





ABOUT THE VALUE OF MOTOR TRAFFIC.

There has been more than usual newspaper comment recently regarding the amount of money expended by the metor-traveling public, and for what the money is spent.

This is due no doubt to the fact that many highway commissioners are avoiding the business districts in routing highway traffic and often building new highways completely around, rather than through any portion of the communities along the route.

Some cities think this plan ruinous to business and loudly voice their protests; others believe that it is sound sense.

In the controversy that has arisen it has been stated that the motor traveling public is of no value to a community-that the cash expenditure of motorists is confined to hot dogs, a bottle of pop and an occasional ice cream cone. A pure case of where a "man can appreciate only that which he knows." In this case he either does not know or it is sour grapes.

The advisability of routing highway traffic away from a town does not enter into this-I take no issue with any highway official-but I will say that the average town, regardless of the fact that they worked hard to get hard roads, does not deserve the traffic, for they have not only failed to take advantage of the business that this traffic has made possible, but have in many cases openly driven the business away from their towns by their unthinking practices and poor business judgment.

Every highway is literally "Acres of Diamonds," but like the story, those who dwell upon it are blind to it."

Every strange motor car that travels the highways through Merkel has an average potential value in cash business of \$1.04, not only to Merkel but to every town, regardless of size, through which it passes. These cars are to a community the same as pedestrians to a store. Every individual that passes a store has a certain potential value, but the store has to get them inside before they can even expect to sell them; still no merchant would say that those who passed, but only looked in his window, were


Big Reductions in Fares Announced by Greyhound Bus Lines

A sweeping reduction of 33 1-3 per cent in excursion fares from all points on the Southland Greyhound lines to San Antonio, Waco, Laredo, Houston, Ft. Worth, El Paso, Dallas, Beaumont, Austin, Corpus Christi and Abilene is announced by officials of the Texaswide motor coach system.

The reduction, one of the greatest ever announced by a motor system, has just been authorized by the state railroad commission and becomes effective May 15 and lasts until June 15.

The plan provides for round trip excursion rates of one and one-third times the one way fare.

Announcement of excursion rate reductions follows a recent systemwide slash in all fares over all lines. totaling approximately 25 per cent.

PREVENTING ROUP IN COLD WEATHER

oultry Require Feeds With Vitamine A Content.

What's sauce for the goose is also sauce fd" the gander, and some of the things ich are healthful in the diet of the family, are equally so in the diet of the poultry flock. Carrots, codliver oil, and green vegetables belong on the table of the flock as much as on that of the family, according to P. B. Zumbro, extension specialist for the Ohio State university poultry husbandry department. "These foods carry vitamine A, a preventative of nutritional roup, a disease which often strikes flocks when they are housed during the winter and unable to obtain green feed on the grange," says Zumbro.

Symptoms of nutritional roup include nasal discharges and swelling of the face, which are characteristic of ordinary roup, but the nutritional roup also causes lesions in the eyes and mouth. Post-mortem examination usually shows the kidneys to be very pale, and marked with a network of white lines, and a deposit of white material on the surfaces of the liver and heart.

Comeplete discussion of the treatment of nutritional roup and other diseases, as well as of problems of incubation. brooding, feeding, and management, are included in a correspondence course given by the poultry husbandry department of the university.

Feeding Poultry Flock for Profit During Year

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Does your poultry flock return a good profit over the cost of feed during the year? It has been found that when laying hens are fed all the grain they will consume Leghorns and similar breeds eat from 70 to 80 pounds of grain a year. Breeds like the Plymouth Rock, Rhode Island Red. and Wyandotte eat from 80 to 95 pounds. All breeds eat from two to three pounds of oyster shells and bout one pound of grit a year.

The average farm ben lays less than 0 eggs a year, principally from March June, the season of lowest prices. Yearly profits in eggs depend largely on production in fall and winter, acrding to the United States Department of Agriculture. Rations for laying stock should include scratch grains. mashes, meat feed, green feed, mineral feed, grit, and drink. The scratch ation should be scattered through the



CALF FATTENING TESTS CONDENSED

Colorado Station Outlines **Results of Experiments.**

Results of calf-feeding experiments conducted by the Colorado Agriculof the association. tural college experiment station during 1928 and 1929 are summarized and discussed in a new bulletin recently published at the college.

Stockmen who are feeding calves this winter will find this leaflet, Press Bulletin 70, entitled, "Feedlot Rations for Fattening Calves," of much value, it is believed. Copies will be sent free to anyone interested.

The report on the 1929 test and the summary of the results of two years' experiments are explained by E. J. Maynard, associate animal husbandman, and H. B. Osland, assistant professor of animal husbandry at the college. the guests back to Corpus Christi for

Outstanding results obtained in the two years are summarized in the bulletin as follows:

1. A standard beet by-product ration of wet beet pulp, barley, cotton cake and alfalfa proved cheapest and most efficient for fattening calves in beetgrowing areas.

2. The relative efficiency of wet beet pulp siloed at the factory and pressed beet pulp siloed at the farm will depend largely on the comparative length of time the pulp is stored.

3. Trench silos are practically as efficient and much cheaper than straw silos for storing pressed pulp.

4. Corn silage can be used to supplement wet beet pulp in a beet by-product ration for fattening calves; 6.3 pounds of corn silage fed daily reduced the pulp requirement by nearly one-half.

5. Dried sugar-beet tops showed a feed replacement value of \$6.41 per ton of tops fed.

6. Steer calves made cheaper and heavier gains than heifer calves.

Practical Treatment Is Urged for Mangy Horse

A horse that has mange may be treated by using a solution made by boiling one and one-half ounces of tobacco in a quart of water. Sponge or brush the horse, using this liquid, and repeat in ten to fourteen days. It will be necessary to clean the har-

ness, collars, curry combs, brushes, etc., that come in contact with the horse. You can disinfect these articles by using any of the common disinfecme sulphur or nicoti





Crushed Oyster Shells

Are Valuable for Hens New feeders of crushed oyster shell report an average of 30 extra eggs a year from each hen. According to other experienced poultrymen this is a modest estimate. Many who trapnest their hens and keep an accurate record of production find that the average is higher. If eggs are figured at three cents each that means 90 cents more in actual cash from each hen. As the bird will eat only about three cents' worth of oyster shell during the year, the net profit is S7 cents. Turkeys Easily Picked if Killed in Right Way

For dry picking, the turkeys are usually hung by their legs at a convenient height for killing. The jugular vein is cut by the single stroke of a sharp knife and the point of the knife is then pushed through the roof of the mouth into the brain. The last operation is known as "sticking" and when properly done paralyzes the bird and loosens the feathers so that they come out easily. Turkey feathers can be removed more easily than can chicken feathers, the proper bleeding and sticking being the most difficult part of the operation.

Contented Birds

Contented, unworried pullets will get into production early and will tend to keep up their production. When pullets are first brought in from the range, they have a tendency to be rather excitable until they become accustomed to their new surroundings. When approaching a pen, whistle or call softly or knock on the door, so as to warn the birds of your approach. This practice may help to get several additional eggs every day from the pullet flock.

Ability to Lay

The ability to lay is inherited and thus depends more on breeding than on feeding; but pullets should be well developed in body before they start to lay. If the pullets seem to mature too rapidly do not feed them wholly on grain to slow up their inclination to lay; anything that checks laying is also apt to stunt permanently the growth of the birds. Feed a mash along with scratch grain, as it is more complete in protein minerals and vitamins.

Whitewash the barn using onefourth pound of chloride lime to a gallon of water. It is desirable to dip the harness, brushes, etc., rather than to spray them, as the dipping is more sure to kill the insects.

Ground Feed for Stock Found Not Profitable

A safe rule as to feed grinding is to grind medium fine all grain for dairy cattle and all hard grain for the other live stock. Extremely fine grinding for cattle, hogs or sheep does not pay for the extra power required, accord-Where dockage is used as part of the ration, this should be ground fine enough to destroy all weed seeds. Tests at several experiment stations indicate that so far as feeding value is concerned, grinding dry forage hardly pays, but that there is considerable saving in wasted material, in handling, and in hauling out the manure.

Sows should take plenty of exercise. Grain should be scattered over the ground to encourage exercising.

A convenient water supply is an essential feature of good live stock management in winter as well as in summer.

In addition to grain the brood sows should be supplied with as much good quality alfalfa or clover hay as they will consume.

Potatoes are somewhat unpalatable, but they can be successfully fed to sheep, cattle and horses in the place of corn silage. . . .

Farmers everywhere are giving greater attention to lowering cost production and developing hogs that most often are market toppers.

. . .

In feeding potatoes to hogs it is necessary to cook or steam them, seasoning with a little salt. They more nearly meet the requirements for feeding hogs when used in this way than they do when fed to other classes of live stock. . . .

Cars for shipping cattle in extremely cold weather should be deeply bedded and the sides lined with heavy paper to a height which will prevent strong air currents from striking the animals directly.




