Washington, Sept. 12. - Unusually favorable cotton-growing weather in August caused the agriculture department to raise its estimate of 1940 production to 12,772,000 bales Monday. This was an increase of 1,343,-000 bales over the August 1 forecast.

Production last year was 11,817,-000 bales and in 1938 it was 11,-943,000. The 1929-38 average was 13,547,000.
