EXTENSIVE PLANS FORMULATED FOR 1950 HORNED TOAD DERBY

L. E. McGraw, who has been named by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce to serve as chairman for the 1950 Eastland Old Rip Horned Toad Derby, announced extensive plans for the celebration at a meeting of the general committee Tuesday night.

McGraw told 12 delegates, representing various civic and service organizations in the city, that "we were well-pleased with the first annual derby staged last month, but we plan to do it up a little browner next year."

In a financial report on the first derby, he revealed the Chamber of Commerce, sponsors, had total receipts of \$800.10 and expenditures of \$517.48, with a net profit of \$282.62. This amount has been placed in a special derby fund.

Plans for the 1950 derby include awarding a total of \$500 in prizes. The sweepstakes winner will receive \$250; second place \$150; and third place, \$100. Prizes for the first derby were: \$125, \$75, and \$50, respectively, making a total of \$250. A \$5 entry fee will be assessed next year, with a \$25 prize going to heat winners. To enter a heat winner in the sweepstakes race, the fee will be \$15. Under this arrangement, a frog owner will still be \$5 winner even if a heat winner does not take a sweepstakes prize. A goal of 300 entries has been set. Suitable prizes will be offered in the children's races.

and other contests held in connection with the derby.

The steering committee has arranged for certificates to be printed, suitable for framing, to be sent entries in the first derby, stating they are charter members. More elaborate entry blanks will be printed for next year and a souvenir program is planned.

The 1950 derby will be a one day affair, with the Senior derby to be at night on Firemen's Field and other events on the Co. house square.

McGraw said portable seats would be moved in to accommodate the crowd at both the derby and square dance entertainment. Spectators from around the track will be cleared. Concessions will be arranged in a more suitable manner. A better type of chute for starting the frogs is being arranged. Scouts serving as parking attendants will be asked to be in uniform. More lights, streamers and banners are planned in addition to a carnival appearance. Old Rip will be more prominently displayed and honored.

A meeting has been set for Tuesday, Oct. 11 to determine which concessions will be maintained by various organizations. Already assured of their concessions are: Fire Department, soft drinks, and Quarterback Club, drinking stool.

A date for the 1950 derby will be designated soon as possible with all plans and activities to lead up to Eastland's biggest celebration of the year, Metraw stated. He declared the derby has possibilities in four or five years of being an attraction of national importance.

The general committee was asked for suggestions as to other activities to be held in conjunction with the one-day celebration. Among the suggestions were: elect a derby queen; have a rodeo at the Roping grounds; a parade in the morning; moving the children's race to Firemen's Field in order that all might see and many other. Recommendations were tabled for further study.

Weather Favors Open Field Work

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 24 (UP)—Open weather permitted active field work in most of the state last week, the United States Department of Agriculture reported today.

Harvesting was active, the USDA report said, for cotton, corn, sorghums, peanuts, soy and sweet potatoes. Final plowing for small grain seedbeds was being rushed to completion as seeding time approached.

Cotton developed rapidly during the week of warm weather and grain sorghums made good growth in the high plains, the USDA noted. Fall crop plantings of beans, egg plant, peppers and tomatoes in the Laredo-winter garden-Eagle pass area made good progress.

Commercial hatcheries in Texas produced 2,450,000 chicks last month to a total a 29 per cent increase over July a year ago, the USDA reported. However, egg production during the same month was slightly less than a year ago because of less layers on the farms. The rate of lay per bird was reported the same.

Cisco Man Has Fatal Heart Attack

CISCO, Aug. 24 (Sp.)—Carroll S. Surles, 63, real estate and insurance agent, died of a heart attack on U. S. Highway 80, near Santo, Tuesday morning.

Surles and a companion, Joe Coats, also of Cisco, were returning from a fishing trip to Possum Kingdom Lake, when Surles was fatally stricken. He died before aid could be summoned.

Born near Putnam, Surles lived in this area all his life, moving to Cisco in 1922.

Phillips Gets Producer In Gulf

PORT ARTHUR, Tex., Aug. 24 (UP)—Phillips Petroleum Co. officials announced today the completion of the Cameron No. A-1 well in the Gulf of Mexico two and one half miles off the coast of adjacent Cameron Parish La.

The new discovery has a potential of 934 barrels of 42.3 degrees gravity oil daily through a 14-64-inch choke.

The well, located on Louisiana State Block No. 33 of the West Cameron area in the approximate center of a 19,760 block, is producing sand from Miocene age through perforations 10,390 to 10,408 feet. The well and block are owned jointly by Phillips and Kerr-McGee Oil Industries, Inc.

The well was drilled to a depth of 13,282 feet before plugging back to the present producing zone. Two possible producing zones at even shallower depths remain untested.

State Head To Address Car Dealers

W. A. Williamson of San Antonio, manager of the Texas Automotive Dealers Association, will be guests speaker at a dinner meeting of the Oil Belt Automobile Dealers Association in the Victor Hotel at Cisco Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock.

"Cap", as he is affectionally known throughout the state, joined the Texas organization in 1917 just two years after it was organized with a membership roster of 200 members. The roster today contains names of more than 1,550 car dealers in the state.

Out of what was a weed grown cow pasture 30 days ago, the Eastland Golf Course, which will be one of the most modern short links in the Southwest, is expected to be completed within another week, Winslow Cotton, pro at the club, has announced.

Sponsored by the Eastland Quarterback Club, site for the nine-hole course, located north of the city limits near Eastland Lake, was secured on a longtime lease from the city.

Work remaining on the course as of Tuesday afternoon consisted of finishing grading of fairways, placing top soil on the greens and tees, and sowing of grass.

Cotton said the grading work should be completed by Wednesday afternoon, with topping of green and tees to take about three days. It was believed that sowing of grass would begin by Monday.

Other construction work will include digging a 50-yard lake by tee box No. 4, located about midway in the course. A new spur is also to be constructed from the Lone Star Gas Co., to the main gravel road leading to the course, which will require motorists to pass only over the main T. & P. Railroad track. Haydite will be used on the approximate 100 yard spur. In the past, visitors to the lake, have been required to pass over a rough bottleneck affair that required going over both the main track, a spur and a narrow bridge.

Assisting Cotton is Jack Chamberlain, president of the Quarterback Club, who has volunteered his services. Cotton paid special tribute to Chamberlain, who has worked from 12 to 15 hours a day seven days a week, for the past 30 days in helping to make the dream of a golf course for Eastland become a reality.

Other members of the Quarterback Club have volunteered their services.

After initial work on the course grass will be permitted to attain a good growth, with actual play not to start until next spring. A putting green will be rigged up to enable local golfers to practice shots prior to the spring opening of the course. Both Cotton and Chamberlain were agreed that any use of the links before that date would result in damage to the greens, since the grass would not have sufficient time to secure the proper growth.

Soon as the greens are sown with grass, Cotton and Chamberlain planned to start work on a pro shop and caddy house. The 24 by 60 foot two story structure will be built of haydite blocks. Facilities will include a ladies' lounge, men's dressing room, a meeting room for the Quarterback Club, pro office and equipment room. It will be erected on the northwest corner of the course. To the left of the pro shop and caddy house will be the putting green.

Site for the Eastland Golf Course is a natural one—having a slope from the east to the west for drainage, a rich sandy loam soil which makes for excellent greens, and is dotted with beautiful shade oak and pecan trees. Cotton said it was not beyond the realm of possibility that linksters could play golf and eat fee peans at the same time.

Unusual features of the course are that the greens and tees are larger than any in the Southwest, and are modeled after the bigger courses in the Eastern part of the United States. Five of the greens are approximately 90 foot square, three are 60 foot square, and No. 7 green has a diameter of 120 feet. Tee boxes are 25 foot square, with special ones for the lady golfers. Total size of the course is 3,300 yards, approximately 400 yards larger than the Cisco Country Club and 300 yards more than the Ranger course.

Polio Shows Drop The Past Week

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 24 (UP)—Polio has dropped in Texas for the second successive week, Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, announced today.

For the last week, 104 cases were reported as compared with 109 for the preceding period.

Cox expressed hope that the trend indicated a "leveling off" and that the incidence would decline each week until only an occasional case would occur in the state.

"However," the health officer reminded, "this is no time to feel complacent. . . efforts should be continued to make every home, community and camp as sanitary as possible."

The latest report brought the total number of cases for the year to 1,552 and involved 175 Texas counties. During the same period last year, 1,186 cases were reported from 130 counties.

Counties listing five or more cases on the latest report included Harris, 13; Tarrant, 12; Baxar, 6, and Dallas, Hale and Tom Green, 5 each.

Polio was reported for the first time this year from Crosby, Falls, Goliad, Irion, Lavaca, Leon, Farmer and Reeves Counties, Cox said.

The record graduate class is composed mostly of teachers seeking advanced degrees because of provisions of the Gilmer-Aikin bills for Texas public schools.

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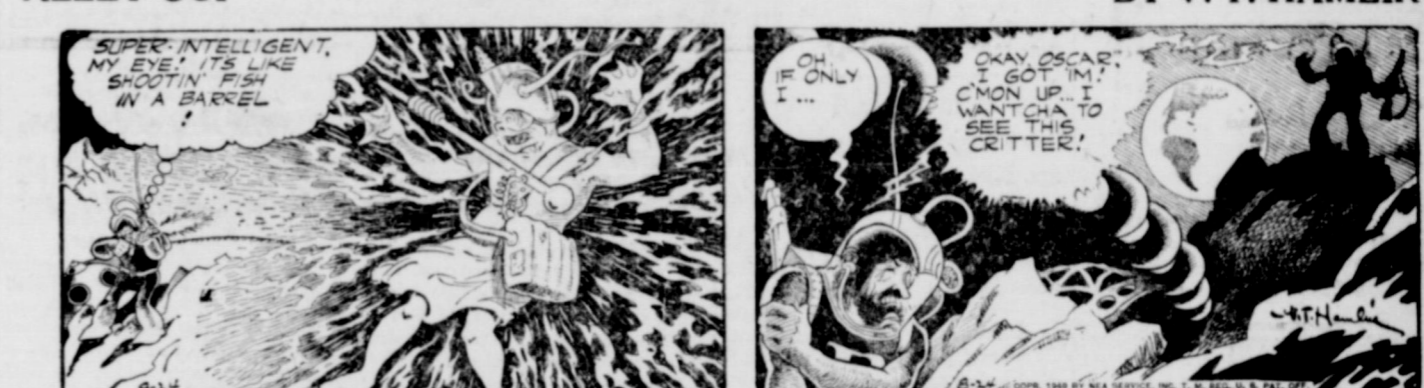

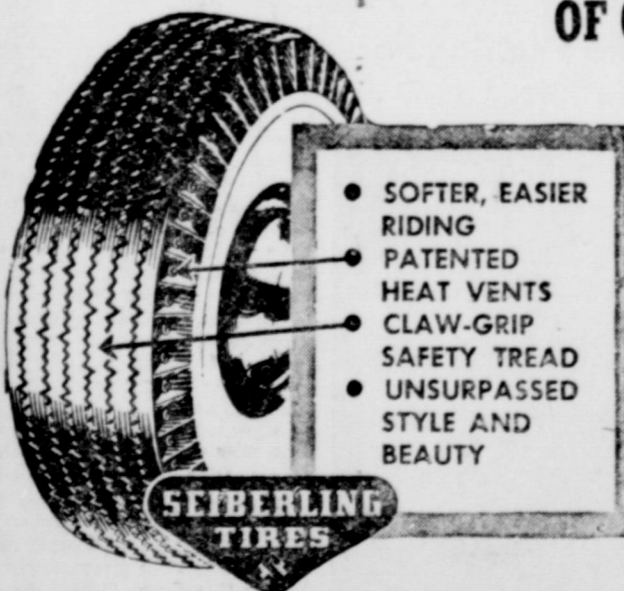


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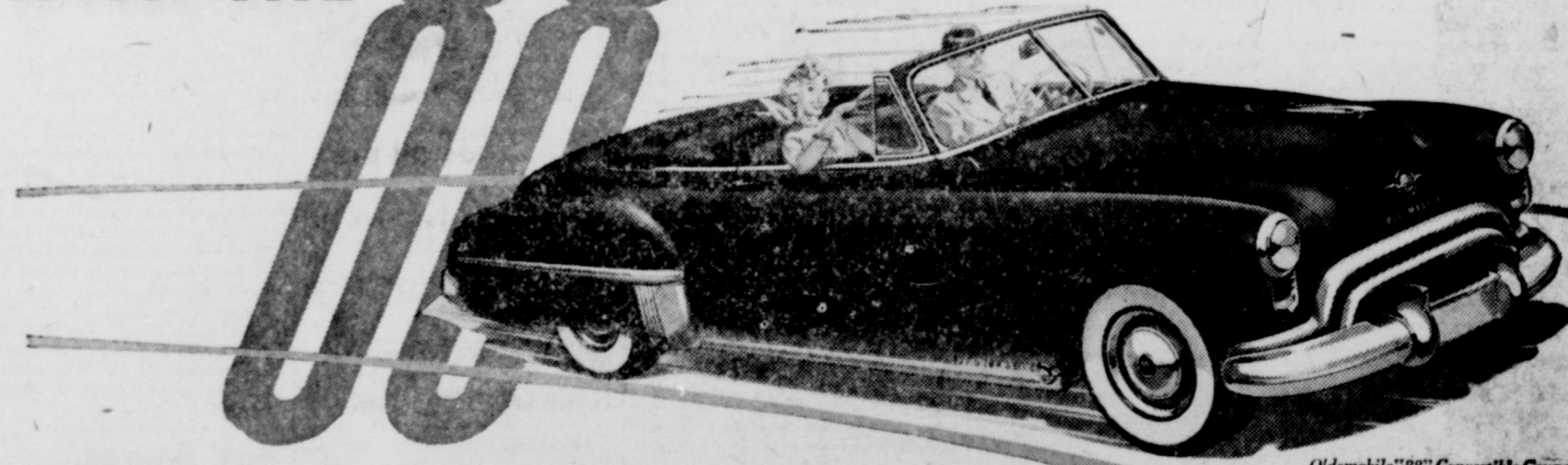
