ARMY DENIES USING GAG

WASHINGTON, April (UP)—The Army insisted today that it did not request an advance copy of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's speech to Congress for the purpose of censoring it or gagging the general.

Maj. Gen. Floyd S. Parks, Army Chief of Public Information, also said that MacArthur will not be expected to submit speeches or public statements for advance review by the State or Defense Departments.

Such a directive covering public statements dealing with policy matters was issued to officers of all the armed forces last December and still is in effect.

But Parks said the directive did not apply to MacArthur after he was relieved of all his commands. Parks said that although MacArthur will continue on the active list as a general of the army for life, unless he resigns or requests removal, the army does not consider him on active duty because he does not have an assignment.

Parks admitted that MacArthur was asked for an advance copy of his congressional speech. But Parks said this was a mistake of a subordinate officer in his office.

Last night Radio Commentator Henry J. Taylor said it was an "inconceivable fact" that MacArthur "got the gag" by a radio message through official communication channels, reminding him that whatever he said should be cleared with Washington.

NAZI THUGS GET GALLOWS

WASHINGTON, April 24 (UP)—The Supreme Court ruled in effect today that seven Nazi war criminals must die on the gallows.

The court refused to hear the appeal of the Nazi who were convicted by military tribunals in Germany of murdering thousands of civilians during World War II.

The convicted men—former SS officers and concentration camp officials—originally were scheduled to hang Feb. 13. They received an informal reprieve from the State Department while the Supreme Court considered their case. Two lower Federal Courts also had rejected their appeal.

Investigation Is Launched Today

FORT WORTH, April 24 (UP)—An investigation was launched today into the accident on the Missouri Pacific Railroad lines in which 17 cars and the caboose of a freight train tumbled off a trestle north of Italy (Ellis County).

Two crewmen of the I&GN (Missouri Pacific) Freight, Southbound from Fort Worth, were injured in the accident late yesterday.

Conductor E. C. Gillespie and H. O. Cramer, another crew member, both of Mart, were hurt in the unexplained mishap which demolished cars and trestle nine miles north of Italy.

Cramer was reported in serious condition with a broken back. Both men were hospitalized at Waxahachie.

Other trains were derailed over an adjacent M-K-T track with only slight schedule delays.

Repair crews from Fort Worth were sent to the scene to rebuild the trestle and the track. The crews were expected to complete their work by noon today.

Fellow workmen dug for five and one-half hours before they reached Mores who was uninjured except for shock. Authorities said he would have suffocated had it not been for his companion's action.

New High School For White Area

FORT WORTH, April 24 (UP)—The crowded white settlement area looked today to the prospect of having a new high school, following announcement in Washington of a Federal Grant of \$929,520.

The grant was announced by the U. S. Commissioner of Education. The law permits aid to "federally-affected" areas such as white settlement with its heavy student population from families of Carswell Air-Force Base men and convair Aircraft workers.

A similar grant of \$625,000 for Grand Prairie also will be used for a high school, Grand Prairie School Board Officials said.

Both grants are being held in reserve until sites, plans and contracts are approved.

Four-man teams composed of three boys and an alternate will judge dairy cattle, livestock, poultry, and grass classification. Judging will get under way at 9:30 a.m. at the college farm, and president E. J. Howell will hand out awards at 2:30 p.m. in the college auditorium.

Other counties in District 8 are Stephens, Palo Pinto, Erath, Hood, Johnson, Ellis, Somervell, Comanche, Brown, Bosque, Hill, Hamilton, Mills, Coryell, McLennan, Limestone and Falls.

Juror Selection Resumed Today

SAN ANTONIO, April 24 (UP)—Selection of jurors to hear the murder trial of Richard Dean Thorbus, 20, of Houston and Corpus Christi, was resumed today.

Thorbus is charged with three others in the slaying of A. J. Sender, 41, during a holdup attempt March 8. Edmond Niemann, owner of the station where the robbery was committed, was also injured. The bandits who staged the robbery netted only \$8.

Charged with Thorbus were Robert E. Miers, 19, Leroy Johnson, 24, and Lynnada Clark, 21, all of Houston. Miers' trial was postponed yesterday until 30 days after adjournment of the State Legislature because one of his attorneys, Joe B. Fleming of Henderson, is a State Representative.

Tax Bill Will Raise \$110,000,000

AUSTIN, April 24 (UP)—Two House-approved tax bills estimated to arise a combined \$110,000,000 in new revenue over the coming two years rested in a Senate Subcommittee today.

But the Senate Committee on State Affairs, which late last night sent the measures to a sub-group after hearing some six hours of testimony, said the action was taken only to study the legal aspects of one measure. It's the bill placing a one cent per 1,000 cubic feet gathering tax on natural gas, authored by Rep. James Sewell of Blooming Grove.

Expected To Name New Chief

FORT WORTH, April 24 (UP)—City Manager W. O. Jones kept to himself today the name of the man he will recommend to the city council as Fort Worth Police Chief.

Jones is expected to make his recommendation tomorrow at the regular City Council meeting.

Most City Hall observers believed, however, that the decision would be either Cato S. Hightower, 42-year-old traffic captain, or Assistant Chief R. R. Howerton.

REDS RIP 10-MILE GAP IN ALLIED LINES TODAY

By Frank Tremaine United Press Staff Correspondent TOKYO, Wednesday, April 25 (UP)—Chinese Communist forces ripped a 10-mile gap in Allied lines Tuesday. They sent 40,000 troops swarming South to points nearly 10 miles below Korea's 38th Parallel.

The Red breakthrough threatened to cut the vital Seoul-Chunchon supply highway West of Chunchon, isolating Allied forces on the East-Central front.

Dawes Dies In Chicago

CHICAGO, April 24 (UP)—Charles G. Dawes, the "Hell 'N' Maria" Vice President under Calvin Coolidge, died late last night at his suburban Evanston home of a heart attack. He was 85 years old.

Dawes' death came as he was preparing to make one of his rare public appearances in recent years as honorary chairman of the civic committee to welcome Gen. Douglas MacArthur's visit to Chicago next Thursday.

His wife, Caro, was with him when he died after suffering a coronary thrombosis attack about 10 p.m. CST. His physician, Dr. George Dick, was summoned, but Dawes was dead by the time he arrived.

His death ended a fiery career—punctuated by his verbal trademark of "Hell 'N' Maria"—as lawmaker, banker, diplomat, soldier, politician, author and musician.

Another Dawes trademark was his famous underslung pipe.

Dawes served under Coolidge from 1925 to 1929 and refused to run for a second term. He was appointed Ambassador to the Court of St. James in London where he shocked court circles when he spurned the traditional "pink tea diplomacy" associated with the post.

He was the author of the "Dawes Plan" for the payment of Germany's World War I Reparations. His efforts won him the Noble Peace prize in 1925.

Lot Of Fire Isn't It?

AUSTIN, April 24 (UP)—The City Fire Marshal here, identified himself to newsmen seeking information about the fire in the Big Bear Food and Liquor Stores in South Austin yesterday, was very helpful.

"It's W. L. Heaton," he said, "Like 'Heat On.'"

Heaton then added, "that's not so unusual... the fire marshal in Dallas is named W. G. Burns."

Man Injured In Railyards

HOUSTON, April 24 (UP)—Charles Martin, 25-year-old switchman, was injured seriously today when he was struck by a freight car in the Katy Freight Yards.

Martin, police said, had set the brakes on a car and was walking around it when another car, being switched, struck the first car, knocking it into Martin.

Joint Chiefs Wanted Ban On Nationalist Troops Lifted

LOS ANGELES, April 24 (UP)—The Chief of United Press War correspondents in Korea says he was told two months ago that the Joint Chiefs of Staff wanted the limitation on Chinese Nationalist forces lifted.

Earnest Hoherecht, UP's manager for Japan, said a staff officer in Tokyo informed him the Joint Chiefs had made their recommendation to President Truman.

Hoherecht flew here yesterday to speak at a banquet honoring the 20th birthday of the Richfield Reporter, pioneer West Coast news broadcaster.

He said he also knew that Gen. Douglas MacArthur "was promised time and again that reinforcements would be there by a certain, definite date. Several times those 'promise' dates came and went without badly needed troops arriving."

"I was told," Hoherecht said, "that General (Matthew) Ridgway—considered a 'Washington man'—offered to issue a statement supporting MacArthur's views when the fight was reaching the White House stage. MacArthur refused the offer, I was told, and said he would carry the burden of the battle alone."

MacArthur Dispute Sparks New Foreign Policy Probe

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Behind the fuss stirred up by President Truman's relieving General MacArthur of his Far Eastern commands, there is a much larger issue. This is the probing of America's whole foreign policy.

What new crisis will drive the MacArthur case off the air and the front pages cannot be predicted with certainty. But in the field of international relations it is pointing to more criticism of the State Department, another "re-examination" of foreign policy. And to personify the mistrust of this policy, there are already new demands for the firing of Dean Acheson as Secretary of State. Since President Truman freed General MacArthur, the general's defenders are demanding a scalp for a scalp.

The new trend seems to be a broad accusation that Secretary Acheson's policy is completely tied to the tail of the British lion. This is a variant of the former charge that State Department policy was dictated by Communists. Now it's the British Socialists who are supposed to be dictating American foreign policy moves.

One story going around is that Sir Oliver Franks, the British ambassador in Washington, called at the State Department and delivered his government's ultimatum that unless General MacArthur were replaced, the British would withdraw from the North Atlantic Pact.

THE story doesn't make sense on its face because the British need the North Atlantic Pact more than the United States. But for the record, it is officially denied as a complete lie by both the State Department and the British Embassy.

There are differences of opinion between the two governments:

1. The British object to some clauses in the draft of a Japanese peace treaty drawn up by John Foster Dulles. In particular, the British believe that the island of Formosa, now seat of Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist government, should be eventually—though not now—returned to the Chinese Communist government, and not annexed to Japan.

The U. S. position is that the Japanese should relinquish all claims to Formosa, but that actual settlement of the island's status is years away and cannot be foreseen now. In the meantime, it will remain the seat of the Chinese Nationalist government, which the U. S. still recognizes, though the British do not.

2. The British recognize Mao Tse-tung's government not because they approve of it, they say, but because it is in actual control of the China mainland. For the same reason, the British think Red China should be admitted to the United Nations, though they are not pushing such recognition now.

The U. S. government rejects both these positions.

In spite of its views on Red China, the British are supporting the war in Korea. They now have in Korea two infantry brigades of about 10,000 men and an aircraft carrier task force of 13 vessels manned by 12,000 men. The British are now moving to increase their ground forces in Korea to a full division.

The British have differed with the American tactical decisions in Korea. On the original crossing of the 38th parallel, the British learned through Indian Ambassador Panikar at Peking that if the UN forces made this move, the Chinese Communists would enter the war. On the basis of this report the British tried to argue the U. S. out of making this advance. But when the decision was made, the British troops supported it and fought right up to the Yalu.

The British position now is said to be that the UN commander—General Ridgway—cannot be taken in a tactical sense not to cross the 38th parallel again. But if any deep invasion of North Korea is to be made, the political situation should be reconsidered.

In these conflicting viewpoints of the two governments, it would seem that neither is leading the other around by a ring in the nose. There are many other issues on which they differ, and on which American views prevail.

HE went on summarizing the contents of Mrs. Grenable's diary in a weary voice:

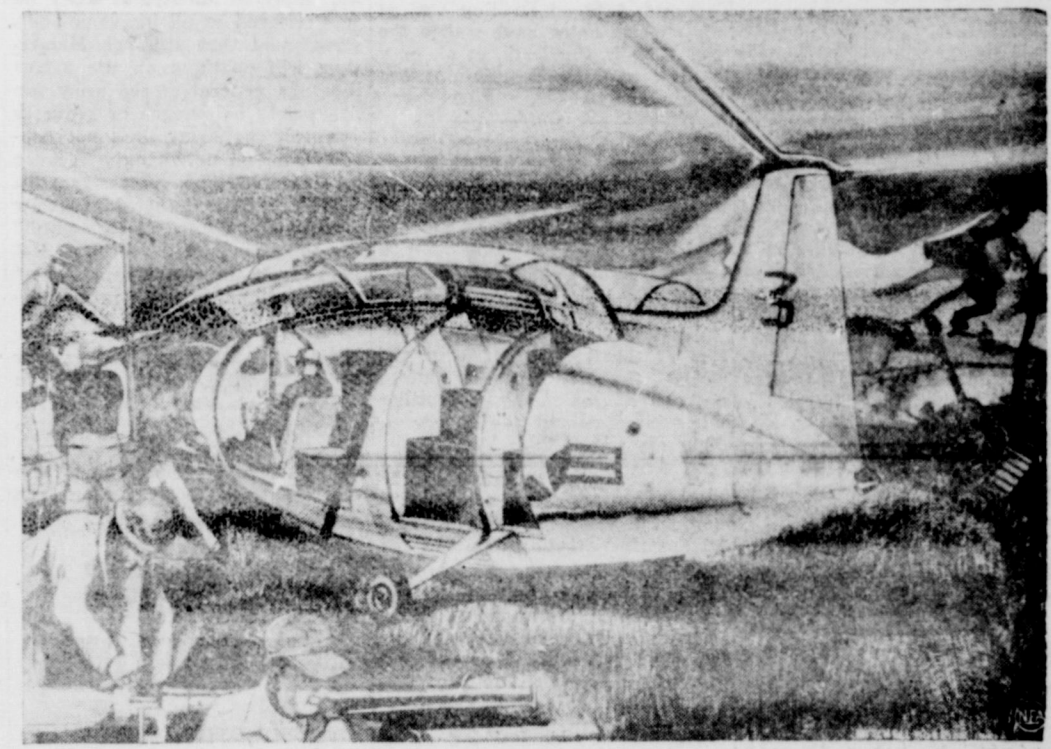

Ruffing Aims to Break N. Y. Whammy on Tribe

NEW YORK—(NEA)—A half dozen big major league clubs trained in the Pacific southwest. But for all the attention they attracted, five of them might just as well have conditioned elsewhere.

The Yankees swiped the performance, further demonstrating to the opposition how great they really are.

Capitalizing on the New York Americans' first invasion of the wild and woolly west, concessionaires loaded the parks with Yankee caps, bats, pennants, sketch books and whatnot.

Cubs, White Sox and Pirates had trained in California since the early 1920s. The Giants quartered in Los Angeles in '32-'33, in Phoenix the four years preceding their switch to St. Petersburg this spring. The Indians have spent five springs in Tucson. The Browns have trained in southern California before. So have the Athletics.

But when the Yankees hit Los Angeles, a newspaper headline screamed: "Big League Baseball Comes to Los Angeles for the First Time."

So the Yankees finished the training season with a new official record of 275,880 admissions, 130,000 in 12 games in California.

CASEY STENGEL's swaggering stalwarts moved into San Francisco Seals' Stadium on a Friday night, left their trunks in the visitors' clubhouse for the next two days, while they played in Oakland, across the bay. That left no room for the Indians, who were alternating with them, so the Cleveland athletes had to dress in their hotel rooms downtown, and travel to the park in monkey suits.

The Yankees came first, as usual. The Indians, especially, are sizzling at the fuss made about the Yankees while they practically were ignored.

The Tribe feels that it has run second to the Yankees long enough. New York is the only club that has beaten Cleveland in a seasonal series the past three years, and the 14 to 8 count last trip was the difference between them. The Bombers prevailed 12 to 10 in '49, by the same margin even when the Indians won their first pennant in 28 years in a playoff in '48.

Al Lopez hopes to do something about this. That's not the least reason why he brought in Charley Ruffing as a coach and George Stinewiss was purchased as infield insurance.

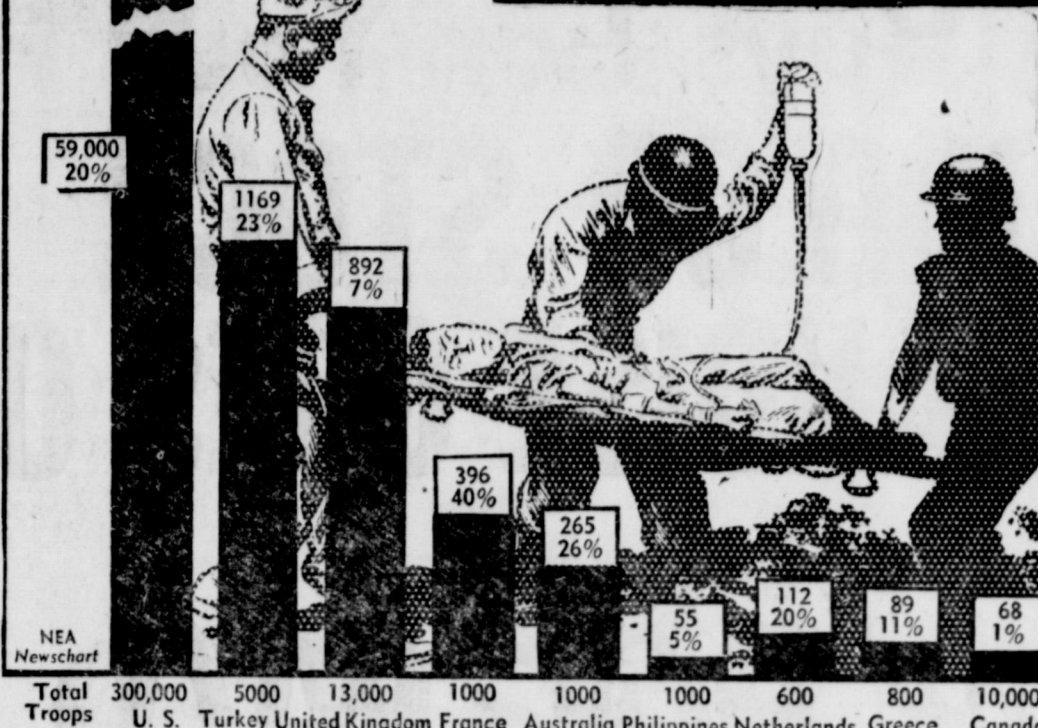

## UN Casualties in Korea



The Newschart above shows relative number of casualties suffered by major UN forces fighting in Korea. Also given are the percentage of casualties and the approximate total of troops supplied by each nation. Note the break in the bar representing U. S. losses. To show this bar in relative proportion to the others would require a chart about 12 feet high. In addition to the nine nations listed, several others have forces in Korea but have suffered negligible or no losses. These include: New Zealand, South Africa, Belgium, Thailand and Sweden. Highest percentage of casualties to troops involved was suffered by the French battalion attached to the U. S. 23rd Division. This unit suffered heavy losses in a delaying action during the first retreat north of Seoul and in hand-to-hand fighting near Wonju. The Turks also lost heavily in these actions.

## TRUMAN HAS A FIGHT TODAY IN MISSOURI DURING MEETING OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., April 24 (UP)—Ralph Truman, a cousin of the President, allegedly struck a young insurance man who criticized the chief executive, but both parties to the brief scuffle indicated today they were ready to forget the incident.

Neither Truman nor the Insurance Salesman, Lrry L. Eifffert, would say what the remark was that prompted the incident.

But most quoted by witnesses to the one-punch affair at the conclusion of yesterday's chamber of commerce meeting said the statement in effect was:

"They ought to use the Atom bomb on old Harry himself."

The witnesses said the group was leaving the building when Truman, a retired Brigadier General called to Eifffert.

Eifffert stopped, and the 71-year old Truman stepped up to him and delivered a blow to the young salesman's head, knocking his hat to the ground, it was reported.

Dr. John Davidson, American Legion commander, stepped between the two men and it was all over.


Truman, who retired from the Army in 1944, said today he had "no comment whatsoever" to make about the episode. He said, however, that he had made no effort to contact Eifffert after the incident and that as far as he knew, the insurance salesman had not tried to reach him.

## Mongolian Troops May Be In Korea

WASHINGTON, April 24 (UP)—Officials have received unconfirmed reports that Soviet-trained Mongolian troops have entered North Korea, it was learned today.

Some of the troops were said to be from Inner Mongolia, which is under Chinese influence. Other troops were said to be from outer Mongolia, which is virtually part of Russia.

The reports are not firm enough to justify United States Military or diplomatic action. Nevertheless, they fall into a pattern that has caused anxiety to rise.

The reports recalled House Speaker Sam Rayburn's recent warning that troops other than Chinese were massing on the Manchurian border. He said that the nation faced the greatest danger of an "expanded war" since World War II. At the time many congressmen said Rayburn was "crying wolf" to prod passage of a draft bill, but his remarks increased war tension in the capital.

## Glen McCarthy Is Sued By Sports Promoter

LOS ANGELES, April 24 (UP)—Wealthy Texas oilman Glen H. McCarthy goes to Federal Court today to defend himself in a \$210,000 damage suit brought by sports promoter Larry Rummans.

McCarthy, owner of the Shamrock Hotel in Houston was charged with having assaulted and beaten Rummans in a dispute over

arrangements for a professional football championship game.

Rummans' suit, filed in October, 1949, accused the husky millionaire of beating him in McCarthy's office at the Shamrock while hotel employes held Rummans on the floor.

The fight grew out of plans to promote a charity football game in Houston, December 17, 1949, between champions of the National and All-America football leagues.

In a deposition, McCarthy admitted a fight took place but said he was provoked when Rummans called him a "liar." He

denied that hotel employes held Rummans.

McCarthy also denied Rummans' charge that he was imprisoned in the hotel's "protective room" for two days.

### Rehash Details Of Dismissal

WASHINGTON, April 23 (UP)—President Truman and his Democratic Congressional leaders today "rehashed" the dismissal of Gen. Douglas MacArthur at their weekly White House conference.

Senate Democratic Leader Ernest W. McFarland and Speaker Sam Rayburn said the discussion was a "general rehash", but declined to give details.

"You couldn't talk anywhere now without talking about General MacArthur," McFarland said as he left the White House with Rayburn, Vice President Alben W. Barkley and House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack.

Meanwhile, Sen. James H. Duff R., Pa., demanded that the President and MacArthur both "come clean" on details of the conflict. Other Republican lawmakers attacked what they said is a "vicious smear campaign" by the administration against the General.

The White House kept silent on Saturday's New York Times dispatch which said an administration record of the Truman-MacArthur Wake Island conference last Oct. 15 showed the General was confident then the Chinese Communists would not enter the Korean War.

Presidential Press Secretary Joseph Short declined to say whether the President or the White House had any hand in

Attlee appointed two new ministers to succeed Aneurin Bevan and Harold Wilson, who resigned in protest against the British Re-armament Drive.

Attorney General Sir Hurtle Shawcross, Chief British Prosecutor at the Neunberg War Crimes Trials, was appointed to Wilson's post as President of the Board of Trade.

A comparative unknown, Alfred Robens, parliamentary secretary of fuel and power, was named to succeed Bevan as minister of Labor.

### Will Trade With Bolivia

WASHINGTON, April 24 (UP)—The United States and Bolivia have signed a short-term contract for delivery of Bolivian tin ore to Texas City, smelters, the State Department has announced.

The contract covers deliveries between March 1 and May 31 during which time the two countries will seek to arrange a long-term contract.

The United States set up a committee to study Bolivia's economic problems, especially its need for American technical and financial assistance in stepping up industrial and agricultural production.

### Murry Ill In Hospital

PITTSBURGH, April 24 (UP)—Phillip Murray, president of the Congress of Industrial Organizations, was reported critically ill in Mercy Hospital.

Murray, who also heads the CIO United Steelworkers Union, was admitted to the institution Sunday night with a "very severe adominal complaint."

The new hospital will be financed by a \$325,000 bequest from the estate of Rosa and Henry Ziegler of Galveston and a \$300,000 U. S. Public Health Service grant. The hospital will be named in honor of the Zieglers.

### LABOR MAY LOSE OUT

LONDON, April 23 (UP)—A second British Cabinet member resigned today, heightening the possibility that the Labor Government would fall and thus bring on a general election.

Harold Wilson, president of the board of trade, tossed in his job in support of fiery leader Aneurin Bevan whose resignation as Minister of Labor was announced last night.

The growing revolt presents Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee with the gravest crisis in his labor government since it swept into office in the closing days of World War II.

### Form A Club For Young Art MacArthur

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 23 (UP)—An Arthur MacArthur Club, with 13 youthful members was a going concern today.

Dwight Davenport, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Davenport, founded the club, organized yesterday when Dwight celebrated his 13th birthday. He said he got the idea of forging the club when he saw newspaper pictures of General MacArthur's son, also 13 years old.

Dwight observed that both he and the General's son lined sports and both played the piano.

Dwight said he organized the club "to fight Communism and make boys patriotic good Americans." Its slogan will be "America First."
