

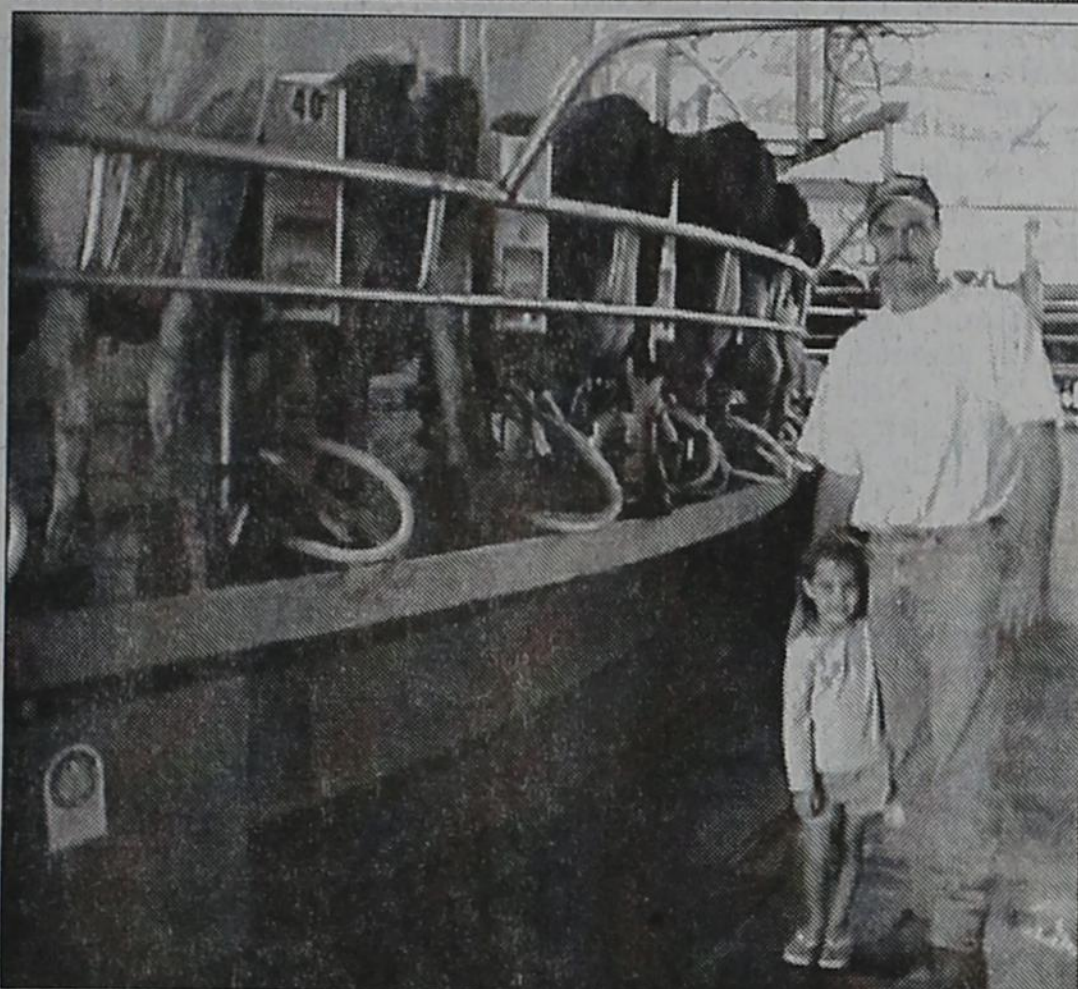
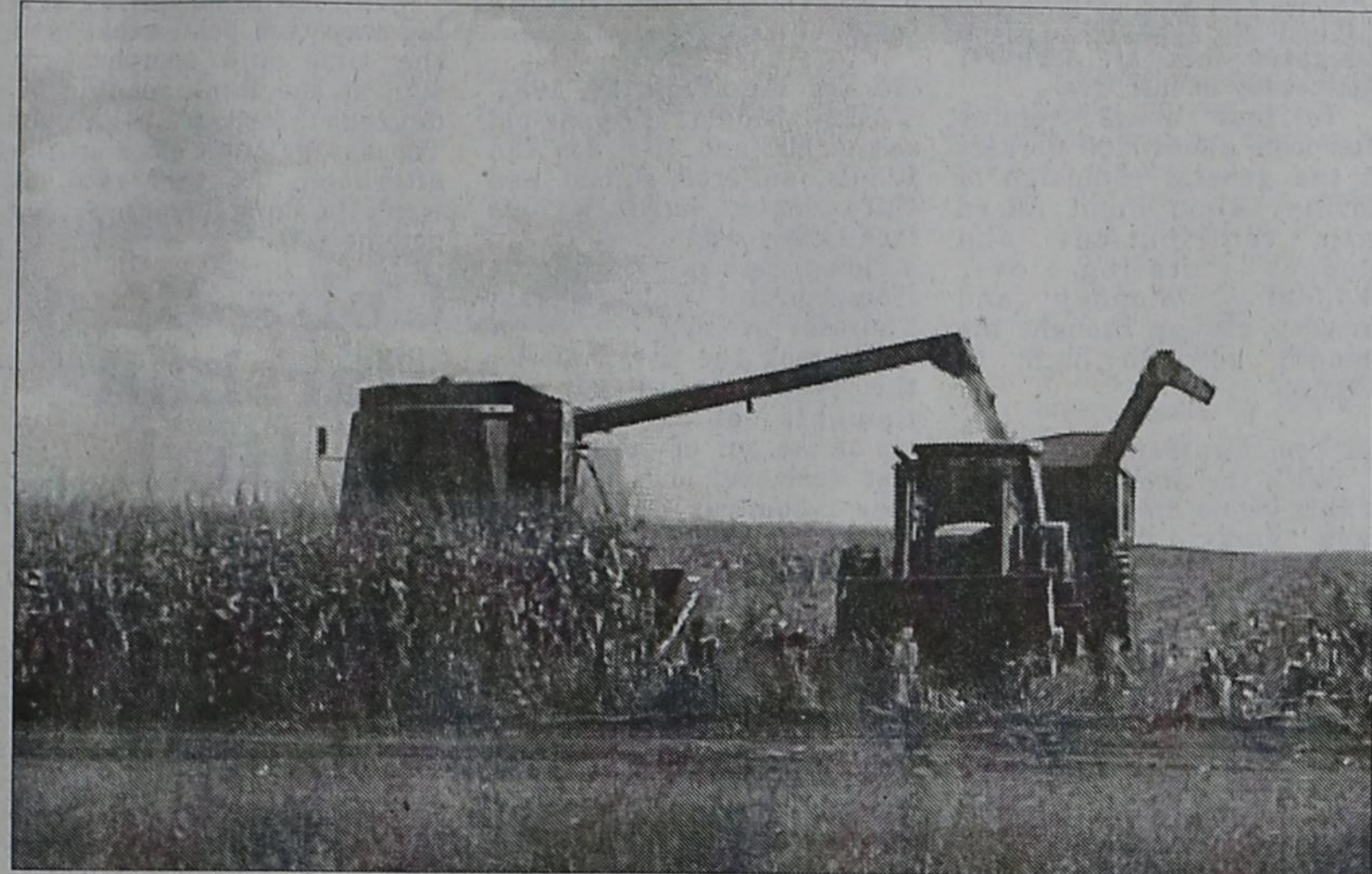

Harvest, New Dairy Progress

Corn harvest has been underway for the past two or three weeks. Although growers had to irrigate more during the growing season, the crop's yield has been favorable.

The corn being cut in the above photo was in the Hub area.

High Plains Dairy, located six miles east of the Hub intersection, is making progress.

The first modern dairy for the county is currently milking around 2200 cows daily. Their new-style carousel milker is handling 300 cows per hour, and is capable of milking 400 cows an hour.

County Receives Sales Tax

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander sent sales tax rebates to Texas cities for September.

The September sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in July and reported to the Comptroller in August. The state's share of sales tax revenue during this period was \$1.3 billion.

Parmer County received a total of \$31,961, divided as Bovina \$2,345; Farwell \$4,236; and Friona \$25,379.

The remittance to Friona was almost a 15% increase over the same period last year.

However, total sales taxes received so far in 2002 are down -6.72% over the same period in 2001.

In 2002, Bovina has received \$20,869; Farwell \$38,223; and Friona \$181,729, for a total of \$240,822, compared to \$258,198 received during the same period in 2001.

Deputy Nets Cash For County In Traffic Stop

Thursday, September 19, around midnight, Parmer County Deputy Andy Stormes stopped a pickup pulling a trailer in Bovina when the trailer had a defective trailer light.

Acting on a suspicion, Stormes asked for, and was given, permission to search the vehicle. During the search, the deputy found packets containing cash.

When questioned, the driver said the money was not his and he did not know who it belonged to. This is a typical scenario in the transportation of drug money.

Stormes confiscated the money, \$119,821, and the driver was allowed to go. He

Council Approves Tax Rate

At a brief special session held Tuesday, September 24, Bovina's Board of Aldermen approved a new property tax rate.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Galen Hromas, city manager Ernest Terry, Aldermen Jessie Stone, Mike McCallum and Stan Miller, city secretary Bonnie Scaff, and Curby Brantley and Deana Curtis of the Parmer County Appraisal District.

The council approved an ordinance setting the ad valorem tax rate at \$0.561968 per \$100 valuation. (The full wording of Ordinance 020902 is printed in an ad elsewhere in this paper).

The special meeting was called to order at 5:13 p.m. and adjourned at 5:23 p.m.

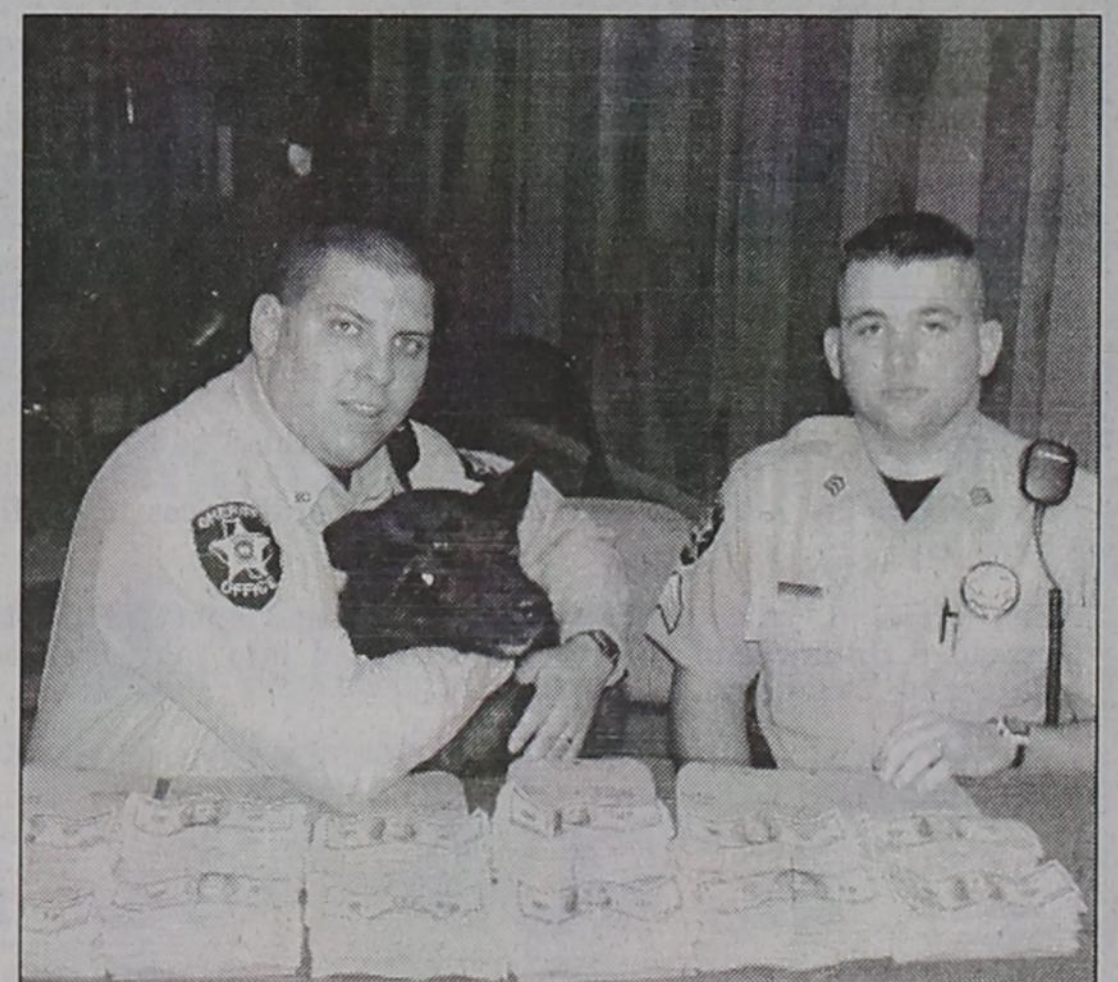

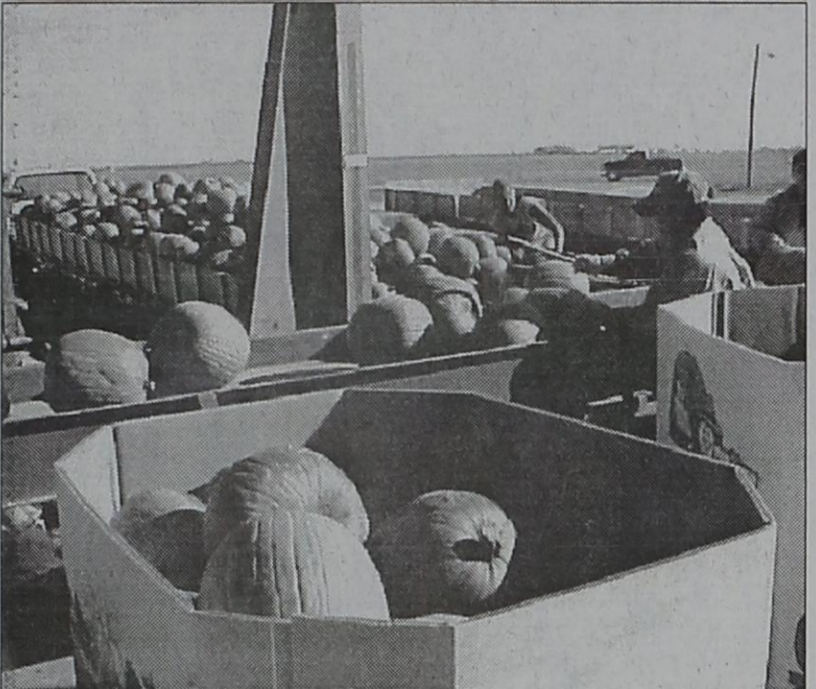

Screening Clinic Set

City of Bovina

Ordinance No. 020902

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE TAX RATE AND TAX LEVY FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2003, UPON ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS, IN CONFORMITY WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AND THE CHARTER PROVISIONS AND ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOVINA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That there shall be and the same is hereby levied and shall be assessed and collected for the Fiscal Year 2003, 1 October 2002 through 30 September 2003, an ad valorem tax of fifty-six and .1968 cents (\$0.561968) on each one hundred dollars (\$100) worth of property at one hundred percent (100%) assessed valuation located within the present city limits of the City of Bovina, made taxable by law, which said taxes when collected shall be appropriated among the funds and departments of said City government of the City of Bovina for the purposes hereinafter set forth, as follows, to-wit:

For the General Fund \$0.561968

SECTION 2. The ad valorem tax rate of fifty-six and .1968 cents (\$0.561968) as set forth in Section 1 above, is hereby levied and shall be assessed and collected on each one hundred dollars (\$100) worth of property located within the City of Bovina as valued by the Equalization Board and made taxable by the City of Bovina law.

SECTION 3. The Tax Assessor and Collector for the City of Bovina is hereby directed to assess, extend, and enter upon the tax rolls of the City of Bovina, Texas, for the current taxable year, the amounts and rates herein levied and to keep a current account of same, and when so collected, the same to be deposited in the depository of the City of Bovina to be distributed in accordance with this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are expressly repealed.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage as provided by law and shall be incorporated into the City Code as #4.60. Annual Tax Rate and Tax Levy.

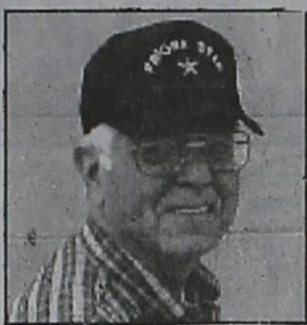

Out Here

Throwing A Wall-Eyed Fit

Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth upon this continent, a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that "all men are created equal." Now we are engaged in a

great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived, and so dedicated, can long endure.

We are met on a great battle field of that war. We come to dedicate a portion of it, as a final resting place for those who died here, that the nation might live. This we may, in all propriety do. But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate--we can not consecrate--we can not hallow, this ground--The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have hallowed it, far above our poor power to add or detract.

The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here; while it can never forget what they did here.

It is rather for us, the living, we here be dedicated to the great task remaining before us--that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they here, gave the last full measure of devotion--that we here highly resolve these dead shall not have died in vain; that the nation shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from this earth.

These few words, 238 of them, have lived through history and taught to countless students.

No doubt President Abraham Lincoln made many inspiring speeches during his lifetime. But none so enduring as the Gettysburg Address, delivered on November 19, 1863.

John Nicolay, one of Lincoln's two private secretaries, said that Lincoln wrote the first part of the speech on Executive Mansion stationery. The second page was written in pencil on lined paper.

The text above is taken from Mr. Nicolay's copy and differs slightly from the version that most school children learn. Read it again, only this time out loud like you were delivering the speech. Put some emotion into it. You'll feel more patriotic. You could even memorize it and impress your friends at Sunday School.

Lord knows we need to feel patriotic these days. Do you realize that in America today, in the 21st Century, you can not go to an airport and get mad at security or airline employees.

I remember back during my airline and travel agent careers, passengers at ticket counters or departure gates would often throw wall-eyed fits and raise holy hell if a flight was late. (What is a wall-eyed fit anyway?)

I've seen passengers threaten to climb over the ticket counter and do bodily harm to an airline employee for a variety of reasons.

But now? A wall-eyed fit at the airport could get you a prison sentence. Do you realize that you can not get mad at airport security personnel? No matter what they do to you, how demeaning they are, making you strip off your clothes, take off your shoes, your choice in America today is to stand there and take it.

If you call one of them stupid, refuse to cooperate, bad mouth or back talk, it will be handcuffs, interrogation, maybe even national TV and a trial date. God forbid that you actually touch a security person in a threatening way. Federal prison here I come.

Don't believe me? Buy a ticket, go to an airport, and throw a wall-eyed fit. We'll see you in a couple of years.

What does that have to do with Mr. Lincoln's Gettysburg Address? Not much I guess. Except for that last part there that says "that the nation shall have a new birth of freedom and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

At airports, it has perished. Throughout Amer-

ica, freedoms are perishing little by little in the name of protecting America from the bad guys.

American citizens have been arrested, held without charges, not allowed to consult with a lawyer, and are not told how long they will be held. All in the name of protecting America from the bad guys.

What's that? Yes I know you don't care much if somebody else gets locked up as long as it's not you. They probably deserve it or else they wouldn't have been arrested.

Over in Lockney, the school board is determined to implement mandatory drug testing on some students. They originally voted, in February 2000, to test all secondary school students, whether the students or their parents wanted them to or not.

But one parent, Larry Tannahill, had the courage to challenge the ruling as unconstitutional. District Judge Sam Cummings, in his ruling, said the mandatory drug testing came at "a great price to citizens' constitutionally guaranteed rights to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects."

Well that didn't deter the Lockney school board. A new plan, copied from one in Oklahoma, was voted in. Mandatory drug testing will apply to all Lockney students in grades seven through twelve who participate in extracurricular activities.

There are rules and there are rights. In America, we seem to be getting a lot more rules and fewer rights. Mr. Lincoln would be annoyed.

A new nation, conceived in liberty....maybe that's what we need.
