Who Pays The Bill



Millions of tons of cottonseed, purchased by the government, and piled out on the ground in open fields; in ricks 50 feet wide at the bottom and 200 feet long; miles and miles of them, are appearing around Lubbock, Texas. Oil mills have all the seed they can handle and the support price the government is paying is running into fantastic figures. The seed is almost sure to waste because of a Texas law which says all cottonseed must be sterilized or burned by March first of the next year, to prevent boll weevil. These two rows of seeds are on a farm owned by K. C. Preston, about 11 miles west of Lubbock, near Wolforth, Texas. About 4200 tons are on the ground here. (NEA Telephoto)

SPECIAL SESSION MAY BE DELAYED TIL FEB.

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 7 (UP)—Delays in submitting survey reports to be studied by a special session of the legislature probably will result in the lawmakers convening in February instead of late January, observers said today.

Gov. Allan Shivers has announced he would restrict the call for the special session in the 1950-51 biennium operating budget, the launching of a hospital-building program and revenue-raising measures to cover the program's cost.

However, reports on an overall survey being made of the state's mental institutions and special schools were expected to be held up until late December or early January. Time would then be needed to correlate the reports into a program for presentation to the legislators.

It had been expected that most of the survey reports would be ready by Dec. 19. But the board for Texas State Hospitals and special schools announced the meeting would be postponed until "early in January."

Big Ad Campaign Planned On '50 Pontiac Models

To announce its 1950 models Pontiac Motor Division has embarked upon the largest new model advertising campaign in its history, according to Harry J. Klingler, general manager.

"Dollar for Dollar You Can't Beat a Pontiac!" is the 1950 theme song of announcement advertisements appearing in 2,915 newspapers with a readership exceeding forty-seven millions. Full-page space was used in 29 key cities on announcement day with other newspapers carrying advertisements ranging downward from 119 inches. A heavy newspaper follow-up campaign is scheduled.

Pontiac announcements were carried by 1001 radio stations in 880 cities and over 48 television outlets, probably the most concentrated use of these media by an automobile manufacturer.

Seventeen national magazines with a combined readership of twenty-seven millions, will carry Pontiac announcement advertisements.

Full color spreads will be used in The Saturday Evening Post, Life and Collier's. Other magazines will carry full-color single pages.

Moyné Kelly, the board's executive director, received a verbal report yesterday on one survey completed by an authority on care of mentally defective children.

J. Thomas McIntire, director of the Arizona Children's Colony at Phoenix, said he found "astounding" few trained staff personnel at three Texas mental institutions. He inspected the Austin State school, Mexia State School and the Abilene State Hospital and School.

He said he found the three institutions lacking in recreation facilities and day rooms and the children "starved to death for training."

However, his report stated, the schools were clean, the food was good and the children's care was "good."

Interest Grows In Stock Show

FORT WORTH, Dec. 7 — Inquiries indicate that the Hereford breeding cattle division of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show will be as strong as the 1949 show which attracted probably the largest number of Herefords in the Fort Worth exposition's history. Dates are Jan. 27 through Feb. 5.

The grand total of awards for Hereford breeding cattle will be \$15,800.

An important feature will be carload and pen bulls, the premiums having been increased to \$2,000. The special importance of the carload and pen division is that it brings animals splendidly suited as sires for commercial ranches and these bulls are available for purchase.

Throp Hereford Farms of Britton, S. D., in 1948 and 1949 displayed the champion Hereford bull, the winner at the last Stock Show being The Royal Domino 37th.

The first auction sale in the new auction pavilion, which is being built, will be that of the Hereford breeding cattle. The auction will be sponsored by the American Hereford Association, beginning at 2 p. m., Tuesday, Jan. 31.

Deadline for cattle, sheep and swine entries in the Stock Show is Dec. 12.

Texan Exonerated In Colorado Death

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. Dec. 7 (UP)—A New Braunfels, Tex., man—exonerated of suspicion in the strangulation death of a Colorado Springs youth—was enroute to his home today.

Wayne Nelson Young, 28, proved himself innocent at three sessions of questioning in the death last January of Walter Joe Parsons, said Police Chief I. B. Bruce.

Young had fought extradition to Colorado, then went voluntarily where yesterday he was cleared of any connection with Parson's death.

Gowns On Ice, Models Await Big Show Tonite

WESLACO, Tex., Dec. 7 (UP)—Twenty-four models from nine Valley towns peeped into their refrigerators today to make sure their gowns for tonight's festivities were still crisp.

The models will display themselves and their gowns, made of everything from red peppers to Boungainvillea, at the national fruit, vegetable and flower style show here tonight.

Some 6,000 spectators will view the colorful and unique show, a part of the 30th birthday anniversary of Weslaco.

Everything visible, except the model, will be of fresh perishable flowers or vegetables. Since most of the gowns must be kept "on ice" until time for the show, the majority of models will be "modeling" long woolies under their spectacular outfits.

The gowns displayed tonight must remain a secret until the show's opening. But if last year's pattern is followed, beautiful evening dresses will be created from slices of carrots wrapped in cellophane, black accessories will be made of shiny onion seed and shaved egg plant will produce a dark purple satin ensemble.

Generally, the costumes are odorous. But one dress which walked off with the prize several years carried the faintly enhancing smell of cabbage. Another, made of tiny red Mexican peppers, gave the model a bad case of "December sunburn."

Chilly Weather Due In Tonight

Chilly weather with some frost in north Texas and the Panhandle appeared in prospect tonight, the Dallas Weather Bureau said today.

No important drops in temperatures are expected but the weather will be cooler than this morning's comparatively warm readings.

Overnight, temperatures ranged from 29 degrees at Clarendon to 62 at Brownsville with Lubbock and Amarillo reporting 30; salt flat 33; Childress and Wink 34; Wichita Falls 38 and Abilene 39; A cool front extended from above Lake Charles, La., through Austin, Tex., and westward. The front was moving southward, the Weather Bureau said.

Temperatures yesterday ranged from 80 degrees at Waco and Victoria to 60 at Guadalupe Pass.

Rev. Chapman Talks To Lions On Communism

Rev. L. M. Chapman, pastor of the First Baptist Church, addressed the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday noon meeting on the subject of "Democracy Beats Communism."

The speaker was presented by County Judge Lewis Crossley, chairman of the Americanism committee of the Dulin-Daniel Post of the American Legion, sponsor of the four day observance of "Democracy Beats Communism" theme here.

Special guests of the club were the Eastland High School Maverick football boys, Lion Tamer and Head Coach Wendell Siebert presented Assistant Coach James Alexander, Football Sweetheart, Miss Lydia Faye Houston, and the boys.

Other guests included District Governor Sam Furr and State Secretary Marlow Fisher. President Wes Harris presided for the business session.

Wichita Falls Planning Civic Improvements

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., Dec. 7 (UP) Multiple civic improvements were in prospect for Wichita Falls today with the passage of a \$3,250,000 bond issue.

Voters balloted more than 3 to 1 yesterday for the bonds to cover expansion of water, sewer, and park systems and additions to the park and fire departments.

City officials estimated the move will increase tax rates 25 per \$100 valuation and cause a minimum sewer service charge of 50 cents.

AUSTIN, Dec. 7th—Jim Cantrell, Princeton banker and President of the Texas Rural Roads Association, announced today the resignation of Gilbert Smith who has been Executive Director of the Association for one year.

Judge Smith tendered his resignation effective January 1st to the Executive Committee in a meeting at Waco last week, to accept a position with the Texas Railroad Association.

Robert G. Dillard, Austin, was named by the committee to succeed Smith. A native Texan, Dillard has been in organization and association work for ten years.

Cantrell expressed keen regret in losing the services of Smith, stating that the association had made excellent progress under his direction. He continued by pointing out that in acquiring Dillard with his training and wide experience in organizational work, the activities of the association will continue to advance, as he is recognized as one of Texas' executives.

PEARL HARBOR OBSERVES ATTACK ANNIVERSARY

PEARL HARBOR, T. H., Dec. 7 (UP) — Only a solemn five-minute ceremony above the rusted deck of the sunken battleship Arizona marked the eighth anniversary today of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

A small group of military commanders and acting governors Oren E. Long gathered at 8 A. M. Hawaiian time (12 noon, CST)—the hour when the Japanese blitz attack was at its height—to hear an invocation by Pacific Fleet Chaplain Capt. E. B. Harp.

His prayer was followed by a moment of silence and then a bugle played "Taps."

The service was arranged on the eve of the anniversary by the suggestion of Pacific Fleet Commander-in-Chief Admiral Arthur W. Radford.

A Navy spokesman said Radford did not want the day to go unobserved but wished a minimum of fanfare. Other branches of the military held no special services to commemorate the day.

One military spokesman said some commanders were opposed to "celebrating a mistake."

Only other sign of an anniversary of the "day of infamy" was furnished by a group of girl scouts and their mothers, who were scheduled to tour Pearl Harbor by boat and drop flower leis on the water in memory of the men who died under a rain of Japanese bombs.

An official Washington report in 1945 listed 4,575 casualties, including more than 3,000 dead or missing. The Arizona was one of two battleships that were sunk in the attack. Six other battleships were damaged in addition to 11 smaller craft sunk or damaged.

Almost 250 American planes were destroyed or disabled, the bulk of them shot up before they could get off the ground.

America declared war the next day and, with the help of her allies, handed Japan its first defeat in 2,605 years of recorded or mythical history.

Gov. Allan Shivers highlighted a statewide observation of Pearl Harbor Day today with a warning to Texans that it takes more than flag-waving and patriotic speeches to protect Democracy.

Shivers, returned by night-train from New Orleans where he participated in a meeting of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, opened a series of three speeches at Gladewater.

Other appearances, all scheduled in connection with the American Legion's "Democracy Beats Communism" Program, were at Grand Saline and Terrell.

Pearl Harbor Day, the Governor said at Gladewater, was an appropriate time for such an observance, because "we were unprepared then. Today how does Democracy stand?"

To keep Democracy a "vital and ever-growing concept of government" it takes more than flag-waving and patriotic speeches," he said.

"More words," the Governor said, "are not enough. Words are merely the expression of ideas, and must be translated into action. We can foster and protect this Democracy we live under, only by living it."

CHICAGO, Dec. 7 (UP)—Former heavyweight champion Joe Louis battles Pat Valentino of San Francisco in the Chicago stadium tonight and a victory for the "Brown Bomber" might be the opening of his comeback campaign.

Louis was expected to weigh about 222 pounds for the brawl compared to 185 for Valentino. They will wear 10-ounce gloves, two over the usual heavyweight mitts, for the exhibition bout scheduled for 10 rounds.

But Jolting Joe will be trying for a knockout before the eighth round, and has said that if he succeeds he might start working toward a genuine title fight with present titleholder Ezzard Charles.

Charles fought Valentino in San Francisco last September and although he was losing on points at the end of seven rounds, he knocked out the tousel-headed westerner in the eighth to hold his championship.

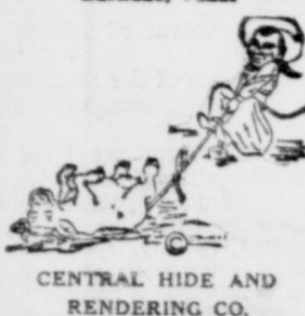

Scroll May Be Lost Chapter Of Bible History

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Dec. 6 (UP) An ancient scroll that may prove to be the lost chapter of the biblical history of man from the creation to the time of Noah will be investigated shortly by Harvard archaeologists.

The priceless Parchment Roll, bearing inscriptions in Aramaic, the language of Jesus Christ, was brought here yesterday by Archbishop Athanasius Yeshue Samuel, Assyrian Orthodox Metropolitan of Jerusalem and Transjordan.

Believed to be the legendary lost book of Lamech that has been sought for centuries. The document will be turned over for chemical treatment to author-

ities of Harvard's fog museum. It is in such a dried-up and fragile condition that extensive preparation with chemicals will be needed before an attempt can be made to unroll it, Archbishop Samuel said. He hoped the first attempt can be made in about two weeks.
