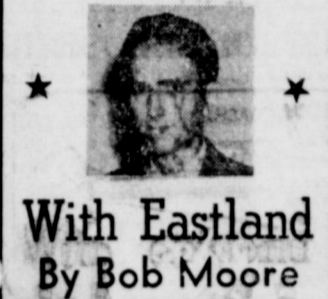

## Recruiter To Be In Eastland

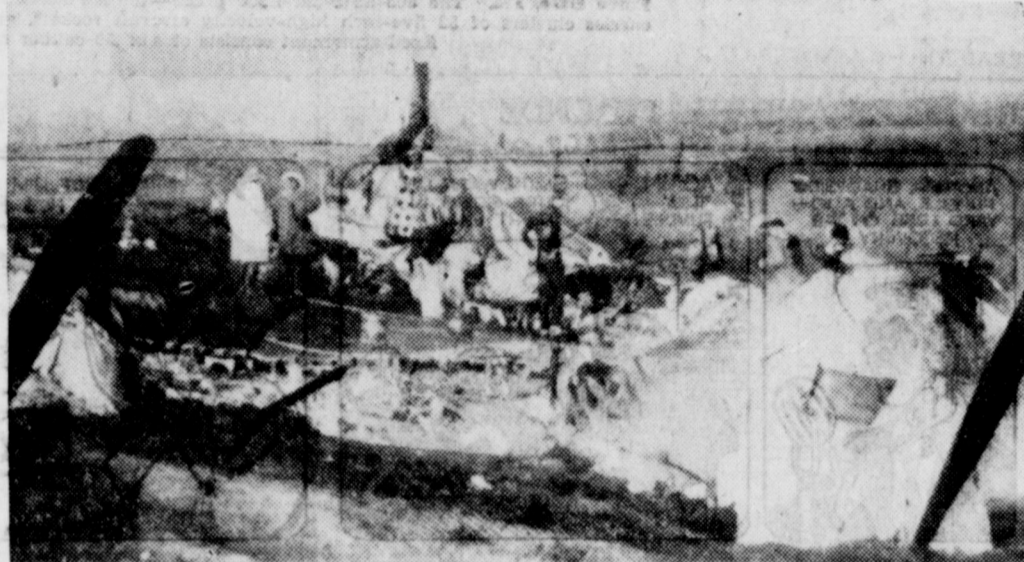

## Another Robbery Attempt Made In Ranger Thursday

Burglars apparently made another strike in Ranger sometime during the night and what appeared to have been an attempt to rob the Texaco warehouse on Tiffin road was discovered this morning when H. P. Earnest owner of the warehouse went to work.

On arriving at his place of business, Earnest found that the lock on the warehouse had been picked and the building opened. He summoned police who made a through investigation with Earnest and it is believed that nothing is missing.

In the meantime a man said to be 43 years of age who was picked up last night for questioning was still being held in jail this morning, pending fingerprinting and identification. On questioning at the city hall, Policeman Dave Morgan and Capt. Boyd were told a long story about the man's history and on which he backed down on further questioning. When the man became crossed up in his stories he was held for further investigation.

"He said first his home was in Dallas, then Oklahoma City and then Ardmore, Oklahoma, so he's in jail," Capt. Boyd said this morning.

## IS FOURTH SUPERFORTRESS TO MEET TRAGEDY LAST TWO DAYS

### Search Goes On For Missing Plane In Atlantic In Bermuda Area

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 18 (UP)—Five airmen were killed when a B-29 crashed and burst into flames in the mudflats on the edge of Tampa Bay today after taking off for the giant search for another B-29 off Bermuda.

Public information officers at MacDill Air Force Base here said four men survived the crash. They did not know immediately whether the bomber carried a full crew complement of 11 men.

Lt. Lloyd Strot, Base PIO officer, said the B-29 took off from here for the Bermuda search area and was only a few miles out when it informed the base tower that its No. 4 engine—right outboard—was on fire and that it was returning to the field.

The bomber came in from the south but it failed to make the runway and crashed into the muck and slime left by an unusually low tide on the edge of Tampa Bay.

Crash boats were unable to reach the blazing bomber because of the low water level. Heavy crash

trucks from the base could not reach its side because of the muck.

The bomber had flown from its home field at Walker Air Force Base, Roswell, N. M., to take part in the search for the missing B-29.

Strot said names of the dead and the survivors would be released at the Walker Base only.

The bomber came in low for its attempted landing. Just south of the north-south runway, its right wing dipped and sliced into the muck. The big plane cartwheeled, exploded and burned.

Strot said the four survivors and a fatally injured airman were thrown clear of the aircraft. The four men were unable to re-enter the blazing plane to attempt a rescue of their comrades trapped inside.

Base personnel waded through muck to the scene with hand fire extinguishers which had no effect on the flaming gasoline that enveloped the bomber.

The injured man was carried to dry ground where an ambulance was waiting. He died en route to a hospital.

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Nov. 18 (UP)—Rough weather and poor visibility closed in today just as search planes believed they were close to finding survivors of an American B-29 Superfortress which ditched in the Atlantic two days ago with 20 crew members aboard.

But scores of rescue planes took off at dawn at bases from Salem, Mass., to San Juan, Puerto Rico, to search the Atlantic. The B-29 crashed off Bermuda after it lost its way in heavy weather and ran out of fuel on a flight from California.

Hope that at least some of the missing airmen still may be alive soared after a search plane which had reported sighting a red flare last night 340 miles northwest of here landed early today with further details.

It said it also sighted another small light five hours after the flare had burst in the night sky.

The detailed report excited even Capt. George C. Welch, commander of the greatest U. S. Air Force search in peacetime history, who had been inclined to dismiss the purported flare as "just another star." He wasn't worried by the fact that the plane's radio has been unable to record any definite object in the area.

"Now, by God, we'll find 'em!" Welch cried, "I was mighty discouraged before, but the fact that the plane got no radar sighting is good. If it were a fishing vessel, they could have picked it up on their screen."

Belief that a flare may have been fired by the survivors was strengthened also by the report of another Superfortress that it had intercepted an international distress signal yesterday.

The sale was not as good this year. Funds will go for the rehabilitation of disabled veterans.

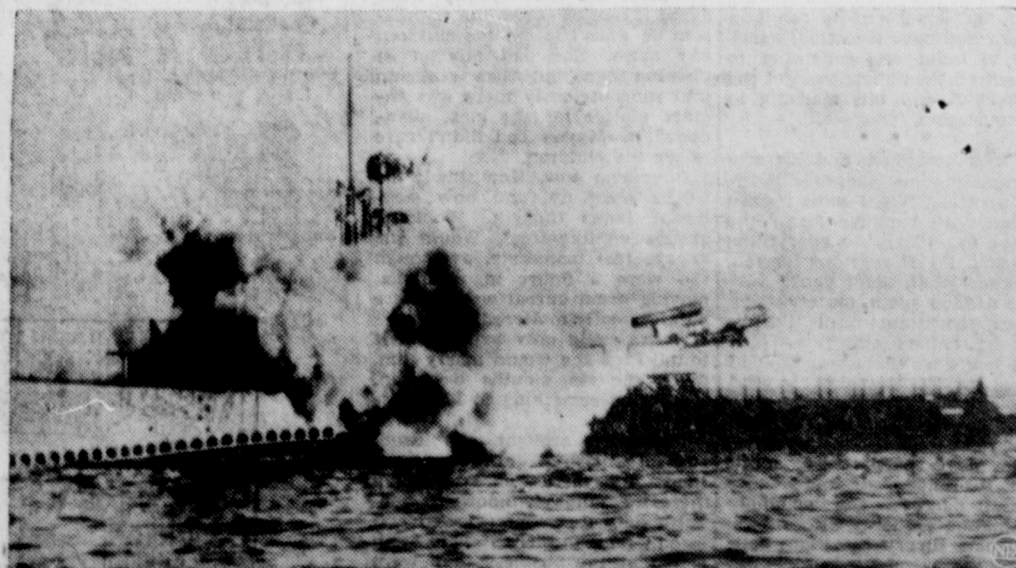
Serving on Mrs. Francis' committee were: Mrs. Bruce Butler and Mrs. Joe Laurent.

Funeral services for Daniel Silas (Si) Bradford 83, of Strawn and a former Eastland county peace officer and policeman at Ranger and Rising Star, will be conducted Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Methodist Church in Strawn.

Bradford died at his home in Strawn early Thursday after having been stricken with pneumonia about a week ago. Up until his illness he had been active as city marshal of Strawn and prior to that had served as city marshal or constable in Strawn for 20 years. He served on the police force in Ranger during the boom and is a former police chief of Rising Star. He also once served as a deputy sheriff of Eastland county and as a U. S. Marshal.

It was during his term as deputy sheriff in Eastland county that he assisted in the capture of the "Santa Claus" bank robbers that held up the First National Bank in Cisco in December 23, 1927. Two Cisco policemen were killed in the robbery and several others wounded. Bradford is credited with having wounded three of the four men that took part in the robbery and was in the posse that captured the last three of the robbers near South Bend and in Graham. Marshall Ratliff who wore the Santa Claus suit in the robbery and Robert Hill and Henry Helms were the three taken, the latter two surrendering in Graham, delirious from wounds inflicted by Bradford. Louis Davis the fourth man in the robbery was shot in the holdup and deserted in the south edge of Cisco as the robbers fled. He was taken to Tarrant county where he died in jail.

Bradford was born in Randolph County, Alabama and came to Texas in 1880 with his mother. They settled at Riverside in Tarrant county but moved to Palo Pinto county in 1883. He became a peace officer in Strawn in 1900. He was married at Gordon in 1894.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. A. M. Caraway of Amarillo and two sons, Hart and Bentley of Strawn, the latter constable at Strawn; two sisters, Mrs. N. B. Moore of Snyder and Mrs. J. W. Garrett of El Paso and two brothers, N. L. of Strawn and R. L. Bradford of Fort Worth.

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## Father, Two Daughters Die Fire At Home

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Nov. 18 (UP)—A father and his two daughters burned to death in an early morning fire today, and only the stark heroism of the mother saved the entire family of seven from being wiped out.

The dead are Bennie Saldana, Sr., 25, and his daughters Gloria, 3, and Dora 7.

The fire started at 2 A. M. in the Saldana's four room house. Authorities believed that two gas burners were not turned off last night.

Mrs. Concepcion Saldana remembered that she pushed a chest of drawers in front of a door to keep a draft off her children.

As flames started spreading through the small house, Mrs. Saldana awakened, clutched her 27 day old son, Andres, and took him outside.

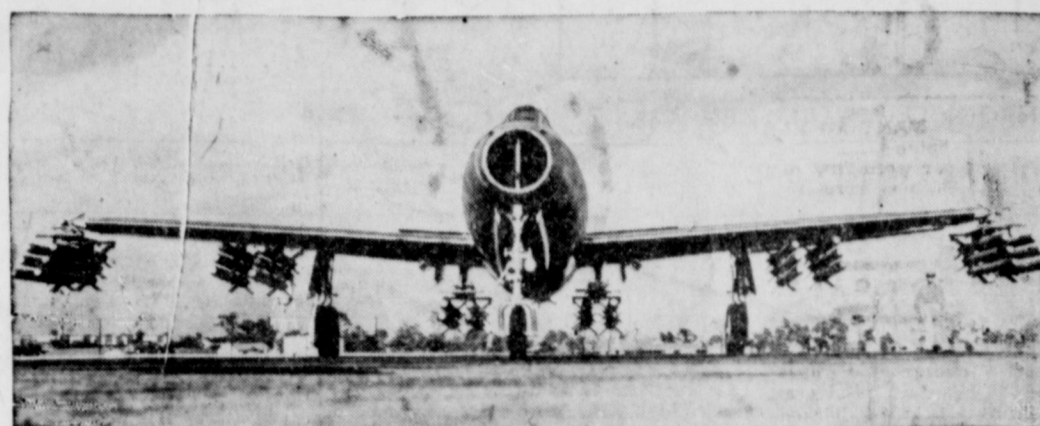

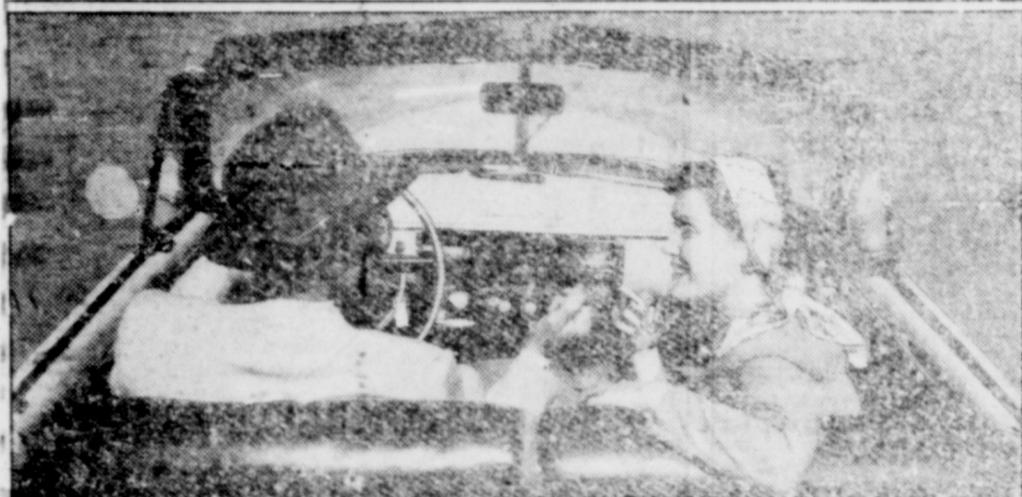

AMARILLO, Tex., Nov. 18—(UP)—A 23 year old police character was held in jail here today for the murder of his brother.

Billy Max Mann was charged in the fatal shooting of Donald Mann, 33, in the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Mann, yesterday.

The divorced wife of the slain man, Mrs. Arliss McKinney, who witnessed the slaying, was held in jail as a material witness. She gave no motive for the slaying, however.

Donald Mann was slain by three .22 caliber bullets at the home of his parents, who were away at the time.

Seconds later, the younger brother sped away on a motorcycle, but he was arrested a short time later.

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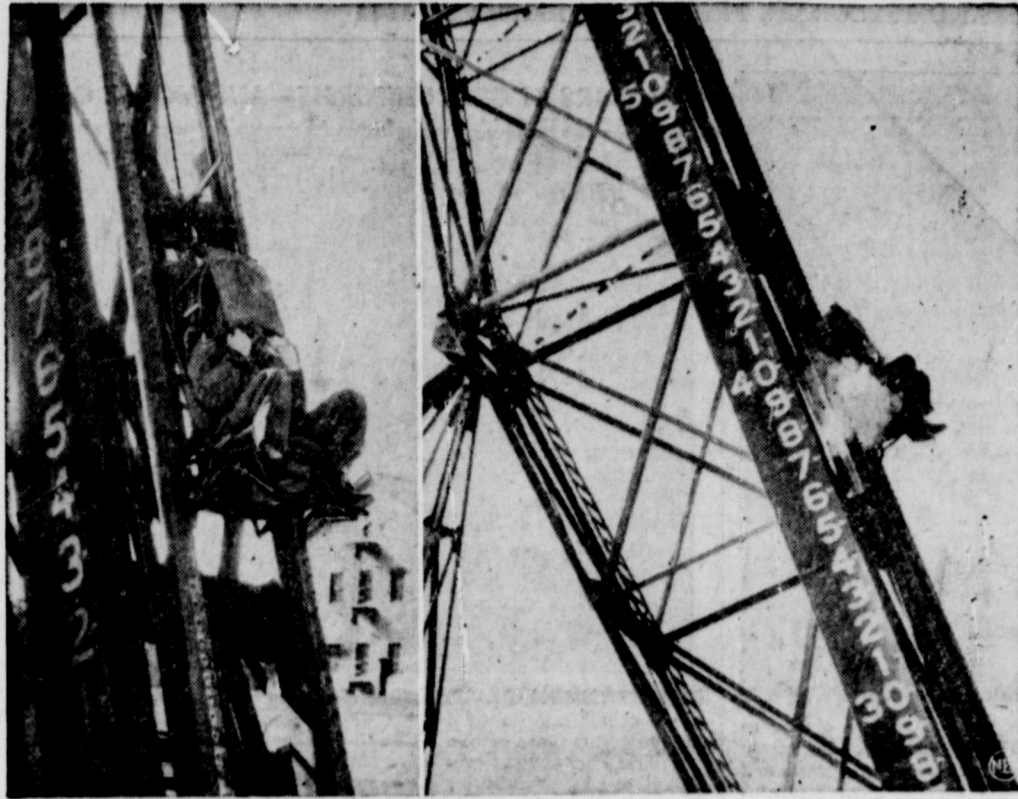

Rosebud and San Antonio Edison joined the list of class A playoff participants today, leaving 18 other berths to be decided before the midnight deadline tomorrow night.

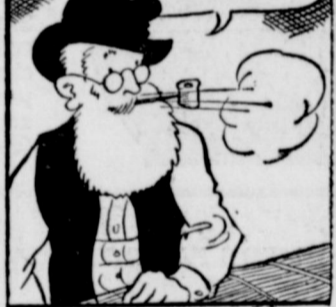
