Their entries were in competition with chickens from San Angelo, Ballenger, San Saba, Bryan, Hatchel, Abilene, Sweetwater, Coleman, Brownwood, Cleburne, Santa Anna and other points but our home men captured the following prizes and awards.





Houston, Texas, Nov. 9 .- Diversification was the keynote of Discussion at the crop conference of Texas farmers held this after noon at the city auditorium. while the gathering was not as large as was anticipated it was enthusiastic and representative. Interesting talks by men farmiliar with their subjects were heard.

The first address of the evening was made by Governor elect James E. Ferguson, who, while he advocated diversification to a certain extent did not think that the cotton acerage should be curtailed too much without first deciding what other crop could be grown profitably in its place.

"The time for concerted action has come, " said Mr. Furgeson "We should meet the issue squarely in the face and come to some conclusion. There are two extremes that must be avoided; they are overproduction and underproduction of cotton. Thousands of people in the South depends on cotton for a living. These include cotten pickers, gin employes and workers in cotton factories.

"It is easy to conden the farmers for raising cotton and to ask the government to pass laws making the curtailment of cotton acerage imperative. But all that accomplishes nothing. It is a matter that requires great deliberation and one that should be discussed in all its phases before action is taken. We should not commit ourselves to any one thing when 4 months will bring us to see that it was the most inadvisable thing we could have done. It will be several months before cotton planting time will come again and by that time conditions may change for the better. No matter how many laws are passed, I do not believe any jury in Texas would convict a man for planting cotton.
