## **EIGHTEEN OF 46 PERSONS ABOARD PLANE SAVED**

#### BY ROY CALVIN United Press Staff Correspondent

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 29 (UP) — A crippled American Airlines DC-6 passenger plane, trying to land with one engine dead, crashed and burned at the north edge of Dallas' Municipal Airport, Love Field, before dawn today.

An Airlines spokesman said 28 of the 46 persons aboard vere killed. Eighteen others, including a 22-month-old baby and three of the five-member crew, were saved. The wreckage instantly was engulfed in angry, red flames that spouted 100 feet into the dark sky.

The weather was clear and crisp when the Mexico Citybound plane approached Love Field for the landing that turned into horrible death for most of those aboard.

Civil Aeronautics Administration officials said it was the worst air disaster in Texas' history.

The fire destroyed three buildings, including one into which the plane slammed as it settled on the ground and burst into flames. It landed just off the airport proper, after plowing through the roof of • one at the airport's fringe as the
