## Practical Solution Advanced For Eastland's Hospital Need

A practical solution to Eastland's need for hospital facilities has been proposed in the conversion of the two top floors of the Connelley Hotel.

The proposed project was reached after a series of conversations between H. L. King, immediate past president of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and Ford dealer, with Don Hill, owner of the hotel.

Included in the proposal was use of the roof garden in the hospital set up, if need be. Each of the top floors has 16 rooms, which would provide a total of 32 rooms for the proposed hospital. Other facilities include a kitchen on the roof garden floor.

Main expense would be in providing a separate elevator for hospital use, King stated. An outside elevator would also have to be constructed.

Two plans were advanced for use of the hotel space: leased out by the hotel management; or a method where patient's rooms could be rented from the hotel on a day to day basis.

King said his only interest was to see Eastland have hospital facilities and believes the project would be more feasible than a campaign to construct a new building, which would entail a huge outlay of money. Since the

## Christmas Prices To Be Lower

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (UP)—Government economists had some good news for Christmas shoppers today.

They said that lower prices, better merchandise and increased competition will make it easier to buy gifts this year than at any time since pre-Pearl Harbor days. In addition, they said, buyers can be more particular about selecting their presents.

The single sour note came from the Federal Reserve Board. In its November bulletin, it said that consumer income this year is running about three per cent below 1948. But the optimistic economists pointed out that this level is still 90 per cent higher than 1935.

## Pioneer Chaney Resident Dies; Rites Today

Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock for Benjamin Cicero Weekes of Route 1, Ranger. The rites were held in the home of a daughter, Mrs. B. B. Freeman, Route 1, with John F. Lilly, minister of the Church of Christ at Comanche officiating. Interment was in Cook cemetery with Killingsworth's in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Weekes died Thursday, November 24, 1947 at the home of Mrs. Freeman. He was born in Bosque County November 14, 1861 and had been a resident of the Chaney community for 51 years. He was a retired farmer and a member of the Church of Christ. On September 12, 1883, he was married in St. Augustine County to Rosa Harvey Snell who preceded him in death in 1934.

Survivors are three sons, Frank Weekes of Ranger, Willis Weekes of McCamey and Dick Weekes of Comanche; four daughters, Mrs. Freeman, Mrs. A. H. Dean of Chaney, Mrs. W. L. Brittain of Graham and Mrs. Tom Kimbrough of Ranger. Seventeen grandchildren also survive.

Pallbearers were J. D. Rogers, E. E. Ferrell, Loy Williams, Jid Blackwell, Melvin Love and John Love all of Chaney.

## Twelve Dead, Two Missing In Storm

ALEXANDER CITY, Ala., Nov. 25. (UP)—Twelve persons were known dead, two missing and feared dead and at least 53 injured today as the result of tornadoes which whipped over Eastern Alabama yesterday.

One of the injured, a six-year-old girl, was in critical condition and hospital attendants said it would be "a miracle" if she lives. Relatively small areas struck by the fierce winds here and in the vicinity of Oneonta, 75 miles to the north. But the toll of dead and injured was high because several of the demolished homes had been the scenes of large Thanksgiving family gatherings.

Nine negroes, all members of the same family, were killed here and a 10th member of the family was missing and believed dead.

At Oneonta and neighboring Easley, three white persons were known dead and a fourth was missing. A total of 53 persons were treated for injuries and 19 of those were still hospitalized today.

Gov. James E. Folsom called out 100 National Guardsmen in the Oneonta area to "preserve order and prevent looting." They patrolled the section all night.

## McFadden Rites Held At Olden

Funeral services for William Charlie McFadden, 82, were held this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in the Olden Church of Christ, with O. G. Lanier of Ranger officiating. Interment was in the Merriman Cemetery with Hamner Funeral Home directing.

McFadden died Tuesday morning at 10:30 o'clock in Wickett, where he had resided the past three years. Prior to that, he resided in Eastland County for 58 years. Born Aug. 26, 1867, in Henry County, Tenn., he came to Eastland County at the age of 21. He was married to Nettie E. Wright, Dec. 1, 1889. He was a member of the Methodist Church until 1912, when he was baptised into the Church of Christ.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Mollie White of Wickett and Mrs. Alta Clark of Bonham; two sons, Munson McFadden of Wickett and Bill McFadden of Duncan, Oklahoma; ten grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Pallbearers were A. L. Bond, and L. E. Littleton, both of Eastland; A. R. Lassiter, Otis Hunt, Berry Elliott and Mr. Rice, all of Olden.

LINCOLN, Neb. (UP)—Bees in Nebraska have had a hard year of it. State-federal agricultural statisticians said the unusually severe winter resulted in a loss of 52 per cent of the colonies on hand last fall. The bees could not leave the hives for water and many starved.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (UP)

Two House Democrats today accused five congressional critics of U. S. conduct in the Angus Ward case of proposing action that would have meant war.

Reps. Mike Mansfield, D., Mont., and Melvin Price, D., Ill., commended the State Department for the tactics it used in seeking release by the Chinese Communists of the American Counsel General from jail in Mukden. Ward finally was released earlier this week.

They denounced five of their Republican colleagues for demanding the resignation of Secretary of State Dean Acheson and other officials for "unbelievable bungling" of the Ward incident. The five Republicans called the U. S. appeal to 30 other nations for help in freeing Ward "one of the most humiliating chapters in American diplomatic history."

Mansfield, a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, and Price accused the critics of willingness to plunge the nation into war. They based their charges on this sentence in a statement issued by the Republicans:

"The truth is that firm action taken months ago would have achieved the results desired."

Mansfield took the view, shared by diplomatic sources here, that the U. S. appeal to other nations of the world responsible for Ward's release.

"It is an indication," Mansfield said, "of how a united group of nations can work."

"If this particular move had not been made, Ward might still be in prison."

The Chinese Communists in releasing Ward and four consulate associates from prison ordered their expulsions from the country. The State Department is trying to get the Communists to arrange transportation not only for these five men but for the entire Mukden consulate staff.

But if the State Department had followed the "firm action" course mentioned by the five Republicans, Mansfield said, "it likely would have led to war and loss of many lives plus the fact that it would not have brought about Ward's release."

Price said he would like to ask the five Republicans what the State Department could have done that it did not do. Price is a member of the House Armed Services and Senate-House Atomic Energy Committees.

"Does the State Department have an Army to rescue people like Ward, or do these five Republicans want us to declare war?" Price asked. "Would they risk the lives of millions to release one man who would be released soon anyway?"

"I'd say this was warped thinking on the part of these five members."

The Republican demand that Acheson—be fired took U. S. diplomatic officials by surprise.

## Callahan Man Held In Death

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 25 (UP)—State police today held a 47-year-old Callahan man today following the death of Jose M. Valdez, 68, in a traffic accident.

Valdez was killed last night when a car struck him as he was walking across U. S. Highway 281 South. He was a brother of Police Officer Manuel Valdez of San Antonio.

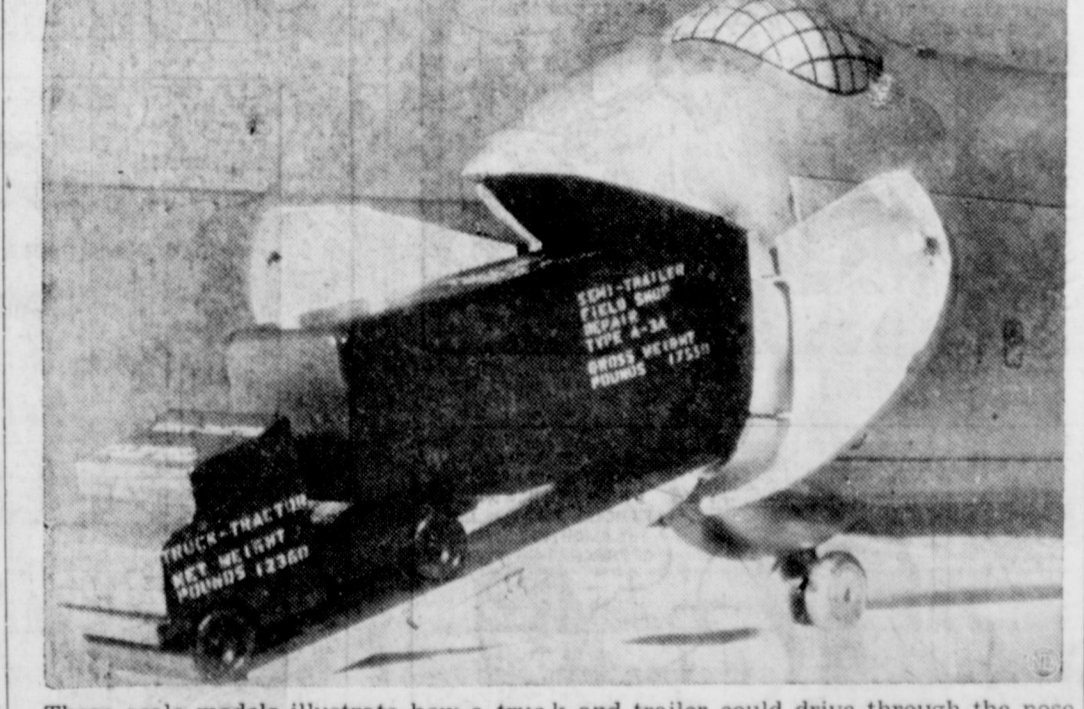

## Man Held As Love Burglar

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 25 (UP)—Fred Felix Adair, a 25-year-old father, refused to deny today that he is the "love burglar" who has been terrorizing Dallas women in their homes.

Four women already have identified Adair as the mysterious nocturnal prowler who has been sought by Dallas police for more than a year.

Detectives said a 17-year-old girl pointed to Adair as he stood at attention in a police lineup and identified him as the man

who raped her at her home several days ago.

A 50-year-old woman who said she was raped July 7 made an identical accusation, and two other women picked out Adair as the man who molested them in recent months.

Adair, a handsome payroll clerk who has an 18-month-old daughter, was arrested yesterday at his place of employment, a concrete company.

Investigators said a penknife labeled with the name of the concrete firm was dropped at the scene of a recent burglary and supplied a clue in the baffling case.

Another clue was a shirt lettered with the company name which was seen by neighbors when a prowler was chased from a suburban Oak Cliff home early this month.

## 2 States Search For Escapee

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 25 (UP)—Missouri and Illinois police today threw out a dragnet for an escaped Nebraska convict who outwitted and disarmed a State Highway Patrolman barely a mile from his headquarters.

The fugitive fled in a Nebraska state-owned automobile late yesterday after taking a 12-gauge shotgun and a revolver from Trooper Herbert Groff, who had stopped the car on U. S. 40 near the suburban Kirkwood, Mo., patrol station.

Police identified the fugitive as William Duncan, 36, Omaha, Neb. Groff's description of the man fitted that of Duncan, who escaped Wednesday night from the State Penitentiary at Lincoln, Neb. Duncan was serving a 12-year sentence for armed robbery.

Missouri and Illinois police were alerted to watch for him. Groff stopped the car for a routine check because he was suspicious of why a car carrying the name of the Nebraska Conservation and Survey Commission was in the St. Louis area.

The trooper questioned the three occupants of the car briefly, then directed the driver to step over to his patrol car for further questioning.

After putting a few more questions to the driver, Groff went

back to the Nebraska-licensed car to query the other two occupants, who said they were hitch-hikers picked up by the motorist.

While the officer's back was turned, the suspected driver seized

a riot shotgun from a ceiling rack of Groff's patrol car and waved it at Groff, yelling: "Get your hands up or I'll drill you."

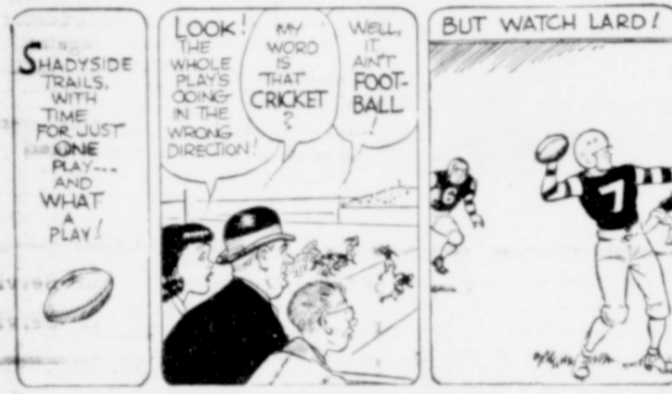
He forced the trooper to hand over his revolver and car keys.

### West Germans Oust Socialist

BONN, Germany, Nov. 25 (UP)—Socialist opposition leader Karl Schumacher was banished today from the West German parliament for bitterly attacking Chancellor Konrad Adenauer over the new German-Western big three agreement.  
 The agreement, announced yesterday, halted dismantling of a number of German factories, put Western Germany in the Allied Ruhr International authority and pledged the New Republic not to revive "Armed Forces of any kind."  
 Schumacher, leader of the social Democratic Party—the second ranking party in Parliament, angrily called Adenauer "Federal Chancellor of the Allies" for submitting to the Ruhr Statute. He objected to Germany in effect surrendering any of its sovereignty over Ruhr industry.  
 Schumacher's bitter attack interrupted Adenauer's defense of the agreement in Parliament early today. An uproar followed and the session was ordered adjourned.  
 An hour later, the steering committee barred Schumacher

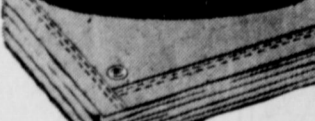
