THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE is laboring, with just a limited time remaining, to establish some type of tax relief for the residents of the state.

At this point, it is problematical as to whether the legislature will pass a tax relief bill before the special session ends.

We liked the sound of one of the proposals, which early on had a good deal of support. It would reduce the amount of local taxes needed by school districts. The bill, if passed, would save taxpayers in the Bovina Independent School District a total of \$10,000 in taxes.

Realizing the added tax burden that has been placed on local residents in recent years due to changing guidelines on the state level, it is apparent that some type of relief along this line would be more than welcome.

We sincerely hope that the legislature can, indeed, agree upon a tax reform measure that will help all Texans. Hopefully, spurred on by the recent passage of "Proposition 13" in California, the legislators will realize that people feel there must be a stopping place for taxes.

THE BIRTH LAST WEEK in England of the world's first "test tube" baby has opened up a new area of discussion as regards the field of human reproduction and medical power.

It has been stated that already, thousands of applications have been received from childless couples unable to have children due to fertility problems.

Researchers who engineered the pregnancy in England feel that their success opens up new possibilities for those couples unable to have children by normal means.

But it also has stirred up a hornet's nest, concerning questions of ethics, law, religion and social morality. It is pointed out that through the development of externally conceived babies, science can now decide who shall be born, how, and to whom.

Groups who in the past have been against abortion and contraception are now debating the new process.

Pro-life groups, who oppose abortion, are caught in a dilemma. They applaud efforts to have children, but they may fear that the new technique is "tampering with nature."

Legal experts predict the possibility of far-reaching changes in family law, inheritance and the concept of legitimacy, if the practice of laboratory fertilization and child bearing "by proxy" becomes prevalent.

The possibility of embryo transfer, which is expected to be the next medical breakthrough, would use surrogate mothers to bear children for women unable to carry a baby full term.

It is pointed out that this could be the final step in the biological liberation of women, who could then have children without the responsibility of pregnancy and childbirth.

The whole subject of test-tube births opens up an entirely new field for debate. And, like abortion, it is likely to be a very controversial debate.

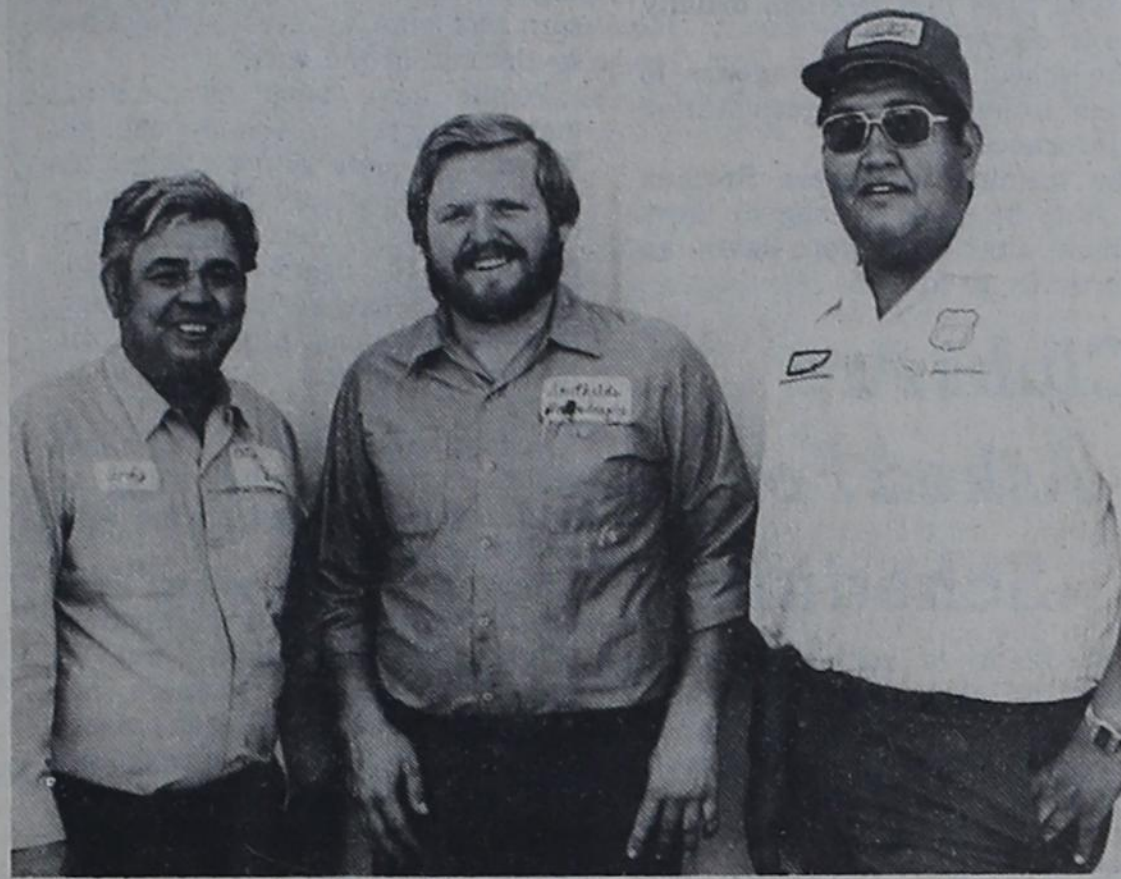
Burglaries Investigated

HUD Fund Narrowly Missed

The Department of Housing and Urban Development has announced that funding will not be available this year for the paving of streets in Bovina. This news was relayed to city officials last week. However the news was not as disappointing as it might seem.

According to City Manager Clayton Williamson Bovina's grant application received very favorable reviews from the federal government. "Our application was just one of hundreds received from cities and counties from all over the northern half of Texas. Since there was not enough money available to fund all the requests, HUD officials ranked the requests by assigning points based upon immediate need, per capita income, and several other factors. The minimum number of points needed was 513. Bovina received 508."

Williamson remarked that the HUD officials thought that Bovina's application was so good that they have requested that Bovina consider resubmitting it next year. Compared to most local governments in the Panhandle Bovina did quite well. Only one Panhandle city received a grant and this was Wellington. The City of Perryton missed being funded by one point while Turkey and Bovina were excluded by only five points.

Williamson foresees the outlook for Bovina receiving this grant in the future as very bright. "This is the first time we have ever applied to HUD for anything. Rarely do they fund any project the first time you apply. I stated when we began work on this back in April that we had only a 25 per cent chance of receiving funding this year but if we applied four years in a row we would get the grant approved. The fact that we scored so high proves that probably within the next three years our paving project will be approved and completed."

Workers Shocked

Three farm workers were injured Monday, July 31, as a result of an accident involving high voltage.

The three workers had been moving irrigation pipe on the Ralph Roming farm one mile northwest of Bovina, when the pipe came in contact with a high voltage line.

City Marshal Jerry Atchley said he received a call on his C.B. saying there had been an electrocution outside of town and that there was an ambulance on the way. Marshal Atchley was then directed to the scene where he found the three workers to be injured and in shock.

Mario Diaz, 28, was the most seriously injured with severe burns and shock. Jose Edwards Mandus, 22, had minor burns and shock, and Roberto Bacus seemed to be in shock.

The three were taken by ambulance to Parmer County Community Hospital, where they received treatment.

The Chamber-Lion's Club Queen Candidates committee has announced the candidates for this year's Bull Town Days Queen's Contest.

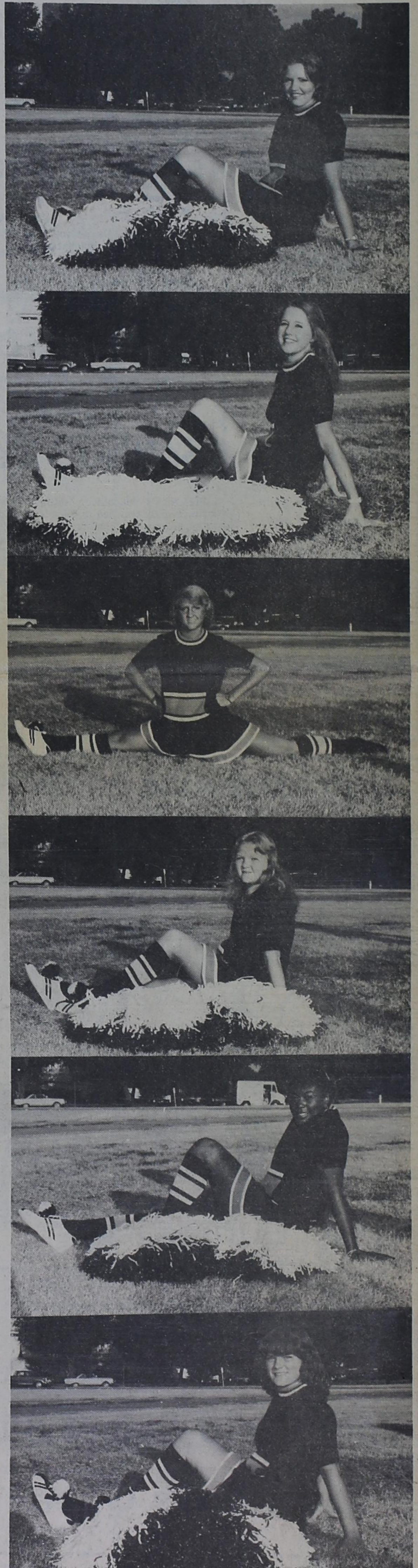

News And Views From American Agriculture

BOVINA'S AMERICAN Agriculture office has opened a fresh vegetable stand on Highway 60 in Bovina, just east of Bonds Oil Company.

This week, we have been featuring five vegetables: cucumbers, cabbage, potatoes, onions and sweet corn. We plan to have cantaloupes by the end of the week.

People have been commenting that our prices are cheap enough. We want to quote you our vegetable prices, and then comment on them: Cucumbers, 17 cents per pound; cabbage, 10 cents per pound; potatoes, 15 cents per pound; onions, 12 cents per pound, and sweet corn, 13 cents per pound.

According to Ralph Roming, these prices represent parity prices on each vegetable, based on the May parity figures.

Roming says the prices listed should be the net price the farmers receive on each item, but in actuality, vegetable farmers are receiving less than half of the stated amount on some crops. No vegetable is currently bringing the above stated prices on the wholesale market.

The vegetable industry, overall, is receiving about 65 per cent of parity, which includes packing and harvest costs.

Roming points out that even if the farmers received parity prices on their vegetables, this would not guarantee them a profit. They would in most instances have to have a bountiful crop, in order to pay for the expenses incurred in growing and

harvesting their crops.

Vegetables being sold at the Bovina stand have been donated by local farmers. The proceeds will go to Bovina's American Agriculture office, to help pay expenses incurred by the organization.

It was stated that if anyone has an overabundance of beans, peas, or other vegetable in their gardens, the AAM vegetable stand would be more than happy for the donation.

A REPORT ISSUED recently revealed that there are less than 25 per cent of the number of feeder cattle today than there was exactly a year ago.

This pretty well goes along with expectations of feeding observers, and is attributed directly to the increasing of beef imports by the Carter administration.

The cattle feeders are just not replacing their herds as they were doing a year ago, when the profit picture was a lot brighter.

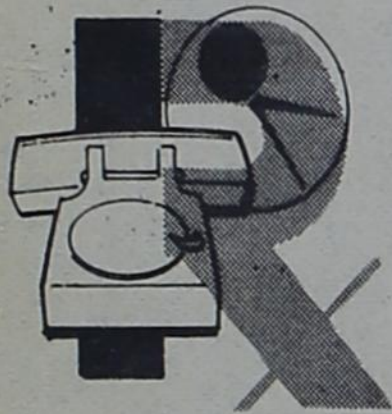

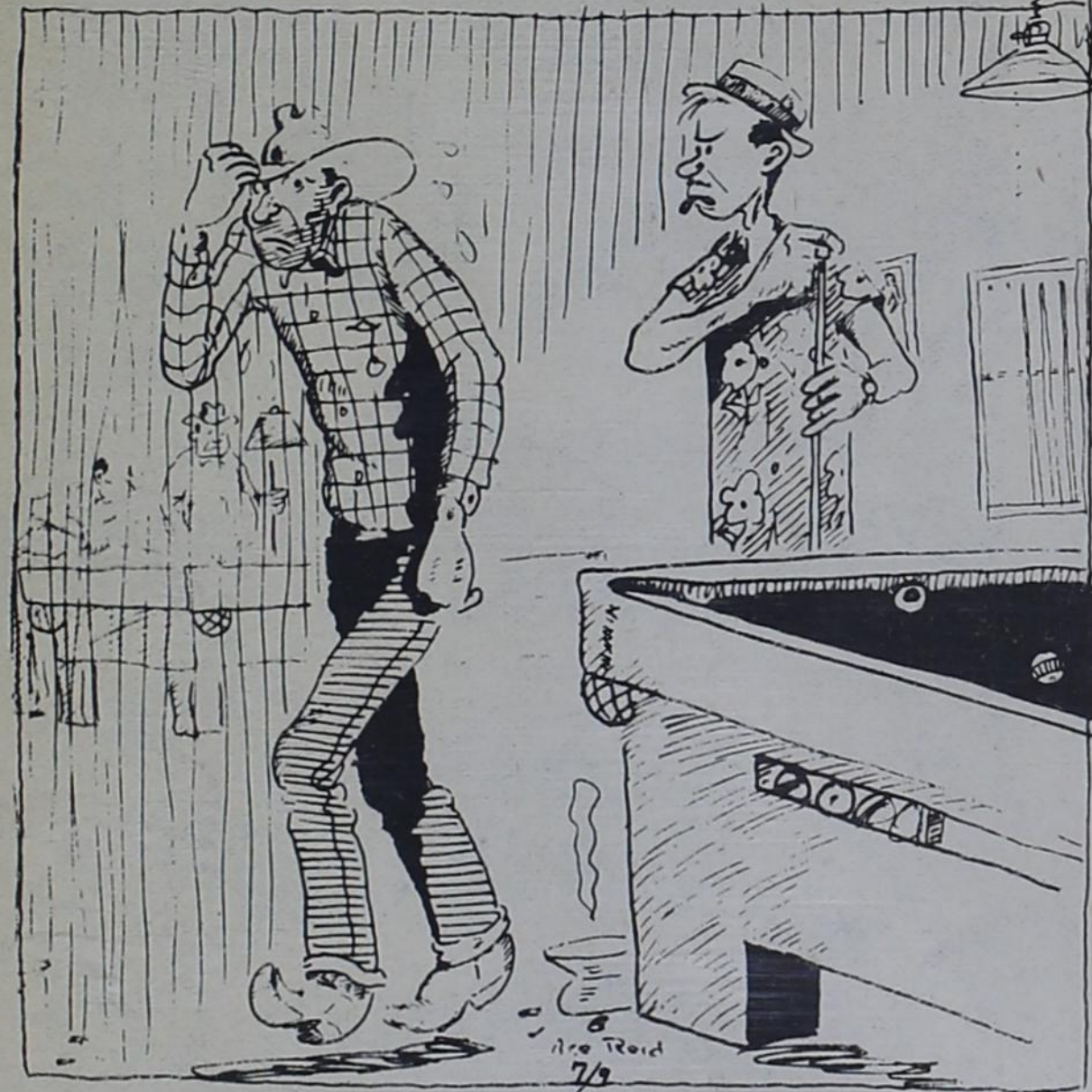

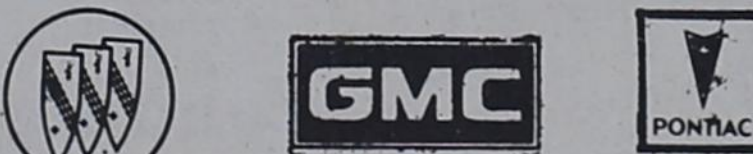

Bovina Judge Attends Seminar

Judge Wayne Spears of the City of Bovina attended the Seminar for Municipal Court Judges on July 25-27 at the Quality Inn in Amarillo. Instruction was given in the following areas: Municipal Court organization and administration; Municipal Court Judge as Magistrate; Citations, complaints, and pre-trial procedure; Substantive criminal law and procedure in non-jury cases; Jury trials and the law of evidence.

A mock trial was staged to familiarize non-attorney judges with jury trial procedures.

Instructors for the seminar were Charles P. Bubany, Bruce M. Kramer and Daniel H. Benson, members of the faculty of the Texas Tech University School of Law.

The seminar was funded by the Office of Traffic Safety-State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation and was co-sponsored by the Texas Tech University Division of Continuing Education.

Approximately 30 judges from across the State of Texas attended

the seminar. Texas Tech is planning another seminar in Junction in September.

What was the nature of this peace? "Not as the world giveth." The world gives the peace of an easy life, pleasant surroundings, etc. Such peace cannot last. An inward peace: "My peace I give unto you." A condition of mind undisturbed by the turmoils of life. It is like a river. Its source is unseen; it is deep; its

course becomes stronger as it approaches the sea. Because Christ had this inward peace, he has the power to give peace—to still the tempest of the soul. (Mark 4:38-5:15).

Who are the recipients of it? "I (Christ) give unto you"—the disciples. Those who are students of Christ, being spiritually minded. Those who have faith in God, trusting him and not themselves. Those who have forsaken sin, the great peace-destroyer. Those who hearken to God's commands.

Having this heavenly legacy, we should not allow our hearts to become over-much disturbed with the things of the past, of the present, of the future.

Company Withdraws Site Offer

Berl Springer, president of Southwestern Public Service Company, said today that the electric company is withdrawing its offer to provide \$100-million and a plant site for building the nation's first gas-cooled breeder reactor.

"This has been a hard decision for us to make. We have been hoping, for nearly four years, that the plant would be built in our service area. However, the program has met with unusual and continuing delays, and the time has come for us to make other plans to be sure that our customers will have plenty of electricity in the future," Springer said.

Southwestern announced in September of 1974 that it had entered into an agreement with General Atomic Company, developer of the gas-cooled nuclear reactor, to provide the plant site and \$100-million for a nuclear breeder reactor with an electric generating capability of 300,000 kilowatts.

"When we made our offer in 1974, we made a commitment for a demonstration plant ready to turn out electricity on a daily basis, just like any of our other plants. At that time, it looked like we would get that kind of plant in the early 1980's. It now appears that it will be after 1990 before a plant can be built, and it will be a research project subject to shutdown and testing and not one on which we can depend for day-to-day operation.

"One of our problems is the big battle that continues over the Clinch River Breeder Reactor. The President is unalterably opposed to Clinch River at the same time that he is vague about what breeder technology he would support. The Congress seems just as insistent that Clinch River be built and pays little attention to gas-cooled or other breeder alternatives. As a result, all the breeder debate is on Clinch

River, although many of us are convinced the gas-cooled breeder is better. This has delayed the building of a demonstration plant, and it is not to the best interests of our customers to keep waiting around for this problem to be solved," Springer pointed out.

General Atomic has been working on the gas-cooled breeder since 1961. In 1968, a group of utilities representing about one-third of the generating capability in the country was formed to join General Atomic in support of the program. It, also, has had limited financial support from the federal government and some foreign nations.

Southwestern joined the industry group in 1974 when it made the offer of the plant site and the \$100-million.

Helium Breeder Associates was formed in 1976 by some of the original members of the utility group. HBA was started to serve as the organization to contract with the federal government for research and development. When it was established, it was hoped that there would be a significant increase in the federal support of the gas-cooled technology which, in turn, would develop additional utility support.

Southwestern will continue to research nuclear fusion as a charter member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. In the fusion process, the atoms are joined, rather than split, and the hydrogen in seawater is the fuel for making electricity.

"We will continue on our plan to use coal as our base fuel. We will, also, look at other nuclear alternatives and continue our support of the fusion program. The decision we have reluctantly made about the gas-cooled breeder will not, in any way, interfere with our ability to serve our customers, either now or in the future," Springer concluded.

Vandalism Acts Scored By Company

An unusually high number of telephone property damages have occurred recently in Bovina due to gun shots at telephone lines, O.D. Hearn, General Telephone Brownfield division manager confirmed today. There have been 25 glass insulators shot from the crossarms of telephone poles in 60 days in Bovina. "These acts of vandalism are inconveniences for our customers now, and will ultimately result in higher rates for all our customers in the future," Hearn added.

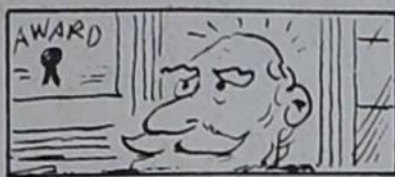
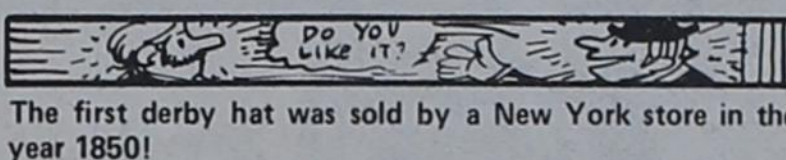
It is against Federal and State laws which prohibit any action to disrupt communications. "The people who are committing this violation probably do not realize it is

a Federal offense," Hearn said.

A shot may disrupt telephone service and endanger many people who depend on their telephones during an emergency. Damaged communications lines often do more than disrupt weekend plans, it was pointed out. The lines may be carrying emergency messages which guide planes, serve radar tracking stations or connect several missile sites.

Historically, during hunting season, some hunters shoot birds on telephone lines or poles, but as this is not hunting season, that is not the

reason for the recent acts. "Each minute a telephone is out of order the safety of many people may be threatened," Hearn concluded.

Buy your fertilizer from a reliable dealer, and pay attention to what your college agronomic researchers, USDA and reliable companies are saying. Being safe, in this case, is better than being sorry.
