The nation's big steel mills have begun closing down for a strike which a high government official said is "very" likely to come.

The 650,000-man CIO United Steel Workers Union has threatened to walk out if no wage agreement is reached by Sunday midnight, although it will meet tomorrow to consider a government request for another postponement.

The government official, who does not want his name used, said the strike is likely because top mobilizers are bent on holding the price line. That means the steel industry would not get the \$9.00-a-ton price boost it claims is necessary to grant the steel workers' wage boost demands.

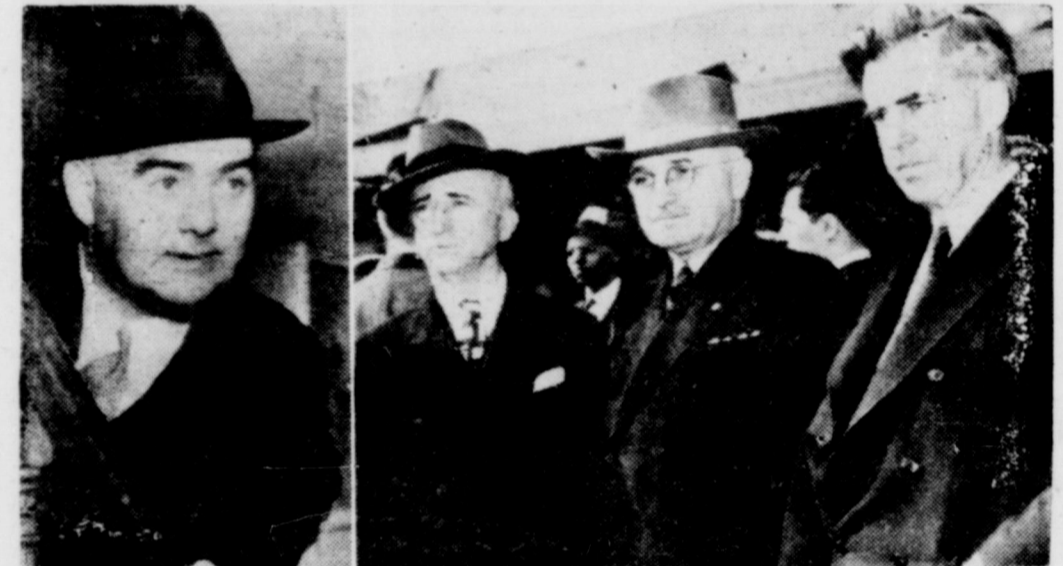

QUESTION: Is there any way I can put up a shelf on the tile wall of my bathroom?
—J. S. Brockton, Massachusetts

ANSWER: Start by attaching small blocks of wood to the tile wall with adhesive. This type of adhesive is generally available; most of them are black in color, and will hold practically all kinds of materials together very well. With blocks in position, use screws to attach fixtures in customary way.

QUESTION: Please advise how to remove rust stains from white asbestos shingles. The stains are caused by rain water dripping from gable-end eaves or vents.
—J. H. C. Bronx, N. Y.

ANSWER: Use a solution of salt soda (sometimes called sodium carbonate) and granulated soap in warm water. Scrub shingles with this mixture, using a stiff brush. Rinse thoroughly with clear water—use a garden hose with full pressure. Start your scrubbing at the bottom, otherwise the drip from above will make stains on lower, dry shingles, which will be hard to remove.

QUESTION: I have difficulty patching broken pavement around my home. What is the correct procedure?
—F. G. Trenton, N. J.

ANSWER: Remove all loose material from spot to be patched, then soak it thoroughly with water. Key edges of hole by undercutting them with a cold chisel. Then apply cement of a 1-2 1/2 mix (1 part cement in which lime has been mixed, 2 1/2 parts sharp sand) in clean water.

QUESTION: Is there any danger in putting the smoke pipe from a coal stove into the same chimney where there is an oil burner in the basement?
—A. Y. Enfield, Connecticut

ANSWER: Main danger from two fires connected to same flue is that draft of one, or the other, will be poor. If oil burner operates with forced draft, probability is that stove would smoke. Some chimneys have two flues however, and it's worth checking for this.

Grand Master, Grand Lodge Texas Paid Tribute By Masons At A&M

COLLEGE STATION, March—(Spl.)—High tribute was paid to Gibb Gilchrist Friday by Masons throughout the state, at a dinner in his honor. Gilchrist is Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge of Texas, A.F.&A.M.

Hundreds of Masons gathered in the Memorial Student Center on the campus of Texas A.&M. College and lauded him as "The Engineer," "The Public Servant," "The Mason" and "The Man."

Past Grand Masters of the Lodge of Texas, including Albert J. DeLange of Houston, Lee Lockwood of Waco, Horace K. Jackson of Gatesville, R. Bruce Brannon of Marshall, delivered talks. R. W. Steen, chaplain; J. H. Sorrels and Joe Woolket, all of the Sul Ross Lodge, College Station, also delivered talks. John H. Crooker of Houston, a Past Grand Master, was unable to attend. Past Grand Master R. M. Montgomery of Ft. Worth introduced distinguished guests.

Gibb Gilchrist is the old fashioned type of public servant who honestly believes a public office to be a public trust. Lockwood said, "He operates on the basis that the respect of those with whom he works, as well as of the public for whom he works, is much more important than popularity. He has always followed the course which he believed to be right in public matters regardless of public opinion at the time."

Lockwood, who spoke on Gilchrist as "The Public Servant," said:

Jackson traced the work of Gilchrist as "The Mason." He

said that he became a member of Tucker Lodge No. 297, Galveston in 1916. He later became a member of Sul Ross Lodge and has held all the posts in the lodge and now as the Most Worshipful Grand Master.

As an engineer, "he started work at the bottom of the ladder as a surveyor's chairman," Albert J. DeLange of Houston said.

"In eight years he rose to the position of special assistant to the chief engineer of the G. C. and S.F. railroad," Mr. DeLange pointed out that Mr. Gilchrist served in the armed forces in World War One. He was an officer in the corps of engineers. He joined the Texas Highway Department as a resident engineer and in 1947 he was appointed state highway engineer. The Texas Highway Department enjoyed its greatest period of growth during Gilchrist's administration," DeLange said. "Both as college president and as chancellor of the Texas A. & M. College System, which he has been since 1948, Mr. Gilchrist has applied engineering methods and training to these important jobs." Mr. DeLange quoted from George Session Perry's book on A. & M., "Even though Gilchrist speaks of himself as an engineer rather than orthodox educator, he is nevertheless, as concerned with what and how they're taught."

Joe Woolket, head of the Modern Languages Department, A. & M., said of Mr. Gilchrist, "he is a man of close family ties, strong and enduring friendships and decided beliefs. His career in engineering, education and public service have been marked by drive, determination and unalterable integrity. He is a completely unconstructed rebel. A large portrait of Gen. Robert E. Lee is today the principal decoration of his office. He is also an ardent Texan and the second largest picture in his office is that of Gen. Sam Houston."

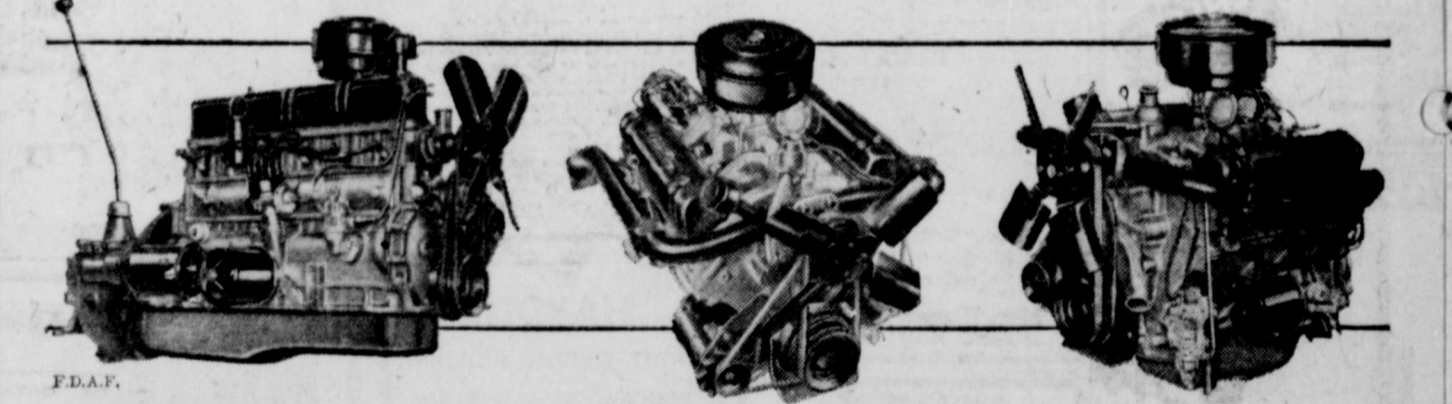

The USDA said the winds were exceptionally strong, "even for the high plains." However, wheat was reported greening and making some growth in the northern high

plains, but lack of moisture continued to check wheat development in the central and southern counties of the High Plains, and throughout the low rolling plains. The crop picture was good in North Texas, and the USDA said progress of commercial vegetables in the Rio Grande Valley was "for the most part satisfactory."

URGES FARMERS TO START BABY CHICKS NOW FOR FALL EGGS

Despite the recent decline in egg prices, it is still good business for farmers to start baby chicks this spring, E. B. Powell, director of research for Purina, stated this week. "This drop in prices may cause some farmers to give up on baby chicks this year," Powell stated, "and we may wind up with an egg shortage next winter."

Powell pointed out the population growth since the last "baby chick season" will swell the normal demand upwards of a billion eggs next fall. The present market seems to be having the tendency to decrease production too much.

"The logical result of a heavy decline in replacement chicks," he continued, "will be fewer eggs next fall when the chicks put down now will be laying best."

He reminded farmers of a similar market condition a couple of years ago, when the egg market broke sharply in the spring, but bounced back to new peaks the following fall.

"Good weather, better breeding and better feeding have combined to make a temporary egg supply larger than usual," he explained.

"Obviously, this has forced the egg prices down. But the situation offers an unusual opportunity for egg

profits next fall, according to most market experts. And here is their reason—some poultry keepers will not raise chicks this spring. So, there should be fewer pullets and fewer eggs next fall and winter. In the past, this has made extra high egg prices during that time of the year.

"Don't be misled into cutting down on chicks this spring," he cautioned, "let the other fellows out."

Some poultry flock owners were panicked into getting out of the egg business in 1949 when egg prices dropped to 30¢ that spring. Yet in the fall and winter of '50, prices hit 50¢ per dozen and held to 50¢.

"The farmer who was cautious in purchasing chicks last spring should have a plentiful supply of eggs," he continued, "and this makes a good chance to start a profitable poultry operation."

There's such a thing as carrying a good thing too far. The dark-haired, dark-skinned beauty is ready for a change of pace.

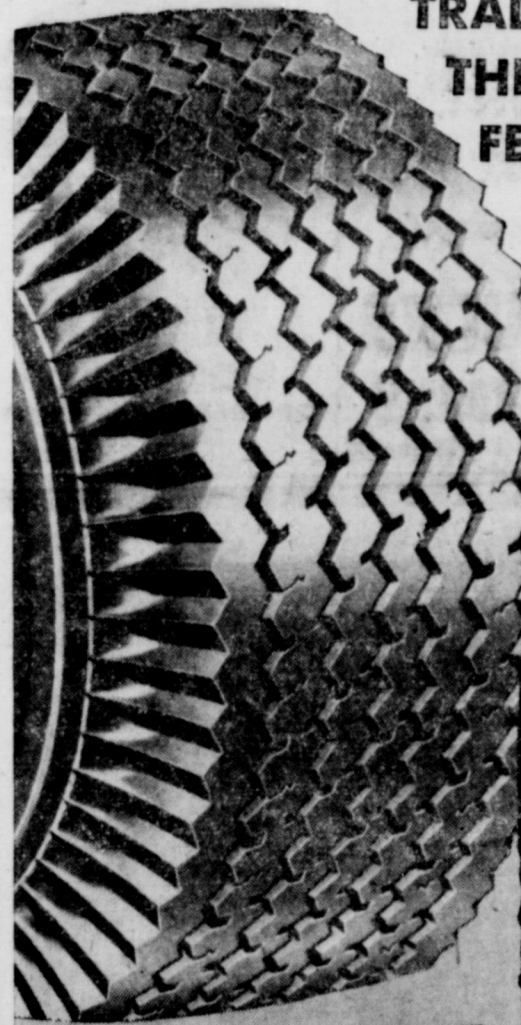
