Cisco Placed In District 8-A For '50 Season

When the Cisco Lobos of District 9-AA played the Eastland Mavericks of District 8-A Friday night at Cisco, it will mark the last game to be played by Cisco as a Class AA team.

W. G. Womack, superintendent of Eastland Public Schools, was notified in a letter from Interscholastic League officials at Austin Wednesday afternoon, that Cisco would play in District 8-A in 1950. Cisco had participated in Class AA football for the past two years, but had been unable to make a favorable showing.

Copies of Williams letter to Arlin Bint, superintendent of Cisco Schools, were sent to Class 8-A schools and following is the letter:

Mr. Arline Bint
Super. of Schools
Cisco, Texas

Dear Mr. Bint:
This is to notify you that Cisco is being placed in Conference A football for the 1950-51 school year. They will be placed in the district which consists of Ranger, Eastland, etc. The exact number of district 8 cannot be given as there may be some changes in Conference A assignments for 1950 but they will be in the district with the above mentioned schools regardless of what number the district may bear.

I believe that you will find your competition to be much more equalized in this district and that it will be fair to the boys and to the community to participate with schools of your own size.

A reshuffling in the ranks of the state's schoolboy football districts for 1950, affecting seven other schools, was announced today by the Texas Interscholastic League.

The move will drop three schools from the AA bracket to A, transfer three schools to other AA districts, and expand two AA districts with the addition of new high schools at Corpus Christi and El Paso.

Williams, said plans would affect these schools in 1950 play: Brownfield will drop from district 3-AA and be placed tentatively in 4-A.

Cisco, now in district 6-AA, will go into district 8-A under present plans.

Jacksonville will drop from 10-AA into district 16-A.

Three AA schools will change districts, with Graham moving from 2-AA tentatively in 6-AA, Big Spring from 5-AA to 3-AA, and Cleburne being swapped from 13-A into 6-AA.

In 14-AA, Williams said, Corpus Christi will expand from one to two high schools, Miller High School and Ray High School. And at El Paso, district 4-AA will have one more high school with the addition of Thomas Jefferson High School.

Williams said that superintendents at Brownfield, Cisco and Jacksonville requested the changes from AA to A football.

Requests also were made to the TIL by Graham High School, which has less than 500 students, and Big Springs.

Cleburne, Williams said, was moved into district 6-AA because it was geographically convenient and to make way for the possible expansion "in the next few years" of central Texas schools in district 13-AA.

Williams said that the schoolboy football district alignment will be completed "no later" than Dec. 1, to provide ample time in which to make up their 1950 football schedules.

Shortly afterward, he said, district plans also will be completed for A, B and six-man football.

Low Pressure Area Taking Nip Out Of Weather

An eastward low pressure area today began taking the nip out of the tingling Texas weather.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at Dallas forecast slightly higher temperatures in the Panhandle and South Plains tonight and in the eastern section of the state tomorrow.

Skies remained clear throughout the state early today. The mercury dropped to the 30's in the north and West Texas during the sleeping hours, leaving a slight sheet of frost in those areas.

For the second successive night Dalhart in the Panhandle reported sub freezing weather, 30 degrees. The same temperature also was recorded at Lubbock.

Clarendon had an even 32 degrees, while Mineral Wells reported 34. Other early morning low readings were 35 at Amarillo and Abilene, 37 at Tyler, 38 at Dallas and 39 at Texarkana.

Galveston and Laredo reported the high minimum, 55 degrees, while Amarillo recorded a low maximum of 58.

Warmest weather of the day Tuesday was an 83 at Laredo.

SHAH OF IRAN CONTENT AS TRUMANS' GUEST

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (UP)—The Shah of Iran, half a world away from his own capital, slept well and dreamed true last night in the house of his friends—President and Mrs. Harry Truman.

At last, he expected to. In a gracefully-worded tribute to America and his host at a state dinner last night, the 30-year old monarch said:

"Tonight, Mr. President, as your guest at Blair House, I know I shall sleep well and dream true, for I shall be in the house of my friends."

The Shah responded warmly to a toast by Mr. Truman in which the president sharply accused the Soviet Union of afflicting to abide by its International Commitments.

The president said that through their long history, the people of Iran had faithfully kept their contracts.

MEETING ON FAR EAST BOOKED FOR JANUARY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (UP)—The White House today announced that a meeting of American mission heads in eastern Asia and the Far East where the United States is fighting Communism will be held at Bangkok, Siam, in late January.

The White House announcement was made shortly after President Truman held a top level Far Eastern policy conference with Secretary of State Dean Acheson and other state department officials.

Acheson and his state department aides conferred with Mr. Truman for one hour and 20 minutes.

Assistant Secretary of State W. Walton Butterworth and Dr. Everett Case and Dr. Raymond Fosdick also attended the conference.

Butterworth is in charge of far eastern affairs at the state department. Case and Fosdick have been working with a consultative group drawing up an American policy for combating Communism in the far east.

Philip C. Jessup, American ambassador-at-large, will attend the conference. It was called for a situation in the far east typified by the arrest and imprisonment of American Consul Angus Ward by Chinese Communists at Mukden, Manchuria.

Mr. Truman met for an hour and 20 minutes this morning with Jessup, Acheson and other far eastern experts.

The White House announcement said that Jessup would leave for the Bangkok conference as soon as he completes his duties as a member of this country's delegation to the United Nations General Assembly.

He will stop off in Tokyo and other far eastern cities en route to Bangkok. He will return by way of India and Pakistan.

The White House announcement said that in preparation for Jessup's trip, the president at the conference today with the state department top level officials "discussed questions relating to policy" throughout the far east.

The former Chief Justice of the 2nd Court of Civil Appeals, who died in a local hospital yesterday after a month's illness, side stepped early ambitions to become a doctor, studying law instead.

He served the Civil Appeals Court for 32 years before being defeated in 1940. Prior to that he was judge of the 48th district court here for 12 years.

Justice Dunklin was born in Greenville, Ala., and came to Texas with his family when he was only three months old.

Mavericks To Close Season Friday Night Against Cisco

Rangers Called In On Murder Of Plains Woman

SOUTHLAND, Tex., Nov. 17 (UP)—Texas Rangers today were asked to investigate what appeared to be one of the most brutal murders in recent West Texas history.

The aid of the Rangers was requested after the body of Mrs. Marvin Truelock, about 31 was found in her bedroom.

A large gas heating stove had been turned over her face and was still burning when Calvin Bass, 13, son of Sheriff E. M. Bass found her body yesterday.

Her face was burned beyond recognition, witnesses said. A pair of men's socks had been stuffed into her mouth and her arms tied behind her back by a rope which had been twisted around her waist.

Young Bass rushed from the house and returned with three students from a nearby training school.

Investigating officers said Mrs. Truelock died of suffocation or asphyxiation.

Bass said that two notes were found on a sewing machine in the room. One was a penny postcard addressed to her family and husband, the other on a scratch tablet and addressed to her parents.

A knife, hatchet and a sharpened screwdriver were found near the notes.

Mrs. Truelock's husband was in Lubbock when he was notified of her death.

Drop Shown In Food Prices

NEW YORK, Nov. 17 (UP)—The Dun & Bradstreet Wholesale Food Index abruptly reversed its upward tendency of the past few weeks today, dropping six cents to \$5.68.

The decline, which was the widest since the Index fell eight cents to \$5.57 on Oct. 11, followed rises of five cents and 14 cents in two of the preceding three weeks. Two weeks ago the Index eased three cents. In the corresponding week last year, the Index stood at \$6.37.

Fifteen of the foods used in compiling the Index declined in price this week. The Index is the total of the price per pound of 31 foods in general use.

Of the other 16 foods used in the Index, six declined and 10 held unchanged. In the latter group was coffee whose soaring price recently had been a large contributor to the upward push in the Index.

The 15 foods which declined in price in the week ended Nov. 15 were flour, wheat, rye, oats, ham, hard sugar, cottonseed oil, beans, peanuts, eggs, potatoes, hogs, lams and butter. Those which advanced were corn bellies, cocoa, rice, steers and raisins. Unchanged were barley, beef, cheese, coffee, tea, peas, molasses, currants, prunes and milk.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Nov. 17 (UP)—Jay Maxine Rodgers, 10, seriously injured when her bicycle collided with an auto here yesterday morning, died today in a local hospital without ever regaining consciousness.

The accident, which occurred a few minutes after the little girl had delivered her mother's Christmas present to her dad for safekeeping, brought the Tarrant County death toll for the year to 70.

Kay Maxine was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. I. D. Rodgers of Fort Worth.

Don Martin, 'Hard Luck Kid', In Dallas Hospital Suffering From Brain Concussion Injury

Don Martin, 14, son of Mrs. Frank Martin and freshman student in Eastland High School, was admitted to Baylor Hospital in Dallas Wednesday afternoon, suffering with a brain concussion.

Martin was injured Tuesday night, when he was thrown off a jeep while enroute to Eastland Park to a meeting of Boy Scout Troop 103. Chief of Police R. A. Y. Laney, who investigated, said Martin and other Scouts were riding on a jeep operated by Calvin and Harold Maxwell, and was thrown to the pavement when the vehicle turned a corner.

The youth did not realize he was injured, and it was the next morning before he was taken to Caton and Cowan Clinic, where x-rays revealed the brain concussion. He also suffered a hemorrhage behind an ear drum.

Martin was transferred to the Dallas medical institution for observation, where an operation may be necessary.

Known as "the hard luck kid" Martin broke both arms in a jump from the diving board at the Municipal Pool this summer. Before that, he had just discarded crutches, after suffering a leg injury while swimming at Eastland Lake.

Touted as a possible all-district selection, Waddell will be out for the remainder of the 1949 season.

The Lobos lack weight, and experience, and are slow. Only two starters from the 1949 team, a delegation that didn't win a single game, reported out for practice at opening of the Lobo 1949 season. They were: Norman Boggs and Robert McMurry, both linemen.

Coach Wendell Siebert's Mavericks, who closed District play last Friday with a 37-6 loss to Ranger, will be gunning to get into the "win column."

The Mavericks are in good physical shape and it might turn into a real ball game.

Suspected Sex Slayer Sought In Old Mexico

SAN DIEGO, Cal. Nov. 17 (UP)—The manhunt for 66 year old Fred Stroble, suspected sex slayer of little Linda Joyce Glucoft, pushed deep into Lower California south of the Mexican border today.

Los Angeles homicide officers Jess Gonzales and Rudy De Leon said they were "almost positive" Stroble had taken refuge either in the border town of Tijuana, Mex., or in Ensenada, 60 miles down the lower California coast.

Gonzales and De Leon came here to coordinate the massed efforts of San Diego, Federal and Mexican authorities in their search for Stroble.

Bartender Hector Estrada sent Mexican authorities speeding southward yesterday when he reported Stroble "definitely" had stopped at his Rosarita Beach Cafe, halfway between Tijuana and Ensenada.

The customer, who strongly resembled pictures of Stroble, had a split finger, Estrada said, although he could not remember which it was.

Stroble has a cleft left index finger which is very prominent and shows up clearly in fingerprints, Los Angeles police said. The bartender said the man told him he was going fishing at Ensenada.

Inspector of detectives Gerardo Souza ordered every available Mexican officer and deputy into a block-by-block search of Ensenada and called for road blocks on highways leading into the fishing and resort town.

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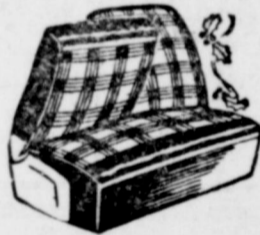

Kin Contacted In Search For Missing Girl

CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 17 (UP)—Police contacted relatives and friends today of missing 16 year old Dorothy Jennings after a report that the tall, blue-eyed blonde turned up briefly at Chattanooga, Tenn., inquiring for an uncle and aunt.

Miss Jennings, who disappeared Monday from a fashionable Cincinnati girl's school, asked a Chattanooga hotel clerk yesterday for the address of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Gillespie. She identified herself as Dorothy Jennings of Cincinnati.

The clerk, Chester Leeper, said

he called the Gillespie address and was informed that the girl's relatives had moved to a new address.

A maid at the new Gillespie home said the blonde girl asked for her aunt and immediately walked away after being told that Mrs. Gillespie had left for Cincinnati because of her niece's disappearance.

Gillespie later called the Jennings home here and related the missing girl's brief visit to grief stricken Mr. and Mrs. Ralph H. Jennings. The father is president of the Queen City Agency, Inc., an insurance firm.

Two former Cincinnati neighbors of the missing girl also reported seeing her walk along the Dixie Highway and then enter a black sedan in northern Kentucky a short time after she left Miss Doherty's college preparatory school.

School officials said Miss Jennings disappeared after receiving permission only to go to a rest room. She had complained of being ill.

Mrs. Jennings, meanwhile, made a pleading radio address for her daughter to come home. "Please come home. Daddy is sick, honey... come home! Are you all right?" The anxious mother tearfully asked.

Refuses To Restrain School Improvements

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 17 (UP)—U. S. District Judge William H. Atwell Wednesday refused to issue a permanent order restraining the Addison independent school district from spending money from a recently-voted \$25,000 bond issue for school improvements.

Five negro parents petitioned Judge Atwell's court to stop any planned expenditures until facilities for white and negro schools were equal.

The suit against the district, in northeast Dallas County, also asked for a court order forbidding the board to continue its policy of "requiring negro to attend unsanitary, unsafe, unequal and inferior schools."

Vernon Fulton, assistant headmaster of the Texas country day school and chairman of the Addison district board, testified that

blueprints had been drawn construction of a new negro school in the heart of the negro district.

He stated it would cost more than \$24,000 and when completed would give negro students facilities equal to those of white pupils in that area.

The plaintiff's counsel, in final summary, argued that Fulton's testimony and introduction of the blueprint indicated only that promises were being made.

However, Judge Atwell accepted Fulton's testimony as having been given in good faith and found no reason why the project should not be executed in the near future.

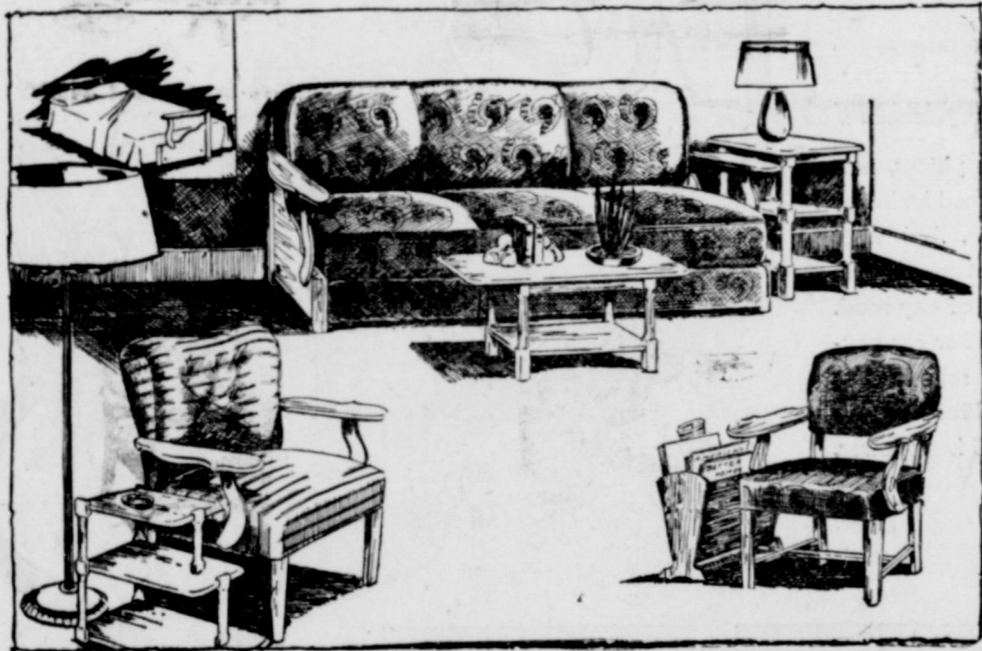
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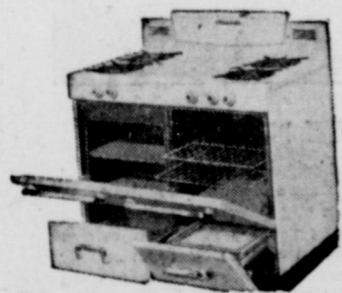


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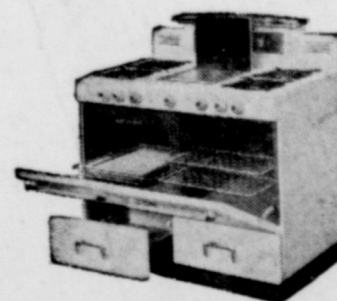
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THE MAVERICK'S CORRAL

Two important Southwest Conference games are scheduled this weekend. SMU meets Baylor, while TCU and Rice play.

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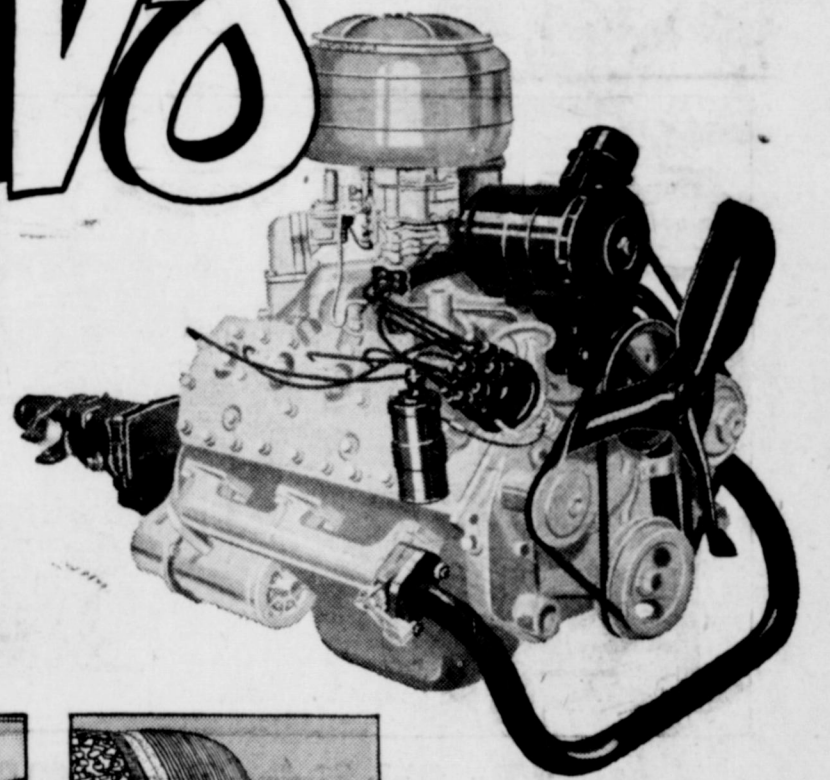

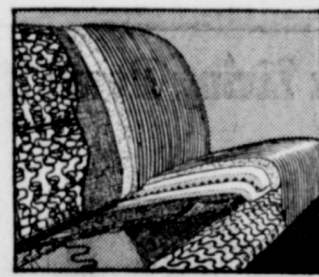

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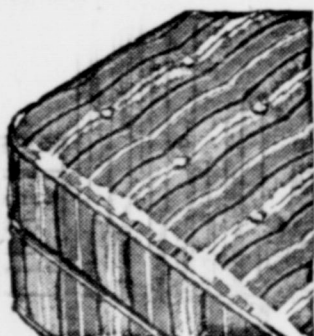
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
