3 Junior High Dogies, Women Injured In Accident Last Night

Three Eastland Junior High football stars and a Breckenridge woman were injured, none seriously in a pick-up car accident last night at 8:45 o'clock, two miles north of Eastland on State Highway 6.

State Highway Patrolman Oscar Avera, who investigated, said a 1947 Chevrolet pick up driven by Hill Gaeta, 14, going south toward Eastland, started to pass a 1937 LaFayette driven by Alexander A. Kime of Breckenridge, also traveling south. As the pick up started around the car, it struck a muddy shoulder causing the driver to lose control and as a result the two vehicles collided and overturned, Avera stated. Both vehicles sustained considerable damage.

Gaeta, fullback for the Dogie team, was unconscious immediately after the wreck and was brought to the Caton-Cowan Clinic in Eastland. He was released later in the evening suffering from a slight back injury.

Gerald Ables, who plays a right half position for the team, was taken to his home where he was treated by a physician for a back injury. Ables was to be x-rayed this morning to determine possible external injuries.

Billy Jordan, Dogie end, remained at the scene of the accident to answer questions, despite minor injuries. He was later taken to the Caton-Cowan Clinic by a Telegram reporter, where he received emergency treatment for a bruised shoulder and lacerations of the knees.

The sheriff's office said a nightfall search disclosed no trace of the missing child.

Dutton aided in the search for his missing daughter but Mrs. Dutton spent the night under medical care.

Authorities said they virtually had given up hope of finding the child alive. They believed at first that she was in one of the cars which was partly submerged but a thorough search was futile. It was possible, they said, the child was thrown clear of the tangle of cars into the mud and water surrounding the disaster scene.

Hilton May Buy Waldorf-Astoria

NEW YORK, Oct. 11 (UP)—The Hilton Hotels Corporation is negotiating to purchase the world-famous Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, it was learned today.

Barring a last-minute hitch, it was understood that Hilton would purchase 366,380 shares of Waldorf-Astoria capital stock for approximately \$16 each, or almost \$6,000,000.

In addition the company would assume the hotel's outstanding bonded debt and its lease obligations to the New York Central Railroad Company, which owns the site.

Fires Cause Many Business To Close Doors

Four out of every ten businesses which suffer serious fires never reopen their doors, Fire Chief A. W. Hennessee pointed out today in urging local business leaders to join in the observation of Fire Prevention Week, October 9 to 15.

"Fires don't just happen," the Chief observed. "There is always a reason for them, and we know enough about those reasons so we can cut down the number of fires.

"For example, we know that millions and millions of dollars go up in smoke each year simply because customers and clerks are careless with cigarettes and matches. If we can keep people constantly aware of this one hazard, we can save many businesses from failure by fire."

The Chief also outlined a ten-point inspection program for store managers, recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. He suggested:

1. Keep the basement clean and orderly, since poor house-keeping in the basement is responsible for many fires.
2. Check the heating system thoroughly.
3. Provide covered metal containers for ashes and trash.
4. Have all wiring inspected by an experienced electrician.
5. Discourage smoking in parts of the store where large quantities of highly combustible goods are displayed.
6. Always keep aisles and exits clear, to avoid blaze. Fire doors should never be blocked open and fire escapes should never be obstructed by cartons or boxes.
7. Be sure woodwork and walls near heaters or the furnace are properly insulated, and avoid placing any combustible material near heaters, pipes, or furnaces.
8. If the store has an automatic sprinkler system (and it should have), see that sprinkler heads are in good condition, and not obstructed by cartons of merchandise.
9. Provide supervised watchmen's service or automatic fire alarm service in all large stores and warehouses.
10. Train personnel on the need for training in an alarm immediately in case of fire, and drill them so they will be prepared to guide all customers to safety in case of an emergency. They should also be completely familiar with available fire fighting equipment.

SAYS PLANES INEFFECTUAL FOR SECURITY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (UP)—Rear Adm. Ralph A. Ofstie said today the Air Force's strategic bombing planes are "ruthless and barbaric" and serve "none of the primary demands for our vital minimum security."

Ofstie, a member of the military liaison committee of the Atomic Energy Commission, gave the Navy's views on strategic bombing to the house armed services committee which is investigating current defense plans.

He listed as the primary demands of western Europe, the protection of forward bases, the early reduction of enemy military potential, and command of the sea.

Of the Air Force's Strategic Air Command, whose main weapon is the B-36, Ofstie asked:

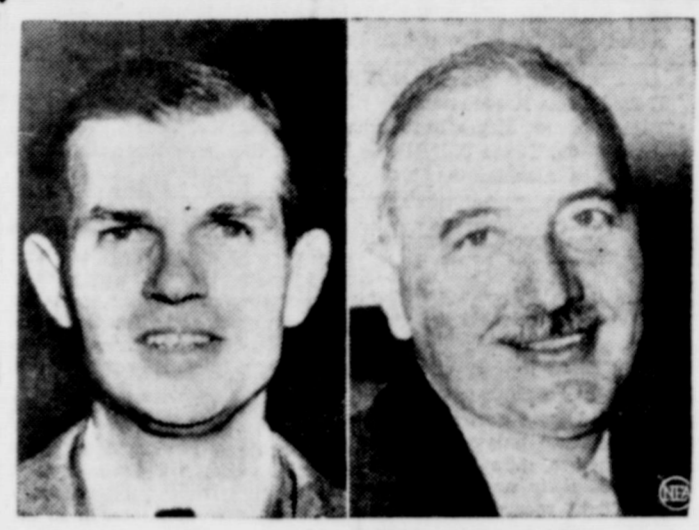
"Must we maintain as a major element of our military power a force which insists on fighting its own war in its own way, and contributes virtually nothing to the vital minimum security of ourselves and our allies?"

"Must we translate the historical mistake of World War II into a permanent concept merely to avoid clouding the prestige of those who led us down the wrong road in the past?"

Ofstie said our armed forces should be based on "balanced power" rather than the single-shot philosophy. "The Air Force's concept of 'instant retaliation,' he said, has produced an 'illusion of power and even a kind of bomb-rattling jingoism."

He said the essential forces the nation would need for defense during the first six months or the first year of a war are:

1. The defense of western Europe—Air Force and Navy tactical aviation to help the armies of Europe meet a land invasion. The aircraft should be fighters, fighter-bombers, dive bombers and attack planes. Strategic bombers could help "but their support would be poor and inefficient."

Elephant Kills Circus Worker

BRUNSWICK, Ga., Oct. 11 (UP)—A huge bull elephant attacked and killed a circus worker here late last night, injuring the man fatally by driving a sharp tusk completely through his chest.

The dead man was identified as George McDonald, about 50, a teamster with the Dailey Bros. Circus of Gonzales, Tex.

Police said they could find no witnesses to McDonald's death and were unable to determine what made the elephant attack him.

He was found dying behind the main circus tent, near the spot where the elephant was tethered. A clean chest wound indicated McDonald's tusk entered McDonald's back and came out below the right breast.

Last Rites Held For G. B. Parker

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (UP)—Funeral services were to be held today for George B. Parker, editor-in-chief of the Scripps-Howard newspaper chain who died yesterday at the age of 63.

The services were scheduled to begin at 2 P. M. EST., at St. John's Episcopal Church, The body will be cremated.

Parker, a native of Ithaca, Mich spent almost all his 40 years in the newspaper business with the Scripps-Howard chain. A vigorous writer and crusader, he won a Pulitzer prize for editorial writing in 1936.

He began his newspaper career with the old Oklahoma News a year after his graduation from the University of Oklahoma in 1908.

In the ensuing years, he served as city editor, managing editor and editor of the news.

In 1920, he became editor of the Scripps-Howard Cleveland Press. Two years later, he was named editor-in-chief of the south-western papers with headquarters in Houston, Tex.

In 1924, Parker was named general editorial executive of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, and, three years later, he became their editor-in-chief.

In that capacity, he guided the editorial policies of newspapers with a combined daily circulation of some 3,000,000 copies.

He is survived by a son, George B. Jr., and a daughter, Mary. Mrs. Parker died last June.

The celebration will start with a get-together at 5 p. m. A barbecue will follow.

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Endurance Fliers Back On Ground

YUMA, Ariz., Oct. 11. (UP)—Pilots Woody Jongeward and Bob Woodhouse locked forward to a "good long rest" today as towns men planned a gala celebration in honor of their new world endurance flight record.

"It sure feels good to get our feet on something solid again," the weary ex-navy fliers said yesterday as Jongeward brought their little Aeronca cabin plane down after 46 days aloft.

They landed at Yuma County Airport after being in the air 1, 124 hours, 14 minutes and five seconds. The old record of 1,008 hours was set at Fullerton, Cal., last spring by Bill Barris and Dick Riedel.

"We wouldn't want to go up again," said Jongeward, 31, and Woodhouse, 26. "It was getting rugged toward the last, and the constant noise and vibration seemed to deaden our nerves. We're ready for a good long rest."

A crowd of 10,000 including their wives and parents, cheered as the plane landed. The pilots were unsteady on their feet at first and friends good-naturedly pilled them from the cabin as the crowd surged forward.

Jongeward and Woodhouse had hoped to stay in the air indefinitely, but a burned-out magneto forced them back to earth. Emergency fire and rescue crews stood by all night in case the defect might cause a crash as they refueled from a speeding ground vehicle.

Progress Made In Mo-Pac Talks

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 11 (UP)—Negotiators reported "definite progress" today as they resumed discussions for settling the month-old strike that has paralyzed the Missouri-Pacific Railroad.

At two meetings yesterday, the sides in the dispute said they were continuing to negotiate in accordance with a proposal offered by governors of the states in which the strike has idled 25,000 Mo-Pac employees.

Roy E. Davidson, spokesman for the striking engineers, trainmen, firemen and conductors, said after the first session that some of 282 claims against the Mo-Pac had been settled.

The unions are striking for settlement of claims by their members and not for wages. Davidson would not say how many claims had been settled.

Guy A. Thomas, trustee for the railroad, said that in line with the proposals of an eight-state governors' conference, agreement is being sought on specific claims. After this is done, he said, a way of disposing remaining claims will be arranged.

LAWSUITS, NEAR RIOTS BOTHER SALLY NOT AT ALL

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 11 (UP)—The Sally Rand Show went on today, its leading lady unperturbed by 48 hours of lawsuits and near-riots.

The dancer, who proved that fans were made for something besides fanning and bubbles for a reason not connected with baths, smiled away financial threats to her State Fair of Texas revue which has drawn full houses since it opened here Saturday.

"I'll place my faith in the ability of the great Texas judges, she said after a special show for negro audiences caused her to interrupt her billings.

In a suit filed in 101st District Court yesterday, Robert Charles Peck and James W. Potts, Chicago agents, sought 50 per cent of the Rand revue's proceeds. They claimed they have a written agreement with Ray Brydon, a State Fair contractor official, to furnish all "girlie shows" for the Fair's midway.

The suit named Miss Rand, Brydon and the Independent Midway Assn.

A hearing was set for Friday before Judge Dallas Blankenship. Brydon said the agent's contract with the State Fair ended when police closed their shows in Louisville and Memphis.

Observers speculated Miss Rand would close her show if the court decision is unfavorable to her. Meanwhile, the fan-and-bubble

dancer said she was "confused" about a Saturday night occurrence at her show.

There was no mistake that a ticket booth was knocked down and \$125 and some 430 tickets taken.

But Miss Rand's explanation of the disturbance differed from a police version.

She said some of her fans—the audience variety—became "over enthusiastic" over the scantily clad chorines. They swayed so vigorously that the wooden benches collapsed, causing an uproar which resulted in the ticket booth episode. About 50 customers bounced to the ground.

However, police officers said the spectators whose seats collapsed rushed the box office to demand their money back upsetting the stand and disappearing with the cash and tickets.

Oil Allowable May Be Hiked

Purchasers' nominations for Texas crude oil in November total 2,494,562 barrels daily, the commission said, reflecting an increase

of 75,046 over the October figure.

The U. S. Bureau of Mines estimate of market demand for Texas crude oil in November was pegged at 2,250,000 barrels a day, compared to the 2,190,000 estimate made for October.

The increases indicated a possible boost in oil allowances by the Railroad Commission, scheduled to hold its state-wide prorating hearing at Houston tomorrow.

A boost in allowances for November would be the third straight increase, after an eight-month decline.

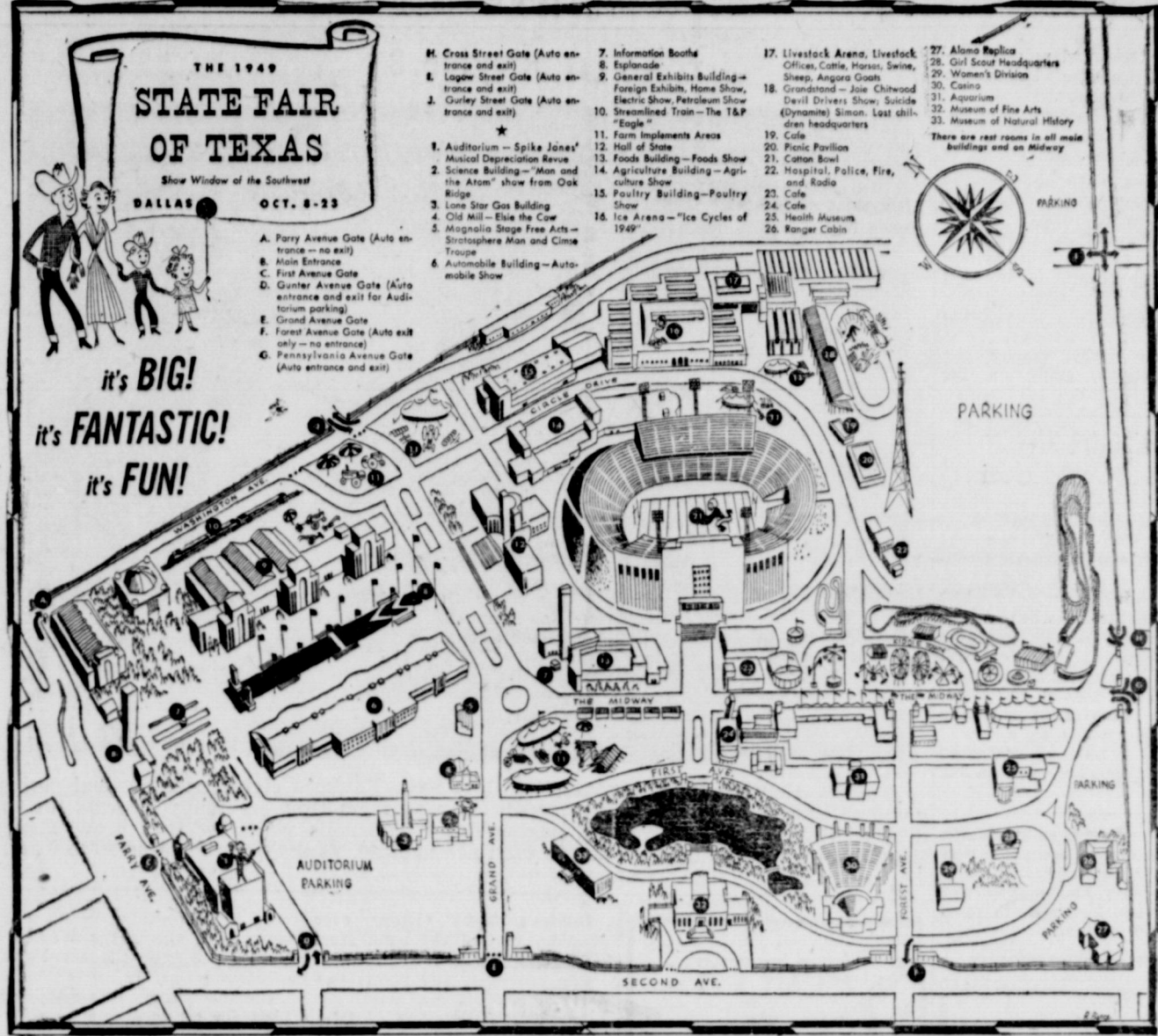

Czechs Continue Mass Arrests

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Oct. 11 (UP)—Police were reported to have arrested hundreds of persons in a series of dawn raids today, carrying out a mass roundup of Czechs into its second week.

One source said that "today was the worst of all" in the seizure of persons reported to number in the thousands.

The prisoners were reported to be in the same categories as those arrested throughout a week of raids — doctors, lawyers, small business men, former factory owners, and holders of big blocks of real estate.

Many of the arrests were said to have been made in the swank Prague suburb of Barrandov.

Reports circulated that most of the victims were being confined to labor camps for "moral, scientific and cultural education" under the law.

The property of those sent to forced labor camps is subject to confiscation and already squads of blue-clad workers' militia had seized the furniture of many home owners.

Relatives left in the home were being told that they would have to get out, informants reported.

Responsible sources discounted reports that the drive was aimed at underground plotters. A Communist source said yesterday that the roundup was aimed at "the biggest underground network uncovered since the Communist party came to power."

Responsible observers here believed three campaigns were going on at the same time:

1. The big roundup aimed at wiping out the middle class.
2. A drive to "purify" government offices and the Communist party. It was reported to have resulted in the arrest of two top information officials and the ousting of scores from the foreign office and other offices.
3. The campaign against the Catholic clergy, going on for months.

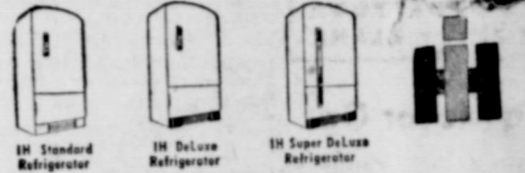

PROSPERITY DEPENDENT ON STRIKE SETTLEMENTS

The strikes in America's two basic industries will cause only temporary dislocations if settled quickly. But if they drag on in the steel mills, especially—the damage may be irreparable.

This is the opinion of many experts. Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder thinks a speedy agreement in steel and coal could signal a new economic rally. Secretary of Commerce Charles Sawyer finds the national economy to be basically sound. But he has warned that consumer spending already is being cut down in the wake of labor strife.

Before Philip Murray called out the CIO steelworkers to join the coal miners in idleness experts in the retail trade optimistically looked for the biggest Christmas on record in 1949. Today the probable spending volume is in doubt. Savings still are huge and the national income high in spite of the strikes but widespread labor trouble makes people cautious, the experts point out.

Secretary Snyder and others have called attention recently to the \$200,000,000,000 (B) backlog of U. S. savings as a potential market for just about everything that American manufacturers produce. And because they have such savings, Americans have been eager and willing to buy out of income.

Proof of this is furnished by the Federal Reserve Board report that installment credit-time pay-

ments—rose in August to a record high of \$9,613,000,000 (B), a gain for the month of \$282,000,000 (M).

Furthermore, businessmen who early in the summer feared a price slump and cleared their shelves of high-priced stock, have for the past two months been buying inventory again. The result has been a rise in business loans in eight weeks of \$553,000,000 (M) to \$13,384,000,000 (B).

Underworld Fence In Chicago Slain

CHICAGO, Oct. 11 (UP)—Elmer "Whitey" Madsen, big-time underworld "fence," was killed by two gunmen in retribution for withholding payoffs for loot from big interstate freight robberies, police believed today.

Madsen was felled by five slugs last night as he stepped out the door of a store on Chicago's northwest side.

Two boys and a woman who witnessed the slaying said they saw two men run from the scene and jump into a car driven by a third man.

Madsen, 4, was an assistant to Arthur "Fish" Johnson, a known dealer in "hot" merchandise who reputedly acted as receiver and spotter for the old Dillinger gang.

Burglar Devices Of Palace Tested

LONDON, Oct. 11 (UP)—Police surrounded Buckingham Palace today to test its burglar alarms and other security measures which were found faulty when an unnamed man entered the palace early Sunday.

Scotland Yard officials said the intruder climbed over a wire fence and a wall. He was taken into custody in a maid's room close to King George's sleeping quarters. It was the fourth time in the past two years that men had been discovered inside the palace grounds.

On one occasion two American students were found asleep on the palace lawns. They had scaled the walls and opened their sleeping bags within a few hundred yards of the palace.

But Scotland Yard said the record of a man named Jones has never been topped.

Finch To Help Investigate Slaying Of Four

FORT WORTH, Oct. 11 (UP)—Richard G. Finch, American airlines pilot on sick leave, arrived here today from Ann Arbor, Mich., as police investigated the mysterious shooting deaths of his estranged wife, their two children, and his mother-in-law.

An inquest verdict was being withheld in the case until after authorities talked with Finch, a chinchilla breeder who has been on a business trip to Chicago and stopped to visit his parents in Ann Arbor.

The four bodies were found yesterday, and police said all had been shot in the head with a .22-caliber pistol. Mrs. Finch and her daughter, Penny, 8, were found in a front bedroom; her son, Allen, 6, in another bedroom, while the body of Mrs. Edith Walker,

the grandmother, was in a third room.

Fingerprints on the gun, found beside the body of Mrs. Walker, were established by police experts as belonging to her. A physician who had been treating Mrs. Walker and last saw her in late September, told the district attorney's office she was "mentally depressed and highly nervous."

Finch and his wife were separated last June 12, and a divorce suit filed by Mrs. Finch was pending in District Court.
