Recent disclosures of very shocking irregularities in high places in our government, has in way added the more or less unsuspecting public. When we consider the past those things that have been done in opposition to law and order, we are not greatly surprised.

France Gets New Premier

PARIS, March 5 (UP)—A little-known French politician has agreed to take on the task of guiding his country through its worst post-war crisis.

Sixty-year-old Antoine Pinay, an Independent, accepted the job of forming a new government to replace the one that fell last week over the defeat of a tax-increase bill to help pay for western defense.

Pinay faces the huge task of staving off bankruptcy under a record high budget. If he fails, France may find itself nearer to accepting General De Gaulle and his extreme right-wing followers.

119 Dead In Train Wreck

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, March 5 (UP)—Casualties in what is believed to be the worst train wreck in Brazil's history are estimated at 119 dead and more than 250 injured.

The accident occurred yesterday 25 miles from Rio De Janeiro at the height of the morning rush. Authorities said a passenger train derailed on a bridge and another commuter train smashed into the derailed coaches.

A near tragedy was averted in Gary, Ind., when two crowded commuter trains collided. A total of 65 persons were injured. Six were hospitalized but not seriously hurt.

The accident occurred when a train from Chicago slipped through an open switch, ramming the rear of another train stopped at a station. Witnesses said casualties might have been higher if the moving train had not slowed down at the station.

In Manchester, England, a double-deck bus went out of control and smashed into a line of school children. Four were killed and six seriously injured. The casualties ranged in age from six to 12 years. Witnesses said it was raining heavily when the bus struck an Army truck and then careened out of control.

ASC President Denies Asking Prof. To Resign

ARLINGTON—March 5 (UP)—Arlington State College President E. H. Hereford says English professor Kenneth Rockwell resigned of "his own free will" after being accused of telling obscene stories in class at the college.

Rockwell—who is an associate professor of English, asserted yesterday that Hereford told him he could resign or be fired. Hereford denied this, saying he didn't ask for Rockwell's resignation.

Rockwell has termed the accusations "ridiculous," and says he plans to make formal protest through his attorney with the board of directors of Texas A & M College, Arlington is part of the A & M system.

Lions Club Pays Visit To High School; Lunch At The Cafeteria

In deference to faculty members and student bodies of Eastland Public Schools, and in celebration of Texas Public School Week, Eastland Lions went in a body to the High School cafeteria for their weekly luncheon and meeting Monday. The occasion was both educational and inspirational, and to a man, the Lions enjoyed it all.

For a while after it was decided to go to the school, some wondered if it would be too much of a burden on those in charge of the cafeteria, but their fears were dispelled immediately upon arrival. Why that group handled the thirty or more full grown Lions, as well as 50 members of the McMurray College Band, along with their regular two or three hundred diners, just as though nothing special had happened.

Everything went off in apple pie order, and if anybody left hungry it was their own fault. One of the women in charge (presumably a teacher) told the Lions that they would be treated just like the children—if the first plate wasn't enough, all they had to do was back up their carts for

128 Pints Of Blood Donated To Armed Forces Yesterday

One-hundred and twenty-eight pints of blood were donated to the Armed Forces by citizens of Ranger and other Eastland County towns and communities yesterday afternoon and evening.

Mrs. Angie Everett of Eastland was the first donor in line and the first one to give a pint of blood. Giving blood was no novelty for her, she gave a full gallon for use by the Armed Forces during World War Two.

Three men gave blood yesterday afternoon who presented no problem to the technicians as to which arm they would take it from. Fire Chief Charlie Isbell, Jess Weaver and Shelby Parnell, of Ranger, were among the most willing givers despite the fact that all three of them are minus one arm.

The processing of the applicants who wanted to donate blood, the actual taking and handling of the donors after they had given was well organized and efficiently handled by the Red Cross personnel and the volunteer workers from this area.

Upon entering the basement of the Ranger First Methodist church each donor was given a form to fill out with questions pertaining to his or her general health, which was taken to two volunteer typists who made out donor forms. From the first room you were sent to another station where you were asked more questions and your temperature was taken. Some of the applicants were stopped here due to having a fever from some minor ailment. From the temperature station you were sent into another room where Red Cross technicians took samples of your blood for typing and your blood pressure was taken. A quick test was given your blood for iron content by putting a drop of it in copper sulfate, if the droplet of blood sank to the bottom then your blood contained iron and you were eligible to give.

From there you went to a table where you were given a flask and the number of the flask was numbered on a corresponding card with your name on it.

Then you took the flask and headed for the actual donation. Ten beds were in operation yesterday

making the process quick and cutting down waiting time after you got to this point. In this screened off room you were told to lie down on a bed and your arm was cleaned with disinfectant by a nurse and the vein from where the blood was taken was located and the needle was inserted. You were given a round cylinder to hold in your hand to squeeze, a few minutes later the flask was full, you had given your blood and you were sent on. After you left the table you were taken into another room where coffee, water, Cokes, and other fluids were given you and a 15 minute rest period of eating was prescribed.

Everything was painless, no one got excited and seemingly all of the donors were enjoying themselves and getting a big kick out of giving their blood.

Ranger had set up a typing system of its own to take blood types for a master file for Ranger, and quite a number of people were having their blood typed for this file.

Tickets will be on sale, and men who are not fathers may find it possible to have as his guest boys who would not be present otherwise. This is to be the 22nd annual banquet. It was established in 1930, by Judge J. E. Hightman.

Cisco Boy In Marine Corps

Private Johnnie L. Courtney, son of John N. Courtney of Cisco, is now undergoing training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, Calif.

During the eight-week "Boot-Camp", as recruit training is commonly called, Private Courtney will become well versed in such basic military subjects as precision drill, first aid, Marine Corps history and mission, and field tactics.

Three weeks of the training period is spent at the Camp Matthews Rifle Range, situated 15 miles north of San Diego. While there, Private Courtney will fire the .30 caliber Garand rifle, 45 caliber pistol, .30 caliber carbine and a Browning Automatic Rifle. He will also receive indoctrination firing with the light and heavy machine guns, 60 and 81 mortars, flame throwers and the latest type bazookas.

Low Pressure System Over Gulf Mexico

Mild, well-behaved weather is the picture in Texas today, but the US Weather Bureau says a low pressure system is picking up Gulf of Mexico moisture, and may bring it northward "within a few days." The rain is desperately needed to stem a drought which caused the U. S. Department of Agriculture to declare all of Texas a "disaster area," insofar as farming is concerned. However, the weatherman cautiously noted that the showers don't show on current weather maps. It is partly cloudy this morning, and considerably warmer weather is forecast during the afternoon.

Forecasters said light drizzling rain will fall in the Panhandle and Pecos Valley regions tonight, but added that it will be of little aid to agriculture. Low temperatures this morning ranged from Amarillo's 23 degrees to 60 at Brownsville.

And despite recent rains, the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Austin said the state's drought is still unbroken over the western half of the state. The USDA said in its weekly crop and weather bulletin today that wheat has made "fair to good" progress in North Texas, and in Southern wheat countries of the High Plains.

However, the bulletin said the crop is only holding its own in the Northern Panhandle. The report said oats, winter legumes, and pastures in the eastern part of the state are "coming along fast." It said recent rains have been very beneficial to the blackland eastern counties.

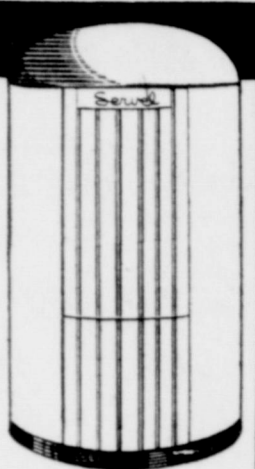

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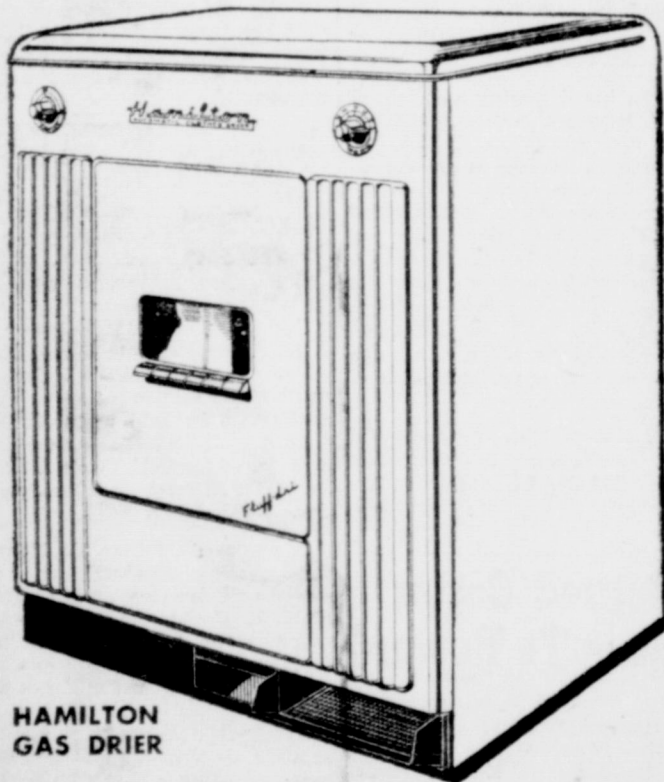
