Yugoslav Diplomat Back To UN As Tension Grows

RETURN ORDERED AFTER RUSSIA MOVES MORE TROOPS TO BORDER

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 31 (UP) — Russia massed five armored divisions on the Yugoslav border today and Yugoslavia immediately rushed an ambassador back to United Nations headquarters in New York to stand by for action.

The ambassador, Dr. Joza Vifan, left Belgrade by plane shortly after authoritative sources disclosed that recent Russian troop maneuvers have placed 50,000 men, 500 tanks and numerous warplanes along a 150-mile front menacing Yugoslavia's northern frontier.

Marshal Tito's personal elite guard, a force estimated at 300,000 men, publicly pledged today that the guard would die fighting if Yugoslavia was invaded.

"We are prepared to give our lives" for Yugoslavia's defense against the Cominform, the pledge said.

It can be said on good authority that Vifan was being hurried back to his post at Lake Success to be ready should Russia's troop movements force Marshal Tito to charge the Soviet Union before the United Nations with menacing world peace.

Vifan boarded the plane for Zurich en route to New York early today. He tossed back a smiling "no comment" to questions addressed by the lone reporter who saw him off.

Although Vifan returned to Yugoslavia only a few weeks ago for a vacation, it was known he spent virtually all his holiday in close conferences with foreign office chiefs.

Simultaneously with Vifan's departure, the Yugoslav Communist party newspaper Borba accused Premier Josef Stalin of duplicity and said Yugoslavia could not have any faith in the Soviet leadership.

There was no government reference as yet to the Soviet note of Aug. 29, which was distributed by the Soviet news agency Tass last night and broadcast by Radio Moscow.

Significantly, it was learned that the Yugoslav government did not receive its copy of the Soviet note until after Tass began sending it to the entire world.

The new note again denounced the Tito regime as "deserters from the camp of Socialism" and warned that Russia "does not respect deserters."

The Soviet forces mass on Yugoslavia's northern frontier were strategically placed within one day's drive across 15 miles of flat plains to Belgrade.

Weather Last Week Good For Texas Crops

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 31 (UP) — Texas' weather last week was ideal for crop growth and harvesting, the United States Department of agriculture reported today.

The dry, weather caused rapid development of cotton, the USDA report said, while commercial vegetables in the fall and early winter irrigated districts made good progress.

However, the department added, many areas of the state were too dry to plow and a general rain would benefit late feed crops and pastures in all areas, even though it would delay cotton harvest.

Eastland Has Rain Shower

An early morning shower of rain in Eastland brought cooler temperatures, relieving the hot weather for the past several days.

Dr. E. Stanley Jones To Speak In Fort Worth

Dr. E. Stanley Jones, spearheading the nation-wide Crusade for a United Church of America will speak in Fort Worth on September 21. Final arrangements have been completed with the Crusade headquarters in Boston.

A luncheon will be in Wesley Hall of First Methodist Church. A large attendance is assured for this popular speaker at the evening mass meeting to be held in the Will Rogers Memorial Auditorium at 7:45 p. m.

Dr. Jones has recently returned from India, where he has been a missionary for forty-one years. At present he is spending six months of each year there and six months in the United States conducting the Crusade for a United Church and a series of Christian Missions. In the last two years he has carried the Crusade to fifty-seven cities to which were drawn church leaders from 1,000 towns. His 1949 itinerary includes engagements in thirty additional cities in which he will speak to an estimated audience of 60,000.

Mrs. J. C. Paylor, Chairman of the Fort Worth Crusade Committee, has announced that the city ministers as well as those in the surrounding towns are giving their active support to the Crusade in an endeavor to make Dr. Jones' visit one of the outstanding events of the year in church cooperation. The wide sponsorship of these Crusade engagements insures that a cross section of the religious life of the city will be on hand to hear Dr. Jones.

Among the original sponsors of the Crusade are Herbert Hoover, Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, Andrew H. Phelps, Lowell Thomas, Governor Luther W. Youngdahl, J. C. Penney, Mrs. Wendell L. Willkie, Douglas Southall Freeman, and Mrs. Harper Sibley.

Dr. Jones is well-known to millions of readers of religious books of which he is author of fifteen. Three of these are best sellers, Christ of the Indian Road, Abundant Living, and The Way. Several of Dr. Jones' books have been translated into as many as twenty different languages.

Rains Dropping Temperatures

Light rain fell in the Panhandle and northwest Texas early today, and temperatures in the region were in the comfortable 60's.

Elsewhere across Texas, readings were mostly in the 70's. For the next 36 hours, the U. S. Weather Bureau forecast no drastic changes in the weather picture, mostly one of moderation.

Presidio's 102 degrees was yesterday's high. At Amarillo and Dalhart, the top was 82 yesterday afternoon, and Texarkana's top for the days was 83.

The temperature range this morning was from 62 at Dalhart and Marfa to 80 at Galveston. Other lows include 63 at Amarillo, 67 at Texarkana; 71 at Dallas, 72 at Houston, and 73 at San Antonio.

Childress got the heaviest down-pour out of today's early showers which had ceased by mid-morning. The rain gauge there registered .91 inch. Other rain reports included Mineral Wells, .79 inch; Clarendon, .45; Glaude, .16; Dalhart, .09; Dumas, .04; Panhandle, .01.

Driscoll Fortune To Build Hospital

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (UP) — The Driscoll Foundation announced today that it would build a \$2,250,000 children's hospital at Corpus Christi, Tex., which will serve children up to 16 years of age free of charge regardless of financial condition, race or religion.

The foundation, founded by the late Mrs. Clara Driscoll of Corpus Christi, said the hospital will accommodate 100 patients at first.

Soviet Deserter Sent Home On Own Suggestion

VIENNA, Austria, Aug. 31 (UP) — A Russian air force deserter who spent seven months in the United States, was returned to the Soviets at his own request today, the mystery of his change of heart unexplained.

American soldiers escorted Lt. Anatoly P. Barsov, 31, to the Soviet zonal border station at Urfahr and turned him over to Russian authorities. He evidently was confident he would suffer no drastic punishment for his "desertion."

Only 10 months ago Barsov and Lt. Piotr Pirogov crash landed their Soviet reconnaissance plane near Linz in the American zone of Austria. They said they had "escaped" from Russia, were fed up with Communism, and wanted to become "good American citizens."

After a lengthy investigation, the United States took them at their word and took them to the United States as political refugees last February. Pirogov is still there, but Barsov was brought back to Austria a week ago after he visited the Soviet embassy in Washington July 28 and said he had repented his flight and wanted to return to Russia.

The brief Army announcement of its surrender of Barsov to the Russians gave no clue as to what lay behind the Soviet lieutenant's change of heart.

But it aroused suspicion in the minds of many that he might have been a Soviet "plant" in the first place. Otherwise, they believed, death or imprisonment awaited him in his homeland because of his bitter anti-Communist statements in the United States.

Polio Believed On Drop In Texas

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 31 (UP) — State Health Officer George W. Cox reported today polio dropped from 104 to 69 cases last week and expressed hope the disease may be on the decline in Texas.

The latest report marked the first time in four weeks that the number had dropped below the 100 mark.

Polio was reported from 34 Texas counties. However, for the first time in weeks, no new counties joined the list.

The total for the year mounted to 1,821 cases, as compared with 1,257 during the same period last year. For all of 1948, the total was 1,765 cases, 144 more than the present figure.

Cox expressed belief that weeks in which new cases would reach the 100 mark were over for the year. However, he cautioned that "we've been wrong about this before."

A report by counties showed a listing of new cases including: Tarrant, 10; Bexar, 8; Harris, 3; Dallas, 3; Tom Green, 4; Wichita, 1; Jefferson 1; Victoria, 1; McClennan, 1; and Nueces, 3.

LEAST SAID, THE BETTER ON STRAWN SCRIMMAGE HERE

The least said, the better about the inter-city scrimmage held between the Eastland High-School Mavericks and the Strawn Greyhounds, a Class B team, Tuesday afternoon at Maverick Field.

One thing was for sure, the scrimmage provided excellent practice for the Mavericks and enabled Coaches Wendell Seibert and James Alexander to determine many flaws that can possibly be corrected before the non-conference opener with the Coleman Blue Cats Friday night, Sept. 9. Here.

The score was 12 to 12 between Eastland and Strawn, but that doesn't mean much as emphasis was placed by coaches on fundamentals and not in the scoring department.

It is difficult to say if the Strawn delegation looked good, or Eastland play was ragged. We're inclined to think the latter. While Coach M. J. Schofield had a fairly heavy team, with eight lettermen back from the 1948 season, they were in the cellar last year in their District. During practice, about seven boys had been reporting out, but about three times that many were on

hand for the scrimmage with Eastland.

Strawn opened the scoring early in the scrimmage, making the TD on a pass. Eastland came back a few minutes later to score with Jimmie Spalding, left half back carrying the ball on a sweep to the left. Spalding turned in some nice runs for the Mavericks during the session, getting off to yard-gaining jaunts around left end.

A sneak play to the left side resulted in the Greyhound's second score, with Eastland retaliating on a quarterback sneak and Doug King carrying the pigskin. An inter-city scrimmage between Eastland and Gorman had been tentatively scheduled for this afternoon at Maverick Field, but rain may cause postponement.

Another scrimmage with Stephenville has been set Friday afternoon at Maverick Field.

Uniforms To Be Worn By Replacements

Dr. Whitehead At Convention

Dr. Ralph Newton Whitehead of Eastland is attending the Annual Convention of the International Chiropractors Association in Davenport, Iowa, according to word received today. Over 5000 Chiropractors from the United States, Canada, and many foreign countries are in attendance at the Chiropractic meeting which lasts through September second.

Dr. Whitehead pointed out that the International Chiropractors Association is placing special emphasis on a research project to discover the relationship between industrial health costs and Chiropractic. It is reported that over 400 insurance companies, and workmen's compensation statistics from 43 states and provinces are being studied in this project. Results of the first year's findings will be made available this Fall to leaders of labor and industry, it was pointed out by Dr. Whitehead.

Uncle Tom Nabers, as he was known to his many friends, suffered a heart attack during the morning service of the Methodist meeting in progress in Desdemona, and was carried to the hospital in Gorman.

He was born in Comanche of pioneer parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Nabers. He has been living in Desdemona for the past 25 years and has served as Justice of the Peace for the past 20 years during his time of office, he had an opponent only one time and his opponent received only four votes.

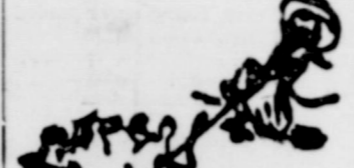
