VERNON E. BENNETT was raised in the Black community, attended school at the old Black Community School, and then graduated from Friona High School.

Bennett received his engineering degree from Texas Tech, but also has become a writer of some distinction. He has published a book on his family, entitled "The Bennetts of Texas." He sent us a copy of the book, which we appreciate very much.

Bennett also has published a booklet entitled "Waiting Room Reading." One of the items concerns his visit to the Black community, 30 years after he left. We quote it herewith for your enjoyment:

AFTER 30 YEARS

During my vacation, my family and I went to the community where I was "raised" to see the old farm, schoolhouse and the places that have lived so long in my memory.

In the Spring of 1938, having a new high school diploma, I heard destiny calling me loud and clear.

Realizing the limitations of the future if I stayed, I set forth into the world to make my mark. Now, after 30 years upon returning, I was a stranger.

The old schoolhouse had been deserted a long time, victim of the consolidated school, but was still standing. The walls were leaning and the doors were padlocked. A sign above the door read "Community House."

The old basketball goals were leaning toward each other as if seeking mutual support. Everything had an abandoned look. The old flagpole, on which we used to demonstrate our strength by shinnying to the top, was rusty now instead of polished by climbing hands.

Things had changed so much that even the old familiar landmarks were hard to find. The old swimming hole was gone, only a muddy ditch flowed where we used to swim.

The railroad crossing by the school where as a first grader I had placed an ear of corn on the rail and watched the railroad motor car spill the crew, was still the same.

On going into town very few of the old crowd was found to be around. One or two had made good and gave me a suspicious eye as if they wondered what I wanted. Two or three fellows still there were complaining about opportunity having passed them by.

The shapely blond with the soft blue eyes, was now fat with a double chin, and was taking care of three grandchildren.

Most of my old friends had gone off into the world seeking their fortune. Those who had been successful won't have time to come back, failures won't want to come back and still others talk about what might have been.

And of course, I didn't find what I was seeking. For while I was away the dreams, the hopes, the emotional security, the confidence and the anticipation of youth they, too, had got up and gone.

I KNOW THAT THE FOLKS AT First Baptist Church are enjoying the Wayne Bristow Crusade this week. We had the Bristow crusade at our home church in Friona a few years ago, and it was a great week.

Wayne, Felix and Jimmy are three of the most dedicated men we have ever met, and we're happy the folks in Bovina have been able to get better acquainted with them.

We happened to go through school with Wayne down the road at Muleshoe, and it was one of those "best buddy" deals of which we've always been proud. But we have a standing deal. I don't say anything in print about Wayne, unless it's good, and he's supposed to do likewise about Ye Editor from the pulpit.

Three Spots To Expire

Three positions held by members of the Bovina Independent School District's Board of Trustees will expire this year. Terms of office will expire for Tom Ware, Keith Garner and James Clayton.

Candidates wishing to file should make application at the Superintendent's Office at the High School. Filing deadline is Wednesday, March 5.

The school trustee election will be held Saturday, April 5, at Bovina High School. Absentee voting will begin March 17 and end April 1.

Beef referendum Registration

Registration is underway to vote in the February 19-22 Beef referendum.

Registration will take place through February 6 at the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office in Farwell.

Voting will also take place at ASCS offices.

Anyone who owned cattle during the calendar year 1979 is eligible to vote in the referendum.

If a majority of bona-fide cattlemen favor the measure, a national beef program will be created for beef promotion, research, consumer education and market development programs.

Texas would have at least six members on the board.

At least 50 percent of those registering to vote must return and vote or the referendum will not be valid.

Joe Buchanan Bids For County Judge

Joe Buchanan has authorized the Friona Star to announce her candidacy for Parmer County Judge, subject to the Democratic Primary in May.

Mrs. Buchanan has been a resident of Parmer County since 1949, when she came to Friona to teach Home Economics after graduation from North Texas University. She was born and raised in Collin County where she graduated from Blue Ridge High School. After the death of her husband Billy G. Buchanan, in 1964,

she assumed the responsibility of managing the farm, and was actively engaged in farming until her sons returned to the farm after attending college. In 1976, Mrs. Buchanan was named Regional Conservation Farmer by the Soil Conservation Service.

Mrs. Buchanan was instrumental in organizing the Parmer County Chapter of the American Heart Association, and was president for 3 years. She is currently serving on the board of directors of the Prairie Acres Nursing Home in Friona, and has served several years as a trustee of the Congregational Church.

The family farm is southeast of Friona, where Lisa lives with her mother, and attends vocational nursing school in Dimmitt. Chief and wife, Carolyn Menefee Buchanan, and three children, and Mike and wife, Cathy Jones Buchanan, and three children, farm in the area and are active in civic affairs in the county.

In announcing her candidacy, Mrs. Buchanan said: "I feel that I can serve the citizens with knowledge and fairness. The office of County Judge is an honorable one, and I feel that I can continue the quality of leadership in that position that we have enjoyed in the past. Your support and enthusiasm in my campaign will be greatly appreciated."

Bob Price Announces For Re-election

State Senator Bob Price of Pampa said Wednesday that he will seek re-election to the 31st Senatorial District seat he now holds in the Texas State Senate.

The 31st District includes Armstrong, Bailey, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hockley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler Counties.

In making his announcement, Price said, "It has been a distinct honor serving the people of this district for the past several years."

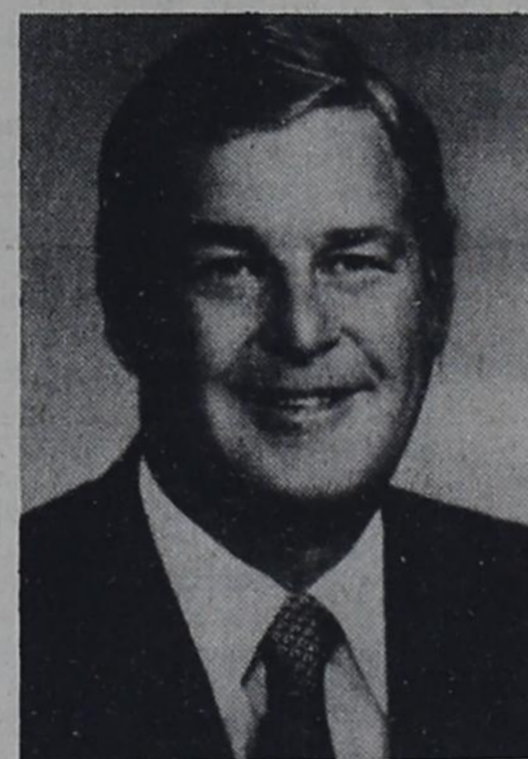
Price serves on three committees: Economic Development, Human Resources and Natural Resources.

"In serving as Texas senator for the 31st District, I have worked to serve the needs of the people of the 26 counties by maintaining my Capitol office and two offices in the district," he said. "I am considering opening a third office in the southwestern portion of the district if the work load is sufficient to warrant the spending of the taxpayers' dollars."

"During my first term of this office, I have been successful in helping fuel suppliers, in most cases, meet the fuel requirements of agricultural producers," he noted. "I also helped provide tax relief for homeowners and agricultural property based on productivity. I have tried to provide an economic climate that will attract new industry and business to Texas so there will be more job opportunities and better wages. Also, during the last session, I was pleased that a majority of the citizens of Texas approved the legislation that I introduced which amended the Constitution and provided for the guarantee of loans for the purchase of farm and ranch land by young people who want to pursue a profession in agriculture."

The Senate passed three Price bills dealing with gasohol development, as well as legislation which would exempt solar and wind-powered devices from ad valorem taxes.

"Regarding water legislation, we were able to ratify the Red River Compact between Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas as

well as pass legislation for the creation of an Import Water Authority for our area," Price said. "I will continue to push for methods by which we can import water into the state from outside sources to meet the needs of our area in the future."

Price said he will continue to support legislation providing financial security for the elderly as well as medical care and housing.

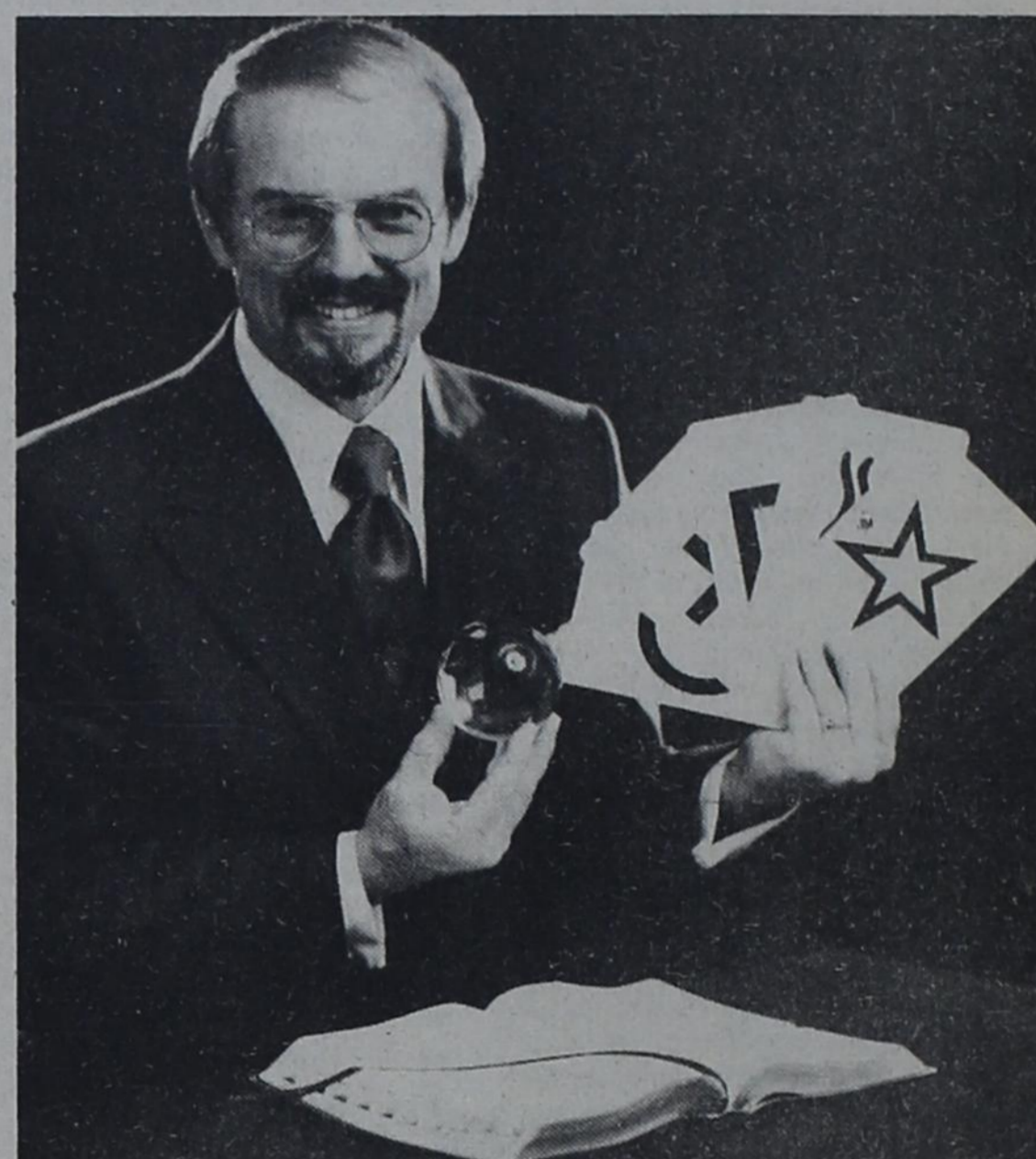
"It is also important," he said, "to help the young people have adequate financing to buy homes."

Price stated that he intends to continue his efforts to support strong law and order, a reduction of taxes, and incentives for all phases of energy production, including gasohol.

"I will strive to continue the reevaluation of education to include bilingual education, vocational training, teacher salaries and other needs to meet the challenge of generations to come," he said.

In the field of agriculture, Price said that he would work to see that the Family Farm Security Act is funded and put into operation as soon as possible.

"I will introduce legislation that will provide a program of producer agricultural sales teams to promote and sell Texas and US farm products overseas," he added. "We can no longer depend on government to sell our agricultural products."

Gerald McCathern Makes Senate Race

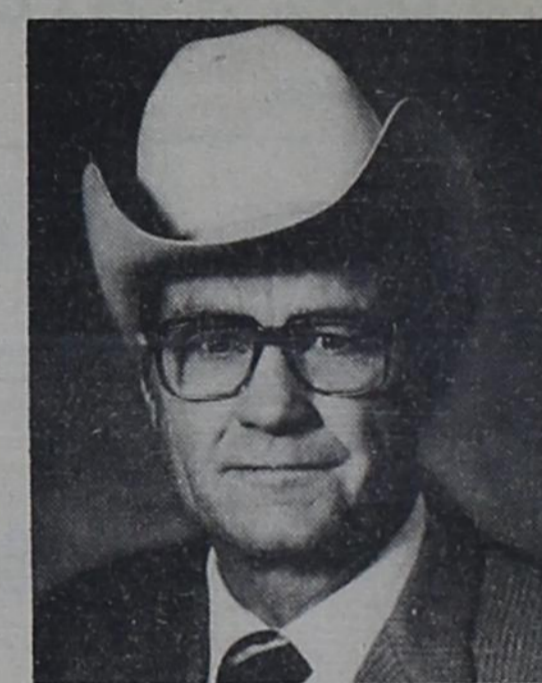
Gerald McCathern, who announced his intentions to run for State Senator from District 31, on September 19, has now made it official by sending in his filing fee to the state Democratic headquarters.

McCathern, farmer and rancher from Hereford, has been traveling extensively through the district since September, talking with people in all makes of life. "I am convinced," he said, "that the people of our district are as concerned as I am that our state government has not been responsible to the needs of our district and the needs of our people. Large special interest groups have been far too influential in securing legislation which is beneficial to those groups at the expense of small businesses, ranchers, farmers, and other working people. My platform will always be to act as a servant of the people and to protect their interests in all forms of governmental action."

"I can relate to these problems of our people," McCathern said, "because I grew up in the eastern part of our district during the depression years of the thirties. I have worked in the oil fields as a rough-neck, roustabout, and welder. After service in the Aviation Engineers during World War II, I attended Texas Tech under the G.I. Bill and graduated with a degree in Petroleum Geology. I worked as a geologist in the Permian Basin before moving to Hereford and beginning business as a farmer and rancher."

Concerning his platform, McCathern said, "As a taxpayer and a businessman, I understand that profit is not a 'four letter word.' Our business people must be allowed to make a fair profit in order to generate the jobs needed by our laboring people. In the same sense, our working people must be allowed to receive a fair days' wage for a fair days' labor if they are to be able to carry their fair share of the tax burden and to buy back the goods and services offered by our business community."

"I believe that it is time to start seeking new methods of securing finances to support our educational system. We must maintain the best educational system possible for our youth, and to do so, we must be able

to compete with other states and industries with equal salaries, equal facilities, and the latest teaching aids.

"I certainly feel that water will be one of the major problems for our district in the 1980's. Ground water is fast depleting, and if we are to keep our municipal needs supplied, our industrial areas growing, and our agricultural industry prospering, we are going to have to start a crash program to build water storage facilities in the form of small surface dams all over our district. We must pursue with greater effort our water importation program, and I am committed to this effort."

"Much can be done on a state level to encourage and expedite alternate energy production facilities, including alcohol, wind, and solar. I am committed to take a leadership role in seeing that the state of Texas would offer tax incentives, research programs, and less red tape to make these energy sources a reality."

"The most important aspect of my platform will be that I pledge to be an extension of the wishes of the people of our district. In order to stay close to the people and close to the problems, I will incorporate town hall meetings on a regular basis as well as to establish scheduled conference telephone calls with our county and city commissioners during the legislative session to keep them informed about pending legislation and to seek their advice concerning

Water, Inc. Meeting Set In Amarillo

Water, Incorporated's 13th Annual Membership Meeting has been set for Saturday, February 9, at the Villa Inn in Amarillo.

Open to the public, the meeting will feature Congressman Jack Hightower at the luncheon and Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton, delivering the keynote address at 9 a.m.

Registration will begin at 8 a.m. Registration costs \$12 per person and will include the noon meal. Advance registration may be made by writing Water, Inc., P.O. Box 367, Lubbock, Texas, 79408.

Joining Hightower and Clayton on the program will be State Rep. Bob Simpson of Amarillo; Harvey Davis, executive director of the Texas Department of Water Resources; and John Specht, president-elect of the National Water Resources Association.

The program will examine recent developments in water policy on the state and national levels and the implications for water importation.

Since the organization was founded in 1967, Water, Inc., has supported water importation as the solution to offset declining groundwater supplies on the High Plains of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. Unless groundwater supplies in the region are eventually augmented, the area's agricultural productivity, which relies extensively on irrigation, will be significantly diminished.

Computer to aid research, teaching

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — The University of Texas, already first in the nation for its use of computers in instruction, has taken another giant step forward.

A new \$5-million computer system for exclusive use in research and teaching has been installed in UT's Computation Center. It has three times the capacity of the system it replaced and is the first step in a five-phase, \$15-million program to upgrade academic computing facilities at UT Austin over the next 10 years.

UT's computing facilities are used in about 1,000 courses and in more than 100 UT departments and research units.

Director teaches

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — He has told the likes of Elizabeth Taylor, Marlon Brando and Spencer Tracy what to do—and now he is doing the same for University of Texas students.

He is Edward Dmytryk, longtime Hollywood director, who is now teaching in UT's Radio-Television-Film Department. He also is teaching Drama Department students about acting in films.

Mr. Dmytryk, once known as "Mr. RKO," was director for such films as "Caine Mutiny," "Raintree County" and "The Young Lions."

Census collections

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — One of the best international census collections in the world is at The University of Texas.

The collection in UT's Population Research Center includes more than 80 per cent of all the censuses ever recorded anywhere in the world. The material is used in a variety of research about populations.

Contained in the collection are all or part of the information gathered in U.S. censuses since 1790, and complete censuses since 1950. European census information also is extensive. Among the oldest data are a 1703 census taken in Iceland and a 1659 survey of names for an Irish poll tax.

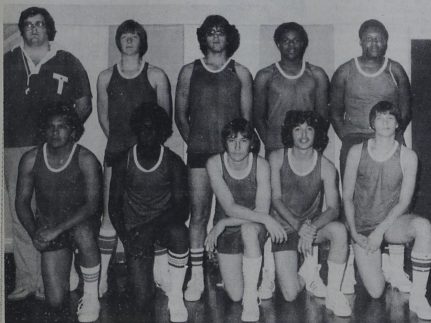

Eliminate Drafts

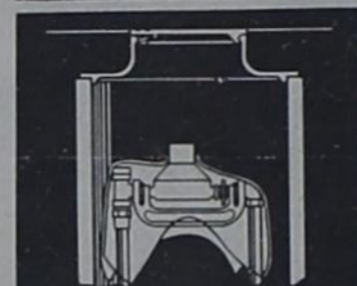
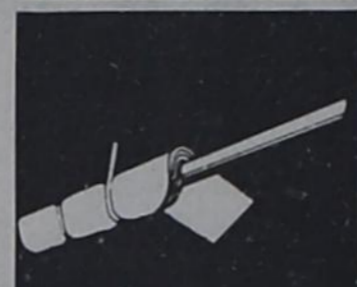
Close off crawl space vents and doors. Repair broken or cracked basement windows. Make sure basement doors and windows close tightly.

Insulate Pipes

Be sure pipes in unheated parts of your home, including crawl spaces, are insulated.

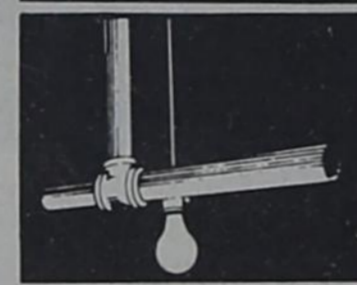

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Electric Company Asks Rate Increase

Southwestern Public Service Company announced Monday that it needs to increase its retail rates by 14.78 per cent to the customers in Texas served by the electric company.

Information outlining Southwestern's needs is being presented to city officials in this area today. Formal filing with all regulatory bodies is pending.

Bert Ballengee, executive vice president of SPS, said the increase is needed for three primary reasons: inflation, the high cost of money and the cost of switching from gas to coal. "Every one of us is affected by inflation including SPS," Ballengee said. "As our costs for making and delivering electricity continue to go up, the price must also go up."

"Every one of us is also affected by high money costs, including SPS. When we borrow money at today's record high interest rates, or sell stock, people are actually letting us use their savings to build new power plants and lines and to build new equipment. If we do not give them a reasonable return on their investment, the people will stop

letting us use their money and our ability to deliver electricity to our customers will be limited.

And every one of us is affected by the change in the way we make electricity. We must build coal-fired plants instead of the conventional gas-fired plants because of cost, supply and government regulation. Coal-fired plants cost almost twice as much but the electricity would still cost less than continuing to burn higher priced natural gas," Ballengee said.

The 14.78 per cent increase is an average for all types or classes of customers. The increase will vary from one rate class to another. For example, a customer that uses 500 units of electrical energy per month would have an increase of \$5.43 per month.
