Time changes things. Barley, for instance, has become a more important crop in Parmer County. This came about with little fanfare.

Since they're both winter crops, barley's gain has come at the expense of wheat. And, due to many factors, barley will be expected to make still more gains in '73.

Wheat, once the primary crop for this area, we understand, has had some drawbacks during the past few years. Most of those disadvantages were dollars, or the lack of them, that a crop was worth.

Whole farmers didn't abandon their wheat, they lost enthusiasm for it because it just didn't pay as well as it did a few years ago. A surplus of wheat dropped the price down to where it wasn't much fun to grow.

Farmers started using it more and more for winter grazing. With cattle, they could make the wheat make more money . . . if the cattle did all right, physically and financially, which they usually do.

Another thing that kept wheat in the picture, even though it wasn't as profitable as it once was, was the fact that the growing season was opposite of that for grain sorghum, cotton and sugar beets. Thus, there was no competition for the limited irrigation water. In other words, most farmers were growing all the row crops their water would allow, anyway, and they might as well grow wheat in the off season and use the wells which would otherwise be idle.

Barley, though, is grown the same time as wheat and offers just about the same kind of grazing for cattle. Barley yields better than wheat and during the past couple of years, has been a better price.

This, no doubt, will cause farmers to plant more barley next year.

Barley is primarily a feed grain, the experts tell us. It is, in fact, higher in protein than our very own Parmer County grain sorghum. Milo has a protein content of some eight percent while barley is in the 10 to 12 percent range.

The price of barley this year is good, compared to grain sorghum or wheat. At \$2.40 per hundredweight, it is a better price than milo and a little under the price of wheat. However, barley yields much better than wheat, as a rule, and the gross income per acre is therefore more.

Until better varieties were developed in the past five or six years, barley had a tendency to "freeze out" in this area. That made it less desirable, of course. New varieties, however, have about eliminated this handicap.

One farmer explained that barley would have become a more prominent crop quicker, but "we're slow to make changes. Wheat has always been our winter crop and it takes a while for our way of thinking to be changed."

While the price of wheat has been low the past few years, it is still probably a more stable crop, offering the producer more dependability both price-wise and yield-wise.

Nonetheless, under the present price set-up and profit potential, barley can be expected to continue to gain in importance on Parmer County farms. It may never equal wheat in number of acres, but it is to be reckoned with and should be.

City Hiring 4 Young People

Bovina's city council has agreed to cooperate with a federal government program to hire four young people during the summer months.

The action was taken at a Thursday night session of the governing body.

Debra Holloway, a '72 BHS graduate, has been hired to work in the city offices for the summer. The city will pay 30 percent of her salary with the remainder to be paid by the federal government. Her pay will go into a college scholarship fund. Also, three boys will be hired under a similar program, according to Mayor Johnnie Horn.

The council heard a request from Dan Koelzer, chief of Bovina Volunteer Fire Department.

Koelzer explained that the department needs additional equipment, especially breathing equipment for fire fighting, and asked the city's assistance in sending a member of the department to the state fire school next month at Texas A&M.

The city will send a member of the department, in addition to Fire Marshal Darrel Read, to the state school. Expenses will be paid plus \$100 for the week's time.

Named to serve as an equalization board were J. E. Sherrill, Larry Scott and Larry Webb. Meetings of the taxboard have been scheduled for this month and next. Edward Isaac was appointed as an alternate member of the board.

Dolph Moten was elected by the council to serve as mayor pro tem.

Councilmen present were Horn, Moten, Roy Allen and Vernon Estes and Don Spring.

Also in attendance at the session were Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary; City Marshal Ronald Mitchell, Koelzer and H. H. Kelso.

Kelso requested permission to install parking spaces for camper trailers or mobile homes on his property on Third Street.

Koelzer told the council members that the fire department "has a big responsibility and has good men and equipment, but more equipment is needed."

Arrest Three Men In Area Burglaries

The arrest of one man in Friona and two at Roswell, N.M., is expected to clear up numerous area burglaries, say law officials in Parmer County.

Tommy Taylor, 30, of Friona is in Parmer County jail at Farwell charged with possession of stolen property.

Bond was set at \$10,000 by Farwell Justice of the Peace Ray Mears.

Taylor had not posted bond as of mid-week.

Law officers here recovered five shotguns and rifles, a tape deck, electric welder, a 1971 model Suzuki 90 cycle and several other items believed to have been stolen from Roswell residences.

Roswell police have two suspects in custody -- Oscar Starbuck, 31, a brother-in-law of Taylor; and Oliver Persons, 24. Both men are residents of Roswell.

Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace went to Roswell Monday to question the suspects. The items recovered there are believed to have come from the Parmer County area and some neighboring towns.

Lovelace reported there was a "mountain of stuff at Roswell that would require some time to check out."

Positively identified and recovered were three motorcycles and a trailer stolen from Monty Corbin of Bovina Christmas night of last year. Lovelace said the motorcycles had been damaged.

Corbin accompanied Sheriff Lovelace to Roswell to identify his cycles and trailer.

The Roswell men were expected to waive extradition and be returned to Farwell sometime Tuesday.

Begin your next party on a flavorful note with these superb nibblers. They can be made in minutes. Wonderful as an appetizer or beverage accompaniment, these delicious Holland cheese fritters will have everyone coming back for "just one more." Try the variations, too.

Holland Cheese Fritters

- 2 cups shredded imported Holland Edam or Gouda
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 tablespoon minced onion
- 2 eggs, beaten
- Cooking oil for deep-fat frying

Mix shredded Holland cheese, flour, baking powder and onion. Add beaten egg and stir until cheese is evenly distributed in the batter. In a deep skillet or saucepan, heat cooking oil, about 2 inches deep, to 375°F. Carefully drop teaspoonfuls of batter into oil. Cook 2-3 minutes until fritters are golden brown, turning once during the cooking period. Drain on absorbent paper. Serve hot. Makes 3 dozen cheese fritters.

If desired, fritters can be prepared in advance and kept in the freezer up to 3 months. To reheat and serve, place frozen fritters on baking sheet in 350°F. oven for 5-7 minutes.

- Variations:
- Salmon - Add 1 (3-3/4 ounce) can salmon, drained and flaked, and 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice.
 - Shrimp - Add 1/2 cup chopped cooked shrimp and 1/2 teaspoon minced dill weed.
 - Apple - Omit onion. Add 1/2 cup chopped apple and 1/8 teaspoon cinnamon.

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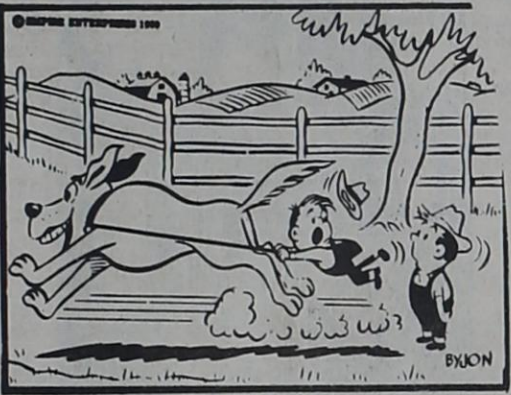

Hot scrambled eggs will entice the sleepiest camper to greet the day with a hearty breakfast. To prevent eggs from breaking en route to the campsite, break them yourself at home, pour into a plastic container and store in the ice chest. When morning comes, shake the container, transfer beaten eggs to a hot skillet and scramble. ...

ned meats stock most market counters. Look for canned roast beef, beef steaks, corned beef, ham, meat balls, chicken, turkey or chicken fricassee. Also try tuna fish, crab, shrimp, salmon, chili and spaghetti. A few cooking tricks can add variety to canned meals. Spoon chili con carne over toasted cornbread squares. Chopped ham loaves can be sliced and served cold with salads or sandwiches, or can be sliced and broiled or fried. For a special treat, top chopped ham with brown sugar, molasses or honey and stud the meat with whole cloves. ...

If you have a yen for corn at the sea shore, use the sea to "shore" up the flavor. Remove the silk but not the husks, and place corn in a weighted burlap bag. Soak in salt water for about an hour. A cool stream will add a tasty lift, too! Then cook corn as usual. ...

Dry milk, an economical camping trip pal requires little storage space and no refrigeration until reconstituted. Prepare only the amount needed for the meal with ice water. Then the milk will be cold enough to drink immediately. ...

Stores offer many kinds of puddings, breads (date or brown bread) and even cakes in cans that make excellent take-alongs. Also select cheese in jars or cans that keep almost indefinitely prior to opening. ...

The bridegroom's parents hosted a rehearsal supper Thursday night for members of the wedding party at Bovina Restaurant.

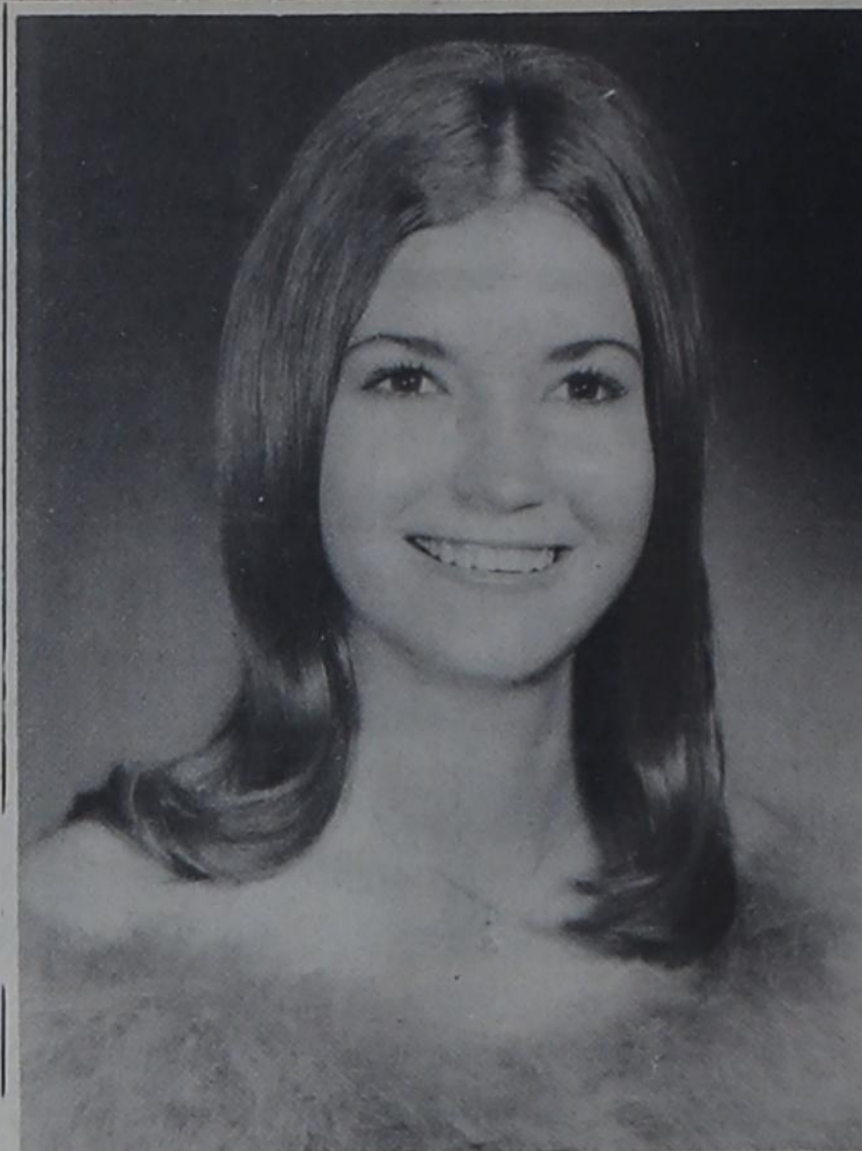
