## Hurricane Harry Heading North

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 23. (UP)—Hurricane "Harry" curved north today, apparently ending its threat to Florida but promising to sweep up the Atlantic coast.

A Weather Bureau advisory at 5 A. M. (EST) said the storm was heading north, and was then located about 300 miles east of Melbourne, Fla., about in the middle of the state's coastline.

It was curving the seas with winds rated at up to 100 miles per hour, but had not changed much in size or strength during the night.

The forward speed of the storm center, a calm spot about 25 miles across encircled by the howling winds, was estimated at about 12 miles per hour. However, it was expected to increase during the day and night.

The storm was named for President Harry Truman, who paid a brief visit here yesterday. Miami, and its population of fun-seekers and permanent residents, were glad to see the President come, but even happier to learn that the storm was not coming.

## WTCC WATER PROGRAM BUILDS HOPE FOR AREA

ABILENE, Texas Aug. 23.—Thirsty West Texas today has a new hope for water in a program that may make the entire area a network of pipelines, supplying water from a half-dozen multi-city dams on the major watersheds.

This prospect is seen in a letter from President John D. Mitchell of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to Manager D. A. Bandoen, in which he pledges the organization's support multi-city surveys.

"From our study of our activities on development of our municipal water supply, it appears that the solution is beyond the capacity of the individual cities and that the total solution of the problem must come from complete river basin development and the building of large dams serving several cities," Mitchell wrote.

"The fact is that dam sites are not available for each of our cities and that there are only a few dam sites with ample water-

## FLOOD CONTROL, RIVERS, HARBORS BILL PASSED

Washington, Aug. 23—(UP)—The Senate got a springboard for an argument over the Corps of Engineers versus the Reclamation Bureau in a \$1,114,539, 974 (B) omnibus flood control and rivers and harbors authorization bill.

The argument cropped up before the House passed the measure, 202 to 1, late yesterday, but there was nothing done toward settling it.

The bill is the first such omnibus measure launched since 1946. It carries only the authority for programs. Work can not start until appropriations actually are made.

Projects in the bill come from the engineers corps, which the Hoover Commission recommended be combined with the reclamation Bureau in a money-saving move.

On one occasion in yesterday's House debate, Rep. Cecil White, D., Cal., attacked the engineers as being a vehicle of the power industry while, he said, the reclamation Bureau is "the advocate of public power." He urged the House to take steps to consolidate the two agencies.

But Chairman William M. Whittington, D., Miss., of the House Public Works committee said the House had rejected that idea in 1929 and added: "I for one, have not changed my mind from that action."

The bill authorizes \$995,000, 000 for 39 flood control projects and \$119,539,974 for 2 rivers and harbors projects. The authorizations would be carried out

in future years as the necessary appropriations were voted by Congress.

Projects included in the bill were:

Increased authorizations for flood control projects already in operation—Red River backwater area, \$15,000,000; emergency fund (Lower Mississippi River Basin) \$5,000,000; Canon, Ark., \$430,000; Missouri River, \$250,000,000; Lower Mississippi \$200,000,000; Arkansas River, \$15,000,000; White River, \$35,000,000; Upper Mississippi, \$15,000,000; Rio Grande Basin, \$34,000,000.

New flood control projects authorized—St. Francis River, Mo., and Cache River, Ark., Mo., \$10,000,000; Grand Prairie, Ark. \$6,000,000.

New rivers and harbors projects included—Arkansas River and tributaries, Arkansas and Oklahoma, \$70,000,000; Trinity River at Dallas and Fort Worth, Tex., \$3,410,000; Galveston harbor and channel, Tex., (sea wall) \$5,550,000; Gulf Intercoastal waterway in south Galveston Bay, Tex., \$3,000,000; Brazos Island, Tex., deep draft harbor, \$3,950,000; Little Bay, Tex., \$29,800; Sabine-Neches waterway, Tex., vicinity of Port Arthur Bridge, \$609,270.

## UNIFORMS ISSUED TO MAVERICKS

Uniforms were issued by Coach Wendell Siebert and James Alexander to the 1949 edition of the Eastland High School Maverick football team Monday afternoon following a week of workouts in track attire.

A new wrinkle to the workouts was added in the pushing of "Betty" around a field west of Maverick Stadium. "Betty" is a wooden contraption, having stalls for about six or eight boys, and provides training for the line in offensive tactics. To provide additional weight, Coach Siebert took several "free" rides on the Maverick-powered machine.

The approximate 50 players received the usual exercise and pass practice. Following this, Head Coach Siebert took over the backs and Assistant Coach Alexander, the line, for training.

The backs were given practice in operating the T formation shift and in passing. Leather popping could be heard in the stands as the line started to "bear down" in earnest.

## Predict New Employment High

AUSTIN, Aug. 23 (UP)—The Texas Employment Commission predicted today that non-farm employment in Texas would reach a new high for the year again next month.

The commission announced that July employment was higher than all previous months but estimated that September would show a 16,200 gain to push the non-farm employment figure to 2,330,800.

After regaining the previous month's losses, July reached a high of 2,314,600 employees. Total manufacturing employment showed gains in 13 categories, three losses and four unchanged. Non-manufacturing had eight gains and six losses.

Included in the manufacturing gains were food, transportation equipment and petroleum. In the non-manufacturing bracket, gains were registered in medical services, construction, transportation and service industries.

## DEFIES RED THREAT TO RETALIATE

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 23. (UP)—Yugoslavia told Russia today that it will not "allow anyone whatsoever" to interfere in its internal affairs.

Marshal Tito's government defiantly proclaimed its independence in a reply to Soviet note of last week warning that Russia would take "effective measures" to defend the rights and interests of Soviet citizens in Yugoslavia.

The Soviet note, dated Thursday, denounced Tito's government as made up of "Fascist Lunatics" and defended the Cominform resolution of last year calling upon Yugoslav Communists to "remove" their leaders.

Moscow today renewed its threat to use "more effective measures" against a recalcitrant Yugoslavia.

It charged that the Yugoslav government had suppressed a Cominform call to Yugoslav Communists to remove the Tito regime and had thrown its opponents into jail "by the thousand" to maintain power.

The Yugoslav Communist newspaper Borba retorted that Moscow is afraid to tell the Russian people the truth about the Yugoslav-Russian crisis.

At the same time, Yugoslav officials warned workers to look out for economic sabotage in the form of unexplained accidents and mysterious fires.

Moscow intensified its attack on the Tito government in a three-column editorial in the official newspaper Pravda, organ of the Russian Communist party.

The editorial again accused the Tito government of persecuting and terrorizing Soviet citizens in Yugoslavia and ended with the ominous key sentence from last Saturday's note to Belgrade:

"The soviet government warns the Yugoslav government that it will not reconcile itself to such a state of affairs and will be compelled to resort to other more effective measures in order to defend the rights and interests of Soviet citizens in Yugoslavia and to call to order the extremist Fascist oppressors."

Accompanying the editorial was a cartoon depicting Tito's body shaped like a swastika with his hands wielding an axe labeled "Fascist Terror." The elegant marshal's cap bore dollar signs and Hitler, Mussolini and Himmler smiled approvingly on him.

Pravda said Tito was jailing his opponents by the thousands to suppress all knowledge of a Cominform resolution calling for a "lawful and constitutional change" in the leadership of the Yugoslav communist party.

## COACH SIEBERT PREDICTS RANGER OR HAMILTON TO WIN DISTRICT THIS YEAR

A prediction was made by Head Coach Wendell Siebert of the Eastland High School Maverick football team that Ranger or Hamilton would have the strongest team in the district this season, in an address to the Eastland Rotary Club Monday noon. He further predicted that Dublin would not be far behind them.

In describing the Mavericks' own prospects for the coming year, Coach Siebert declared they would get their pants kicked off of them in the opener with Coleman, Sept. 9. "However, the boys will learn a lot of football that will be invaluable as the season progresses, and we had rather get our pants kicked off and learn something than to defeat a mediocre team as the season starts."

The speaker pointed out that only one regular starter from last year is returning — Co-Captain Glenn Garrett, 142, who played as a guard — and six one year lettermen — none being backfield men. He said efforts were being made to make a back out of Garrett.

Coach Siebert announced that Wendell (Cotton) Reed, 135 pound backfield man, who will attend Eastland High School this year from Morton Valley, had

been declared ineligible. Reed is six weeks past the age limit requirement of the Texas Interscholastic League. Reed had been working out with the squad during the past week and was one of the brightest prospects for a backfield position, Siebert stated.

Given the nod as being the most promising for the backfield slots were: Bob Womack, 140; and Doug King, 135. Both are Juniors, with Womack being a squaddman last season, playing in a guard position.

Coach Siebert said 16 Sophomores had reported out, with 11 having definite possibilities of being good football material by the time they are Seniors. Only five Freshmen boys are out for the team.

One youth, Rodney Stephen, 85, Sophomore backfield man, was given particular praise by the coach. He declared that Stephen was the best passer and kicker in the entire field of 50 candidates, but was too light to make the varsity squad. "If he weighed about 25 more pounds, he would be one of the starters, as he has more hustle and all-around possibilities than any of the others."

Several important Interscholastic League rule changes for the coming season were discussed including one that permits the ball to be run out of the end zone on a punt return, or the ball may be "killed" and automatically set back on the 20. Another new rule is that a clipping penalty will apply only when a boy is blocked on the back below the belt line.

Finances were discussed in detail, with the Coach hoping for a \$3,000 net during the season. Cost of equipment alone will amount to \$2,000, with the remaining \$1,000 to provide for playing officials, transportation, insurance and other necessary expenditures.

Bill Jessop was program chairman for the day and presented the speaker.

During the business session, President Kenneth W. Cowan presided and discussed the proposed Eastland County Dairy Heifer program for youths, giving his personal viewpoints on the worthy project that had proved successful through practical operation in Johnson County.

### Water—Cont'd —

In a study of the Hoover Commission's report, the WTCC recommended that economic loss from lack of water be made criteria for multi-city dam building, as well as flood control.

Banden pointed out that much of the money spent on multi-city dam building, where municipal water would be the principal product, would be reimbursable to the government, but at the same time communities would receive federal aid to which they are not now entitled. This is because of inability to show flood damage on West Texas streams in the 20-inch rain belt.

At the same time the WTCC went on record as approving the Hoover recommendation that municipal water be given the highest priority in multi-city dam building and that hydro-electricity be considered only after all other uses had been provided for.

Already the Bureau of Reclamation is beginning its study of dam building in West Texas, with a view to supplying municipalities with water. First of these studies covered the proposed dam on the Canadian River north of Amarillo near Berger. There a dam and distribution project to cost some \$87 million is recommended for serving nearly a dozen cities. Water would be piped from this dam out of the Canadian basin, across the Brazos and into the Colorado watershed, in serving Lamesa. This is the first project of its kind

proposed in Texas, and it already has the approval of the House of Representatives and a favorable nod from President Truman himself.

Next has come the proposal of 25 towns in the Brazos water shed for the construction of the Bob Paskin dam near Rule, which would impound 310,000 acre feet on the Double Mountain fork of the Brazos river-shed, for domestic and irrigation water. This project previously had been rejected by the Bureau as an irrigation project that would not pay out.

WTCC engineers applied the domestic yardstick and urged a re-consideration on the basis of supplying domestic water to the 25 towns, and the Bureau of Reclamation announced it would re-consider the project in the light of the suggested usage.

In turn the Bureau also has indicated a willingness to investigate other projects, on a basin wide basis, with a view of supplying domestic water with a series of dams. Such a series would be necessary to "divert certain hard and salty waters from the main lakes, so they would provide palatable water for domestic uses.

Already the WTCC has proposed a study of the Big Spring-Odesa project on the upper Colorado, and the Pease River project for a score of towns in the Vernon area. Reclamation service officials from Oklahoma also are making a study of a project on Prairie Dog creek, which would serve Memphis and Childress.

The multi-city water supply idea is not a new one in West Texas, where some town already are having to use water which has been impounded by other municipalities. A number of West Texas towns have had to use tank cars to haul water from neighboring town, when their own supply became exhausted. Coleman, on the Colorado watershed, for nearly two years bought water from Brownwood and served it through Coleman distribution system at a cost ten times greater than normal. Finally Coleman was able to get a dam built in Hords' creek, which now is supplying it with ample water.

The City of Baird, however, now is buying water from Abilene in tank cars. The same is true of Trent. Stamford also is threatened with buying water from Abilene, while other towns in the general area are buying drinking water from tank trucks which haul it in from Sweetwater.

The multi-city dam and pipeline system would put a stop to that.

Western observers believed today the Soviet government is facing failure in its campaign of economic warfare against Marshal Tito.

However, authorities believed that Russia for the time being would go no further than a war of nerves and sabotage against Tito.

Direct military action by Russia or the Soviet satellites was not anticipated.

Reports indicated that Tito's successful defiance of the Kremlin is encouraging other anti-Soviet groups behind the Iron Curtain.

Officials and workers within Yugoslavia itself were warned to beware of economic sabotage such as unexplained train wrecks and fires.

Belgrade reports said Yugoslavia was almost bankrupt. The Russian strategy was believed intended to scare off western help by convincing the west that Tito was a poor risk for investment.

The United States already has granted Yugoslavia an export license for an American steel mill, and loans for specific economic projects are under consideration by the International Bank and the U. S. Export-Import Bank.

Washington reports said it was possible the west might adopt a more liberal attitude toward Yugoslavia's requests for economic help as a means of embarrassing Mos-

The matter is expected to be discussed at length when U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson and British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin meet in Washington next month.
