Consul's Arrest Precludes U. S. Nod to Red China

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (UP)—Secretary of state Dean G. Acheson said today that Communist China's arrest of American Consul General Angus Ward has killed any chance of American recognition of the Communist Regime at this time.

Acheson angrily told a news conference that the United States considers the arrest of Ward and other members of the American consulate at Mukden as very serious and is considering all possible steps to bring about their release.

Asked about the chances of America recognizing communist China, Acheson told the reporters that they could easily imagine that the arrest removes any possibility of the United States even considering that question.

Acheson also announced.

The United States is protesting to nationalist China over the attack Monday of a nationalist warship of the American freighter flying cloud off Shanghai. He said he is protesting only the endangering of lives, leaving the broader question of whether the nationalists had a right to stop the vessel for investigation.

Illegality In P. I. Elections Is Charged

MANILA, P. I. Nov. 16 (UP)—The opposition Nacionalista party charged today that President Elpidio Quirino had been elected illegally and threatened to take legal steps to block his proclamation as Philippines president.

Eulogio Rodriguez, Sr., president of the Nacionalista party, said the Quirino victory had been "achieved not only through ruthless destruction of Democratic processes but also by illegal expenditure of government funds and taxes."

The latest official vote tabulation, plus unofficial returns from Manila, gave Quirino 1,432,761 votes against 1,107,663 for Jose Laurel, Nacionalista candidate who served as puppet president during the Japanese occupation.

Under the Philippines law, the new president and vice president must be proclaimed by a special joint session of congress before the Dec. 30 inauguration date. The second Tuesday in December has been fixed for a Congressional canvass of the returns.

Quirino, who succeeded to the presidency on the death of president Manuel Roxas in 1948 controls the house of representatives but not the old Senate.

Rodriguez charged that there had been no legal election in at least four provinces—Cebu, Lanao, Cavite and Negros Occidental—"because of terrorism and violence."

Weather Favors Farmers' Work

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 16 (UP)—Texas farmers rushed harvesting and fall plowing today as the United States Department of agriculture happily called attention to the second consecutive week of "ideal, open weather."

In the northwest part of the state, gins were unable to handle the cotton as fast as it was being gathered, the USDA said.

A full week of sunshine along the coast had dried fields further, and the rice harvest was nearing completion.

However, the USDA said that surface moisture was being depleted in the eastern, wheat-growing counties of the northern high plains by high, dry winds.

In the western counties, some what was showing damage and general growth was being retarded by a lack of surface moisture.

But good progress, the USDA said, as being made in all commercial vegetable areas.

During World War II, Morris served in the Asiatic-Pacific Theater with the 96th "Deadeye" Division. He accompanied the division on the invasion of Leyte and Okinawa and was a battalion commander on that famous Conical Hill attack on the latter island. He has been awarded the purple heart with an oak leaf cluster, the bronze star with an oak leaf cluster, the combat infantryman's badge and has three campaign stars on his theater ribbon.

North Texas Due To Be Colder

A light topcoat won't be too uncomfortable for North Texans whose business takes them outdoors tonight.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at Dallas said temperatures would drop to the upper 30's after sundown, about three or four degrees below normal for this time of the year.

Temperatures in West Texas will remain chilly, but the weatherman said he did not think the mercury would continue to drop in that section.

Dalhart, in the roost of the Panhandle, recorded the lowest temperature during the night, a sub-freezing 28 degrees.

Several stations reported temperatures in the 30's, but only Lubbock's, a 33, neared the freezing line.

Salt Flat reported a 34, Clarendon and Amarillo 35, Ozona 36, Mineral Wells 37, Childress 38, and Presidio and Wichita Falls 39.

The highest overnight minimum was 57 at Galveston, while the low maximum reading was 60 at Amarillo. Laredo reported the warmest weather of the day Tuesday, an 84 reading.

Skies were clear throughout the state after an early morning fog cleared at Cotulla and Laredo.

There was no rain reported over the 24-hour period ending at 6:30 A. M. today.

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 16 (UP)— Britain warned Russia today that unless it changes its ways "the free world will reduce to a minimum its relations with the Soviet government."

Hector McNeil, British Minister of State, made a long appeal to the Soviet Union to cooperate for peace with the rest of the world as the United Nations political committee debated opposing "peace plans" offered by Russia and, jointly, by the United States and Britain.

"The time for understanding steadily, if gradually, runs out," McNeil warned Soviet Minister Andrei Y. Vinshinsky, who was sitting beside him.

"I don't mean we are on the edge of war. I do not think the Stalinist regime contemplates war and certainly no one else does. But it must be plain that this campaign to sabotage peace is as disastrous in its consequence as its failure."

R. L. Perkins' Brother Dies

J. N. Perkins of Grand Prairie, only brother of R. L. Perkins, manager of Higginbotham-Bartlett Co., died at the residence Tuesday night. He had been critically ill in a hospital for several weeks and had seemingly recovered.

Funeral arrangements are pending.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, J. D. Perkins of Grand Prairie and Joe W. Perkins of Dallas; two daughters, Mrs. Johnnie Walston of Midland and Mrs. Joe Bob Moore of Dallas; and two sisters, Mrs. C. Malone and Mrs. C. L. Lyle, both of Springtown.

Coal Dispute Goes To Truman

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (UP)—The Federal Mediation Service today turned the soft coal wage dispute over to President Truman leaving it up to him to prevent a new coal strike Dec. 1.

Federal Mediation Chief Cyrus S. Ching referred the coal dispute to the white house at a conference with Mr. Truman's chief labor adviser, presidential assistant John R. Steelman.

Ching told Steelman that "further mediation efforts in the case would be fruitless."

"By Soviet concept," McNeil told the 59-nation committee, "war is inevitable and military superiority a necessity. We do not believe that. But it is the Soviet view because their ultimate aim is world revolution, world domination . . ."

"We shall judge Mr. Vinshinsky's peaceful intentions not by the words of his resolution but by the acts of his government, and we are mournfully and miserably reminded that it is the act of his government which have destroyed international conference."

VERACRUZ, Mexico, Nov. 16 (UP)— Carlos Garcia Leal, 21, broke no law when he tried to ship himself 500 miles by air freight, police said today.

Authorities released the youth when he told officers he no longer had an "urgent need" to get to Merida, Yucatan.

Two weeks ago, Garcia Leal wanted to get to the peninsular city in a hurry to get married but couldn't afford the fare. So he crated himself in a wooden box to be shipped collect to his fiancée.

Delivered to the airport in the crate by a friend, he began to smother and shouted for help. Freight handlers opened the box and Garcia Leal escaped in the confusion.

He finally reached Merida and was married. Police arrested him when he and his bride returned here hunting for a job.

Hannegan Estate Valued Over Million

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 16 (UP)— An inventory indicated today that the estate of the late Robert E. Hannegan, former postmaster general and part owner of the St. Louis Cardinals, was worth about \$1,500,000.

The estate, filed in probate court here yesterday, totaled only \$524,820. But attorneys familiar with the holdings said many securities were listed at par value. The stock's actual value was much higher, they said.

Under terms of the will filed Oct. 13, Hannegan left the estate to his widow, Mrs. Irma Hannegan and his four children.

Hannegan, who rose to the national chairmanship of the Democratic party and was named to the cabinet by President Truman, died Oct. 6. He was 46.

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FBI Joins Search For Safe Cracker

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 16 (UP)— The Federal Bureau of Investigation searched today for a notorious safe cracker believed involved in the \$481,000 burglary of a Richmond, Va., jewelry store last February.

Gerald B. Norris, FBI agent in charge, said the suspect, identified as Robert A. Pinkerman, recently was seen in St. Louis.

Last week, Henry W. Bostelman was arrested here in connection with the burglary. Three other persons were arrested in Kansas City earlier this month and implicated in the crime.

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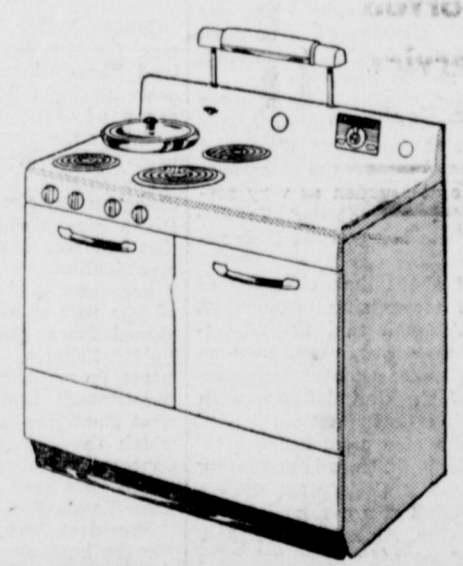
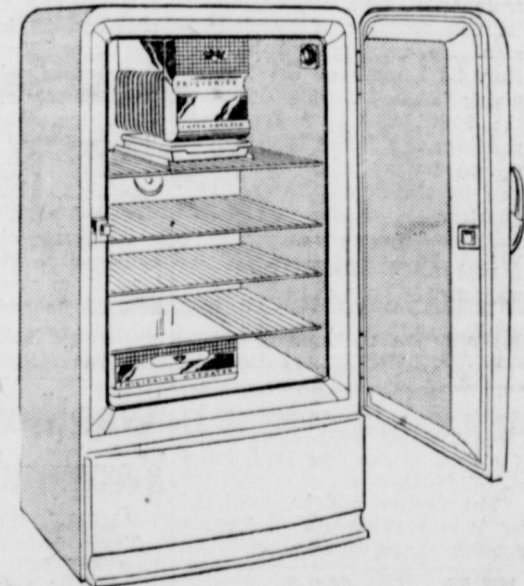

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Police Interrupt Sex-Kidnapping

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 16(UP)—Fast police action may have prevented the sex-kidnaping of seven-year-old Karen Keuchenmeister from becoming another Linda Glucoff case, Police Inspector Peter Socrant said today.

"A patrol car just happened to pass the house a minute or two after she was carried away," Socrant said. "Otherwise we might have had a tragedy like the little Linda Glucoff case in Los Angeles."

A radio alarm alerted every police car in Detroit within 15 minutes and hurried in pursuit at 80 miles an hour last night until the abductor jumped a curb and abandoned the car in fashionable grosse Pointe.

Karen, covering in the front seat of the car, was unhurt, but

police said her panties had been stripped from her and she told them the abductor had exposed himself and proposed indecencies. Less than an hour after Karen was snatched from her home, police arrested William Mabrey, 35-year-old poolroom operator who owned the kidnap-car.

Keorn was taken to the police station to identify her abductor and immediately pointed to Mabrey who was lined up with 11 other men.

Assistant Prosecutor Ralph Garber said Mabrey, who told police his car was stolen earlier, would be charged with kidnaping and attempting to take indecent liberties. Mabrey, father of a two-

months-old son, at first denied the charges.

Free DDT Goes Over Big
CHICAGO (UP)—Police had to be called in to control crowds when a paint manufacturer gave away \$59,200 worth of DDT through several department stores. The manufacturer offered the 80,000 units of DDT, one unit to a customer, with no strings attached, nothing to buy. The firm said it simply wanted the compound used to help fight the spread of disease by insects.
