NEW YORK—(NEA)—For 65 games, or almost one-half of the regular playing season, Charles Dillon Stengel was without the services of Joe DiMaggio.

But with Tom Henrich leading the way, the New York Yankees were alone in first place when America's number one heel came back into the line-up with a bang in Boston.

But three nights later, on July 1 to be exact, and while sporting a lead of 5½ games, Henrich ran into the dugout and over the bat rack in pursuit of a foul ball against the Senators in Washington. The battered right knee became swollen, kept him from the line-up for a time.

It was another in the long list of New York injuries which at last count totaled 45.

"Has any team won the pennant with as many as 45 injuries," was the inquisitive remark asked of Casey Stengel.

Ignoring the blunt question, but well aware of his problems, Stengel quickly changed the subject.

"Why you take that other guy," said Casey, referring to Henrich but conscious that he had a DiMaggio on his club.

"Last word I had from him after getting hit by a foul tip in batting practice was that he had a fractured right big toe, was home in Newark with his foot suspended in air.

"EVERYONE asked me who was going to play first base. I told 'em I didn't know, but Henrich wasn't. He was lost for the week.

"Then I was figuring out my line-up, looked up and saw him taking batting practice. I walked out, took a look at him. He had the toe cut out of his spike, the white stocking painted with ink where it protruded through the hole.

"He saw me, turned and said, 'I'm ready, Skip.'

"What are you going to do with a guy like that?" shrugged Casey. DiMaggio's present mild slump is easily understandable.

Starting out with a bang, the Yankee Clipper has settled down to routine. The long layoff is now showing itself through faulty timing.

Luke Appling's two-run homer in the 10th inning final of the White Sox series looked like the first shutout to be handed the Yankees at home since Mickey Harris and the Red Sox did it, 4-0, April 23, 1948.

Henrich blasted his 17th off Bob Kuzava giving the Bronx Bombers the distinction of going 120 games in Yankee Stadium without a whitewash.

Tom Henrich dates to 1937, and certainly the club spirit will always be strong with Old Reliable a part of it.

Security Agent To Be Here Soon

Glen McNatt, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be in Eastland at the Army Recruiting Office at 10 a. m. on Thursday, August 25. Any persons wishing assistance with retirement or death claims under the Social Security Act are invited to call and see McNatt at that time.

In a statement made today, Mr. Natt urged all workers to check at intervals on their social security accounts. If this is done, each worker will be sure that he receives credit for all wages he earns. The Social Security Admin-

istration takes every precaution to insure the accuracy of the records, but faulty reporting by employers still gives some trouble. Most errors in reports are due to mistakes in the worker's name or account number, or the failure to show any number.

There is no charge for furnishing a statement of wages credited to the worker's security account. Social Security offices stock a self-addressed postal card which can be used for making the request. Any person who wishes one of these postal cards should request it from the Social Security Administration, Abilene.

The elder Mason was killed shortly after he accused Deputy Sheriff Sam Smithwick in a broadcast July 29 of owning a taxi dancehall here where prostitution and vice flourished.

Young Mason tried to carry on his father's campaign but lack of funds forced him to give it up.

Weed Killer Law Ruled Valid

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug 20 (UP)—Attorney General Price Daniel today ruled that an appropriation to the commission of agriculture for administration of the weed killer law was legal and valid.

A question arose over construction of the recently-enacted law, passed by the 51st Legislature. The law, which became effective June 23, set up a 2, 4-D (weed killer) license fund to be used by the commission of agriculture.

In an opinion addressed to J. E. McDonald, commissioner of agriculture, Daniel said the act "made a valid appropriation of the money collected thereunder by the commissioner of agriculture for the purposes therein stated for a period of two years, beginning June 22, 1949, and ending June 22, 1951."

Jump Reading Bible DENVER (UP)—Police found that 28-year-old Herbert E. Roberts had a Bible clutched under his arm as he leaped out of his thirteenth hotel room. 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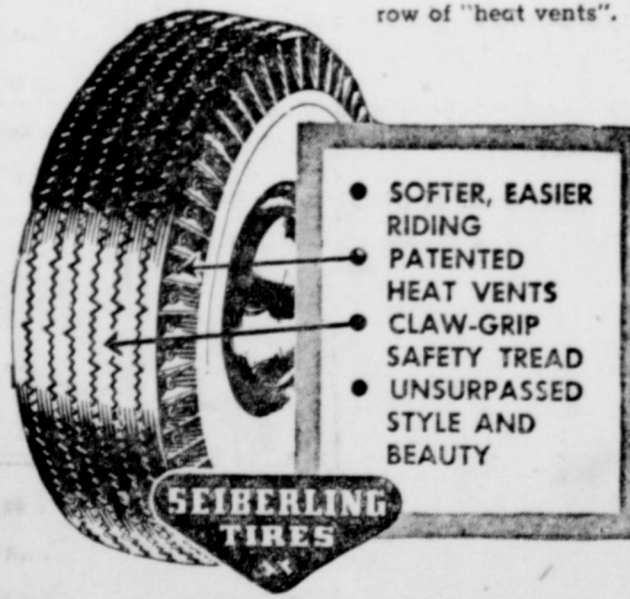
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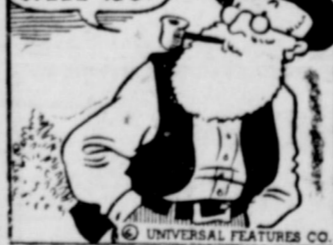
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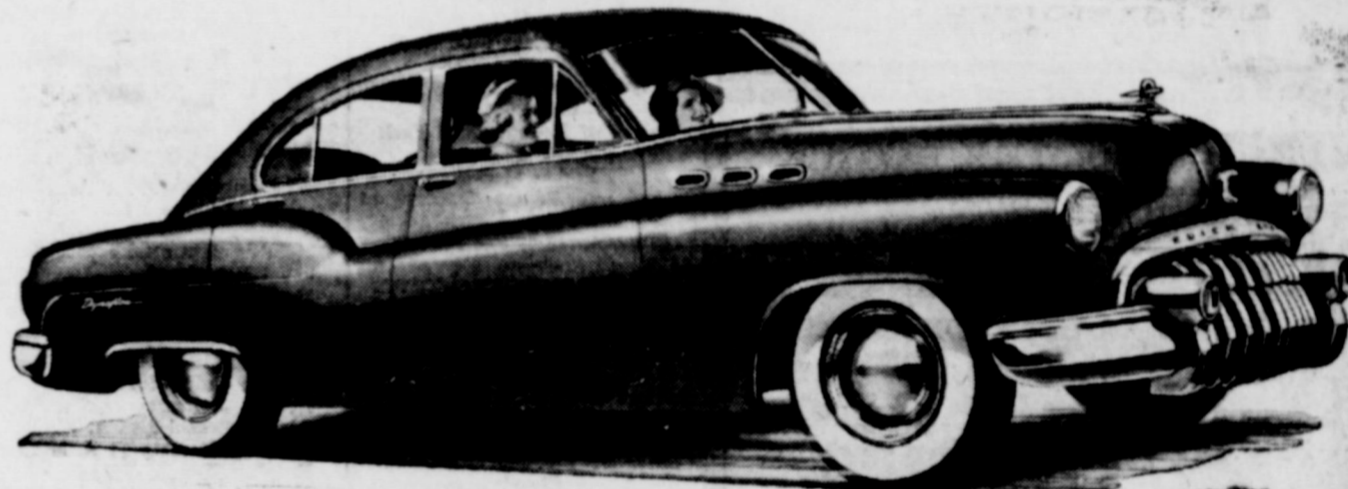
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
