



John's Episconal Church. The body will be cremated. Parker, a native of Ithaca, Mich spent almost all his 40 years in the newspaper business with the Scripps-Howard chain. A vigrous writer and erusader, he won a Pulitzer prize for editorial writ-

ng in 1936. He began his newspaper career with the old Oklahoma News a year after his graduation from the University of Oklahoma in 1908. In the ensuing years, he served

as city editor, managing editor and editor of the news. In 1920, he became editor of the Scripps-Howard Cleveland Press. Two years later, he was named editor-in-chief of south-western papers with head-Gordon Wayne Cooper, son of
