## TAX PROGRAM TO COST PUBLIC TWO, HALF BILLION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25 (UP)—The nation's oil producers estimated today that President Truman's tax program would cost the public at least \$2,500,000,000 (B) in higher prices.

Ronald Rodman, member of the Executive Committee of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, said elimination of the "incentive program" of the present law would raise the price of crude petroleum "between 50 and 100 per cent." It also would increase the cost of producing gasoline, heating oil and other finished oil products, he said.

Rodman said that if the present "depreciation" clause of the tax laws is eliminated, the oil industry will find itself "in the position of having to find another source of revenue in order to regain its risk capital."

Last year, the industry grossed \$5,000,000,000 (B) on crude products alone. According to Rodman's figures, the minimum additional cost would be 50 per cent of the total gross, or \$2,500,000,000 (B).

The association said the president's plan, if adopted, would deprive the industry of "the most important factor in oil production — the incentive to go out and drill new wells."

Meantime, at Philadelphia, researchers for the Atlantic Refining Company said they have developed a new drilling method which may tap billions of barrels of crude oil heretofore given up as lost.

In known oil fields now there are 30 billion gallons of oil which are given up because current drilling producers extract only about 45 per cent of the oil from

## Hiss Sentenced To Five Years

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (UP)—Alger Hiss, the bright young State Department expert who advised President Roosevelt at Yalta, was sentenced to five years in prison today for lying about his 1938 cooperation with a Communist spy ring.

The 45-year-old former president of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, stood white and tense as Judge Henry W. Goddard sentenced him to five years on each of two perjury counts, the sentence to be served concurrently.

Even as the sentence was pronounced, Hiss repeated that he was innocent.

Just before Judge Goddard pronounced the sentence, Hiss requested the opportunity to make "a brief statement."

"I would like to thank you for the opportunity to deny the charge against me," he said. "I am confident in the future the full facts as to how Whittaker Chambers was able to carry out forgery by typewriter will be disclosed."

The lanky defendant then stood, arms at side, facing the judge to hear the sentence. He did not flinch as the judge pronounced sentence.

His attorney Slyde B. Cross filed appeal papers immediately. Hiss received the maximum five year sentence on each of the counts. He also could have been fined \$2,000 on each count.

Judge Goddard ruled that Hiss remain under \$10,000 bail, twice the amount he had been in liberty under since his indictment.

Cross made two motions immediately after the court opened at 10:30 A. M. — one for a new trial, and the second for arrest of judgment. Both were denied.

## Five In Family Burn To Death

HATBORO, Pa., Jan. 25 (UP)—Five members of a family were burned to death in their sleep today when flames destroyed their home in the Lacey Park housing project.

Hatboro firemen identified the dead as Horace Morrow, his wife and three children, ranging from two to 14 years of age. The names were not available immediately. Another son left the Morrow home two days ago to rejoin the Navy.

Morrow is a sailor attached to the Johnsonville Naval Air Modification Center about one mile away.

The charred bodies of the victims were found in their beds by firemen.

The dwelling occupied by the Mowrows was one in a four-unit residence at the government project. The three families in the other units escaped. Their quarters suffered water and smoke damage.

## Cold Front Moves Across Texas

A cold front moved slowly across North Texas today, leaving behind swirling winds that kicked up dust in the west.

Freezing rain or snow was predicted for the Panhandle and Upper South Plains today and tonight and in the top half of East Texas tonight.

The U. S. Weather Bureau at Dallas said a few showers would fall in the north and eastern sections of the state earlier in the day.

Colder weather was expected Thursday.

During the early morning hours today, Dalhart, at the entrance to the Panhandle, reported the lowest temperature in the state, 18 degrees. Lufkin was warmest with 72 degrees.

Amarillo reported a reading of 26 degrees at 4:30 A. M. and Clarendon had a 29.

Other 4:30 readings were Lubbock 56, Childress 34, Wichita Falls 67, El Paso 57, Midland 51, Abilene 63, Fort Worth 68, Dallas 68, Austin 69, Laredo 67, San Antonio 68, Victoria 72, and Brownsville 71.

Winds which buffeted the western and northern sections yesterday lost their strength after midnight. Wichita Falls was still recording 20 mile per hour winds just before dawn, and Lubbock was feeling 22 mile per hour gusts. The wind was coming from the south, however, and was not stirring up much dust, the Weather Bureau said.

## SISTER-IN-LAW OF SLAIN MAN TAKES STAND THIS MORNING

Testimony was started this morning at 9 o'clock in a packed 91st District Courtroom in the trial of Mrs. Elva Moad, 38, Cisco, for the murder of her estranged husband, Emory E. Moad at Cisco last September 4.

The case opened Tuesday morning with a special venire of 100 men summoned. The day was spent in the examination of prospective jurors with the following panel being selected at 5:20 P. M.: Gaston W. Dixon, Ranger Auto parts man; S. A. Hightower, Ranger employe of Texas Electric Service Co.; James Calvert, Ranger used car salesman.

Roy M. Tucker, Cisco farmer; George Bennett, Eastland farmer; Z. O. Mehaffey, Gorman gasoline dealer; Doss Alexander, Pioneer farmer; Sam S. Powers, Gorman rancher; J. N. Graham, manager of the J. C. Penney Store at Ranger.

Carl Johnson, Eastland mercantile dealer; C. E. Watson, Gorman Lone Star Gas employe; and W. M. Medford, Carbon farmer and service station operator.

Allan Dabney and Earl Conner, Jr., both of Eastland, are the defense attorneys.

Frank Sparks, Eastland City Attorney, is special prosecutor, with District Attorney Elizo Been assisting.

Judge Floyd Jones of Breckenridge is presiding.

First witness for the State this morning was Mrs. Irene Moad of Cisco, sister-in-law of the deceased Emory E. Moad. Mrs. Irene Moad was on the stand until 10:30 when court was recessed for a brief period.

Mrs. Irene Moad, under questioning by Special Prosecutor Sparks, stated that she and her husband, Roy Moad, brother of the slain man, operate the Spot Cafe in Cisco. She said that Emory E. Moad came to the cafe at 12:30 A. M. on Sept. 4. The night was spent by Mrs. Irene Moad, Roy Moad, a daughter, and an employe of the Spot Cafe, and Emory E. Moad in "roaming the streets of Cisco looking for Mrs. Elva Moad." The witness testified they first saw the defendant at the intersection of Avenue F and Ninth Streets occupying a car driven by Joe Lee Moore of Cisco. She further testified that Moad drove his car at the side of the house where she and Roy Moad reside. She stated he was suffering from two wounds—one in the back below the left shoulder and the other in an arm. "My husband and I took him to the Graham Sanitarium. Enroute he said 'Irene, I'm dying. She shot me three or four times. The witness said she stayed at the hospital, except for a few minutes, until Emory E. Moad's death at 11 A. M. Tuesday.

Prosecutor Sparks asked the witness if she had ever heard the defendant say anything about killing Emory E. Moad. The witness replied "Yes" but added she couldn't recall right now when and where.

The cross-examination of the witness by Defense Attorney Conner revealed at one time during the night in question, Emory E. Moad had stepped on the porch of the residence of the couple, and called out "she had been caught and that he had witnesses to prove it." The witness further testified that Emory E. Moad said "when I find Joe Lee Moore I'm going to beat the hell out of him."

Asked if she had made reference to a beating given the defendant several days before and that if wasn't half what he was going to give her, the witness said "no."

All of the approximate 200 seats were taken and spectators were standing three deep in the aisles with all entrances being jammed.

Awaited in the case, is the call of Rev. James W. McClain, rector of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church here and originator of the Dr. I. Q. program, who has been subpoenaed as a state witness. Rev. McClain has stated he is ready to go to jail, if need be, rather than reveal the nature of a confidential conversation with the defendant following the shooting.
