

SWPS Plans \$73 Million Investment

Southwestern Public Service Company will invest more than \$389-million during the next five years in new equipment and improvements, Roy Tolk, chairman and president of the electric company, announced today.

Expenditures for 1976 will be about \$73-million, while the projected expenditures for the other four years range from \$65-million to \$104-million, the latter expenditure scheduled in 1980. The new equipment and improvements are necessary so that SPS can continue providing electric service for the 45,000-square mile area it serves.

"During the five-year period, Southwestern will be required to borrow about \$255-million to meet these construction expenditures," Tolk said.

Two new generating facilities to be installed during this period will increase the SPS system capability by more than 700,000 kilowatts, bringing the total capability to just over three million kilowatts.

Harrington Station, northeast of Amarillo, will be the site for the two additional generating units. The first is nearing completion and is scheduled to go on the line in June 1976. The second unit is scheduled for completion in 1978. Both of these units will have a capability of 350,000 kilowatts and will use coal as their primary fuel.

"During the latter part of the five-year period, substantial expenditures will be made on a third 350,000-kilowatt generating unit presently planned for completion in 1981. This unit will also use a coal-fired boiler," Tolk said.

Low-sulphur coal from Wyoming is now arriving at Harrington Station. Approximately 11,000 tons are delivered every four to five days by a 110-car unit train, and SPS presently has about 125,000 tons on hand. This represents about a month's supply of fuel.

Southwestern Public Service Company, through its fuel subsidiary, TUCO INC., is continuing its aggressive program to assure adequate fuel supplies.

REMEMBERING...Chuck Wagon

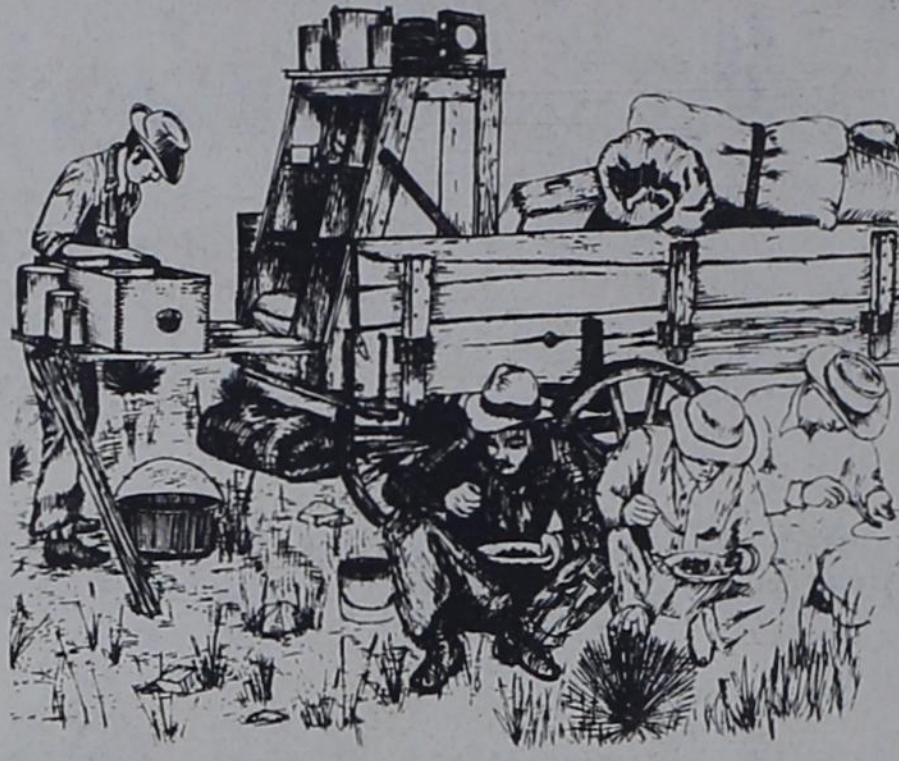
During round up time on the larger ranches, cowhands often had to stay out on the range several days. In those times a chuck wagon was a familiar sight to all and a welcomed one to a cowboy who had worked hard all day. It was usually a standard flat bed wagon with short sideboards. The tail gate was left out and the chuck box was bolted in place at the back of the wagon. The chuck box was a cabinet-looking thing that had a large door facing the rear of the wagon. The door was hinged at the bottom and latched at the top. While in use, the door folded down to serve as a table or counter on which to prepare the food. Various sized compartments inside the box held the supplies, tin plates and knives, forks and spoons.

If you were a picky eater you were in trouble on a round up. The menu was not elaborate as any cowboy can tell you. The choice was usually beans, bacon, sourdough bread and fresh beef butchered there on the spot. Canned goods were taken along, usually peaches, corn and tomatoes. Canned milk was used whenever it was needed for cooking. Coffee was the accepted drink.

One cook used to try to be nice to the hands and would make them a cake occasionally. A cowboy was heard to say he didn't mind the cake so much except it tasted a lot like the corn bread, only the corn bread was sweeter. Very little complaining was done about the food though because appetites were usually high by the time the dinner bell sounded.

One thing about the Chuck box though, it was the cook's territory and no cowhand was to ever mess around in it. That was a good way to get shot or at least get a good cussin'.

"Chuck" was a term for food but the chuck wagon was more than just a place to eat. It was the cowboy's home away from home, a place where there was always hot coffee and a warm fire. Bed rolls were unrolled around it at night among prickly pears, mesquite, rocks and sometimes rattlesnakes.

When darkness came in the evening it was a place to gather and tell stories; stories about other days, of gun fights, girls, drinking and lifelong dreams. Of

course a lot of them were lies but that didn't matter. They took the cowboy's mind off the hard day's work just completed and made his life a little more exciting.

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MBPXL Votes For Quarterly Dividend

At its meeting recently, the Board of Directors of MBPXL Corporation voted a policy of regular quarterly ten cent (\$.10) dividends per share with the first payment to be made on February 11, 1976, to holders of record on January 21, 1976. A special ten cent (\$.10) extra dividend is to be paid with the first regular quarterly dividend.

David J. La Fleur, President, announced that MBPXL Corporation earned \$3.12 per share in the year ending October 25, 1975. This is a 42 per cent increase over the \$2.20 per share in the preceding fiscal year.

The beef packing concern reported that while it slaughtered seven per cent more cattle and fabricated 21 per cent more carcasses, the dollar sales decreased from \$727 million in 1974 to \$709 million in 1975 due to lower prices and to the conversion of outside sales to intra-company transfers. President La Fleur attributed the increased profit

to a strengthening of the relationship between live cattle prices, to the acquisition of a trucking subsidiary during the year and, most importantly, to the development of a strong MBPXL management team from the executives of the two firms which merged to form MBPXL Corporation: Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. and Kansas Beef Industries, Inc.

During the year, MBPXL started operations in its new boxed beef plant in Wichita and expanded its boxed beef facilities in Plainview, Texas.

MBPXL Corporation is an integrated beef slaughterer and fabricator with plants in Friona and Plainview, Texas; Wichita, Kansas; Rock Port, Missouri; Omaha, Nebraska; and Boise, Idaho.

The Wichita-based firm also operates a distribution center in Philadelphia and a contract truck carrier in Amarillo, Texas.





Electric Company In Policy Change

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it will no longer bill its Texas customers monthly for the one-sixth of one percent of its annual Texas revenues that it is assessed under the law which established the Texas Public Utilities Commission. The company also announced that it would refund the amount that it has collected since the new law went into effect.

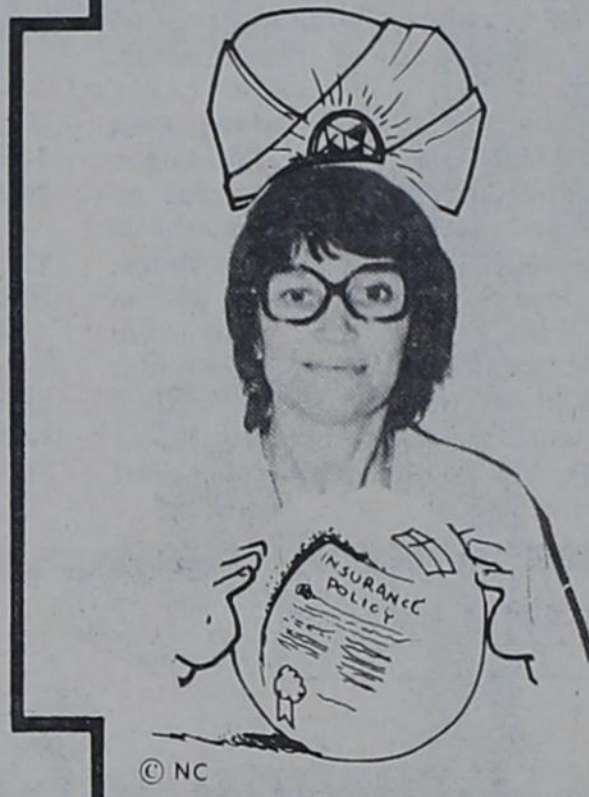
A Southwestern spokesman said that, while the company and the Public Utilities Commission were in agreement that the tax clause in the company's rate ordinances made the collection of the assessment

completely legal in urban areas, there was a difference of opinion between the Commission and the company on whether the tax clause permitted the company to assess rural customers.

"The question here is what is fair to Southwestern's customers. It would not be fair to collect legally from one set of customers and not assess the others, when all of our Texas customers are part of the jurisdiction of the utility commission," the spokesman said.

Refunds of the assessment already collected will be made to customers as soon as possible.

Chieftains Play Well In Amarillo Tourney

The Friona High School Chieftains, champions of the first two Amarillo American Legion Holiday basketball tournaments, finally lost their rabbit's foot in the big city event this year, but the team continued its fine play in the Amarillo classic.

The Chiefs came from a 13-point deficit in their first round game against the Phillips Blackhawks in the tournament's Division I, to score a 21-point victory, 64-43 on Monday evening.

In the semi-finals on Tuesday, Friona was pitted against strong class AAA Canyon, and carried the fight to the Eagles before bowing by six points, 52-46.

The team dropped a tough 50-48 triple overtime game to Tulia in the battle for third place Wednesday.

"Maybe we are coming out of the slump we have been in and are beginning to play like we did at the first of the season," said Chieftain Coach Larry Dyess. The Chiefs, who broke out to a 4-0 season record, stood at 8-7 for the season following the Canyon game.

The Chiefs might have upset Canyon and found themselves in the tournament finals for the third straight year if big junior Mark Neill had not got into foul trouble and saw very little action. Neill, who copped a season high of 20 points in the Phillips game, dipped to only two points on a single basket Tuesday.

"Mark got a couple of fouls early, and then began pressing. Before you knew it, he had four fouls and the first quarter wasn't even over," Dyess said.

His absence also hurt the team's rebounding effort, since Canyon has a tall team.

The Chiefs lost the Canyon game at the free throw line, where they connected on only six of 19 charity tosses, compared to 16 of 23 for the Eagles.

In the vital fourth quarter, when the Chiefs were trying to catch up, Friona hit only three of 12 free throw attempts, and every attempt was a 1-1 situation, when the team could have scored two points.

After trailing by seven points at the half (30-23), Friona chipped away at the lead and went into the

fourth quarter trailing by only three, 40-37.

Late in the game, with Friona still behind by three, the team received a "crazy" technical foul call, and it resulted in a five-point play for the Eagles and helped sew up the game.

In the Phillips game, the first half was a nightmare, as the team fell behind by nine points, 19-10 after the first eight minutes. At one point in the second quarter, the Blackhawks led by 13 points, 25-12, and held an eight-point lead at intermission, 29-21.

In the second half, Friona went into a fast-break offense, and began a half-court man-to-man press on defense, and caused the 'Hawks to turn the ball over a number of times.

Friona outscored Phillips, 26-8 in the third quarter, and went from eight points behind into a ten-point lead at the buzzer. Dyess credited the outstanding floor play of junior Keith Martin and sophomore Jeff

Whiteside with sparking the second half rally.

The Chiefs hit 52 per cent of their shots in the second half against Phillips, getting some good percentage shots on the fast break.

Friona gets some more good experience this Friday (January 2), when they host the Canyon team in a game at Chieftain Fieldhouse.

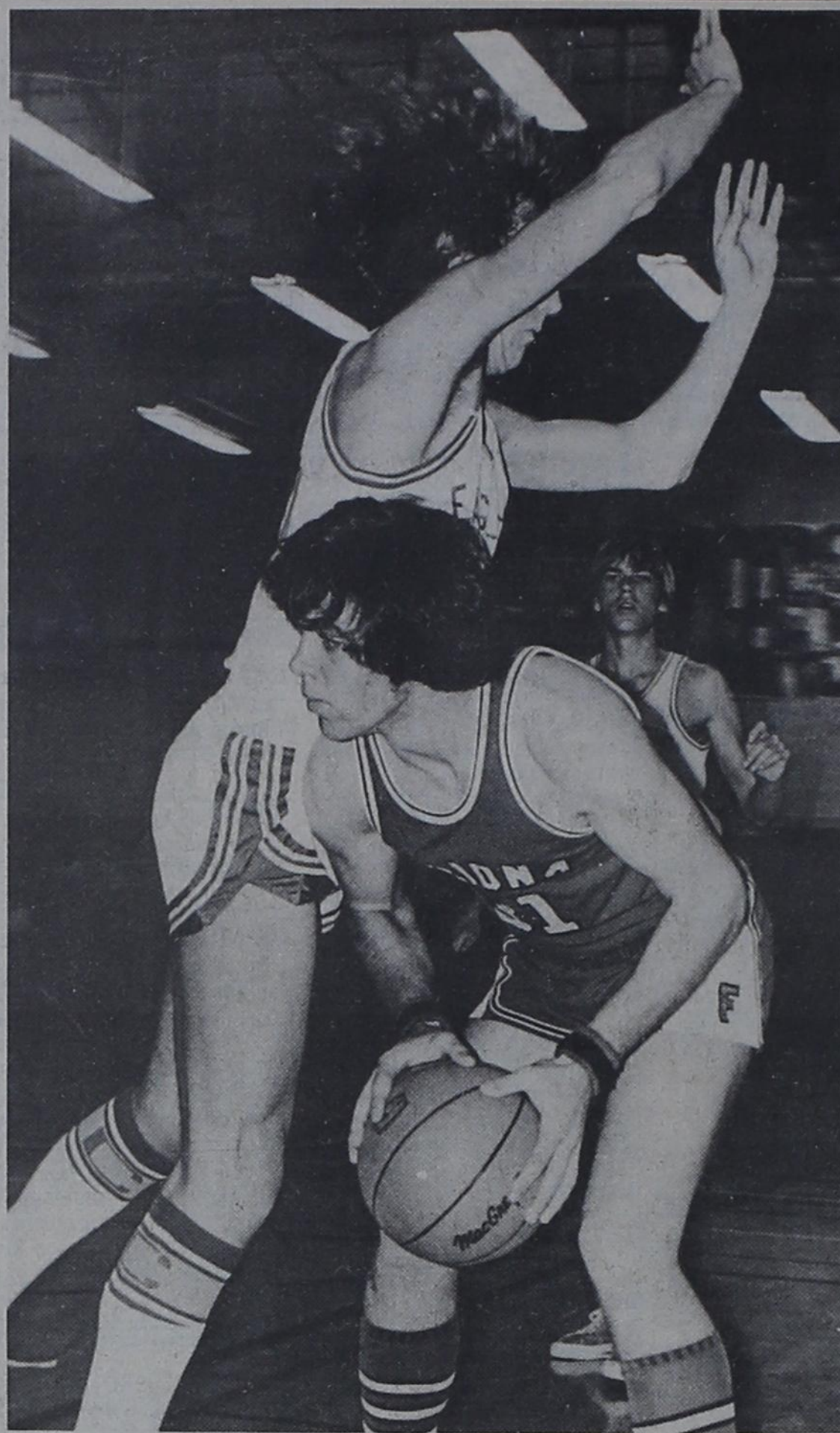

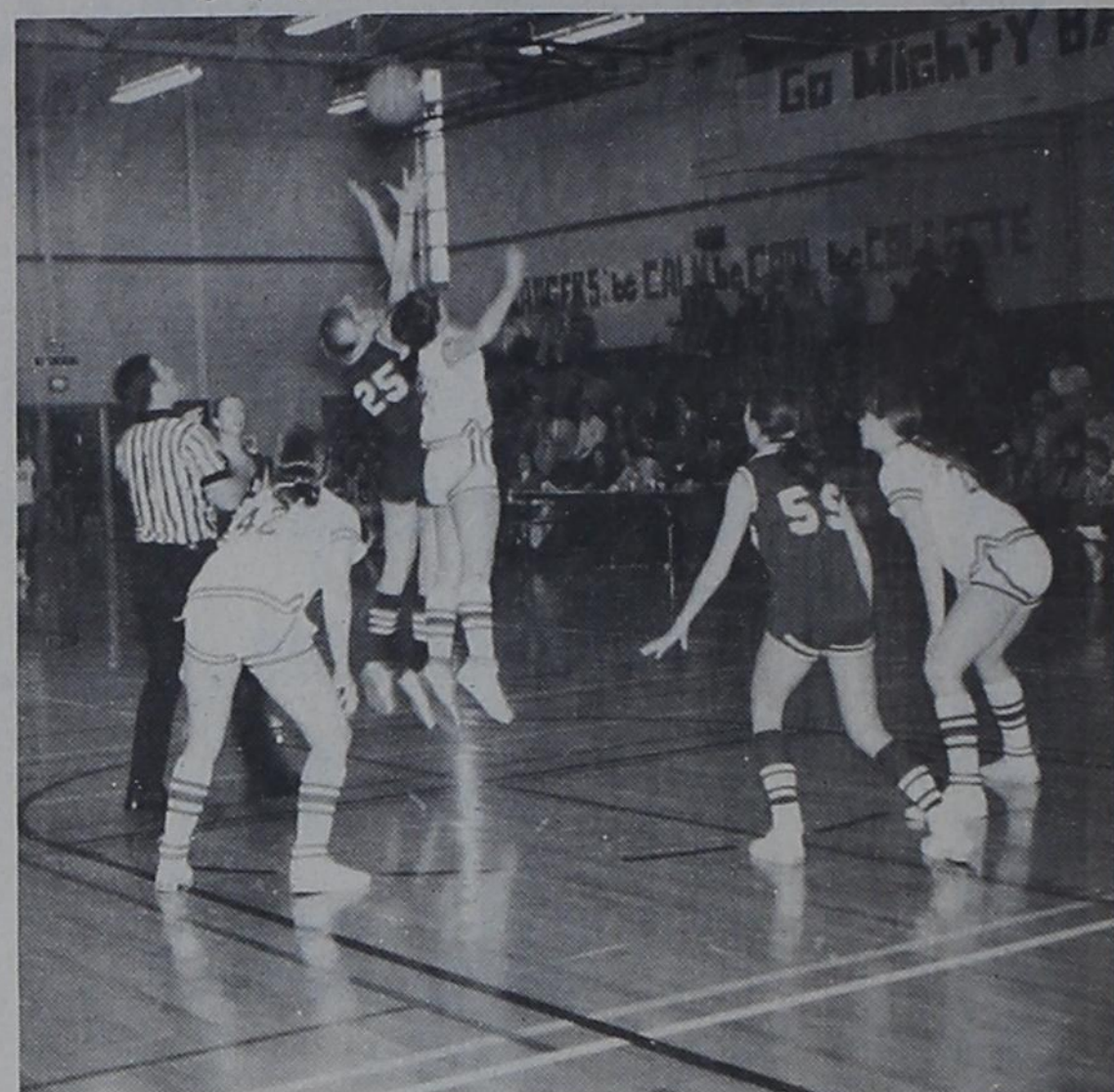

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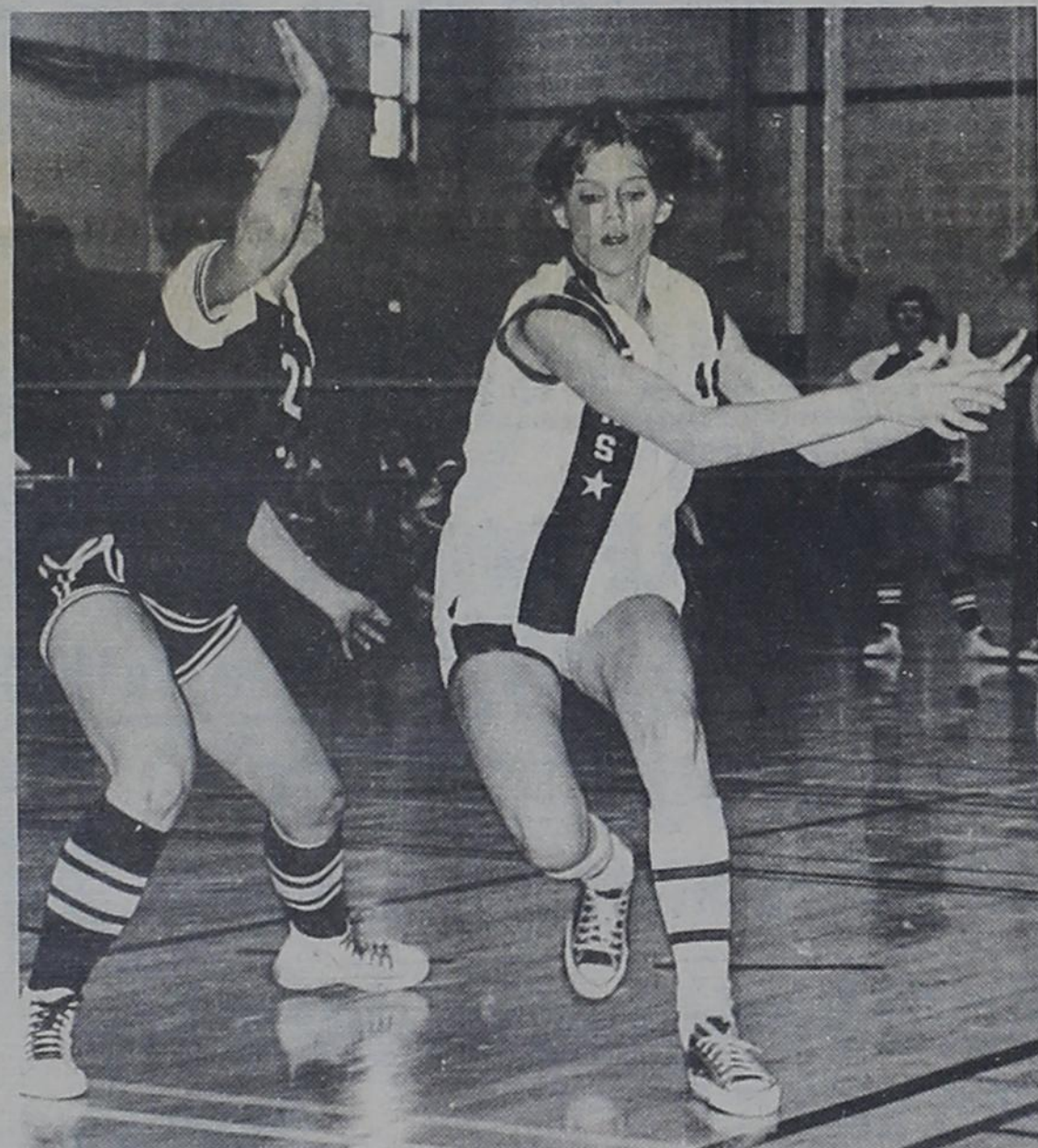

He is majoring in boot and shoe operations and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F.H. Gable of Littlefield, Texas and is a graduate of Friona High School.

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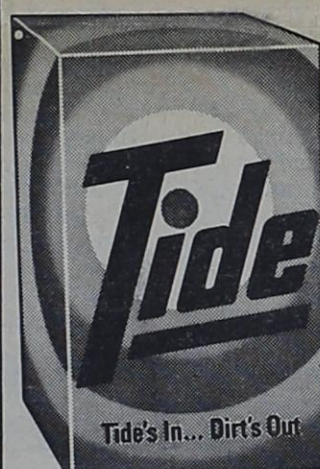
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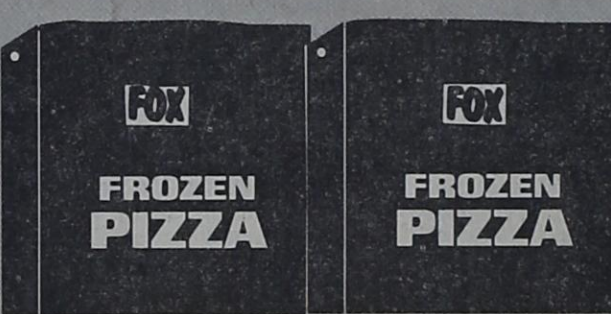
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
