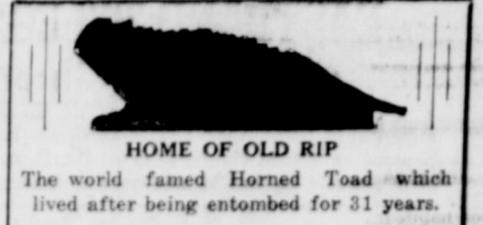

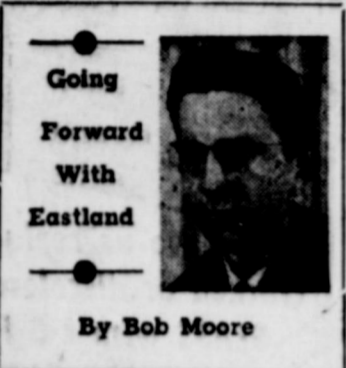

Burleson Urges Denial Of Bond To Communists

Speaking for himself and for the "millions of citizens of this Country who will not take the time to communicate their feelings," Congressman Omar Burleson of Texas today called upon Attorney General J. Howard McGrath to fully support U. S. District Attorney John F. X. McGohey and Judge Harold S. Medina, in denying bond to the eleven Communists recently convicted of conspiracies in New York.

Congressman Burleson expressed regret that the maximum imprisonment under the Smith Act was not severe enough and referred to the reference of Federal Judge Medina that if he could have imposed a greater sentence he would have done so.

"Since these conspirators are American citizens and not aliens, they cannot be deported," Burleson said. "Therefore," he continued, "it seems to me we should prepare a place for such traitors as these, 'Axis Sally' Gillars, 'Tokoyo Rose,' and others who doubtless will be convicted in the future, outside the borders of this Country—a place of exile for those who would destroy this Nation which has been so good to them."

Burleson said he will seriously consider introducing legislation in the Congress when it reconvenes in January to designate an island in the Pacific where such prisoners can be sent. He said he saw some ideal places for this purpose during the time he served in the Navy in World War II.

"These eleven conspirators who drew five years, the maximum under the law by which they were convicted, will serve only a few months. Extra time allowed and credit for good behavior will free them to continue their revolutionary activities. They should be banished from these shores of the United States," Burleson said.

Eastland Dogies Lose To Dublin

A battling Eastland Junior High Dogie eleven was defeated, 26-7, by the Dublin Kittens on Lions Field Thursday night.

Dublin scored on the third play of the ball game, having received the opening kick, with a Kitten giving 45 yards over the line for a TD. Try for the point was good. Later in the same period, a short Dogie punt set the ball up for another Dublin touchdown. Attempt for conversion failed.

During the second period, the Dogies held their own with the Kittens and held them scoreless. In the third quarter, the Kittens made a sustained drive with a 3 yard buck over the line accounting for their third touchdown.

Eastland's score came early in the last period, with Gerald Ables Dogie left halfback ace, running through the entire Kitten eleven for 80 yards. Ables kicked the point to make the score Dublin 19 Eastland 7. In the closing minutes of the game, the Kittens drove to the 1 yard line and then over to make the final score Dublin 26, Eastland 7.

Coach Joe Williams had planned to start Hill Gaeta at left half, Ables at quarterback, LaVerne Meroney at right half and Jamie Jessop at fullback. However, Gaeta complained of his side hurting upon arrival at Dublin, indicating appendicitis, and did not suit out. Making a last minute switch in plans, Ables played left half, Meroney at right half, little Billy Griffin at quarterback and Jessop at fullback. Ables and Meroney called signals in place of Gaeta. In the line were: Gerald Harris, center; Stanley Harris, left guard; Jimmie Jumper, left tackle; Billy Jordan, left end; Alan Vermillion, right guard; Butch Harbin, right tackle; and Landon Jordan, right end. Substitutions were made liberally, with every man seeing action.

In recent games the Dogies have lacked the pep and hustle that made them such standouts to fans at the opening of the season.

Party Of Year At Mineral Wells Today

MINERAL WELLS, Tex., Oct. 28 (UP)—Outstanding Texas citizens and state and congressional officials gathered here today for the "party of the year" that will see some 800 guests and 20 hosts in attendance this afternoon.

Termed a "strictly non-political affair," the party was designed to acquaint Texas' business and industrial leaders with the men who direct state functions and represent them in congress.

Gov. Allan Shivers and U. S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson will top the guest list. It includes, besides other state officials and Texas congressmen, businessmen, ranchers and oil men.

Fred Brown, one of the hosts and assistant manager of the Baker Hotel here, said the city hoped to make it an annual affair.

The party was scheduled to begin at 5 P. M. with a barbecue supper. Informal talks by guests were slated after the supper.

Lindberg Views Air Demonstration

PARIS, Oct. 28 (UP)—Air France said today it had received a brief message from the Azores saying "there will probably be no survivors" in the constellation crash.

SANTA MARIA, Azores, Oct. 28 (UP)—An Air France constellation bound for New York with 48 persons aboard including boxer Marcel Cerdan and 11 Americans, crashed in flames into an Azores mountain today, and first reports said there were some survivors.

The pilots of a search plane reported spotting the smoldering wreckage of the big transatlantic airliner on the summit of Mt. Algarvia, on St. Michael Island, 60 miles north of Santa Maria.

The airman said he saw "some survivors" waving to him from around the wreckage.

The constellation left Orly Field outside Paris at 9 P. M. 3 P. M. EST) yesterday. At 3:50 A. M. it radioed that the Santa Maria Field was in sight and it would land in five minutes. Nothing more was heard from it.

The clouds which shrouded Mt. Algarvia at the time of the crash lifted sufficiently later in the day to enable the search plane to sight the wreckage.

Search Spurred For Escaped Texas Convict

CAMERON, Tex., Oct. 28 (UP)—Central Texas Officers were put on the alert today for an escaped convict who beat and robbed a Midland man returning home from his wife's funeral.

George Tabor of Midland identified James Mitchell from photographs as one of two hitch-hikers who took his automobile, his boots, \$10 in cash and his watch.

Mitchell was one of two convicts who escaped from Central Prison Farm number two last Monday, by hiding in a water barrel that was trucked out.

Mitchell's companion in the escape was captured the same evening at Houston. The identity of his fellow hitch-hiker in the attack on Tabor had not been determined.

Tabor said he picked up the two young men Wednesday afternoon near Brenham as he was driving home to Midland from Houston, where funeral services had been held for his wife. She was fatally injured in an automobile crash.

North of Cameron, after darkness fell, Tabor said, the two hitch-hikers ordered him to stop the car at a roadside park. There they beat him into unconsciousness, robbed him and fled with his automobile.

Tabor's car was found abandoned yesterday at Lott, on U. S. highway 77, about 30 miles south of Waco.

Vague reports of an explosion and fire circulated. Trucks and automobiles shuttled through the heights on this and other islands in the group.

More than a dozen planes from Santa Maria, other Azores Islands and Portugal were thrown into the search. They swept low over the Atlantic on the chance that the constellation had plunged into the sea.

The ocean was calm and the weather generally was clear, although clouds scudded low over the hilly areas and shrouded some of the taller peaks.

Three Portuguese Navy ships and dozens of small vessels joined the search after dawn.

When the mist-clouds raised, a search pilot sighted a thin column of smoke rising from the summit of Algarvia. Dropping down as low as he dared, he saw persons around the wreckage, he reported.

Within a few minutes rescue parties were heading for the scene. The nature of the terrain made it uncertain when the crash scene would be reached around and when the first definite word of casualties might be expected.

The vanguard of the rescue forces clambered ashore from a fleet of boats and started climbing toward the wreckage near the top of the 3,500-foot peak.

Among the Americans on board were Kay Kamen, 57, president of Kay Kamen, Ltd., of New York licensing representative for Walt Disney characters and similar properties, and his wife, Kate, 40, well known fashion stylist, writer and lecturer.

Emery H. Komlos, 32, a New York lawyer, was on the last leg of a round-the-world business trip.

Another passenger was Reuel Silbermangel, 59, president of Selsi Company of New York, an importer of optical goods.

Mrs. Simon B. Hennessey of Dobbs Ferry, N. Y., was returning from visiting her husband, Michael P. Hennessey, wealthy real estate developer, who became ill in Paris while on a business trip.

U. S. Air Force planes based in the Azores took part in the search.

An Air France plane left Paris for the Azores with company officials and representatives of the French Ministry of Transport and the Civil and Commercial Aviation secretariat.

Aboard the plane were 11 crewmen and 37 passengers, comprising 11 Americans, 16 French, two Canadians, one Cuban, one Iranian, one Mexican, one Lebanese, one Iraqi, one Israeli and one stateless person.

Three significant Southwest Conference games, Texas Tech's fourth 1949 meeting against a Southwest Conference opponent, and cheers from the largest crowd ever to see a Conference game will come to listeners of Humble Oil & Refining Company's radio football reports this weekend.

Super-Highway Delayed For Lack Of Funds

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 28 (UP)—The \$3,000,000 (M) per mile Super-Highway from Houston to Galveston will not be completed until late in 1952 because of a shortage of construction cash, a highway department spokesman said today.

District Engineer Jim Douglas said it might not be finished until early in 1953, despite the fact that much of the basic work has been completed.

Douglas said Federal appropriations hadn't been made available with the speed hoped for earlier, which would have made the six-laneroad complete late in 1951.
