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Don't Shoot At Birds On Phone Lines

"Please don't shoot at birds on telephone lines," is the plea of W. H. McNally, manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, who says that each year thousands of telephone wires are broken by stray shots during the hunting season.

"Birds can fly away," McNally said, "but telephone wires just have to sit there and take it. It's not that the hunters deliberately try to hit the wires, and I don't think sportsmen would shoot at a sitting bird on a wire, but I guess they just don't realize that a hasty shot, might cause serious damage to telephone lines and disrupt long distance service."

Explaining the yearly dilemma, McNally pointed out that each hunting season money, man-hours and telephone calls are lost through gunfire damage to telephone lines. "It would help a lot," he said, "if hunters would be very careful when they are in the vicinity of telephone lines. Even if a bullet or shot only nicks the wire, when cold weather comes the wire contracts and the added stress may cause it to break."

One solution advanced by the manager was that telephone engineers might try to develop a type of wire that would move when shot at. "In the meantime," he said, "all we can do is to ask hunters to be careful when shooting at birds near telephone wires."

Metalloscope Used In Search Of Old Gold Mine

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 1 (UP)—A scientist was trying to track down gold today in an old Spanish mine with a nelectronic "metalloscope".

Charles M. Bootman, 46, a St. Louis geophysicist is probing an ancient gold mine first worked by the Spaniards centuries ago.

He leased the mine, called the Madre Veda (mother vein) which has its mouth in Arkansas and the remainder in Missouri, near the hamlet of Pineville.

Legends claim that the Spaniards overlooked the mine's richest treasures. A previous owner learned from his father that a dying Indian said gold would be found in the mine "but water must be moved."

"Legends often are based on fact," Bootman said, "and in checking the Madre Veda I came across facts justifying a metalloscope test."

The metalloscope reports electrical half as much water "as I usually do."

When asked how he expected to live without food, Cain answered: "God will take care of me."

The sheriff said his prisoner's health appeared good, but Cain added that he felt "fine."

He has read half of the New Testament since he was jailed for failing to pay \$10 monthly to the support of his child, Nina Mae, 14.

Cain was ordered to help support the child when he obtained his second divorce from his wife in 1945. His former wife since has remarried.

HOBAT, Okla., Sept. 1 (UP)—Ernest Wesley Cain, a tall lay preacher jailed for child abandonment, today began his ninth day of fasting and said he had "no desire for food."

Sheriff Leon Jennings of Kiowa County emphasized that Cain, 45, was not on a "hunger strike."

He said the Holiness Pentecostal preacher, dressed in blue denim overalls, was just "fasting."

Jennings reported Cain had been offered three meals a day but refused to eat.

Life-Termer May Get Out To Hear His Cantata Played First Time

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Sept 1 (UP)—A life-term convict who composed a 75-page musical composition in his cell without the aid of a piano may get a few days of freedom so he can hear his work for the first time.

Frank M. Grandstaff, 47-year-old former piano salesman jailed for life under Tennessee's "habitual criminal" law, composed the 11-movement cantata mentally, tapping a pencil on his cell wall to get the time right.

He called it "Big Spring" after the Texas town of the same name a town he used to visit during his salesman days.

Big Spring is observing its centennial anniversary on Oct. 2, and the townspeople want Grandstaff to be there when his cantata is presented.

Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas wired Tennessee's Gov. Gordon Browning, asking for help in granting Big Spring's wish.

"All we want is for Tennessee to let Grandstaff out of prison long enough for him to go to Big Spring and hear a presentation of his cantata," the Texas governor wired. "We'll see that he gets back."

Browning, attending the American Legion convention in Philadelphia, was not immediately

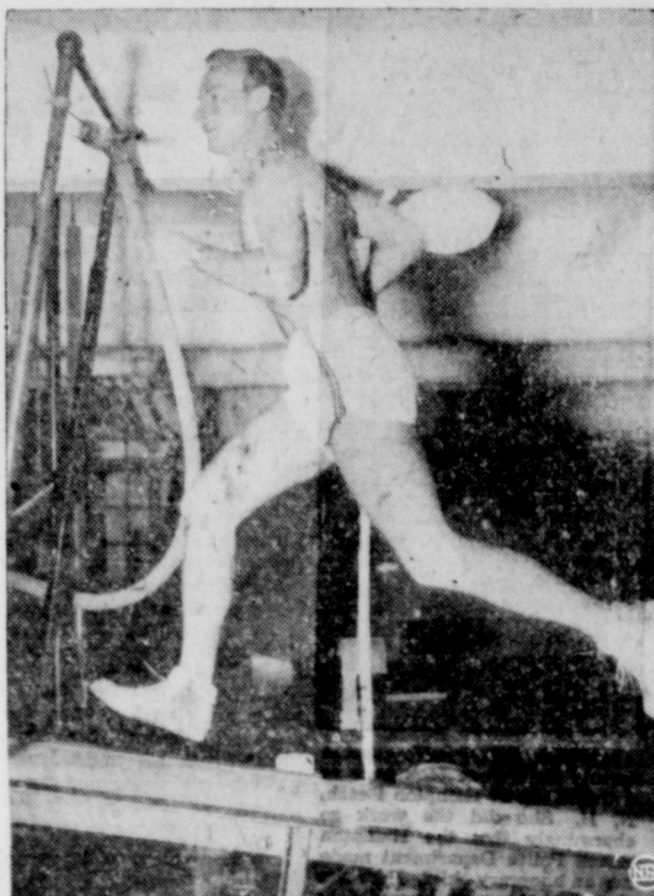
Money Talks May Hit Oil

In a letter to Texas Senior Senator Tom Connally, Hovey said the sessions on Britain's dollar crisis should be public, and that oil men, officials of oil-producing states and other interested parties should be allowed to sit in. Hovey stated that the British still had not given up the idea of the Anglo-American oil treaty, negotiated in 1945 and 1946. (That measure, which would have effected a degree of international oil control, failed in the U. S. Senate in 1947.) Fish can be frozen in solid ice for long periods and still survive. Naturalists say they should thaw out gradually, however.
