# Mrs. Moad Says Troubles Caused By Sex

## TELLS OF FREQUENT BEATINGS SAYS HUSBAND WAS OVERSEXED

Sobbing at frequent intervals, Mrs. Elva Moad, 37 of Cisco, took the stand this morning in her own defense on a charge of murdering her estranged husband, Emory Moad on September 4, 1949, and testified three hours before a packed 91st District Courtroom regarding fights with the slain man during their marital life, which were caused by "him being oversexed."

When court was adjourned at 12 noon by Judge Floyd Jones of Breckenridge, who is presiding, Mrs. Moad was still being examined by Defense Counsel Earl Conner, Jr., and Allen Dabney, both of Eastland.

Special Prosecutor Frank Sparks and his assistant, District Attorney Elzo Been, frequently interrupted the defendant's testimony asking the court to "have her get to the point of the difficulties without relating irrelevant matter."

## Hearings On Prices Requested

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (UP)—The United Auto Workers suggested today that Congress hold public hearings on industry price increases before they go into effect—not after.

In testimony prepared for delivery to a joint congressional economic committee, Donald Montgomery, the UAW's Washington representative, emphasized that he is not suggesting that the government regulate industry prices through some administrative agency.

"We are thinking," he said, "only of the value of having a public preview of the facts with respect to any significant price determination by a corporation which sets prices for an industry to follow."

## Russians Thumb Nose At Protest

BERLIN, Jan. 27 (UP)—Russian officials ignored a western protest against their baby blockade of Berlin today. They went right on holding up truck traffic to and from the city.

German police at Helmsdorf said 300 trucks were lined up on both sides of the Soviet checkpoint at Marienborn, 200 waiting to go to Berlin and 100 waiting to enter western Germany.

Fur-capped Russian border guards were passing from two to six vehicles an hour compared to a normal rate of 15 to 20 an hour.

Charles A. Dix, Berlin's American transport chief, said the average Berlin bound truck was forced to wait from 30 to 40 hours for clearance. West-bound trucks waited an average of 12 hours, he said.

## \$100,000 Jewelry Robbery Doesn't Worry Billy Rose

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (UP)—Half-pint showman Billy Rose didn't mind today that bandits stole \$100,000 in jewels and furs from his home.

But he was just as glad that his wife, former olympic swimming star Eleanor Holm, was out on the town with him wearing \$250,000 worth of diamonds during the robbery.

"I'm sure happy my baby wore her war paint," Rose said. "But I don't care about the jewels as long as no one was hurt."

Although the robbery took place at 10:30 o'clock last night, it wasn't until the 50-year-old Rose and his beautiful wife arrived home at 12:20 A. M. CST today that he learned of it.

## Fowl Cholera Threatens Ducks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (UP)—Fowl cholera has broken out among 600,000 wild ducks wintering in the Texas Panhandle, Secretary of Interior Oscar L. Chapman said today.

Chapman said 250 dead birds have been picked up in the Bull Lake area since the outbreak was reported on Jan. 15, and more deaths are threatened.

A similar outbreak two years ago killed more than 36,000 ducks in Northwest Texas.

## BARUCH WANTS U. S. TO MAKE HYDROGEN BOMB

By JOHN L. STEELE United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (UP)—Bernard Baruch said today that this country ought to make the hydrogen bomb if it can.

The elder statesman and author of the world atomic control plan ejected in the United Nations by Russia made his views known to the United Press as atomic officials explored the subject in a secret hearing with key congressmen at the capital.

"If you knew of any instrumentality to defend your life, would you try to get it?" Baruch asked. "The question answers itself."

Baruch did not discuss this aspect of the H-bomb issue. He left no doubt, however, that he considered the H-bomb a valuable weapon which this country must have if it can be made.

Meanwhile, key congressmen sought the low-down on the H-bomb from the men who may be ordered to build it.

## Would-Be Slayer Search Pushed

BELTON, Tex., Jan. 27 (UP)—Every available officer was engaged today in a search for an unidentified gunman who fired two shots Monday night at District Attorney James K. Everetts, who was engaged in executing Sam Smithwick for the murder of Alice Newman W. H. (Bill) Mason. Smithwick was found guilty and assessed a life sentence.

The search for the would-be assassin was soft-pedaled until the Smithwick trial ended Wednesday night. State's Attorneys had feared a mistrial might be declared if news of the shooting reached jurors.

## New Drug Being Released For Use

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (UP)—The soil of the earth has given man another drug to combat disease, the first test in human patients put the new germ killer in the big league class.

The drug is known as terramycin in a name given by scientists of the Charles Pfizer and Company, Brooklyn, who discovered the substance after testing more than 10,000 soil samples. The Pfizer research team officially announced the development in Science Magazine, official publication of the American Association for the advancement of science.

Terramycin, it was learned, already has been tried on about 40 patients at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center and is now being distributed to other hospitals throughout the country. In the first trials, it has shown to be effective against pneumonia, including the so-called virus pneumonia, certain blood infections, a strep throat, some skin eruptions, undulant fever, whooping cough and urinary tract infections.

## MOST OF NATION TO GET SAMPLE OF WINTER TODAY

CHICAGO, Jan. 27 (UP)—A cold wave was expected to sweep over most of the nation today, routing all the pretty girls posing as sun-bathers during the phenomenal winter heat spell of recent days.

The cold, which pushed temperatures to 30 below at Pembina, N. D., early today, was expected to hit all of the Atlantic Coast except the extreme eastern Carolinas by tonight.

Weather forecasters said could moderate as it crept over the Appalachian Mountains about dawn, but that it was still severe enough to shrivel the plants and bushes that budded and bloomed in the false spring Easterners enjoyed this week.

The cold wave extended into Louisiana and Texas and was expected to move all the way to the gulf coast.

Those sections that were hit by the cold earlier this week enjoyed slightly warmer weather today. But even in towns such as Chadron, Neb., and Livingston,

## Lineman Injured In Fall Wednesday

Serious injuries were sustained by Joe Henry, 31, of Eastland, a Texas Electric Service employe, Wednesday when he fell from a pole on a company high line a few miles west of Cisco.

He was rushed to Graham Hospital in Cisco in a Thomas ambulance, where he received emergency treatment for a fractured right ankle and severe back injuries.

Upon the advice of Cisco physicians Henry was taken to Fort Worth for examination and treatment.

Mont., where the mercury climbed 20 to 30 degrees, the temperature was still below freezing.

Meanwhile, new floods threatened in the Illinois-Indiana areas bordering on the Wabash and White Rivers. In some sections, the rivers were almost as high as they were during the serious floods of earlier in the month.

The Pacific Northwest was threatened by another severe storm from the ocean last night but the blow lost its punch and merely sifted rain and light snow along the Washington coast line.

The cold wave's swift movement caused phenomenal temperature drops as it "broke" in heat wave.

At St. Louis, temperatures were 50 degrees lower today than Wednesday. At Tulsa, it was 53 degrees colder.

The line between summer and winter was sharp in some cases. At Vichy, Mo., it was 23 degrees above zero at one time while 50 miles away at Mauldin, Mo., it was a balmy 63.

Mrs. Moad, clad in a gray coat and hat to match with a large green feather, lost the calm composure which she had maintained since the trial opened Tuesday morning, soon after taking the stand. Starting in February, 1931, when she was married to the slain man at the age of 18, Mrs. Moad had detailed their marital difficulties up to 1947, when court was adjourned.

She told of the birth of two daughters and details concerning two miscarriages, which she attributed to beatings administered by Moad. The defendant said the difficulties started five days after they were married, when "he started slapping, beating and choking me one night while we were in bed together."

At one point, many of the women in the courtroom were in tears, when defendant told how Moad wouldn't permit her to order a layette prior to the birth of the second child and administered another beating.

Mrs. Moad's two daughters appeared on the witness stand Thursday afternoon and described a series of sordid family disputes, many of which they claimed ended with the father "beating" Mrs. Moad.

The two daughters' testimony consumed more than two hours Thursday afternoon. When the second daughter left the stand at 5:05, Judge Floyd Jones recessed the court until Friday morning at 9 a. m.

## Lineman Injured In Fall Wednesday

Neota Moad, 14-year old daughter of Mrs. Moad and the slain man, was the first of the two Moad children called to the stand Thursday afternoon.

The attractive young high school freshman came into court smiling, turned to smile at her mother, but broke into tears seconds after she appeared in the witness box.

She testified that her mother and father had difficulties many times. She told the court that her father often called her mother "bad words."

Neota told of an occasion at 2:30 one morning when her father brought his "girl friend" to their home. She said she was awakened by the noise in the living room and went in to find her father and a woman named "Bee."

"He asked me to come over and sit down by him and Bee," Neota said.

She told the court her father a former chef, asked Mrs. Elva Moad for a divorce, saying he wanted to live with Bee Hartwell of Hobbs, N. M.

On cross-examination, Special Prosecutor Frank Sparks presented a picture of Neota, taken in 1948. He entered it as state's evidence and passed it to the jury with instructions to read what was written on both sides.

"On the front was written, 'To Daddy, I love you, Neota.'"

"On the back was written, 'To a Sweet Daddy from Neota.'"

Neota told Sparks it was her hand writing, and that she had given it to her father.

Elva Moad 18 year old Cisco daughter of the slain man and the defendant, was called to the stand. She told a very similar story to that told by her younger sister.

During the questioning of the two girls, Sparks repeatedly objected to Judge Jones that Defense Attorney Conner was asking the witness "leading questions putting words in their mouths."

The judge sustained at least 10

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### INGRID TO SEEK QUICK DIVORCE IN MEXICO

 HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 27. (UP)—Ingrid Bergman will file suit for a Mexican divorce, probably today, to sweep away the last obstacle to her remarriage to director Roberto Rossellini.

The beautiful star was in such a haste to get out of her marriage that she didn't stop for an agreement on her property or custody of her daughter. She said she settled that later.

Her attorneys said the suit was filed immediately, possibly when the courts opened today, if it hadn't been filed already.

Neither Miss Bergman nor her husband, Dr. Peter Lindstrom, will have to appear for the decree, and as far as Mexican courts are concerned she can tie the knot with Rossellini as soon as the judge bangs his gavel.

The long-awaited divorce climaxed nearly six months of international wrangling over terms of the decree. Finally, the star told attorney Gregson Bautzer to get the divorce now and negotiate later.

"No agreement was reached on the custody of Miss Bergman's child," Bautzer said. "I was authorized to file the divorce independent of any property settlement or custody agreement. The negotiations are continuing."

Lindstrom said his wife's move was a "complete surprise."

"He was never approached regarding a Mexican divorce and knew nothing about it," his personal representative, John Vernon, said.

He added that it wasn't Lindstrom who was holding up the negotiations.

The Mexican divorce was being handled by attorney William A. Cocks of El Paso, Tex., right across the border from Juarez, Mex. Cocks has won divorces for movie queens Laraine Day and Merle Oberon and 3,000 other U. S. citizens.

Cocks refused to say when or where the divorce petition would be filed, but it was believed it was not ready in time for yesterday's 3:30 P. M. (CST) court closing. Divorce actions in Chihuahua state can be filed either in Juarez, Chihuahua City or Casas Grandes, but all must be taken to Chihuahua City for court action.

U. S. citizens are not required to appear for Mexican divorces, but they usually do if they want them to be recognized in the U. S. This might not bother Miss Bergman, who says she won't return to Hollywood.

The beautiful 32-year-old actress gave up her career after she and Rossellini, 43 and balding, fell deeply in love while making the movie "Stromboli" on a barren island off the coast of Italy.

She offered to give up their community property to Lindstrom if he would give her a divorce and last week, according to Rossellini's lawyers, offered to give up their 11-year-old daughter, Pia, too. That report was denied by Bautzer.

Rossellini recently got an Italian court to approve his Austrian divorce from his first wife, Marcella. She says she considers Miss Bergman and ideal spous for him.

of the objections and each time warned Conner about his questioning.

Conner replied that if he was leading them it was unintentional.

Mrs. Minnie Biggs, Elk City, Okla., a sister of Mrs. Elva Moad, told of a scene of which she said took place when she visited the couple at Cisco in 1947.

"He knocked Elva down," Mrs. Biggs said, "stomped her, beat her and used profane language. Elva begged him to stop, but the attack which started about four in the afternoon continued until about midnight."

"The next morning the fighting started again. I got to the bathroom door in time to see Emory throw her into the bath tub and out like a rubber ball," Mrs. Biggs continued.

Mrs. Lou Mendenhall, Cisco, told of being invited into Mrs. Moad's home one afternoon for coffee and cake.

"Mr. Moad came in while I was there," Mrs. Mendenhall said. "Without saying a word, he tore a pack of cigarettes in two and threw them over Mrs. Moad and the living room. He then knocked the cup of coffee out of her hand and began to beat her."

R. C. Farmer, former Cisco policeman, told of going to the Moad home to investigate a disturbance. He told of vile language he said Moad used in the presence of Mrs. Moad and their children.

Norman Dale Lowery, Peggy Swartz, and Benny Everett, friends of Elva Moad, said they were at the Moad home on Aug. 31 prior to the slaying on Sept. 4, when Emory came there and beat his

wife.

They described a disturbance in the driveway in which they found Emory beating and kicking Mrs. Moad. The scuffle continued on into the back yard where he repeatedly struck her about the face and the body, the witnesses said.

They quoted Mrs. Moad as saying: "Emory, you're killing me." They said Emory replied, "That's what I intend to do."

Justice of the Peace W. E. Brown of Cisco denied from the stand today that he told Mrs. Moad after the shooting that she should have shot her husband earlier. Cisco Police Chief M. L. Perdue testified Wednesday that Brown said words to that effect.

Brown testified Thursday that after hearing Mrs. Moad's story of what happened he told her: "If those facts are true, I think you were justified in shooting him."

The state rested its case Thursday morning at 9:40.

After that time, the defense counsel paraded 11 witnesses before the jury by 5 o'clock Thurs-

day afternoon, ten of which testified that Emory Moad beat his wife in their presence.

The first witness on the stand was Joe Lea Moore, Cisco druggist. State witnesses repeatedly testified they saw Mrs. Moad in the car with Moore on the night of Sept. 3, preceding the shooting at noon of Sunday, Sept. 4.

Moore said he knew Mrs. Moad by sight, but flatly denied that she was in the car with him on the night of Sept. 3. He said he had no knowledge of the chase which the state witness described.

Moore said he knew Mrs. Moad only as a customer.

## MYSTERY MAN RETURNS PART OF AGA'S JEWELS

PARIS, Jan. 27 (UP)—Some \$350,000 worth of the \$710,000 in jewels stolen from the Aga Khan on the Riviera last August were returned to Marseille police surreptitiously last night, French national police announced today.

A mystery man, whom police said probably was one of the gang left a package containing the jewels on the sidewalk in front of a police station at about 8 P. M. He then called the police and said: "You'll find the jewels outside the station house."

Two inspectors rushed out and recovered the package. French national police in Paris said experts examined the gems and said there was "no doubt" they were part of the loot taken from the Aga Khan. The package contained clusters of gems torn from their gold and platinum settings as well as bracelets, necklaces and clips which were intact. The gems which had been pried out of their settings were easily recognized, police said.

The mysterious package contained a note of instructions on the outside saying it was to be opened only in the presence of Marcelle Facotte, Marseille examining magistrate in charge of investigation of the man robbery. Facotte was called in and the package was opened.

A spokesman for the national police, who announced that five of the holdup gang were arrested last week, said he believed police had frightened the members of the gang still at large who had the jewels.

He said they apparently had decided to take no chance of being caught with the jewelry in their possession.

The jewelry was insured by Lloyd's of London for \$700,000 but the Aga Khan, who presented

it to his wife, estimated its real value at \$710,000.

A spokesman for Lloyd's in Paris said the entire amount of the insurance had been paid to the Aga Khan and thus technically the jewelry now belongs to the insurance company.

He indicated, however, that the insurance company probably would agree to arrangements for returning it.

The Aga Khan and his wife, the Begum, are now in India on a visit.

The first break in the robbery of the fabulous Aga and his beautiful French wife was announced last Friday. The French police said then they had captured five members of the gang that plotted and carried out the holdup.

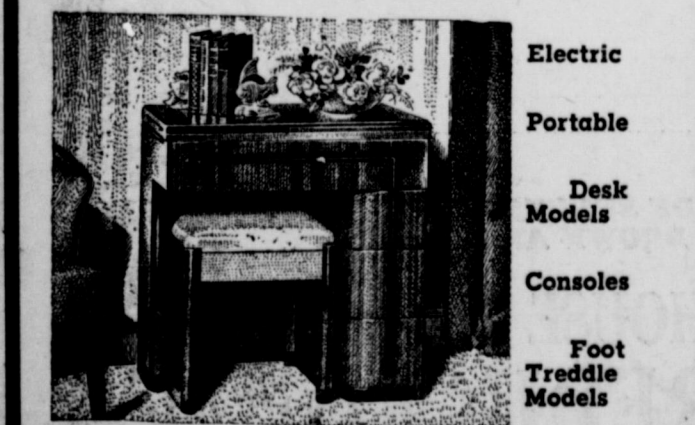

"Tchaikovsky's Sixth Symphony does not murder musicians," he told the reporters.
