## At Least 28 Killed In Dallas Airliner Crash

### EIGHTEEN OF 46 PERSONS ABOARD PLANE SAVED

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 29 (UP) — A crippled American Airlines DC-6 passenger plane, trying to land with one engine dead, crashed and burned at the north edge of Dallas Municipal Airport, Love Field, before dawn today.

An Airlines spokesman said 28 of the 46 persons aboard were killed. Eighteen others, including a 22-month-old baby and three of the five-member crew, were saved. The wreckage instantly was engulfed in angry, red flames that spouted 100 feet into the dark sky.

The weather was clear and crisp when the Mexico City-bound plane approached Love Field for the landing that turned into horrible death for most of those aboard.

Civil Aeronautics Administration officials said it was the worst air disaster in Texas history.

The fire destroyed three buildings, including one into which the plane slammed as it settled on the ground and burst into flames. It landed just off the airport proper, after plowing through the roof of one of the airport's fringe as the pilot fought desperately for altitude.

One of the lucky few thrown clear, Benjamin Bogish, 58, of New York City, was enroute to Tucson, Ariz., for his wife's funeral. The funeral was to have been conducted this afternoon, but Bogish telephoned Tucson and asked that it be delayed.

His injuries in the crash were a broken arm and shock. Bogish hired an ambulance, and left Dallas during the morning for Tucson.

The four-engined ship went down, witnesses said, left wing first.

The pilot, Capt. Laurens (Tommy) Claude of Dallas, had feathered one propeller—on a left-side engine—and made an approach from the southeast.

In the control tower, Howard McKendree, was watching. He said that the plane's left wing seemed to drop at the south end of the north-south runway.

"He tried to pull up the plane and then he veered off to the left," McKendree said. "On the radio he said something the tower couldn't understand clearly, but it sounded like 'we are losing.' That's all we could hear."

McKendree's ringside seat for the tragedy was three-quarters of a mile from the crash site. The plane, off balance, skittered at telephone-pole altitude between two buildings on the fringe along Love Field Drive, the street that is north border of the airport.

Mrs. J. H. Davis, whose home was two blocks away, was up to feed her cats.

"The plane sounded awfully loud, but I've got used to low-flying planes and I didn't think much about it," she said. "I heard a thud and then a puff, and then flames lighted up the whole neighborhood."

### Man Killed In Hunting Accident

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 29 (UP)—Louis A. Devinney of Fort Worth died last night at Brackenridge hospital as the result of a gunshot wound suffered earlier in the day in a hunting accident.

Deputy Sheriff Perry Miller said that Devinney, 42, was fatally wounded when a gun he was carrying was accidentally discharged as he climbed through a fence.

The accident occurred about seven miles south of here near the Fredericksburg highway. Devinney, alone at the time, lay unattended by the roadside for some 30 minutes until he was discovered by Joan Dykes, a 13 year old schoolgirl.

He was rushed to a hospital where doctors worked some four hours in an effort to save his life.

He left Austin last week-end as his father's condition became worse and was at the bedside at time of death.

Gov. Shivers planned to attend the services for Smith.

### First Check In Mortgage Plan Issued

First guaranteed mortgage loan check to be issued by the office of George I. Lane of Eastland, Farmer's Home Administration agent, has been made to Mr. and Mrs. Rocky B. Erwin who reside four miles northeast of Rising Star.

The funds will be used to build a new house and other necessary improvements on the 300 acre farm owned by the Erwins. Loaned by the Banker's Life Insurance Company of Des Moines, Iowa, the United States Government endorsed the transaction.

This was one of 100 such loans made in Texas since the program went into effect one year ago. Several other insurance companies and individuals have participated in the program.

Another loan of this type is being handled by Lane's office for Mr. and Mrs. Henry Reed of Long Branch. The Baird bank is making the loan for the Reed's to purchase additional acreage.

Regarding the new Rural Housing program, Lane said many applications are being received but few are granted because of limited funds.

### Woman Dies As Car Explodes

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 29 (UP) — A woman tentatively identified as the wife of Herbert Ray Noble, well known Dallas police character, was killed today when her automobile exploded.

The ear-splitting blast occurred as the woman backed the auto out of a garage at the Noble home in Oak Cliff section of Dallas.

The explosion was heard for miles and led to speculation that possibly another airplane crash had occurred in Dallas. It came about an hour after a DC-6 cracked up at Love Field at the opposite end of the city.

Police at first believed the woman, reported to be Mrs. Noble, had a child riding in the automobile with her. This report, however, was later found false.

Officers speculated that the car might have been wired with a dynamite charge.

### T. U. Dean's Wife Dies Suddenly

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 29 (UP) — Mrs. J. Anderson Fitzgerald, wife of the Dean of the College of Business Administration at the University of Texas, died of a heart attack last night.

Mrs. Fitzgerald, 57, collapsed at her home. Efforts of a fire department inhalator crew and a doctor to revive her were futile.

### Another Summer Day In Store

Texans prepared today to give the "Indian" in Indian summer back to the weatherman as they faced another day of abnormally warm weather.

While Christmas decorations sparkled in stores throughout the state, armies of shoppers doffed their coats, donned sunglasses and made the usual remarks about climatic vagaries in the Lone Star State.

The U. S. Weather Bureau predicted temperatures this afternoon would be only slightly lower than yesterday's record-ripping readings in the 90's and 80's.

Laredo received 97-degree heat to top the day's mercury ascent. San Antonio with 90 degrees was the hottest it's ever been on Nov. 28. Dalhart reported a low minimum of 34 degrees during the night.

There were other unprecedented highs for the date at Del Rio, 95; Austin, 89, and Dallas, 83.

Thermometers in Waco and Corpus Christi scoffed at all previous November records, climbing to 89.

At Tyler, it was 85; Lubbock, Houston and Texarkana, 83; Amarillo, 81, and Galveston and El Paso, 78.

Weatherman credited brilliant sunshine and a lack of wind for the freakish, shirt-sleeve situation.

A weak cold front which began moving into the state last night from the Great Lakes was due to drop official temperatures early today to the 40's.

However, they were slated to span the gap to the 80's in most places before the sun went down. Continued clear skies were forecast.

### HEIFERS FOR YOUTH PROGRAM ARRIVE IN FINE SHAPE, SEEM TO LIKE NEW EASTLAND HOME

Looking none the worse after a 300 mile trip by truck from Tyler to their new Eastland County home, 17 registered jersey heifers were busy eating when visited Monday afternoon by George I. Lane, member of the Eastland County dairy youth program committee, and this writer.

The heifers seemed to like their temporary quarters at the Sam Slover farm, known as the old Stubblefield place, southeast of Eastland. After eating to their heart's content inside a large shed, they ambled out in the warm Eastland County sunshine. One or two sauntered down to one end of the fence enclosure for a drink of water out of a couple of tubs. Noticing that the water was n't too clean, Lane and the writer emptied the tubs and refilled them with fresh water.

Nothing is too good for these

heifers. They are not ordinary ones, but something special. In this small herd of stock may rest the nucleus of a great new industry for Eastland County—dairy-farming.

At least, that is the dream and hope of businessmen, civic organizations and agriculture officials of the county who have pooled their money, time and energy in the project known as the Eastland County Youth Dairy association, with the county dairy association as the sponsoring organization.

Kickoff of the program will be in Eastland, Tuesday, Dec. 13, with the heifers awarded to as many worthy 4-H and FFA boys of the county in a public ceremony. In connection with awarding of the heifers, a joint meeting of the Eastland Lions and Rotary

## Indictment Of Adair Pushed

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 29 (UP)—The State pressed for a grand jury indictment today against Fred Felix Adair, good looking young Dallas father charged with rape as the city's "love burglar."

The District Attorney's office, seeking a death penalty in the case, made clear it will fight any attempt to free the 25 year old blond bookkeeper under bond.

Married and the father of an 18 months old child, Adair has been identified by at least five rape and attempted rape victims.

He signed a confession last Thursday following his arrest but two days later he repudiated it, saying he would wage a court battle.

A dozen local residences were invaded last summer by a burglar who also raped occupants in at least two instances.

Detectives said Adair had "cleared up" 28 burglaries committed during the last two years.

The grand jury received evidence in the case yesterday, specifically charging Adair with criminal assault of a Dallas housewife but there was no announcement of its findings.

## Wants Extension Of Rent Control

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (UP)—Rent director Tighe E. Woods said today he will ask Congress to continue rent control another year.

"Maybe" ceilings can be abandoned safely after that, he said in an interview.

"I believe it is possible that the housing shortage can be licked by June, 1951, provided industry and the government work together to that end," he said.

The real estate industry is seeking to end the rent curbs on June 30, 1950, when the present law expires. Realtors contend that controls no longer are needed or justified.

Woods' reply to that was: "If we are to achieve President Truman's goals of decent housing, at prices people can afford to pay, we haven't yet licked the housing shortage. I have yet to see a \$50 rental in new construction in any major city."

Woods said that so far he plans to ask no major revisions in the present law. It is a "decontrol" measure under which ceilings have been abandoned on 2,422,892 housing units and raised, by an average 19 per cent, on another 390,000.

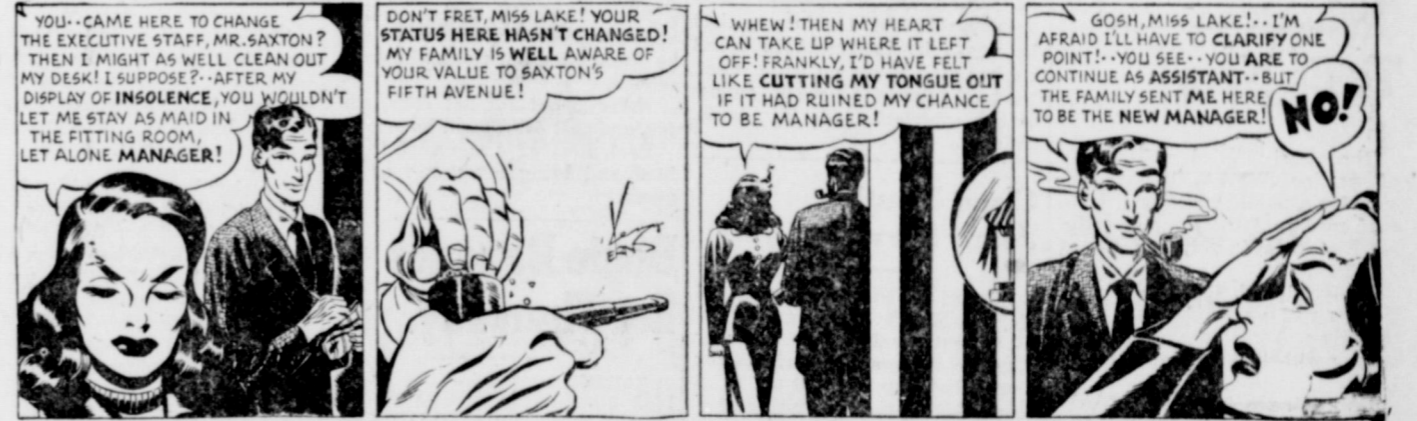

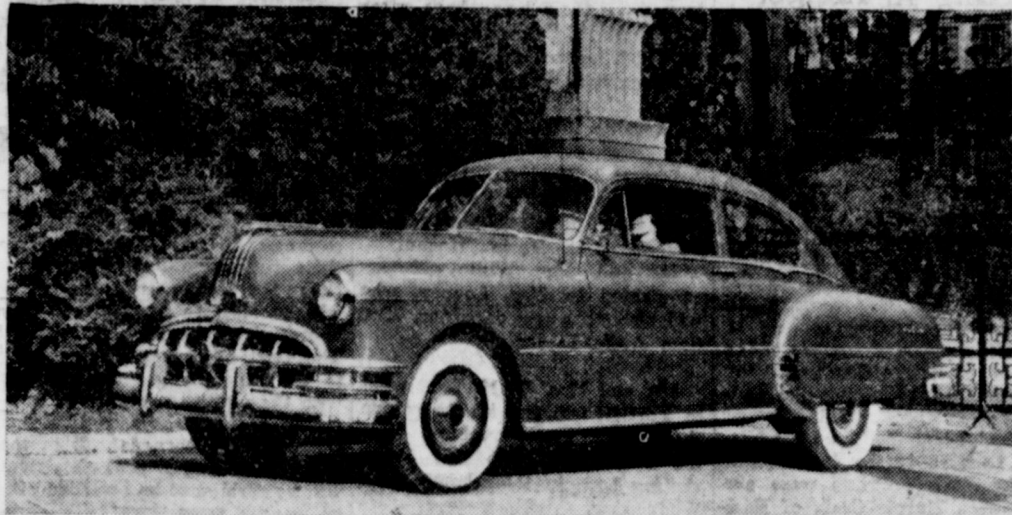

Clubs will be held soon in the basement of the First Methodist Church. Emmett Brown of Cleburne, who pioneered a youth heifer program in Johnson County, after which the Eastland County program is modeled, will be guest speaker.

The youths, who were selected to receive the calves from applications, will take the calves to their respective homes to raise. When the time is ready, the calves will be bred to a registered bull approved by the dairy association. The first offspring will go back to the sponsoring organization with the youth to retain full ownership of the original calf. From the offspring turned back to the sponsors, another pool of calves will be formed to be awarded other worthy farm boys in a ceremony next year. In this rotating plan through the youths of the county, a dairying industry is expected to be derived.

Like most worthwhile projects, the youth dairy program has and will continue to take considerable work and effort, but those interested feel they will be well repaid in additional revenue to the county and benefit to the boys.

Until a few months ago, the program was on an idea in the minds of a few citizens. One of the pioneers of the program was A. Z. Myrick of Cisco, president of the dairy association, who secured details of the Johnson

County Plan. He and other agriculture officials visited various civic clubs and outlined the proposed program. To secure the calves with which to start, it was necessary to have sponsors to furnish funds. One of the first to say, "Yes, we'll sponsor a calf," was the Eastland Rotary Club. Others quickly fell in line with the plan, including considerable publicity and editorial endorsement by the Eastland Daily Telegram.

Next step was the organization of a special steering committee to administrate the program. Theo Lamb of Eastland, automobile dealer who didn't know which end to start at to milk a calf, but was vitally interested in the welfare of the county, was elected as president of the committee. He and his committee have been the "work-horses" to put the program over. Within a brief time 17 sponsors at \$200 a calf were secured to start the ball rolling.

With \$3,400 cash in the till, the committee was then ready to buy the calves. Here was one of the most vital steps in the entire program, for the selection would be the basis for the future industry. After many trips to look at various herds, correspondence and telephone calls, they finally found just what they were looking for at Frank Took's dairy, near Tyler. The Took dairy has more than 100 cows and the calves were selected from a herd of 50. The calf has papers of evidence concerning blood line and that they were bred from cows of merit in

production.

Now the calves are here, happy and contented eating food as guests of the Eastland Lions Club, who didn't have enough money in the treasury to buy a calf, but wanted to participate in some manner. To raise the money to buy the feed, members gladly dug down in their pockets with the openings already frayed from having to donate to so many worthy causes. This was typical of the spirit of cooperation that may someday make Eastland County the dairying capital of the world.

## BERRY LEADS SOUTHWEST IN OFFENSIVE HONORS

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 29 (UP)—Lindy Berry, Texas Christian's small but mighty workhorse, stood head and shoulders above the Southwest Conference field today in total offensive honors.

Berry played the latter part of the season behind a cumbersome plastic mask. But despite the handicap, he continued to hit receivers with the fine accuracy and whirled to great yardage on the ground.

Berry's total for the season was 1,702 yards rushing and passing on 350 plays. Trailing for overall honors were Adrian Burk of Baylor with 1,347 yards on 221 plays and Paul Campbell of Texas with 1,263 on 218 plays.

In passing alone, Berry hit 106 times on 220 tries good for 1,445 yards. Burk completed 110 of 191 passes for 1,428 yards and Campbell tossed for 1,372 yards on 91 completions out of 182 tries.

In the "human tank" department, Arkansas' Geno Mazzanti paced the field, according to newly-released Southwest Conference statistics. The piston-legged Mazzanti netted 743 yards for the season and was trailed by Sonny Wyatt of Rice with 714 and Texas A&M's Bob Smith with 704.

Still in the running for ground gaining honors, however, was SMU's Kyle Rote, with one game to play. Rote's total to date was 662 yards.

All-American Doak Walker, SMU's pride who has been handicapped by illness and injury this season, paced leading passers with a .586 percentage. Trailing closely was Burk with a .576 mark.

The leading pass receiver was

Southern Methodist's Rote has averaged 43.4 yards in punting, 1.7 yards more than the respectable average turned in by teammate Walker.

Bobby Dillon of Texas was the top punt returner with a 19-yard average. Berry was second with a 17.6 mark.

The Texas Longhorns posted the best offensive and defensive marks. They averaged 362.4 yards on offense and held opponents to a 206 yard average.

Baylor was second best on defense, allowing 226.7 yards, and Rice was the second most potent team on offense with a 35.5 average.

## Doak Walker To Play In Shrine East-West Game

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29 (UP)—Doak Walker, Southern Methodist All-American back, will play for the West in the East-West football game here Dec. 31, it was announced yesterday.

To date 23 stars have been selected to play in the game, 19 of them from the East.

At the same time the coaching lineup underwent a change when the Missouri Tigers accepted a bid to the "Gator Bowl." Don Faurot, Missouri coach, was to have been a West coach in the game at Kezar Stadium. His replacement has not yet been named.

The East will be coached by Andy Kerr of Lebanon Valley, Bernie Bierman of Minnesota and Tuss McLaughry of Dartmouth. Two of the West's three coaches will be Jeff Crayath of Southern California and Matty Bell of Southern Methodist.

## POSSIBILITY OF MIRACLE IS BEING INVESTIGATED

LAFAYETTE, La., Nov. 29 (UP)—A special representative of the Pope conducted secret hearings here today to determine whether a miracle saved the life of a man with a gangrenous appendix after doctors gave him up for lost.

The catholic church was investigating the case of Herbert Theriot of Franklin, La. The first session was held Saturday.

On April 12, 1948, Dr. Guy Aycock of Franklin operated on Theriot and found that gangrene had set in at the appendix. The doctor closed the incision and said Theriot was a "hopeless" case medically.

A church spokesman said that today Theriot is in good health "to the amazement of medical science."

Theriot said that after Dr. Aycock gave him up he asked Sister Francis, Superior of St. Johns Academy in Franklin, for help. She brought him a piece of the

late Pere Antoine Moreau's bones. Theriot said he held the relic over his incision and grasped a picture of Pere Antoine.

The next day, Theriot said, Dr. Aycock came to dress the incision and pronounced him out of danger. His recovery was rapid.

Dr. Aycock has since died. But he is understood to have written to catholic authorities saying that the cure was unexplainable and must have been a miracle.

The church is now trying to determine whether Theriot's cure came by special intervention of God through Pere Antoine.

Pere Antoine, who is not now recognized as a saint by the church, founded the congregation of the holy cross in southwest Louisiana in 1846 and is said to have granted many favors of miraculous character to members of his congregation during his lifetime.

## Felling Crows SMU May Win Notre Dame Tilt

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 28 (UP)—While Southern Methodist grid officialdom moaned today over SMU's chances against mighty Notre Dame here Saturday, there was a mounting groundswell of public feeling that SMU wasn't going to be slaughtered—and might even win.
