FOR hot weather eating you'll enjoy this chicken mousse:

Chicken Mousse
(Makes 8 servings)

One envelope unflavored gelatin, ¼ cup cold water, 3 instant chicken bouillon cubes, 1½ cups boiling water, few grains pepper, 2 cups chopped cooked or canned chicken, ¼ cup chopped celery, 1 tablespoon minced onion, ¼ cup chopped sweet gherkins, ½ cup mayonnaise.

Soften gelatin in cold water. Dissolve bouillon cubes in boiling

Spoon into mold; chill until set. Unmold. Garnish with sliced olives, cucumbers and watercress. Serve with additional mayonnaise.

This recipe can be served either hot or cold. It takes very little kitchen time:

Spicy Smoked Shoulder Butt
(Makes 8-12 servings)

Two and one-half to four-pound smoked shoulder butt, 6 whole cloves, 1 small bay leaf, ½ teaspoon celery seed, ½ cup cider vinegar, 1 sliced onion.

Place shoulder butt in a deep kettle; cover with water and add cloves, bay leaf, celery seed, vinegar and onion. Cover tightly and simmer until tender. Allow 40 to 45 minutes per pound for cooking.

Sour Cream Dressing
(Makes 1½ cups)

Three tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon paprika, 1 teaspoon dry mustard, 1 cup sour cream, ¼ cup cider vinegar.

Combine dry ingredients and mix well. Fold in sour cream. Add cider vinegar and mix well. Serve cold.
