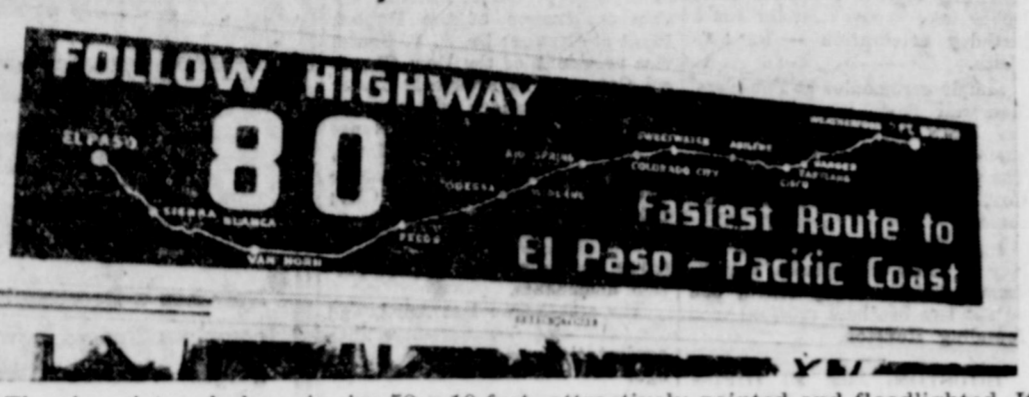
Youngsters Vs. Oldtimers At Roping Club Wednesday

PARENTS REFUSE AID TO SANDRA IN BROWNWOOD JAIL

SOMERVILLE, Mass., Aug. 30 (UP)—The parents of a 17-year-old divorcee held at Brady, Texas, on a murder charge say they will not help their daughter.

"We will have nothing to do with her," Mr. and Mrs. Charles Anageros said, referring to their daughter Sophie.

"We haven't heard from her since last November," the mother said. "I received a postcard at that time from New York telling me that she had married a man by the name of Maurice Peterson."

Her identity was not revealed until yesterday though her parents said they recognized her picture in the newspapers last week. The girl is held with Loretta May Mazingo, 16, of Austin, Tex., on a murder charge in the automobile shooting of Lewis Patterson, 34, a Brady real estate man.

Wade To Assist Prosecution Of W. I. Arwine

DECATUR, Tex., Aug. 30 (UP)—A former Tarrant County assistant district attorney, Herbert C. Wade of Fort Worth, today conferred with County Attorney Tom McMurray to chart prosecution strategy in an attempt to send W. I. (Ike) Arwine to the electric chair.

The county attorney announced last night that Wade has agreed to serve as special prosecutor. His fee will be paid by a group of Wise County residents.

Wade served as first assistant to former Dist. Atty. Jesse Martin in prosecution of O. D. Stevens and Bill May following the much-publicized Handley triple murders. He is a veteran trial lawyer.

Defense Attorney Nolen Sewell said he hopes to begin a sanity hearing tomorrow morning for Arwine, who admitted he killed Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Mash of Bridgeport after Mrs. Mash accused him of criminally assaulting her.

PLANS MAPPED TO SECURE FEDERAL AID ON PROJECTS

No Solution Seen To Lone Star Dispute

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 30 (UP)—No immediate end to negotiations between the Lone Star Gas Co. and its union employees was seen today following a conference of labor officials with Gov. Allan Shivers.

Shivers discussed the deadlock yesterday with a group of five spokesmen of the Oil Workers International Union, CIO led by Fred Schmidt, international representative.

Applications To Be Taken For GI Homes

The union yesterday asked the governor to refer the matter to the industrial commission since Shivers twice had refused to intervene in setting up arbitration machinery.

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Eastland and Ranger representatives met with delegations from Gorman and DeLeon Monday in Abilene for a conference with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation with the view of securing possible Federal aid on the construction of a joint Ranger-Eastland dam on the Leon River.

Harry P. Burleigh, Austin, States planning engineer of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, told the Eastland County delegation that under present regulations the Bureau of Reclamation does not make financial grants for domestic water supply projects. While it can assume the cost of reservoirs, cities aided must pay back through the purchase of water, usually over a 40-year period.

Burleigh said his agency will probably have a preliminary report ready by next March. This should show "within approximately 90 per cent" what the price of water to the municipalities would be and, in the bureau's places to construct the dams for all West Texas. Then the West Texas cities would be asked by the bureau if they will still want the over-all plan pursued. He thought a report could be submitted to Congress in 1951 to cover the project.

GALVESTON, Aug. 30 (UP)—Galveston County's ninth polo case of the year was recorded today with the diagnosis of a 5-year old boy.

The city itself reported its sixth case of the year—a University of Texas Medical School student stricken with the disease.

BROWNWOOD, Aug. 30 (UP)—The Texas State Checker Association went into the second of its threeday tournament here today.

The board includes, in addition to McCarthy: Clark Barrett, assistant manager of the Dupont Plant at Orange; Dr. A. P. Beutel vice president of the Dow Chemical Company at Freeport; Lester Clark, Breckenridge oil operator and former member of the House of Representatives; Joseph Mares, vice president of the Monsanto Chemical Company, Texas City; Otho Plummer, mayor of Beau-

mont; W. R. (Bob) Smith, Jr., San Antonio lawyer and former federal district attorney, and Ernest R. Winstel, Port Arthur, representative of the Boiler-makers Union, A. F. L.

At the same time, the governor designated as acting chairman Dr. A. M. McAfee of Port Arthur.

McAfee was named to the board by the late Gov. Beauford Jester and confirmed at the regular session of the 51st Legislature.

Terms of the new regents are: two years, Winstel, Smith and Beutel; four years, Barrett, Mares and McCarthy, and six years, Clark and Plummer.

Smithwick To Face Grand Jury

ALICE, Tex., Aug. 30 (UP)—Former Deputy Sheriff Sam Smithwick will face a Jim Wells County grand jury as soon as it goes into session in its investigation of the slaying of newscaster Bill Mason.

Three jury commissioners will be named to select a 16-man grand jury panel at a special term of the 79th District Court, which will convene here Friday at 10 A. M.

As soon as the list is completed, the date for the empanelling of the jury will be set. Smithwick, held in jail without bond, was charged with shooting Mason to death last July 29 one day after the newscaster had accused the deputy of operating a nightclub allegedly used by gamblers and prostitutes.

District Attorney Sam Reams said numerous organizations were pressing him for permission to send special prosecutors to assist him when Smithwick goes to trial. Reams said he would not permit the "courtroom to become overrun with attorneys," but asked the organizations to decide on the names of two special prosecutors who would assist him.

This map spots series of "nerve war" incidents which observers connect with Russia's August 18 note to Yugoslavia, threatening "more effective measures". Soviet troops and armored divisions are reported moved from Romania to Hungarian-Yugoslav border, concentrated at Mohacs (1) and Szeke (2). On Aug. 12 a Soviet warship appeared at Kladovo (3) on Yugo-Romanian frontier, steamed 200-miles up Danube, through Yugoslav territory to Hungary and two days later steamed down the same route, ignoring Yugoslav signals to halt. A mysterious fire, reportedly set by Cominform agents, broke out at Fimue (4), 3rd largest oil refinery in Europe. Yugoslav troops are being concentrated at Pola (5) naval base and at the nearby Arsa coal mines. Reports though denied, persisted that four unidentified planes, flying from direction of Albania, bombed the Yugoslav army airfield at Pristina (6). Moscow denied reports that a special meeting of the Soviet satellite Cominform members has been at Sofia (7). (NEA Telephoto)

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Sen. Harris To Seek Lieutenant Governor's Job

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 30 (UP) — State Sen. Fred (Red) Harris of Dallas today began a race for the lieutenant governor's seat in next year's election.

He became the first to announce for the office last night, when he made it known he would seek re-election to the Senate. He seeks the office vacated by Gov. Allan Shivers who was elevated to his present position of the death of Gov. Beauford H. Jester.

Harris, a Naval hero of World War II, made his entry into politics in 1935, when he was elected to the Texas House of Representatives. He served in the House from Dallas County during the 44th, 45th and 47th sessions. He later served as county commissioner in Dallas County, having been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Vernon Singleton. He resigned in 1942 to enlist in the Navy.

One of the most outspoken voices in the Senate, Harris engineered the longest filibuster of the 51st. Legislative session. He led the filibuster against the basic science bill as it originally was written and finally reached a compromise with proponents of

the measure. Harris held the floor 11 hours and 4 minutes. During the war, Harris served as a Navy lieutenant aboard the Aircraft Carrier, USS Franklin and was decorated with the Navy Cross, Bronze Star and two Purple Hearts.
