### Three Brothers Race To Death

HARLINGEN, March 14 (UP)—Three brothers were killed early today near Harlingen when the two new automobiles they were racing crashed into a Southern Pacific freight train.

The victims were identified as 25-year-old Billy Earl Noolen and Mack W. Noolen, about 32, both employed at the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station . . . and James Harrison Noolen, 37, a Rio Hondo mechanic.

The crash occurred at a crossing five miles east of Harlingen on the recently opened Port Harlingen Road at 1:46 a.m.

Highway Patrolman Vernon Wyatt says the men were racing the two cars when the lead automobile collided with the train at high speed. The other car, Wyatt says, "followed him right on in."

The Highway Patrolman says James and Mack Noolen were killed instantly. Billy Earl Noolen died two hours later at Harlingen's Valley Baptist Hospital.

Their parents are Mr. and Mrs. J. Ernest Noolen who for years have operated a Boy Scout Camp at Rio Hondo.

Billy Earl Noolen is survived by a wife and three sons, his brother, James, by a wife and two sons, and Mack Noolen by a wife, a son and a daughter.

### Cattle Raisers Are To Meet In Fort Worth, March 17-19

FORT WORTH.—For the 75th time cattlemen will gather for the annual convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association to be held here March 17-19.

The site of the 75th convention will be in modern Hotel Texas in contrast to the first meeting of the organization held under a large oak tree in the frontier village of Graham, Texas in February of 1877.

Since its initial meeting the organization has grown from a handful of cattlemen in Northwest Texas to a membership of more than 10,000 in 16 states and has become the nation's largest association of cowmen, representing the ownership of more than three and a half million cattle.

The basic creed written the day the Association was organized has never been altered: "The members of this association shall work together for the good and common interest of all stock raisers, and do all within their power for the promotion of the stock interests."

The Association was formed during the era of the open range, and many of its early activities centered around the organization of the round-ups, trail drives and protection against theft. Today 29 full-time inspectors are employed to give protection service to members and market inspectors are on hand to check brands and ownership of cattle at every major market in the Southwest.

A new speaker announced by president Ray W. Willoughby of San Angelo is Marvin Jones, chief judge, United States Court of Claims, Texas and is a graduate of the University of Texas law school. He practiced law in the Panhandle of Texas and was elected to Congress from the 13th Congressional District in 1916. He served 20 years on the House Committee on Agriculture and was its chairman from 1931 to 1940. He became chief judge of the Court of Claims in 1947.

Speakers previously announced are Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas; Lt. Gen. Robert Wells Harper, commanding general of the Air Training Command with headquarters at Scott Air Force Base, Ill.; Ljc. Oscar Flores, director

of the Mexico-United States Commission for the Eradication of Foot and Mouth Disease in Mexico; Porter M. Jarvis, executive vice-president and director of Swift and Company, Chicago and Harold Cooley, member of Congress from North Carolina and chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture.

A full program of entertainment has been arranged beginning with a dance in the lobby of Hotel Texas, Monday, March 17th. The association has issued a cordial invitation to all cattlemen, regardless of Association membership, to attend business sessions of the convention.

The two youths admit being AWOL from Lowry Air Force Base at Denver. The FBI said the three admit burglaries in Colorado, Texas, West Virginia, Florida, Utah and Georgia.

All committees which had served in the program for the new parsonage met in joint committee meeting and informal social evening at the new parsonage on Thursday evening.

### M. D. Fox Family Moving To India

M. D. Fox, Vocational Agricultural teacher in the Eastland Schools for the past three years, has resigned to accept a position with the United States Department of Agricultural in the office of Foreign Agricultural Relations, as Agricultural Technician in the government's Point IV program.

He is leaving today for Washington, D. C. where he will spend two weeks. He will then be joined by his family, and they are to fly from La Guardia Field to New Delhi, India. They are to go via London, Rome, Cairo and will then be assigned a permanent location, somewhere in India.

The purpose of this mission is to assist the Indian government and farmers in improving their agricultural methods, in an effort to increase their food production, which is as a rule antiquated and found lagging.

# Snyder Announces Re-Organization Plans For Bureau

## Adequate Facilities Made For Care Of Stock Show Animals; No Entry Fee Will Be Charged

Exhibitors at the annual Eastland County Livestock Show to be held at the old Airport one mile north of Eastland on March 28 and 29 will find adequate facilities for taking care of their animals show officials have reported.

A wash rack has been constructed large enough to take care of several calves, cows or pigs at one time. The hanger is large, roomy, well lighted both naturally and artificially when needed. All livestock is to be housed inside. Cattle and swine are to be in the big hanger at the airport while sheep and goats will occupy one of the smaller buildings. Eastland City officials have proven very cooperative in the undertaking it was said. The city owns the land and buildings.

S. P. Crofts, Cisco, President of the County Livestock Raisers Association, sponsors of the show, advised that practically everything is in readiness for the event.

There is no entry fee for the show on both adult and Junior exhibitors are urged to enter their animals for the two day show. They have to be on the ground and in place, properly entered with the respective superintendents by 10: o'clock on the morning of the opening day, C. M. McCain, General Show Manager said.

There are no facilities for showing either poultry or turkeys, however, officials indicated.

The horse show to be held in connection with the affair will be under the direction of Sig Faircloth and Pete Tindall, both of Eastland who have wide acquaintance with horse men from over the state.

The show arena for livestock has been built large enough to take care of all animals in any one class and is outside of the buildings.

## Prisoners Riot In Jail Quited With Tear Gas

HOUSTON, March 14 (UP)—The Harris county jail at Houston is reported "peaceful and quiet" today following last night's rioting, window-breaking, riot by 29 prisoners.

The demonstration was quelled only after deputies pumped six tear gas shells into one block, and Sheriff C. V. (Buster) Kern came to the jail to talk personally with the rioters. The red-eyed prisoners had wrapped blankets over their heads as makeshift protection against the tear gas.

Before the revolt was quieted they smashed numerous window panes, ripped a lavatory from the wall and hurled pieces of broken plumbing at jailers attempting to enter their cell block.

Kern says today he talked to the men in groups of five and that most complained of solitary confinement meted out to 18-year-old Don Tracy (Bucky) Cook for fighting with another prisoner yesterday.

## New York-Chicago Collectors Will Be The First Out

Secretary of the Treasury John Snyder has announced the first step he's going to take in his re-organization of the Internal Revenue Department.

Snyder says the Internal Revenue Collectors' offices in New York and Chicago will be replaced next month.

The reform plan—which was approved by Congress yesterday—abolishes the offices of 64 tax collectors and 14 district supervisors. Those politically-appointed jobs will be put under civil service and all operating functions of the Federal Tax Service will be placed in 21 to 25 district offices.

Snyder says a non-political district commissioner will take charge of all federal tax operations in each of the two cities named today. In addition New York will have three deputy commissioners and the Chicago commissioner will have one. The Treasury secretary says the new district commissioners and deputies haven't been selected, but in any event they will have to qualify under civil service regulations.

House tax scandal investigators have subpoenaed more New Yorkers for questioning about their financial affairs. Members of a House Ways and Means sub-committee are trying to show that some tax collection employees accumulated considerable sums of money despite their comparatively small government salaries.

The case of a former tax collector is scheduled to go to federal jury at St. Louis today. James Finnegan—former collector of internal revenue at St. Louis—is charged with bribery and misconduct in office.

A former treasury official says congress is to blame for inflated prices. Former under-secretary of the treasury A. L. M. Higgins—in testimony on a joint congressional committee—says it's hard to stabilize our economy when congress appropriates more money for federal spending than it provides in taxes.

## Kefauver Gets Houston Backers

HOUSTON, March 14 (UP)—A hundred Houstonians have formed a Kefauver-for-President Club and agreed on what they call a "high-level, deliberate campaign" in behalf of the Tennessee Democratic Senator.

At an organizational meeting last night Houston Attorney Cyril J. Smith, one-time classmate of Sen. Estes Kefauver at Yale University, was elected chairman. The meeting was set up by Ernest (Soapy) Gilliam of Fort Worth, the principal Texas Kefauver booster.

Generous expressions of appreciation were voiced by top college officials upon announcement of the gift.

Work is expected to begin April 1, and will have a floor area of 62,000 square feet, making it one of the largest in Texas. It is to be a three-story, 162 room structure, ready for occupancy by the time the 1953 fall semester begins.

Announcement of the generous gift from the Mabec Foundation marks the second gift from the foundation received within recent months at Abilene Christian College. In October the foundation set up a \$10,000 loan fund for worthy ACC students.

## WORLD NEWS BRIEFS

President Truman will fly north from his vacation headquarters at Key West, Florida, today. He'll stop overnight in Washington to see his wife and her ailing mother at Blair House, then fly on to New York tomorrow to address a group of school newspaper editors. Mr. Truman plans to return to Key West after the speech for another two weeks of vacation.

Secretary of State Dean Acheson has accused Russia of plotting to confuse and weaken free world unity with an economic conference to be held in Moscow April 3rd. Acheson says one purpose of the

meeting is to organize pressures in non-communist countries against current restrictions on the export of strategic materials to the Soviet bloc.

The Wage Stabilization Board has asked steelmakers and the C-I-O United Steelworkers for comment on a fact-finding report written by its special steel panel. The report will be the basis for the board's recommendation on settling the steel wage dispute. The industry and union were asked to state their views by Tuesday, so that the board can go to work swiftly on a set of proposals. The board is working against a strike deadline that could shut down the basic industry at midnight, March 23rd.

French Premier Antonin Pinay has promised General Eisenhower that the French Government will fulfill its West-European defense commitments to the best of its ability. The pledge came at a 50-minute conference between the general, the premier and defense Minister Rene Pleven. Eisenhower said he had intended just a "courtesy call" on the new premier—but it developed into a formal conference.

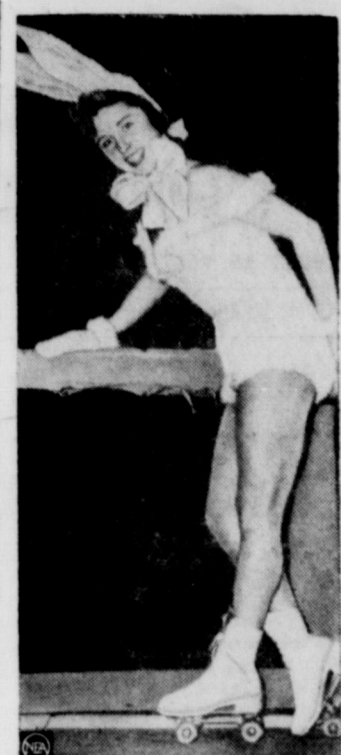

### Ousted Cuban Chief Leaving

HAVANA, Cuba, Mar. 13 (UP)—The ousted President of Cuba is on his way to exile. Carlos Prio Socarras left his sanctuary in the Mexican Embassy in Havana with followers of his party and went to the International Airport on the first leg of their trip into exile.

Prio had refused to give up his title as president of Cuba to Gen. Batista, who overthrew the government three days ago. Batista reportedly would not allow Prio safe passage until he gave up the presidency.

### New Atom Plane Contract Let

WASHINGTON, March 13 (UP)—The aircraft company that produced the B-17 and B-29 bombers has thrown its engineer-

ing know-how into race to develop an atomic powered bomber that could circle the world without refueling.

In former sources say engineers of the Boeing Airplane Co. have been working secretly for several months on the design of

a body for an atom-powered bomber.

First word of the project came in a contract announcement last night by the Defense Department. Two other aviation firms—Consolidated Vultee and General Electric—are engaged in a similar project.

ELIZABETH, N. J., March 13 (UP)—Officials in Elizabeth, N. J., have reacted angrily to a charge by Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker, that Communist agitation helped close Newark, N. J., airport.

City council president John Boyle says there definitely was no Communist hand in the demands to close up the field following three air crashes in Elizabeth within two months.

Rickenbacker had told a Congressional Committee recently that the "Communist element took advantage of the honest emotions and honest peoples' feeling" after 119 persons were killed in the crashups.

Russia announced that first prize in the annual Stalin Awards has gone to the designers of MIG jet fighter plane, the kind used in Korea. And Moscow newspapers carried full reports on a mass meeting in the capital to protest the alleged use of germ warfare by the Allies in Korea and Red China.

### Body Of Bowie Football Player Found In River

AUSTIN, March 13 (UP)—Austin police are awaiting results of an autopsy in their investigation of the mysterious death of a 17-year old Bowie School Athlete. The body of Darwin Watts, A husky, 225-pound football player, was found late yesterday in the Colorado River by two Austin fishermen.

It was not immediately known whether the youth died by drowning, or was perhaps dead before his body entered the water.

The youth disappeared last Friday night from a downtown Austin drugstore. He had been in Austin attending the State High School Basketball Tournament, in which the Bowie team participated.

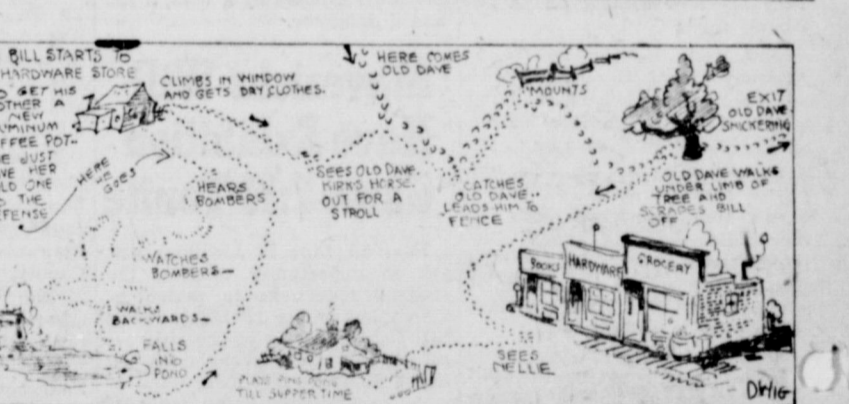

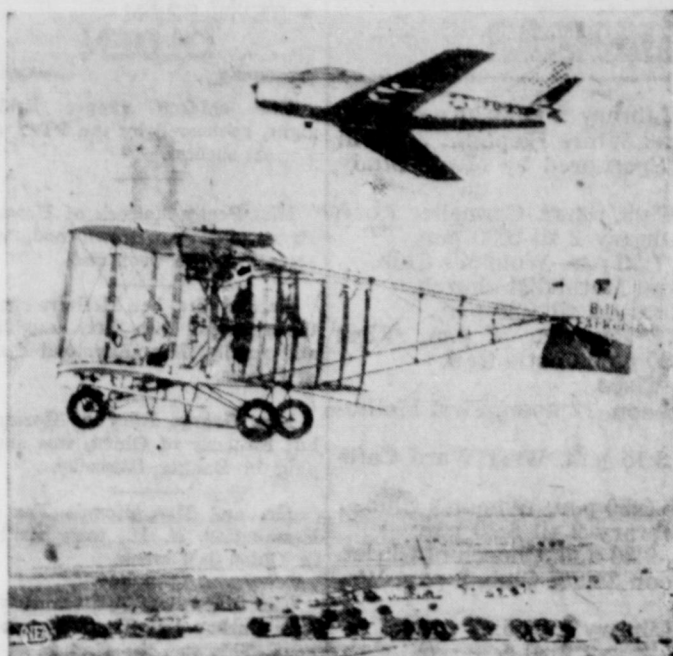

The border cities of Brownsville and Matamoros, Mexico, are discussing possible legal action today against upstream pumpers on the Rio Grande.

The pumper have been blamed for part of the two cities' water shortage problems. Matamoros had a flow of only 15 cubic feet at its pumps today, and Brownsville had no flow at all.

Members of the Brownsville City Commission talked of law suits against water districts upstream in an effort to see whether irrigation districts or cities have first legal claim to scarce water.

The mayors of both the Texas and Mexican cities are conferring on possible joint legal action.

## Testimony Ends In Finnegan's Trial, St. Louis

ST. LOUIS, March 13 (UP)—Both government and defense have completed testimony in the St. Louis trial of James P. Finnegan, former Internal Revenue Collector, on charges of bribery and other misconduct in office.

Defense Attorney Harry C. Blanton presented 10 character witnesses when court resumed at 9 a.m. CST. All described Finnegan favorably but under cross-examination said their relationship with him had been entirely social.

Testimony was completed by 9:30 a.m. and U. S. District Judge Rubey M. Hulien declared a brief recess to give attorneys time to prepare final arguments. The case is expected to go to the jury later today.

## Family Doctor Coming Back

The old-fashioned family doctor, that storehouse of medical knowledge and possessor of every needed medical skill, is making a comeback after his temporary disappearance in a floodtide of specialization. For the past five years the proportion of medical students planning to become general practitioners has increased steadily, according to an article in the April issue of Pageant Magazine.

The day of the old-time general practitioner is back but the new-style family doctors are better equipped than ever before to accept total responsibility for diagnosing and treating the whole patient as well as giving them psycho-biological counsel. This is to people who have felt for many years they were being led through a veritable forest of medical "ists" — gynecologists, dermatologists, gastroenterologists and all the others.

At Duke University Medical School, for example an exchange program for medical students and country doctors has been inaugurated. Its purpose: to help improve rural health by encouraging more medical school graduates to enter general practice. It permits Duke medical students to take a minimum of two weeks "time-out" to serve a tour of duty with a small-town doctor.

But this sudden regeneration of the general physician is by no means a one-night stand on the tank-town circuit says Pageant. People in rural areas are not alone, in these jittery days, in their need and understanding, interest and affection for their doctor. In the cities too the general physician, long in obscurity during a period
