It takes several cowboys to opcrate a ranch the size of the King. In fact we notice that they are now raising their own mounts down there. To care for the needs of the cowboys they are raising quarter horses by the thousands, and right now have more than 3000 on hand,

Now we are not bragging when we say it takes a large number "pokes" to handle the cows. Just now they are grazing a little more than 65,000 head. Quite a nice bunch of dogies, we say, even if most of them are grown and many of them high grade regis-
