Pretty soon, the plants begin to fall over and die, animals stand with glazed eyes, dreaming of the cool water that once filled their troughs, and things are in bad shape. Then people try all kinds of ideas to make it rain. A tribe of Indians hold awe-inspiring ceremonies. Some pray. New York pays a fabulous price to have a man climb into an airplane and seed the clouds with "dry ice." California tried a smudge pot theory. But people will try anything. The farmer has to have rain so he can help the—(refer back to paragraph two).

But rain will fall when God knows we need it. And not before. We can't cause it to rain and find anytime a man tries to take credit for God's work, let him beware. Even though man has proved his capability to make it rain by seeding clouds with dry ice, who put the clouds there in the first place? And who can say that the rain wouldn't have fallen anyway had it just been left alone?

And then it rains. What happens? Well, the dust is cleaned from the sky. The earth hides her scars and puts forth new plants and leaves to replace the ones that have withered. You can bet she has a few unkind words about the "gift from heaven." Which brings up a point. Wouldn't it be nice for some kind of rain to fall that didn't leave mud. What a thought. I don't know why I've had this argument with me. I haven't proved a thing, to you or myself. But one thing is certain. When moisture comes pouring down from the skies, then friend, it's raining.

BELIEVE LOVE INSPIRED PLANE BOMB PLANTING

LOS ANGELES, April 18 (UP)—Police worked today on the theory that love for a red-haired airlines stewardess drove aircraft engineer John H. Grant to try to kill his wife and two children by timebombing a plane carrying 16 persons.

Grant claimed he plotted the mass murders to collect \$25,000 insurance he took out on his wife, Betty, 29, and their children, Robert, 5, and Mary Anne, 4, just before they boarded the United Airlines DC-3.

He said he needed the money to clear himself of back-breaking debts totaling about \$8,000. Most of the debts were incurred, he said, when a New York woman won a suit naming him as the father of her child.

However, Betty Suomela of Hermosa Beach, Calif., told officers that she and Grant had carried on a love affair for the past three years.

Miss Suomela, assistant supervisor of stewardess for American Airlines, said the 31-year-old engineer was supposed to be in court arranging for a divorce at the very moment his plot to blow up the airliner was discovered.

Grant claimed it was a last minute change of heart that caused him to shout a warning to cargo loaders just as they placed a suitcase he had rigged with an incendiary bomb aboard the two-engine plane.

Police weren't so sure about that. They were checking the

exact sequence of the dramatic events in the belief that Grant may not have had his "change of heart" until the bomb plot was already discovered when a baggage handler inadvertently dropped the bag and set off the infernal machine.

Had the bomb exploded as set, the plane would have been 31 minutes along its flight to San Diego. The bomb probably would have ignited the plane, causing it to crash and kill everyone aboard. Miss Suomela said she met Grant shortly after she arrived in California from New York three years ago.

Grant told her he was married but had no children, she said. Throughout their affair, he promised to get a divorce and marry her.

The first she knew of his two children, she said, was when she learned of the plot to blow up the plane.

In his confession, Grant made no mention of Miss Suomela.

SHIVERS INTRODUCES RADIO QUIZZ SERIES

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 18 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers is willing to participate in a quiz show with private citizens serving as the question poppers.

In the first of a series of weekly "radio visits," the governor last night asked Texans to mail him "any questions you might have about state affairs."

He promised to answer as many questions as possible during the hour-long radio series, which are described as non-political by Shivers' office and carried free of charge over 17 Texas State Network stations.

Shivers said he wanted his listeners "to know exactly what the governor's office is doing, and to be informed about the other agencies of state government."

He added that he might want to "ask your advise on some knotty problems" during the series which he hopes "can be just as informal as a friendly discussion on the courthouse lawn back in my home town or yours."

Shivers spent half of the 15-minute broadcast interviewing Capt. N. W. Jackson, chief examiner of the Drivers License Division. They discussed the procedure a driver must use in renewing his license.

An interview with an official from the state prison system will highlight next week's broadcast.

"I want to ask you to write out your questions about the State Prison System and mail them to me at the State Capitol," Shivers said. He also invited citizens visiting Austin to "take the time to stop in at the executive office and meet all of us."

When the governor announced last Saturday he would make the series of broadcasts, Casa March, a gubernatorial candidate, said he thought he, too, should be furnished an equal amount of free radio time.

Although Shivers has not filed or formally announced for election, he has indicated many times that he intends to run for governor.

Phone Company Re-Organization Is Announced

ST. LOUIS, April 18 (UP)—Southwestern Bell Telephone Company today announced a re-organization of its administrative and operating set-up in Texas in the face of the great growth of that state during the past decade.

W. L. Pehn, general manager of the Texas area since 1926, will retain that title under the decentralization program, but will now be charged with the company's operating activities as well as its commercial duties. His office is in Dallas.

Heretofore, Pehn's office has had equal rank with those of area traffic and plant chiefs and all three have been responsible to the Southwestern Bell's home office in St. Louis.

Heading the three operating offices under the new organization, which is effective immediately, will be Ben Smith, former assistant general manager, now general commercial manager; Clarence Oliver, former traffic manager, now general traffic manager; and Sam P. Martin, former plant superintendent, now general plant manager.

Thomas B. Kelly, former general plant manager for the entire Southwestern Bell system in St. Louis, will become Pehn's assistant general manager. C. Walker Mier of Dallas will become chief engineer for Texas.

The company's announcement noted that Southwestern Bell more than doubled its plant investment since 1940 to \$227,000,000, or 160 per cent; upped the number of its telephones in service two and one-half times to 1,400,000, and increased its number of employees from 14,500 to 23,700, or 59 per cent increase.

Yet, it said, the state's requirements have not been met and it now has an \$87,000,000 construction program under way for 1950.

Principal speaker at the convention was Dr. B. J. Palmer, the son of the founder of chiropractic, David D. Palmer. Dr. Palmer is president of the Palmer Chiropractic College and head of the Palmer Chiropractic College and clinic and research laboratories in Davenport, Iowa.

NEW YORK, April 18 (UP)—A Canadian Jet Liner flew from Toronto to New York in 59 minutes today, completing the first Canada-United States jet-propelled passenger transport flight in slightly more than one half the time required by conventional air liners.

The four-engine plane, built by A. V. Roe Canada, Ltd., landed at Idlewild Airport at 10:33 a. m. (EST). It took off from its home base at Toronto's Malton Airport at 9:31 a. m. and was over Idlewild at 10:30 a. m.

WASHINGTON, April 18 (UP)—The United States today charged that Soviet fighter aircraft shot down an unarmed American Naval plane over the open waters of the Baltic Sea.

That statement was made by a State Department spokesman as he made public this government's reply to a Soviet protest that an American plane had flown over Latvia and exchanged gunfire with Soviet fighters.

The American note said an investigation showed that the only American plane in the air over the Baltic Sea on April 8—the date of the incident alleged in the Soviet protest—was the missing Navy Privateer plane which disappeared on that date with 10 crewmen aboard.

"No trace of its crew has since been found," the note said.

The note added that the plane was "wholly unarmed" and under blanket instructions to avoid flying over any foreign territory.

"The investigation conducted by the United States government has convinced it that the U. S. Navy plane in question — did not fly over any Soviet or Soviet occupied territory or territorial waters adjacent thereto," the American reply said.

"It must be concluded that Soviet military aircraft fired on an unarmed American plane over the open sea, following which the American plane was lost."

The note said this government protests "in the most solemn manner against this violation of international law."

The United States demanded that Russia "institute a prompt and thorough investigation" and that the Soviet air force be instructed to refrain from such actions in the future.

The United States, the note said, "confidently expects the Soviet government will express its regret for the unlawful and provocative behavior of its aviators" and will see to it that those responsible are "promptly and severely punished."

Four-Lane Highway To Be Built Soon

CISCO—A contract will be let in August or September for a four-lane highway linking Cisco and Eastland, according to B. A. Butler, secretary-manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

The information came to Butler from the district office of the State Highway Department in a recent report to the C C directors.

Butler said that asphalt topping work will begin in the near future to complete the new section of U. S. Highway 80 between Cisco and Abilene. The section in Eastland county has been completed for several months.

The new road between Cisco and Eastland will utilize as much of the present right-of-way as possible. Much of the new right-of-way has been obtained it was reported. Dangerous curves on the highway are to be eliminated and the distance between the two towns shortened.

It is understood that the highway department expects eventually to have a four-lane highway from Cisco to Weatherford to connect with the four-lane road linking Weatherford to Fort Worth.

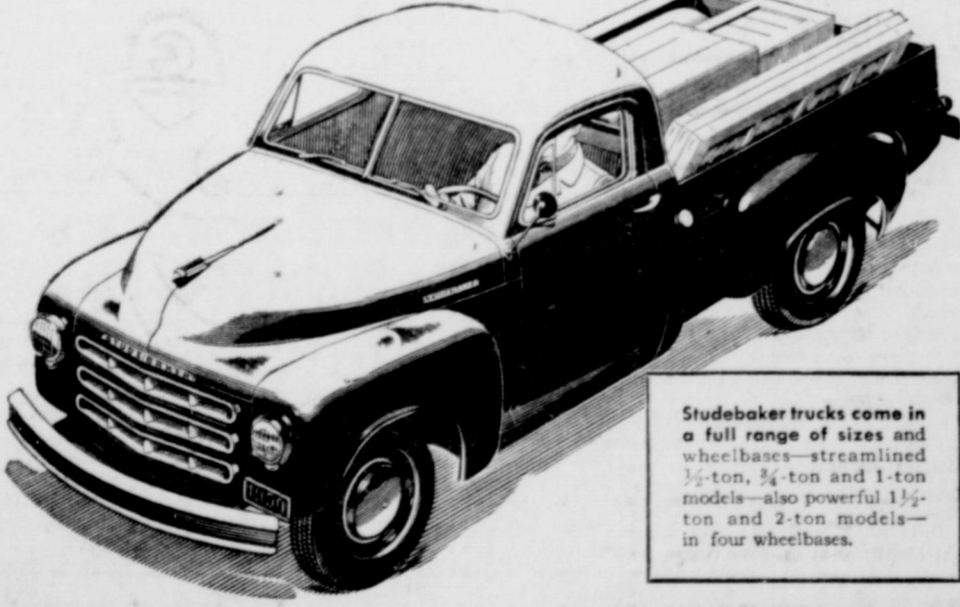

Ochoa Retains Lawyer For Suits

LAREDO, Tex., April 18 (UP)—George Ochoa, fugitive Laredo broker charged with two murders, has designated attorney Gordon Gibson to represent him in civil lawsuits.

Gibson said he could tell police only that "communications between a lawyer and his client are privileged and I cannot divulge any information received from my client."

A search for Ochoa has been conducted in Texas and Mexico since last July 29 when the bodies of Henry Whittenburg, Jr., of McAllen, and Corp. James Lindsay of Huntsville, Tenn., were found on separate floors in a Laredo Hotel.

Ochoa disappeared on the same day and was reported seen later on a Mexican golf course. He returned on Christmas Day to demand money from an acquaintance but fled when the friend refused.

Lindsay's family sued for \$55,000 damages and Ochoa's wife, ex-wife and grandfather recently filed money suits against him. Police Chief D. O. Gallagher accused Gibson last week with being in "contact" with Ochoa, but the lawyer denied yesterday that he had been questioned by police.

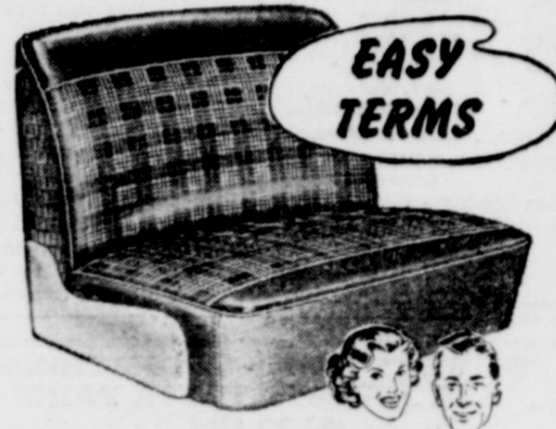

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RELIABLE BLOOD TEST FOR CANCER REPORTED

 ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. April 18 (UP)—A West Coast scientist working in a basement laboratory of his home may have found the key to reliable blood test for cancer and even more, perhaps one of the causes of cancer.

 The new test, based on a simple process, has been found to be 98.6 per cent accurate and is the result of 15 years research, including long, tedious nights in the Penn basement where he was experimenting with tissue of liver of cancerous patients, and isolating what may turn out to be a causative agent of cancer.

This scientist is Dr. H. S. Penn, of the University of California, Los Angeles, who reported with three of his colleagues the development of a new test for cancer at the American Association
 The most significant part of their report was the statement that those persons who underwent surgery for removal of a cancerous growth showed up negative in tests eight days after the operation. Thus, if the tests meet other clinical trials and are found to be without error, cancer doctors may be able to determine whether all of a cancer has been

removed.
 The new cancer technique is similar to that of the Kahn test for syphilis, it is done quickly in a test tube, and requires no microscopic examination.

In the first place, the doctors use the livers of persons who have died of cancer. The tissue is ground, and prepared in a purified form. During the early work, the scientists found that the livers of persons who have cancer and not particularly cancer of the liver contain a factor that appears to be a causative agent of cancer.

The medical men know that the human body creates antibodies, or chemical fighters, against disease but there has been no proof that cancer causes the body to create antibodies. The new test is based on the assumption that cancer does cause the body to create antibodies, such anti-bodies show up in the white part of the blood—the serum.

In making the test for cancer, the West Coast doctors took blood from persons in the study and mixed it with a saline solution containing the "cancer factor" of the liver of cancerous persons. In the case of persons who had cancer in their body, it was assumed the blood had created antibodies against the disease.

Result was that in those persons who definitely had cancer there was reaction in the test tube test. That is, substances, apparently antibodies, were "attacking" the cancer agent and causing the solution to lose its cloudiness, such is a positive test.

Those persons, known to be in health and apparently free of cancer, had no such reaction. Their serums remained cloudy. There was no activity of a "cancer antibody" attacking the cancer agent.

DALLAS, Tex., April 18 (UP)—A bread truck driver escaped with only a cut on the arm when a Texas & Pacific freight train smashed his vehicle to pieces early today.

Clyde Ewalt of Mesquite, Tex., was thrown clear of the wreckage, but his truck rolled over four times after it was struck by the freight train two miles east of Dallas.

Ewalt telephoned the sheriff's office to report he couldn't find enough of his truck to move it. He was told it would be all right to go on to work.

An hour later, Ewalt was en route to Hillsboro with another truck laden with fresh bread.
