Eastland's hospital hopes were brighter Wednesday than in a long time because of the passage of the special water assessment proposal in a popular election.

Ridgway Stands By In Korea

TOKYO, June 28 (UP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's supreme United Nations headquarters stood by today for instructions from Washington on a possible Korean cease-fire conference.

Russia officially suggested to U. S. Ambassador Alan G. Kirk in Moscow yesterday that the North Korean and United Nations commanders negotiate a truce in the year-old war.

Headquarters officers kept a tight-lipped silence on the possibility of cease-fire talks, but observers here believed concrete developments might be near.

Presumably either Ridgway or Lt. Gen. James A. Van Fleet, commander of UN ground forces in Korea, would represent the Allies in any conference with the enemy.

Gunman Shoots His Ex-Wife

TULSA, Okla., June 28 (UP)—A 35-year-old Tulsan who critically wounded his ex-wife in a busy downtown Tulsa store said today that "there was no argument—I loved the girl, and I just shot her."

In a statement to police, the gunman said he had been "drinking for three or four weeks" before he entered the store where his ex-wife worked and shot her in the abdomen.

The victim, Goldie Russell, 35, was given "a fair chance" to recover. Police withheld charges against the suspect pending further reports on the wounded woman's condition.

The gunman, remarried and the father of three children, entered the store and walked over to the counter where the woman was employed as cashier. Clerks heard him say: "You'll die for this."

He drew a .32 caliber pistol and fired five times. The bullets broke glass in show counters and ricocheted off the walls, terrifying a score of Tulsa shoppers.

Mrs. Russell apparently was hit as she fled toward the rear of the store. Moaning, she crawled into a counter and lay there until an ambulance arrived.

The gunman wheeled and warned clerks and customers in the store: "Don't anyone move or I'll kill you." As he attempted to retreat from the scene, police said, a customer, J. E. Weichel, 30, carefully laid aside his glasses and grabbed him.

The suspect told officers he had been divorced from Mrs. Russell "four or five years."

Holding Special Election Now

WICHITA FALLS, June 28 (UP)—The Special Election shaping up over the vacancy created by resignation of congressman Ed Gossett had its fourth candidate today.

Walter Jenkins, 33, of Wichita Falls, administrative assistant to Texas Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson since 1946, announced his candidacy last night.

Gossett will vacate the office July 31 to become general counsel for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in Texas.

Already announced for the place were Judge Frank Icard of the Wagoner district of Stoneburg, and State Rep. Doug Crouch of Denton.

The 13th District which Gossett represents includes Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Wilbarger, Baylor, Throckmorton, Wichita, Archer, Young, Clay, Jack, Montague, Wise, Cooke and Denton counties.

Date of the special election to choose Gossett's successor will be set by Gov. Allan Shivers.

Jenkins moved his family back to Wichita Falls and said he is preparing to begin his campaign.

Archbishop Is Sentenced To 15 Year Term

BUDAPEST, Hungary, June 28 (UP)—Archbishop Josef Groesz was sentenced by a People's Court today to 15 years in prison for leading a plot to overthrow the Communist government.

Archbishop Groesz, who succeeded imprisoned Josef Cardinal Mindszenty as Roman Catholic Primate in Hungary, had been liable to a death sentence.

However, the 64-year-old Prelate had pleaded guilty to all four charges against him, announced that he was repentant, and asked for the mercy of the court in a final plea Tuesday.

In passing the sentence, the court announced that it had convicted the archbishop of leading an organization seeking to overthrow the government and restore the Hapsburg Monarchy, black marketing, aiding people to escape Hungary, and "crimes against the people."

Iran Ask Help From Truman

TEHRAN, Iran, June 28 (UP)

Premier Mohammed Mossadegh asked President Truman today to mediate Iran's explosive oil dispute with Britain and expressed hope that a solution could be found.

The ailing premier voiced his concern, at the same time, least not to be depressed with the three two-year sentences running consecutively. He expected more, he said.

AUSTIN, June 28 (UP)—The Texas Adjutant General's Department said today that three units of the Texas National Guard 49th Armored Division had received superior ratings for performance in the field.

The awards came after the division finished a two-week field training period at Camp Polk, La. The units were identified as Company D, 146th Armored Infantry Battalion, Atlanta; Company B, 386th Armored Engineer Battalion, Brenham; and Company C, 117th Armored Medical Battalion, Clarksville.

A. P. Merritt, president of the Merritt Tool Company of Kilgore, announced that his company had signed a multi-million dollar contract with the U. S. Air Force, to recondition, repair, and de-mouth ball non-aeronautical equipment.

He said the program would continue six or seven years and would bring Kilgore workers some \$3,000,000 in payroll checks.

Lie Detector To Be Used

AMARILLO, June 28 (UP)—Police turned to a lie detector test today to determine the truthfulness of a 27-year-old man's denial that he raped a nine-year-old three times last Monday night.

The suspect, arrested in Borger, yesterday, denied the charge despite the girl's identification of him as her attacker.

The arrest of the suspect, who gave Tulsa, Okla., as his home, ended for the moment a widespread manhunt in the Panhandle area.

Police were looking for a man about 30-years-old who picked up the little girl in his car, attacked her, and then tried to run over her with his automobile when he let her out on a highway about ten miles from here.

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Defence Witnesses Continue Testimony On Venue Question

FBI AND OSI AGENTS INVESTIGATE STORY

SAN ANTONIO, June 28 (UP)—FBI and OSI Agents today investigated a youthful sentry's story of how a mysterious masked man attacked and disarmed him as he guarded a highly-secret Air Force security center here.

Air Force officers indicated they believe the assailant may have sought to steal secret Air Force codes from the security center at Brooks Air Base.

A "full report" of the alleged attack on Pfc. Francis McGill, 19, New York City, will be made today to Brig. Gen. R. H. Lynn, Base Commander. It was not known whether the report would be made public.

The incident, kept secret until last night, occurred Tuesday evening within the shadows of the Brooks Headquarters Building, known to San Antonio residents as "the brain of the Air Force."

McGill, a Russian language student at the Brooks security center, told officers that a masked man crept up behind him as he walked his guard post. He said the man slapped him and disarmed him of his carbine.

Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the office of strategic information joined the Air Police and Bexar County Sheriff's officers in an investigation of the case.

Lynn refused to say whether any government property was missing from the base. But he said McGill had a loaded carbine when he went on guard detail and did not have it after the reported attack.

McGill told Sheriff Angel Sticklebault that he heard footsteps behind him and turned to see a man dressed in fatigue clothes approaching.

"I told him to halt, but he didn't," McGill, son of a New York policeman, said. "I pulled the bolt of my carbine back and shoved a round into the chamber. But before I could fire, he hit me in the face, with what I thought was a rolled-up magazine. It socked hell out of me. He grabbed the carbine and ran."

The sentry said the assailant had a white handkerchief tied around his face and was "a big man—about six feet tall."

The entire Brooks Guard Force mustered quickly and called upon the Bexar County Sheriff's Office for help. Together the units searched Berg's Mills, a residential settlement near the base. McGill said his attacker fled in that direction.

Deputies said FBI agents questioned McGill carefully and the young soldier "stuck with his story."

McGill, described by Sheriff Sticklebault as "sort of a studious boy with glasses," was on guard duty as part of his regular assignment. He is with the 6923rd Process Squadron at Brooks and listed as a Russian language student at the security center.

Bus Bandit Is Shot In Head

HOUSTON, June 28 (UP)—Houston's so-called bus bandit tried his eighth holdup last night and that one was a mistake.

The 28-year-old Negro was shot in the head by a passenger on a loaded Nance bus. Today he was in Jefferson Davis Hospital in a critical condition and under charges of robbery by firearms.

Ironically, the bus bandit on the Nance run—L. W. Martin, Jr.—was the same man the bandit held up on June 15 in the first of the fast-moving series of holdups.

Police identified the wounded man as Joe Willie Harp. He was shot by A. O. Murphy, 37, who fired a total of six shots at the man. The bus was carrying 25 persons.

After the shooting, police went to Harp's home and found money believed to have been obtained from the other holdups.

Defence witnesses continued to testify today that in their opinion Horace Walker, indicted on charges of embezzling Eastland County funds while working as an agent of the county collecting delinquent taxes, could not receive a fair trial in Eastland County.

Attorneys for the defense said that at least all day Thursday would be required to present their witnesses. Frank Sparks, attorney for the state, assisting District Attorney Elzo Been, said that the state would offer at least as many witnesses as the defense, which indicates that the hearing on a change of venue in the case will continue at least until Saturday.

Walker contends that he can not receive a fair trial in the county because there is a wide spread prejudice against him. While holding a delinquent tax contract in the county he filed many suits against citizens of the county.

Defense attorney Ivan Irwin of Dallas said that the case will be requested to move the case to Taylor County, if the change of venue motion is granted.

Eleven witnesses, called by the defense, were heard Wednesday afternoon. All testified that they were of the opinion that Walker could not get a fair trial in the county, or that they doubted that he could receive a fair trial here.

B. E. Garner, Ranger theatre owner, testified upon cross-examination that he expects to realize about \$30,000 profit from property purchased at tax sales brought by Walker.

Defense Attorney Irwin asked Garner, "In your business, the theatre business, you come in contact with a great number of people, do you not?"

"No sir, not now," Garner replied laughing. "I used to, back nights, but not any more."

Oscar Lyerla, former county Democratic chairman, testified that it was "possible but not probable" that Walker could get a fair trial in the county.

Joe Dennis, Ranger; Paul McFarland, Eastland; W. H. Collins, Carbon; Tom Stark, Cisco; W. W. Gilbert, Gorman; Miss Eusa Lindley, Gorman; Fleming Waters, Cisco; Ray Fryer, Eastland; and Joe Parker, Gorman, all testified for the defense, Thursday.

Judge Floyd Jones, Breckenridge, who is sitting in for Judge George Davenport in the case, overruled a motion by the defense Thursday morning to quash the indictments. The jury panel was dismissed until 9 a.m. Monday. Judge Jones said that the panel will be dismissed if the change of venue is granted.

Court was adjourned at 5 p.m. Wednesday, re-opening at 9 a.m. Thursday with more witnesses presented by the defense.

FARMERS MAY LOSE MEXICAN LABOR AS COTTON PICKERS

AUSTIN, June 28 (UP)—Farmers in 52 Texas counties are in danger of losing Mexican labor as a source of cotton pickers because of alleged discriminatory practices, the Texas Council on Human Relations reported today.

Thomas S. Sutherland, Council Executive Director, revealed that the counties "may find that they do not satisfy the clause requiring no discriminatory conditions when they apply for Mexican farm labor," under an agreement with the Mexican government.

He said that action should be taken "because otherwise farmers may invest in premature trips to Mexico in search of labor."

"Unless immediate action is taken to prevent it," he said, "careless human relations will rob the farmer of his labor and the merchant of his profit from sales to cotton pickers in about 50 Texas Counties."

The list included some of Texas' most popular counties—Bexar, Dallas, Jefferson and Tarrant. However, Sutherland said that at least one county—Caldwell—was taking steps "to remove any accusation of discrimination."

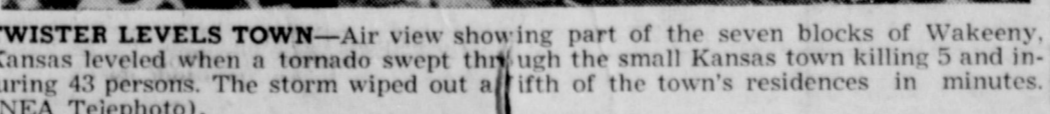
He said that a delegation from that county had visited him and expressed intention to clear itself of any such charges.

Sutherland said these counties were in danger of losing Mexican farm labor: Andrews, Bee, Bandera, Bexar, Bastrop, Bosque, Brazoria, Caldwell, Cass, Coleman, Clay, Colorado, Comal, Crane, Dallas, Denton, DeWitt, Eastland, Ector, Erath, Fayette, Fort Bend, Freestone, Gaines, Gillespie, Gonzales, Guadalupe, Hays, Jackson, Jefferson, Kent, Knox, LaSalle, Live Oak, Marion, Matagorda, Upson, Menard, Milam, Red River, Refugio, Walker, Rockwall, San Patricio, Somervell, Tarrant, Victoria, Wharton, Wichita, Williamson, Winkler and Young.

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Texas Soldier Being Held On Murder Charge

BIG DELTA, Alaska, June 28 (UP)—Chester D. Pitts, 27-year-old Terrell, Tex., soldier, was being held by the army here today on a charge of manslaughter in the shooting of Pvt. Herbert E. Brown, 19, of Denver, Colo.

Army investigators yesterday released details of the slaying, saying Brown was shot after he passed up Pitts on the Alaska highway after Pitts' car had broken down. The car driven by Pitts stalled about three miles northwest of Big Delta, the investigators said, and he attempted to flag down a truck driven by Brown.

The GI and a passenger in the truck either did not see or ignored Pitts' signal, officers said.

Angered, Pitts took his .30 caliber hunting rifle from the stalled sedan and fired three shots in the direction of the truck, investigators said.

One of the slugs entered the cab of the truck and deflected into Brown's head, killing him instantly.

Tenant Farmer Invents New Weevil Killer

HENDERSON, June 28 (UP)

Farmers in this area today praised a "dream" invention of a 50-year-old Rusk County cotton raiser that exterminates boll weevils. E. E. Perry, a tenant farmer with 11 children, said he "clearly saw his invention in a dream" last summer after he had unsuccessfully fought the cotton-killing weevil in his 30-acre patch.

He demonstrated the "dream" contraption yesterday in a field of lush cotton near here. Some 50 skeptical farmers and civic leaders witnessed the test.

During the demonstration, Perry drove a tractor with machine attached up and down eight rows of cotton on the Charlie Brown farm, three miles east of Henderson.

Perry's complicated-looking machine works this way:

A tank filled with the inventor's own special insecticide is on the hood of the tractor. This fluid flows downward through twin "tunnels" past the hot exhaust pipes of the tractor.

The heat from the exhaust vaporizes the fluid and it is then sprayed through nozzles onto the roots of cotton. A large metal tray rests under the tractor to catch the falling weevils.

After the test, Perry proudly called for the farmer present to

come "and take a look." Several weevils, larvae, eggs, and other insects pulled the plate from under the tractor and it was filled with dead insects. The farmers minutely examined each of the dead insects, and they hailed the machine as being "revolutionary and history making."

in the cotton industry. Having passed its test, Perry proudly stated that at last his "dream had come true."

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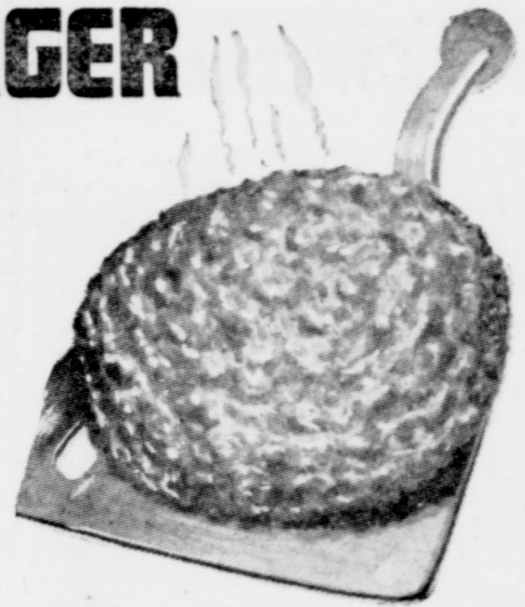

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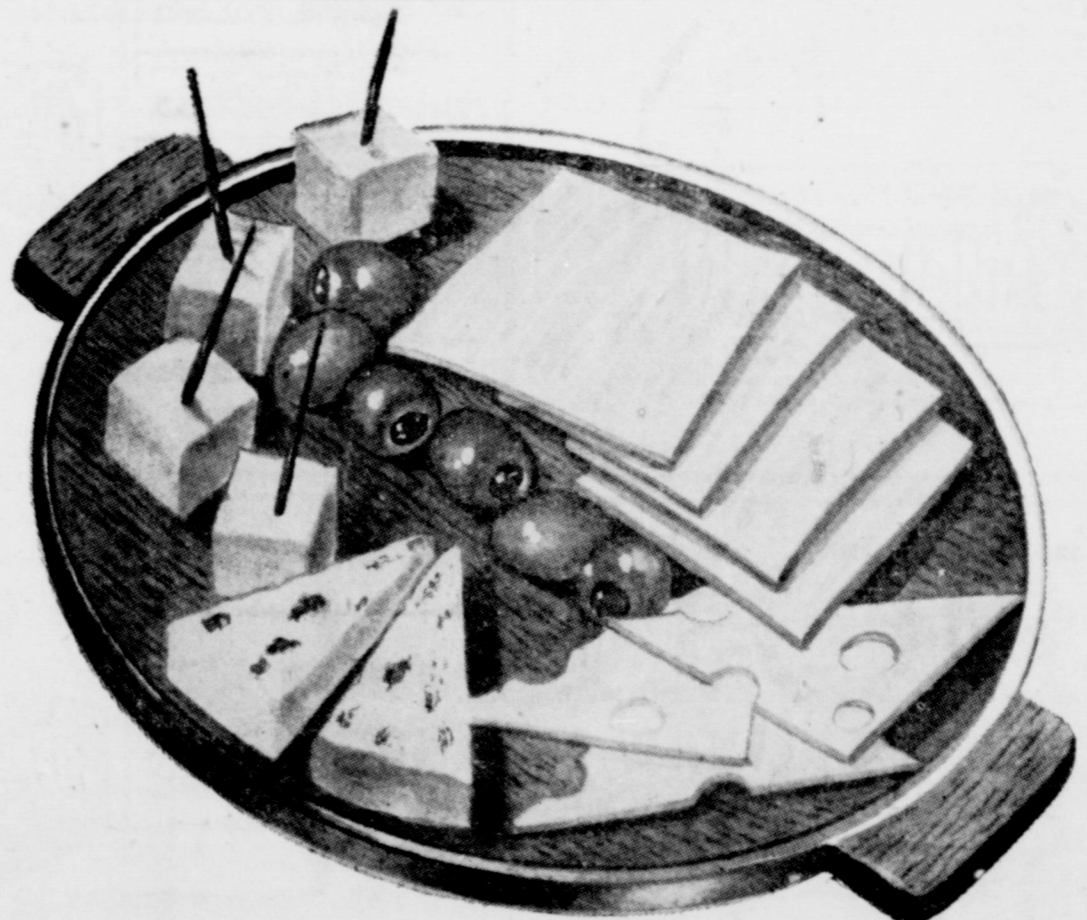

Youths Smug After Arrest

ARLINGTON, Va., June 28 (UP)—Two husky youths, smug and smart alecky, showed little concern today that they may face death for dragging a 19-year-old bride from her bed and raping her four times.

One "guessed" he would go to the electric chair. Officials said neither of the confessed abductor rapists appeared worried.

The two held in jail are John R. Pirk, 19, Arlington, and William R. Payne, 25 Bethesda, Md., both automobile mechanics.

They calmly showed police yesterday where they attacked Mrs. Nancy Ann Hotchkiss, beautiful blonde socialite from Winnetka, Ill., at a recreation spot not far from the nation's capital after kid-

napping her early yesterday.

The two had dragged the bride of only eight days through a window of her ground floor apartment while her husband, Ens. James K. Hotchkiss, lay helpless in their bed—covered by a rifle. The girl, who had been unclothed, was permitted to put on a blue negligee. Hotchkiss, a recent Dartmouth graduate, is assigned to the Pentagon.

Polk and Payne were captured within two hours after the kidnapping. Held without bond, they were charged with burglary and abduction with attempt to commit rape. They faced probable rape charges in Fairfax County, where the rape occurred. The maximum penalty for rape in Virginia is death.

Arlington Commonwealth Attorney Denman Rucker said Polk and Payne started "joking about the whole thing" as soon as they were arrested.

Republicans Plan Leaving The Red Dean Without Operating Funds...

WASHINGTON, June 28 (UP)—Republicans devised a new plan of attack on the State Department today. Their scheme: to leave the department without any operating funds when the 1951 fiscal year ends Saturday night.

An emergency measure to keep the State Department and all other federal agencies in operation through the month of July was approved by the House Appropriations Committee yesterday.

This is the customary procedure to follow when appropriations bills are still in the legislative mill near the end of a fiscal year. Ordinarily there is little or no opposition to this procedure.

But Rep. A. L. Miller, R. Neb., and his GOP colleagues told newsmen they have several objections to the present measure. Miller wants to eliminate the State Department from the list of agencies that can go on spending money.

Rep. John Taber, R. N. Y., wants to make the Federal Agencies stick to the reductions which the House and Senate have approved in various forms.

Both Miller and Taber plan to offer their proposals when the emergency spending measure is called up for House consideration tomorrow.

North Korea Is Asking A Voice

TOKYO, June 28 (UP)—Communist North Korea has asked to be given a voice in a Japanese peace conference demand by Russia.

The Soviet Union made the demand June 10 in a note to United States Ambassador Alan G. Kirk in Moscow, stipulating that Communist China should participate also.

The North Korean request was broadcast by the Red Pyongyang radio and heard in Tokyo. It said Korea for 40 years had been under Japanese domination and many Koreans died under Japanese pressure. It added that Korea is a neighbor country of Japan and that the two maintain close relations.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 27 (UP)—A crazed gunman who wanted to "shoot me a couple of cops" will start showering down (with information) now that they know we mean business.
