THIS WILL BE OUR LAST column for the year, and as such the last one we will publish during the 1970s. The next time we'll be greeting you in this space, it will not only be a new year, but the beginning of a new decade.

A lot has been written and said about what has happened in our country and state during the 1970s, and how the events of the decade will shape our life styles in the future.

We have watched on television or followed other news accounts while Arab terrorists blew up jet planes at the start of the '70s. The entire civilized world shook its head at the mass suicide at Jonestown in 1978, and wondered how this could happen, under the guise (or disguise) of religion.

The attraction of cults was not the only shocking revelation of the 70s, however. We gasped at such events as the Patti Hurst escapade, the "Son of Sam," John Gacy, and other mass murderers.

In politics, the 1970s will be remembered for the first resignation of an American president and vice president, the Watergate scandal, the Wilbur Mills sex scandal, etc., which "turned off" millions of Americans on politics for a time.

But there were lighter and happier moments during the decade, also. America threw a whing-ding of a 200th birthday party during 1976, and the country entertained its first Pope during a whirlwind tour this past year.

In entertainment, "Star Wars" touched off a new wave of outer space movies, Alex Haley gave us "Roots" and a closer look at our families' origins, and Steve Martin proved to be a real "wild and crazy guy."

In Texas during the '70s, Waylon, Willie and the boys made Luckenbach a national by-word; and "Racehorse" Haynes made a name by defending Cullen Davis in murder-related trials. The High Plains had its first native son in the governor's chair with Preston Smith, and the Republican party became a reality in the state by electing Bill Clements in 1978.

In the sports world, we bred a new breed of super-heroes who sometimes detracted from their accomplishments by their demand for astronomical salaries. Mark Spitz won a record seven gold medals in the 1972 Olympics, salvaging some of the limelight from the Arab terrorists.

At least twice during the decade, a foreign leader has turned diplomacy into a joke. Idi Amin of Uganda was the first, and the current crisis in Iran, led by the Ayatollah Khomeini, has the nation on a tight-rope while holding 50 Americans hostage.

Clements Plugs For Energy Production

"I'm familiar with the problems of farmers. My dad and grand-dad were farmers in Kaufman County," Governor Bill Clements told a group of area residents at Hereford Wednesday.

Clements was the special guest of the Struve and Welch families, and had come to the Panhandle for the opening week of the pheasant season. He spoke to a group of invited friends at a luncheon at Hereford Country Club.

"The only answer to the nation's energy problem is the production of energy. Mr. Carter's program on energy conservation won't do the job. We need to turn loose our farmers and producers, and not hold them back," Clements said.

Clements said in regard to his promise to reduce the state's bureaucracy by 25,000 in four years, that he had currently reduced the number of state employees by 4,000, and expected the number to double, to 8,000 by the end of the next fiscal year.

"When we reach the figure of 8,000 reductions, this will amount to

On the subject of energy, Clements said this was probably the single most important topic for us as Texans and Americans. "It is a national and an international problem, and has an impact on our national security," he said.

Santa Claus is expected to visit the children in Bovina Friday afternoon downtown, after school dismisses.

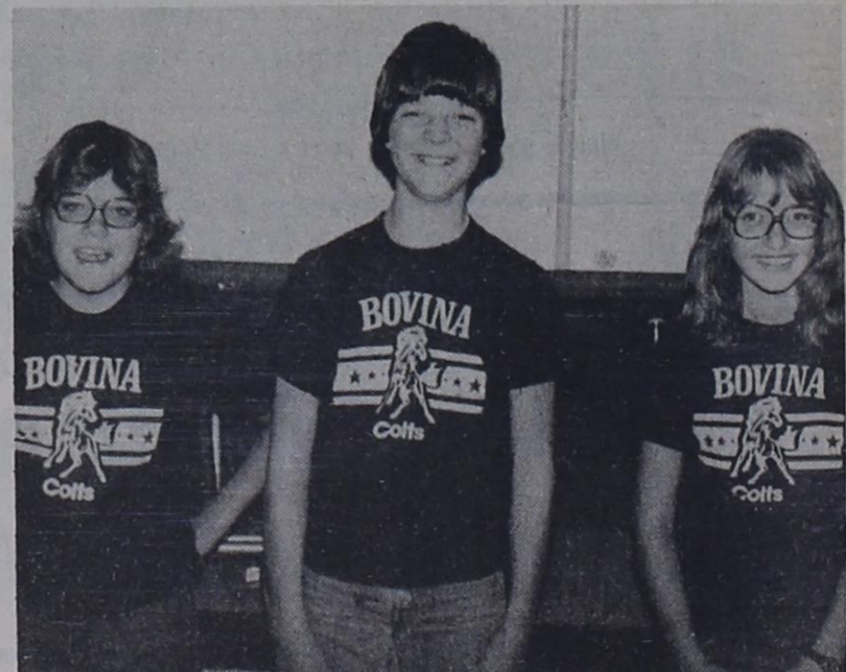
Santa's appearance here is being sponsored by the Bovina Chamber of Commerce. All parents are urged to make arrangements for their children to see Santa here Friday afternoon.

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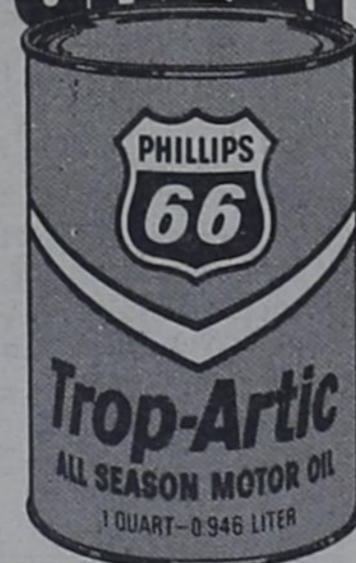

national crises America has faced in recent years—possibly since World War II.

"The Middle East is without question the most sensitive of any area in the world today. The implications of the Iranian situation are horrendous. There is no government, as we know government, in Iran at the present time, and the situation is likely to get worse before it gets better," Clements warned.

Clements explained the three issues which he has discussed with the president of Mexico: illegal aliens, energy and drugs. "I feel we're making progress on the issue, but on the alien situation, I seriously doubt that this will come up for serious debate next year, since it is an election year.
