

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (UP) -Six of President Truman's plans for streamlining the federal government went into effect today.

Under the most significant of the six, the United States Employ ment Service and the Unemploy ment Compensation Bureau were shifted from the Federal Security Agency to the Labor Department. The shift marked the first step in Mr. Truman's program to build some of its functions in recent years, back to its former strength.
