CAB INVESTIGATING NEAR CRASH AT PORT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (UP)—Civil Aeronautics officials today were investigating a "near miss" at the National Airport in which Vice President Alben W. Barkley narrowly escaped death last Thursday night.

The Boeing Air Force Base first disclosed the incident, saying a converted B-17 bomber flying Barkley here from Paducah, Ky., came within 50 feet of ramming an advertising blimp owned and operated by the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. while approaching for a landing "in the normal traffic pattern."

It quoted the plane's crew as saying no lights were visible on the blimp until they were directly over it. The blimp's pilot said his lights were "blinking all the time."

ACHESON PROMISES BERLIN, OTHERS AMERICAN HELP

BERLIN, Nov. 14 (UP)—U. S. Secretary of State Dean Acheson today promised American help for Berliners and other European peoples in opposing Soviet attacks on freedom.

Acheson arrived at rain-swept Tempelhof airport from Frankfurt at 11:20 A. M. (4:20 A. M. CST) for nine crowded hours of conferences and receptions.

He will leave Tempelhof at 9 P. M. for Frankfurt and Washington.

Rumor Says Crew Of Liner Drunk

ACAPULCO, Mexico, Nov. 14 (UP)—Rumors that crew members were drunk when the luxury ship Corsair ran aground on a submerged rock off here were investigated today by insurance company authorities.
The ship, formerly the private yacht of J. P. Morgan, was taken over by the company yesterday, and officials were known to be suspicious of the crew's report that the steering apparatus failed.

The ship was cleared for departure by port authorities and should have been in open sea when it caught on the rock off Caleta Beach early Saturday.
Many of the 55 passengers left for the United States yesterday. None of the passengers, mostly from California, or 77 crewmen was injured by the accident.

LEWIS DEMANDS MEETING WITH COAL MINE OWNERS

John L. Lewis pulled another surprise switch today, demanding that mine owners meet with him immediately to head off another coal strike Nov. 30, as steel mills began working full blast in an attempt to retrieve production lost during the steel walkout.

The United Mine workers president let it be known that he would be "at his desk in Washington" this morning "awaiting the convenience of the coal operators" whom he accused of "stubborn refusal" to bargain.

Federal mediator director Cyrus Ching was scheduled to review the mine situation with presidential assistant John R. Steelman and some observers believed that later in the day he might announce new plans for a mediation session between Lewis and the mine operators.

Ching had called such a meeting for last Thursday but Lewis failed to show up, claiming he was too busy getting the miners back into the mines after their 52 day strike.

Plans for mine meetings. Less than 20,000 men were still on strike in the steel industry and most of those were expected to return to work in a matter of days.
The latest firm to make peace with the CIO steelworkers was the Wheeling Steel Corp., agreement which set the pattern for the industry. Wheeling's 50,000 employees returned to work today. Allegheny-Ludlum Steel Co., with 12,000 workers, was expected to sign today.

Pittsburgh Steel employing 8,000, was expected to reach an agreement by Thursday. Negotiations were expected to resume with the big Aluminum Corp. of America, employing 20,000 workers, on Wednesday.
But Crucible Steel Co., indicated it would hold out for a special type contract on grounds that it could not pay the cost of the \$100 monthly pension plan and insurance benefits laid down in the Bethlehem agreement.

The Steelworkers strike cost the nation 8,500,000 net tons of ingot, enough to build 6,000,000 automobiles. The finished steel lost during the period would have been valued at \$700,000,000.
The workers lost \$178,000,000 in wages and they will have to work two full years to make them up in the social security benefits they won. However, the increased benefits will accrue to future workers.

TEXAS News Briefs

RIO GRANDE CITY, Tex., Nov. 14 (UP)—Starr County farmers surmised today that hawks had a pre-Thanksgiving Day feast of rats which strangely disappeared from rich tomato fields during the weekend.

Hundreds of pounds of poisoned grain were scattered in the fields last week when a horde of rodents threatened to overrun 4,500 acres. Rats were scarce this morning, even dead ones.

Farmers explained that hawks don't die from eating poisoned firemen fought the blaze for stomachs.

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 14 (UP)—Influenza is spreading in Texas at a faster-than-average rate, State Health Officer George W. Cox reported today.

Cox said that for the week ending Nov. 5, Texas reported 1,072 cases, as compared with the average for the last seven years

Construction On Pipelines Due

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 14 (UP)—Work will begin in mid-December on construction of 61 miles of crude oil pipe lines in West Texas, it was announced here today.

R. B. McLaughlin, president of the Texas New Mexico pipe line company, said the line would extend from a point in Borden county to the Colorado City pump station in Scurry county.

The contractor is Carl H. Dunn of Fort Worth, McLaughlin said.
A smaller contract to build 5.41 miles of line in southwestern Ber-

den county and northwestern Howard county was awarded the Wright Construction Company of Lovington, N. M., McLaughlin added. Work on that project was to begin immediately.

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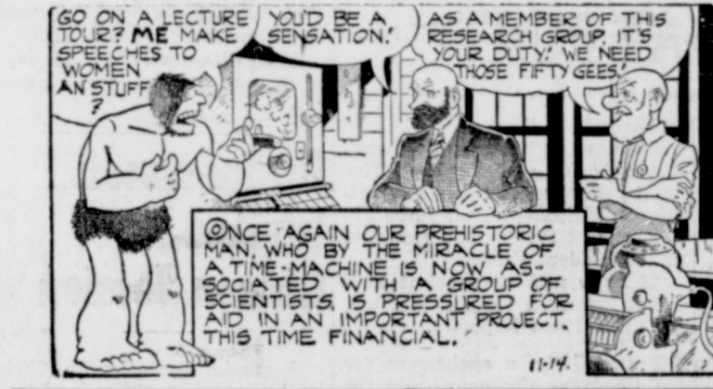

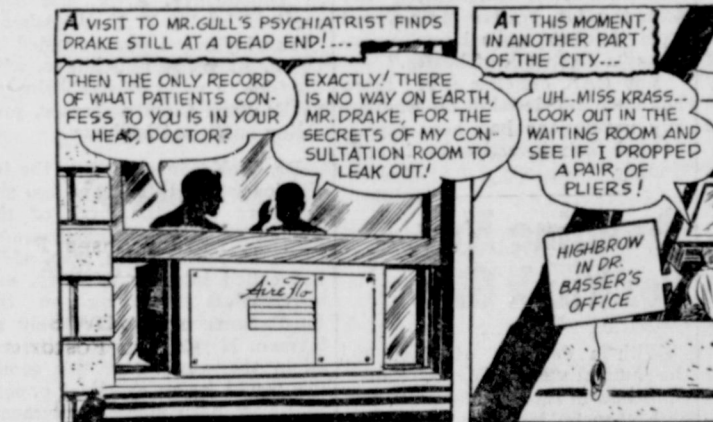

Prince Charles Philip Arthur George played host in his nursery at Clarence House, the home of his parents, only a few hundred yards from Buckingham Palace. He is second only to his mother in line of succession to the British Throne.

Princess Elizabeth was on hand to assist her son in receiving his guests. Also lending a helping hand were his two nurses, a detective and a young footman, other members of the Royal family also dropped in.

Prince Charles was certain to be neither a talkative nor a wandering host. His vocabulary is limited to three words—"mama," "papa" and "no"—and his walking to about two steps at a time.

THANKSGIVING DINNER CHEAPER THIS YEAR

Pop can sit down and enjoy his Thanksgiving feast this year with the knowledge that it's costing him considerably less than in recent years.

A United Press survey showed today that the cost of a Thanksgiving dinner for four, including a 10 pound turkey, will be about \$1.50 cheaper than last year. Prices in 20 large cities were checked against last year's prices in the survey.

Such a meal last year cost \$9.57, the survey showed. This year he can be grateful on Thanksgiving Day for only having to shell out \$8.16 to provide the traditional meal for the wife and kids.

In the survey, prices were checked for this year against 1948 on ingredients for a menu consisting of a 10 pound turkey, two pounds of sweet potatoes, a can of cranberries, two bunches of celery, a can of asparagus, a loaf of white bread, a pound of assorted nuts, a pound of table grapes and a can of pumpkin pie. The prices compared as follows:

they expected prices to drop even lower by Thanksgiving. Competitors vied for business with special sales.

The big drop in the price of turkey was due to a 29 per cent increase in fowls over last year, the department of agriculture said.

The reverse was true of pumpkin. Farmers became disgusted at the low price they received last year. So this year they cut production and prices rose.

Cranberries were cheaper as result of a bigger crop in the nation's bogs.

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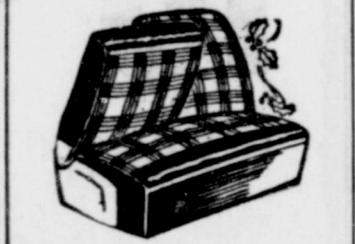
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
