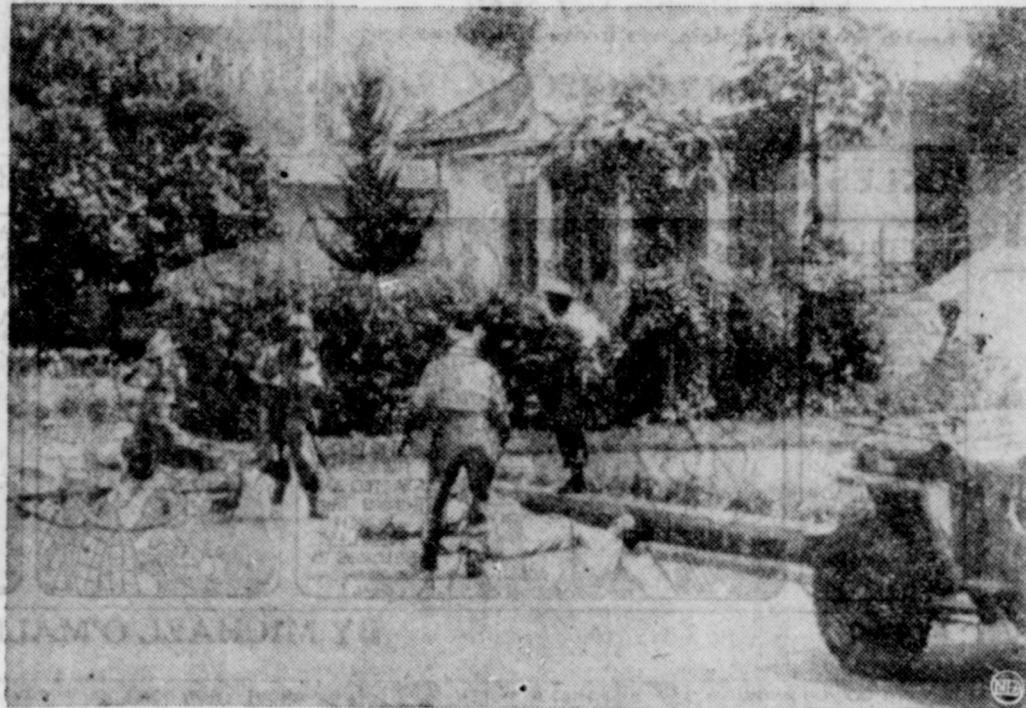

## Says Stromboli Is Outrageous

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (UP)—Rep. Ed. Gossett, D., Wichita Falls, Tex., says Ingrid Bergman's new picture, "Stromboli," is an "outrageous film" and should be banned from American theatres.

Gossett said in a House speech yesterday that it was ironic that on a day when the House was considering a bill to incorporate the Girl Scouts it should be comforted with newspaper advertisements of the new Bergman picture.

"A nation that glorifies prostitution and adultery . . . should take notice of the direction in which it is going," Gossett said. There was applause from both sides of the aisle.

## Expect Further Oil Cutback

AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 16 (UP)—Two separate reports today indicated a further cutback in Texas' oil production allowable following a state-wide oil proration hearing at San Antonio tomorrow.

The U. S. Bureau of Mines informed Railroad Commission chairman William J. Murray, Jr., that its estimate of market demand for Texas crude oil in March was 2,100,000.

The estimate was 70,000 barrels below the forecast for February. A purchasers' nominations report for next month dropped to 2,269,871 barrels a day, or 14,329 under the figure for February. The average calendar daily allowable as of Feb. 11 was 2,025,499 barrels.

## TRUMAN SAYS U. S. READY TO TALK PEACE ANY TIME

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (UP)—President Truman told a news conference today that he will grant exclusive interviews whenever he pleases.

The President conceded that there was a White House tradition against such interviews, but he said he will do as he pleases about breaking it.

Reporters tried to get from the President some of the same information he imparted in an exclusive interview with Arthur Krock published yesterday in the New York Times. Reporters did not mention the Krock interview until the President brought it up.

Mr. Truman said sharply that he thought the newsmen were acting disgruntled and did not like their attitude. So cool off, he said to his news conference.

He went on to say that he is his own free agent and that he will see who he pleases and say what he pleases.

He said he would not be censored by the reporters at his conference or by anyone else and would

## Truman To Draw Party Battle Lines Tonight

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (UP)—President Truman may draw the battle lines for the 1950 congressional election campaign tonight when he addresses the Democratic party's \$500,000 "I-1" raising dinner.

Feature attraction and main speaker before the huge Jefferson-Jackson dinner at Washington's National Guard Armory, Mr. Truman is expected to give more than 5,300 Democrats who paid \$100-a-plate for their steak dinner a hint about his own interest in the coming political campaign and election.

He may say, some Democratic sources suggested, that he will wage a vigorous campaign to help the Democratic Party maintain or increase their present majority in the House and Senate.

Mr. Truman speaks at 9:30 P. M., CST., to wind up a four-hour program that the Democratic National committee said will include plenty of food, entertainment and speeches.

Besides Mr. Truman, speakers include Vice President Alben W. Barkley, House Speaker Sam Rayburn of Texas and Georgia Nease Clark, Treasurer of the United States.

LONDON, Feb. 16 (UP)—Winston Churchill denied today that he had died this morning. He said a rumor to that effect was part of a deliberate election whispering campaign.

The conservation party leader issued the following statement from his home at Chartwell, Kent: "I am informed from many quarters that a rumor has been put about that I died this morning. 'This is quite untrue. 'It is, however, a good sample of the whispering campaign which has been set on foot. It would have been more artistic to keep this one for polling day.'"

## Forger Held In Coleman Wanted In 26 States

COLMAN, Tex., Feb. 16 (UP)—A fugitive from the Virginia State Prison, arrested here Feb. 8, is wanted in 26 states on forgery charges, Sheriff H. F. Fenton, Jr., said today.

The convict was taken to the Texas Department of Public Safety headquarters at Austin, where he identified himself as James Ellis Eastep, 26.

Eastep was arrested after he wrote a \$71.20 check on a non-existent San Antonio company and passed it to a Coleman merchant, Fenton said.

Eastep was serving a 12-year sentence for grand larceny at the Virginia prison when he escaped in 1947.

## WIVES JOYFUL OVER NEWS OF HUSBANDS' SAFETY

By JUD DIXON United Press Staff Correspondent FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 16 (UP)—It was a long, breathless wait fraught with uncertainty. But the prayers of a courageous group of women were answered, and there was tearful thanksgiving.

The women they left behind them suffered more, probably, than those crewmen on the six-engined B-36 superbomber that went down off British Columbia.

All day Tuesday and through the long night and into Wednesday, they prayed and hoped and listened for word from the rugged northwest.

And when the good word finally came that all were found alive, there was an undamming of emotions that had been held in check by a barrier of fortitude.

"I just feel beautiful inside," exclaimed Mrs. Raymond P. Whitefield, Jr., wife of the B-36's navigator. She wept tears of joy. That told a lot of stories for a lot of women. They had feared the worst and prayed for the best. Their agony was compounded in a period of confusion late Wednesday. First reports said six, then nine, men were safe and well. Then came a joyful report that all aboard had been located.

Maj. Gen. Roger Ramey, Commander of the 8th Air Force to which the men and the lost ship were attached, summoned the chaplains, telling them to spread the news.

The report had to be amended. It later proved to be true, but it went out at a time when it was not supported by known facts.

Mrs. Martin B. Stephens of Houston, one of the wives, was put through the emotional wringers three times. Three times she heard that her husband was safe. Later, after unofficial.

A chaplain from Carswell Air Force Base first brought her the good tidings of her husband's rescue. She rushed to the base to get more information, but as soon as

she walked into the public information office she learned the report had not been confirmed. "But they told me that he was alive," that it was official," she said. "I've been praying all night."

Mrs. Stephens returned to her car parked in front of the PIO office and wept.

An Air Force Corporal hurried out to her car to tell her it was official. She managed a weak smile.

The corporal, however, had not heard about the official correction that all 17 survivors had not been found.

Mrs. Stephens later learned, from unofficial sources, that her sergeant-husband's name was on a partial list of survivors, but Carswell officials at that time could not give added encouragement. They said they could not confirm it because they had not received such a list.

Later, when it became certain that her husband was all right, Mrs. Stephens was afraid to believe.

"I won't believe it," said she, "until I see him and touch him."

## Ideal Weather To Continue

By United Press Blue skies and mild temperatures, such as will make Texans start thinking about spring again, were forecast today for the state in the next 24 to 36 hours.

In the 24 hours ending at 6:30 A. M. today, there was no rainfall in Texas.

Temperatures in the northern half of the state in the early hours today were more like winter than spring, ranging as low as 23 at Dalhart and dropping below the freezing mark throughout the Panhandle and South Plains and as far south and east as Mineral Wells and Junction.

But skies were clear everywhere and the sun had a chance to really shine. U. S. Weather forecasters foresaw an immediate future both mild and sunny.

Yesterday afternoon's temperature range was from a high of 74 at Alice to a low of 55 at Texarkana.

Overnight the range was from Dalhart's low 23 to Galveston's 51.

Some of this morning's minimum reports showed: Houston 46, San Antonio and Dallas 38, Austin 39, Lufkin 33, Texarkana 31, Lubbock and Amarillo, 28, and Mineral Wells and Junction 32.

## TAKES SLAP AT RUSSIA FOR WALKOUT, VETO

BY JHON L. STEELE United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (UP)

— President Truman said today that the United States is ready to discuss at any time with any country any plan for peace.

But he made it clear that such discussions will have to be through the United Nations or regular diplomatic channels — unless Russia's Josef Stalin or any other chief of staff wants to meet with the president here.

Mr. Truman said at his news conference that:

1. He does not believe it is time to send a mission to Stalin. 2. But he has always said that the door is open, here in Washington, any time to any head of state. That was as close as he came to commenting on Winston Churchill's proposal for "highest level" atomic control talks with Russia.

3. This is not the proper time to press — as proposed in a pending Congressional resolution — for creation of an Atlantic Union of Atlantic Pact Nations. Mr. Truman said there are more important things to discuss.

4. This country (unlike Russia) has never walked out of any meeting and has never used its UN veto to block anything leading to peace.

The President's statement that it is not time to send a peace mission to Moscow was evoked by a question based on his exclusive interview with Arthur Krock of the New York Times. Krock quoted Mr. Truman as saying he would have sent Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson to Moscow in 1948 if a presidential campaign had not been going on. A reporter asked if he thought the time has now come to send such a mission.

Mr. Truman replied that he does not think that time has come.

Asked about the new 30-year pact between Communist China and Russia, the President said Secretary of State Dean Acheson covered that subject adequately yesterday when he said China's troubles with Moscow are just beginning.

The President was questioned about the possibility of "some dramatic move" to reach an atomic control agreement with Russia.

He replied that there is ample negotiating machinery within the United States. He added that all of the ambassadors representing this nation are ready to discuss any question at any time with any country.

Mr. Truman made an oblique slap at the Russians. He said this country has never walked out of any meeting and has never used the UN veto power to halt anything leading to peace.

He said the door is always open to any country to discuss better international relations and repeated his oft-stated offer to meet here in Washington with any head of any state.

The President was asked particularly about a proposal made in Great Britain by Winston Churchill for "another talk with the Soviet Union upon the highest level."

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## OPERATION TO REPLACE DEAD CORNEA SUCCESS

ATLANTA, Feb. 16 (UP)—A slender beam from a flashlight told Mrs. Mary Ella Sams today that her television debut had been a smashing success.  
Ten days ago the mill worker's wife smiled through fear and hope at one of the most erudite TV audiences ever assembled. There wasn't a critic or a columnist in the crowd, because her acting ability wasn't on trial. Mrs. Sams was lying on an operating table. Several surgeons hovered above. One deftly removed a "dead cornea" from Mrs. Sams' eye and put in its place a cornea from an infant which had died in Grady Hospital that morning.  
The other eye was unseeing, too, but unbandaged. Doctors planned to try another cornea transplantation on it after the first healed.

In an auditorium several blocks away, the audience was 1,000 doctors. They watched the receiver spotted about the auditorium. When the "program" was over, there was no applause.  
But today the doctors had tenderly peeled the bandages from her eyes. And the applause rolled out of Mrs. Sams' heart when she saw that slender beam of light.  
She was so excited she couldn't speak, she was 33 years old, and she had been blind since infancy. Ronald, her 10-year-old son, couldn't wait.  
"Oh, mommy," he begged, "can you see?"  
"Yes, son," she replied. "I can see some light."  
Her husband, father, sister, nieces, nephews crowded about her room, some crying, some laughing.

## Bidault Orders Crack Down On Communists

PARIS, Feb. 16 (UP) Premier George Bidault's government ordered senior officials throughout the nation today to suppress mercilessly any Communist attempts to paralyze the country.  
The orders were in the form of circulars warning that the government has reason to believe the Communists will try to demoralize the nation's life through strikes and sabotage.  
The Communist program will be directed especially against ports and railroads scheduled to handle American arms shipment under the Atlantic Pact.  
The orders were approved at an emergency cabinet meeting held last night to consider the mounting wave of Communist-inspired strikes which have swept France back into the front line of the East-West cold war.

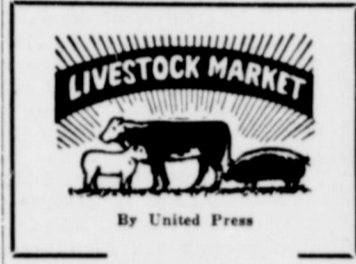

## SAYS HYDROGEN BOMB COULD DESTROY EARTH

OTTAWA, Feb. 16 (UP)—Explosion of the first hydrogen bomb might cause the world and all in it to disintegrate in less than a minute, Dr. Allan Munn, one of Canada's foremost physicists, said today.

The super-bomb, if big enough, could set off a chain reaction that would encircle the globe an annihilation, Munn said in an interview.

Some American scientists do not believe a hydrogen bomb explosion would set off an uncontrolled chain reaction, turning the earth into a ball of fire.

Munn was one of the group which started Canada's atomic energy project at Montreal in 1943. He is now associate professor of physics at Carleton College here.

He said he could not see no possible peacetime applications of the power represented by the H-bomb. It is "just a frightening monster," he said.

Given the right conditions, Munn said explosion of an H-bomb could "turn us all into little suns, probably in less than 50-seconds after the blast."

"It would be a very painless death," he said. "It would be all over so quickly we wouldn't know what hit us. Our world would then be just another star in space."
