## Baby Sitter Stabbed To Death

**FERRIS, Tex., Sept. 12 (UP)**—A farmer, apparently jealous of a pretty 23-year-old baby sitter he had hired, stabbed her to death late yesterday and was himself wounded in an argument with another farmer.

The wounded farmer stabbed the baby sitter at the home of another farmer they were visiting, Dallas County Sheriff Bill Decker said.

The woman was not immediately identified.

Decker said the farmer had hired her about three weeks ago to stay with his children while he picked cotton.

Yesterday, the sheriff recounted, the farmer and the baby sitter went to the home of Mozeano Pena Cano, a nearby farmer. The young woman danced with some men who were at Cano's home, the sheriff was told.

Decker said the farmer, apparently overcome with jealousy, stabbed the woman as they sat on the edge of a bed.

Cano and the farmer then got into an argument about the stabbing, Decker said, and Cano shot the farmer in the shoulder with a shotgun, wounding him seriously.

The farmer was taken to an Emory, Tex., hospital, but Decker said he probably would be re-

moved later to Parkland Hospital in Dallas and also would be charged, probably today.

## Strikers Ready To Attend Meet

**ST. LOUIS, Sept. 12 (UP)**—Four brotherhoods on strike against the Missouri Pacific Railroad said today they would attend a meeting called by a citizens' committee in an effort to end the three-day-old walkout.

Indications were that Mo-Pac officials would also agree to meet with the committee at 2 P. M. They were meeting to decide whether to attend the conference and the committee chairman expressed hope they would decide to do so.

Roy E. Davidson, spokesman for the brotherhoods, said he and his associates would meet with the seven-member committee which was organized to "break the ice" between management and the unions. Both sides contended that they would not take the initiative to start negotiations.

## Change Of Venue Ordered For Sam Smithwick Trial

**ALICE, Tex., Sept. 12 (UP)**—Judge Paul A. Martineau today, on his own motion, granted a change of venue in the murder trial of Sam Smithwick, ex-deputy sheriff charged in the slaying of W. H. (Bill) Mason, crusading newscaster, here last July 29.

The judge ordered site of trial changed to Belton, Tex., in Bell County, some 250 miles north of here.

Defense Attorney W. M. Wilder presented a motion, after Smithwick had entered a formal plea of not guilty at his arraignment, for a change of venue on grounds his client could not receive a fair trial here.

District Attorney Sam Reams also requested a change of venue. After denying both motions, Judge Martineau said he agreed with the

defense and the state that Smithwick could not get an impartial trial here because of publicity in the slaying.

"It is the opinion of the court," he said, "that things that exist in Jim Wells County exist in all adjoining counties. Under these circumstances, it is necessary that the court overrule both the state and the defense. My thought is that the case be transferred to Bell County."

Had the judge granted either motion, it would have been necessary under state law to change the site of the trial to the nearest county seat town which would have been San Diego, Tex., in Duval County, only about 12 miles west of Alice.

Judge Martineau said all matters relating to the Smithwick case would be sent to Bell County immediately for the next term of court.

The grand jury, meantime, continued its investigation into other matters in Jim Wells County. One of the witnesses summoned was Claude McConnell, former deputy and jailer who also was the tar-

## LEAGUE PLAY SCHEDULE TO BE QUICKENED

The pace steps up on the Texas Interscholastic League football front this week with 60 games on tap involving Class AA and City Conference teams and by Saturday night every team in those divisions will have had its initial 1949 test.

The 37 teams (24 AA and 13 City) which didn't get mixed up in last week end's hullabaloo of upsets and tests will join in the fun as every district sees action.

Some of last week's favorites that fell victims to upsets will get a chance to redeem themselves. For example: Odessa, mildly upset by Port Arthur 27-13 Saturday night, takes on Sweetwater, which dropped Vernon 14-0.

Ablene, held to a 7-7 tie by Breckenridge, runs into a fair Fort Worth Arlington Heights team making its season debut.

San Angelo, upset by Denison

20-12, gets a breather against El Paso Bowie, which was knocked over by El Paso Cathedral 21-0.

Gainesville, redely joined by Grand Prairie 26-7, runs into another tough customer in Dallas Jesuit, the Dallas Catholic school that put a big crimp in Nacogdoches' hopes with a 12-0 licking.

Nacogdoches, likewise, gets a rugged foe in Henderson, a team that knocked over Jacksonville 32-0.

San Antonio Jefferson, rated one of the city's powers along with Brackenridge, was plastered with a 27-6 setback by Austin and this week meets a Temple team rated by many as one of the state's best.

Brackenridge, 6-0 loser to Kerrville, catches Beaumont South Park on the rebound from an unexpected 7-0 defeat by Texas City.

The week end also will mark the first appearance of the defending AA champion Waco Tigers, who bow against the tough Austin Maroons.

## Football Hall Of Fame Goes To Rutgers U.

**NEW YORK, Sept. 12 (UP)**—College Field at Rutgers University, New Brunswick, N. J. scene of the first American intercollegiate football game in 1869, today was selected as the site for the National Football Hall of Fame. The announcement was made by Asa Bushnell, secretary of the National Football Shrine and Hall of Fame, Inc.

The Rutgers field was chosen upon the recommendation of the site selection committee and was endorsed in a nationwide mail

poll by the American Association of Football Coaches and the National Football Writers' Association.

College Field was the site for the nation's first college football game between Rutgers and Princeton on Nov. 6, 1869.

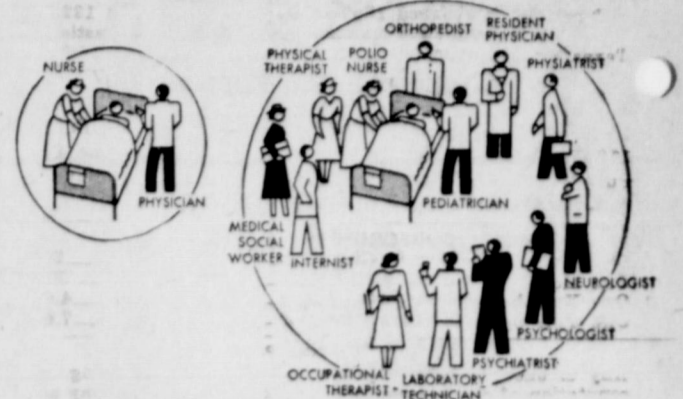
Boggus will tackle the yearlings from a tackle spot through a five game schedule. Boggus was

## SOME AID FOR BRITAIN SET AS TALKS NEAR END

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (UP)—The three-power dollar conference went into its final round today with Britain apparently assured of some American aid and hopeful of getting a further hand by shifting part of her Far Eastern military burdens to this country.

The American, British, and Canadian delegates returned to the state department for what Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder said may be the last in the series of talks that began last week.

When they quit work tonight, they hope to have a number of agreements for helping Britain out of her dollar crisis. But there was no sign that anything like a complete solution for the British economic troubles had been found. Canadian Finance Minister Douglas Abbott, head of the Dominion delegation told a luncheon meeting at the National Press Club that the conference has made "very encouraging progress."

But he warned against expecting that the conference had produced a "complete answer" to the problem or that it assured any "immediate relief" for Britain.

"We have determined what steps can be taken at this time," he said, "and, above all, we have agreed on the direction in which we must all work... we have made a good beginning."

British efforts appeared to be concentrated on the Far East. They were believed to have sought the support of Gen. George C.

Marshall for a plan to shift some of their military obligations in that area to the United States. Marshall could lend great prestige to such a plan.

Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin lunched yesterday with Marshall at the latter's Virginia estate. British sources said the accent of their conversation was on Asia.

India now is regarded by United States and British officials as the key to peace in Asia and the biggest obstacle to the spread of Communism in the Far East. The plan now under discussion would be for the United States to assume some or all of the burden of holding the line there.

But the 18 year old brunette, whose ambition is to be a "real dramatic actress" still was so flustered today about winning the nation's most glamorous beauty crown that she still wasn't able to make up her mind to sign the contract.
