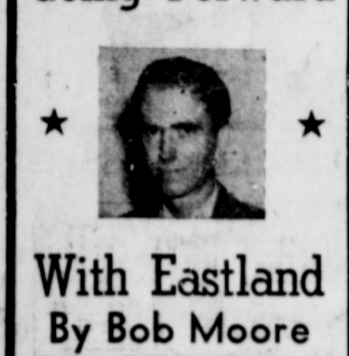

Man Buried Alive In Cave-In Near Whitney Dam

WHITNEY, Tex., Feb. 15 (UP)—The body of August Paul Brocard, 54, buried alive in an abutment hole cave-in near Whitney Dam yesterday, was en route to St. Louis, Mo., for burial today.

Brocard, an assistant construction foreman, was killed when he entered the abutment excavation to make an inspection and the walls collapsed, covering him with tons of dirt.

His body was removed two and one-half hours after the cave-in. Brocard had been working on a railroad bridge being built to carry Missouri - Kansas - Texas trains across the Brazos River below the Whitney Dam site.

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 14 (UP)—The Texas Highway Department today went into the second day of a two-day letting, receiving low bids totaling \$1,847,560 on 19 projects in the opening day. Low bids included:

NEGOTIATIONS START AS NATION'S COAL SUPPLY CURTAILS INDUSTRY

John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers opened new contract talks with the nation's soft coal operators in Washington today against a backdrop of snowballing industrial layoffs.

A coal shortage caused by the UMW walkout has forced many industries in most sections of the country to reduce production.

International Harvester Co., warned its 70,000 employees in seven states that widespread layoffs could be expected "at any time" because of low fuel supplies.

On another front, the Railway Mediation Board reported that it failed to settle a contract dispute between the major railroads and 250,000 conductors and trainmen. The two brotherhoods said they would announce a strike date Friday but the National Railway Labor Act probably will delay a walkout for several months while a presidential emergency fact-finding board studies the problem.

The soft coal operators met with UMW officials today and federal mediation director Cyrus S. Ching said he probably would sit in on the sessions. He said David L. Cole, chairman of President Truman's fact-finding board, also would listen to the wage talks.

About 400,000 UMW members were out of the pits despite a federal injunction barring their strike. Mine spokesmen said any back-to-work movement would hinge on the outcome of the coal talks in Washington.

Gov. John Battle of Virginia, meanwhile, contemplated seizing the idle mines in his state and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York signed an emergency bill empowering him to ration coal and limit its uses for 90 days.

More than 40,000 industrial and railroad workers were idled by the coal shortage and railroad passenger train operations have been slashed 25 to 50 per cent.

CIO president Philip Murray threw the support of his powerful organization behind the striking coal miners as other labor organizations lined up in back of the UMW in its fight against a Taft-Hartley injunction.

Meanwhile, the CIO United Auto Workers strike against Chrysler Corporation remained static. Daily contract talks continued although there was no indication that they were any nearer agreement than when the 125,000 workers walked out. Settlement has been stymied by a pension issue.

"Cain And Abel" Slayer Testifies In Own Behalf

CANYON, Tex., Feb. 15 (UP)—Billy Max Mann, 25, testified in his own behalf yesterday in the "Cain and Abel" rifle slaying of his older brother, Donald, last Nov. 17 at the Amarillo home of their parents.

Billy said no one could get along with Donald without an argument. "I did everything to please him," he testified.

The defense seeks to establish that Billy shot his brother in self-defense.

The case is being tried in the 47th District Court of Judge Henry S. Bishop.

Professor Says Business Will Be Good Long As Truman In Power

Business in the United States will be good as long as Harry S. Truman is in office as President, Dr. Carl Ashburn, professor of economics at McMurry College of Abilene, declared in an address to the Tuesday noon luncheon of the Eastland Lions Club.

The speaker declared that as far as he could see Truman would be president indefinitely and, at least, as long as the Democrats are in power. Mr. Truman likes his job, Mrs. Truman likes to live in the White House. Mr. Barkley likes his job as Vice-president and his new wife especially likes it in Washington.

The Truman administration is determined to stay in power and the only way they can be by heavy deficit financing.

Dr. Ashburn in his address on "Federal Government Deficit Financing", pointed out that the national debt at present is 257 billion dollars and will reach 265 billion dollars by the end of the current fiscal year. He said that heavy government expenditures were going to farmers and ranchers in the form of subsidies, the military, civil service employees, and to foreign governments.

"President Truman is a functioning politician. He realizes the farmers put him in office, but it's a peculiar thing that Southern price supports are not as good as in the middle-western states."

Dr. Ashburn said the present government budget of 45 billion dollars could be cut down to 25 billion dollars, but it might throw the country into a serious business recession. He advocated an orderly retreat from heavy government deficit financing.

In a question and answer series with various Lions, Dr. Ashburn said the United States was heading down the road to a socialistic form of government. He expressed the belief, however, that American citizens would not permit such an occurrence.

Theo Lamb was program chairman for the day and presented the speaker. Lamb was a student of Dr. Ashburn, when the latter was a professor at Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

President Wes Harris presided for the business session. It was announced that next Tuesday's meeting will be dispensed with. Thornton Slayer Enters Potter County Jail

AMARILLO, Tex., Feb. 15 (UP)—Shackled in chains, Ewald Johnson, confessed slayer of W. A. Thornton, famed oil-field trouble-shooter, entered the Potter County Jail last night as a curious crowd looked on.

Johnson was arrested last Thursday in Munising, Mich., at the home of a relative less than 24 hours after his wife, Diana, had named him as the killer.

Mrs. Johnson surrendered voluntarily in Washington, D.C., last Wednesday and her story, and information furnished by Amarillo police to Michigan authorities, led to her husband's arrest. She is also charged in the crime and is being brought here for trial.

Sheriff Paul Gaither returned Johnson. The accused man, who will face Grand Jury action Friday was in leg arms, handcuffs and a waistchain.

The only complaint Johnson registered was that accommodations in the Burlington, La., Jail were poor, and Sheriff Gaither were grounded in Burlington because of poor flying weather. The Sheriff had chartered a plane for the trip.

Texas Ranger Frank Probst, his wife, who is acting as matron and Deputy Sheriff Woody Riner are returning Mrs. Johnson.

Thornton was found beaten and shot to death in an Amarillo tourist court last June 22. He had been robbed of approximately \$3,000 and his car stolen.

In New Mexico, Thornton had picked up two hitch-hikers and brought them to Amarillo. At the tourist court, a couple registered as Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Johnson. They had disappeared before Thornton's body was discovered.

'Devil' Under Indictment Here In 1923

The State of Texas Vs. "One Devil."
That was the styling of an Eastland County Grand Jury indictment returned in March, 1923 on a Mexican for alleged burglary of a railroad car.

District Clerk Roy Lane noticed the unusual styling recently while looking up an old court order in the Criminal record book.

T. G. Scott was foreman of the Grand Jury and the indictment advises the identity of the man charged is unknown, and he is known as described as Devil.

The indictment against "One Devil" was dismissed for lack of evidence in 1926 by District Judge Elzo Bean of the 88th Court, who is now District Attorney W. J. Barnes was County Attorney at that time.

District Clerk Lane says "we handle all types of cases here including those against the Devil."

Holiday Set For Easter In Schools

The Easter holiday for this year was set for one day, Friday, March 10, by the Eastland School Board of Trustees in a regular monthly meeting Monday night, the Business office stated.

The one day holiday was set in order to adhere closely to the schedule for school operation as outlined by the new Gilmer-Aikin law.

M. D. Fox, vocational agriculture instructor in the Eastland Schools, has been offered a pickup for local Future Farmers of America Chapter by a local automobile dealer. The acceptance of this offer was approved by the board. Full information regarding this will be forthcoming in the near future, the Business Office promised.

Plans were made and arrangements have begun to institute a safety driving program in the schools next year. Similar plans are in operation at nearby Ranger and May. Highway patrolman Oscar Avera said these plans have aided tremendously in reducing numbers of accidents involving young people.

Eastlandite With Jet Group

Whitehorse, Y. T., Can.—Corporal James W. Watson Jr. son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Watson of 1720 Commerce St. Eastland, Texas is currently serving with the 66th Jet Fighter Squadron on Exercise Sweetbriar, a controlled training exercise being conducted jointly by US and Canadian Forces under Arctic conditions in the Yukon Territory and Alaska, during January and February.

The sleek jets, part of the Alaskan Air Command, based at Elmendorf AFB, Anchorage, are supplying close tactical air support to Allied ground forces engaged in maneuver with "Invading" Aggressor hordes who have made a theoretical airborne assault on Alaska.

US Army and Air Force units in Alaska are providing the Aggressor forces which launched the mythical invasion, bringing Exercise Sweetbriar into being as a speedy counter-action.

First peacetime joint Canada - United States maneuver to be held in the Arctic, Exercise Sweetbriar climaxes a series of test task force exercises by both countries since World War II.

Goes To Trial Second Time For Slaying

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 15 (UP)—Former Dallas Police Chief R. L. (Bob) Jones today went to trial for the second time for the Jan. 7, 1948 slaying of George Vadere, his son-in-law.

Jones' first trial ended last March when jurors failed to agree on a verdict.

Only one juror was selected yesterday, and a special venire of 500 men was ordered to appear in criminal district court today.

Criminal district Judge Robert Hall gave the word for summing prospective jurors after overruling a defense motion for continuance.

NASH CASE TO BE GIVEN TO GRAND JURY MONDAY

District Attorney Elzo Been stated today that the case of the confession of Mrs. Margaret Wilma Nash to the slaying of Jimmie Daniels, Ranger policeman, in 1924, is at a standstill until more corroborating evidence can be found.

He said, however, that he will present the case to the 91st Grand jury which reconvenes Monday. Any action that may be taken will be on their recommendation and that of Judge George Davenport of the 91st District court.

Been stated this morning that he had requested the chief of police at Los Angeles to try to get Mrs. Nash to name others implicated in the slaying but that she steadfastly refuses to name the other five persons in the party at the time of the slaying. Been was informed of her refusal in a telegram from the police chief in Los Angeles this morning. He stated

in the telegram that an air mail letter follows.

A check of city directories of Ranger for the years 1925, 1926 and 1927, revealed Tuesday afternoon that a Mrs. Ella Nash and two daughters, Elsie and Flossie had resided in Ranger during those years. Mrs. Ella Nash has been named as the mother of the woman in California and is reportedly living in Fort Worth at the present.

Elsie Nash was listed in one directory as a waitress. It is presumed that Margaret Wilma Nash was not named in the directory as she was in the reformatory in Gatesville, according to her own statement.

Chief W. G. Pounds of Ranger stated this morning that he has turned the case over to District Attorney Been and that any action taken on the case will be up to him.

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OIL MEN PROTEST PLAN TO CUT OIL DEPLETION ALLOWANCES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (UP)—A day-long parade of witnesses appeared before the House Ways and Means Committee yesterday to protest President Truman's proposal to reduce oil depletion allowances.

Mr. Truman has asked that the depletion allowances be cut from the present 27-12 per cent to 15 per cent, a proposal which has met vociferous opposition from oil industry spokesmen.

The Treasury Department also contends that the reduction will result in additional tax revenue, but R. B. Anderson, chairman of the Texas Board of Education, strongly disagreed.

Pointing out that much of Texas school income is derived from oil taxes, Anderson said that the proposed depletion allowances would eliminate many small oil operators. "If it takes them out of business, it takes them also from the tax rolls," Anderson stated.

Together with other southwestern spokesmen, Anderson said a continued high depletion allowance is needed to foster development of new oil reserves vital to national defense.

Gov. Roy J. Turner of Oklahoma submitted a statement hand-

ed the committee by Rep. A. S. Mike Monroney, D., Okla., Turner said a reduction of oil industry taxes would "seriously affect the entire state financial structure."

Monroney said the drilling of oil wells in Oklahoma has come to a standstill "to see whether Congress takes this ill-advised step or not."

Other witnesses opposing the cut included Grant E. Judge, Houston, Texas, member of an accounting firm; F. L. Hurley and B. B. Orr, both of Longview, Tex., and Clinton Beard, manager of Northeast Oklahoma Oil Producers, Inc.

An older sister, Verbia Lee, 15, said her two small brothers were playing with matches and accidentally set fire to a window shade.

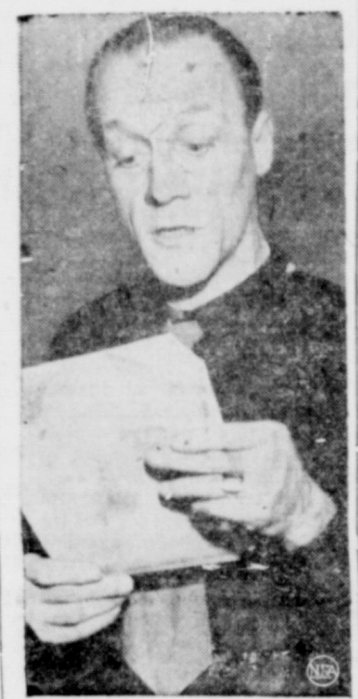
The parents were away from home at the time.

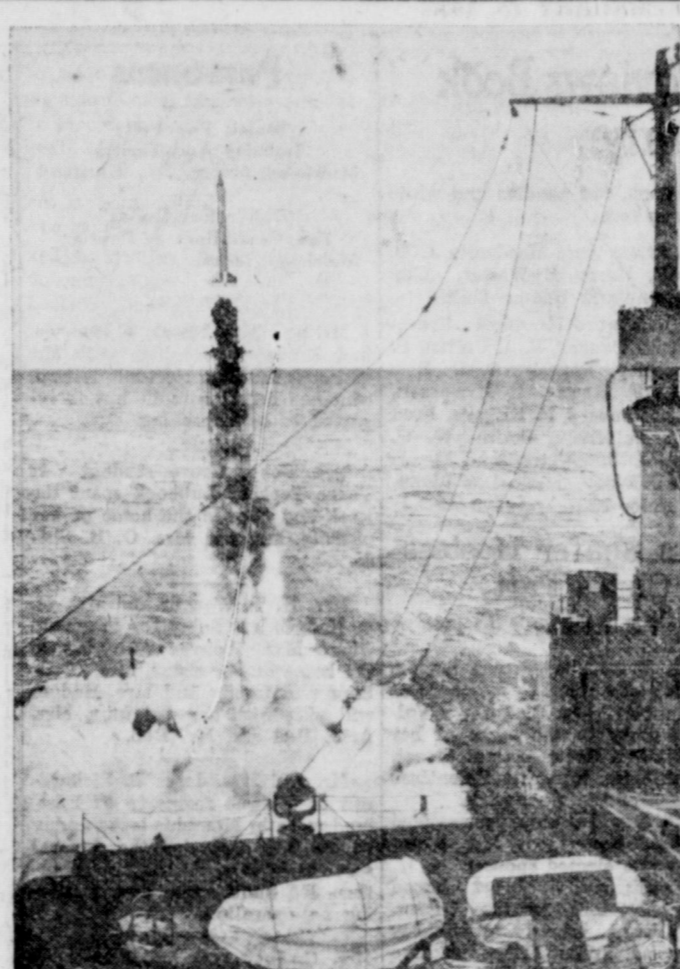

COMMUNIST CHINA LINES UP AS RED SATELITE

HONG KONG, Feb. 15 (UP)—Communist China has become just another Russian satellite by the 30-year treaty of alliance announced today in Moscow, observers believed.

Moscow announced early today that the treaty had been signed after two months of direct negotiations between Chinese Communist leader Mao Tse-Tung and Soviet Premier Josef Stalin.

The pact was divided into three parts:
1. A 30-year treaty of alliance pledging each country to render full military aid to the other should either country find itself at war with Japan "or any other state which directly or indirectly would unite with Japan in acts of aggression." The phrase "any other state" obviously referred to the United States and Britain, which with Nationalist China and Russia are the only occupying powers in Japan.

2. Agreement by Russia to return the Naval base of Port Arthur and the jointly-controlled Manchurian railroad to Communist China by 1952 or sooner if a peace treaty is concluded with Japan earlier.

3. A commercial agreement under which Russia would loan China \$300,000,000 over a five-year period, at one per cent interest, for the purchase of railway and industrial equipment.

Observers said that China definitely came out second best in the treaty despite the fact Mao spent two months in Moscow, apparently resisting Soviet demands.

These sources said that by joining in a military pact with Russia the Chinese Communists surrendered their highly important right to act independently in foreign policy.

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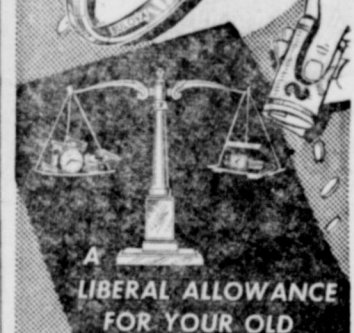

Smuggler Held On Opium Charge

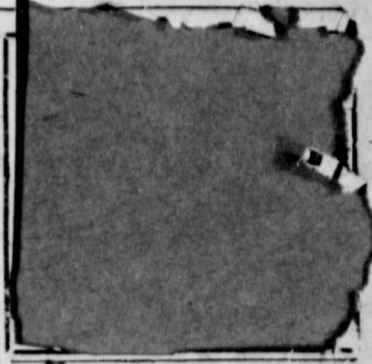
EDINBURG, Tex., Feb. 15 (UP)—A 29-year old Monterey, Mexico smuggler was held today on a charge of bringing \$100,000 worth of "smoking opium" into the United States.

Felix Estrella, described by authorities as a smuggler with an international reputation, was arrested at Brownsville, Tex., yesterday as he walked off the International Bridge from Matamoros.

U. S. Customs agents said they opened his valise and found the largest haul of opium ever seen along the Texas-Mexican border.

"It's the first smoking opium I've ever heard of being along the border," Agent Joe F. Ray said. Ray reported the opium was in liquid form and packaged in 28 six-ounce tins. He said the retail value of the narcotics seized amounted to at least \$100,000.

U. S. Commissioner J. C. Hall charged Estrella with unlawfully



bringing opium into the United States and with unlawful possession of a narcotic. His bond was set at \$15,000.

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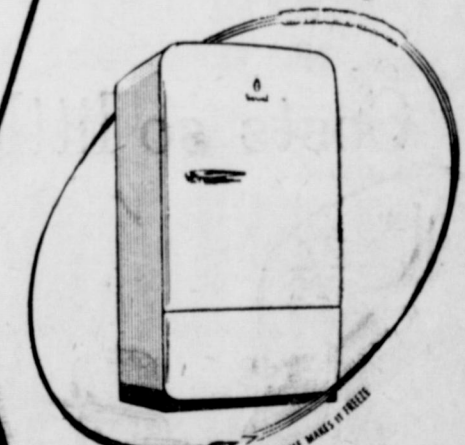
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
