





Ramsey, who was elected lieutenant governor from a field of 12 candidates in 1950, is a native of San Augustine, a lawyer and for mer Representative and state Sena tor and Secretary of State of Tex

Principal duties of the lieuten ant governor include acting as governor in the absence of the state's chief executive and serving as presiding officer of the senate. Ramsey outlined a seven-point re-election platform. He called for both economy and honesty in government; less, better and cheape


