On the face of the final tabulation released Tuesday night by the Texas Election bureau-an organization of newspapers of the state for the purpose of gathering election returns-Governor W. Lee O'Daniel, twice winner for the governorship without a run-off in a state democratic primary, apparently defeated new deal Congressman Lyndon Johnson by 1,095 votes in the race for United States senator to succeed the late Morris Sheppard.

Bob Johnson, manager of the Texas Election bureau, cautioned, however, that while the returns from counties had been checked and rechecked there was always chance for errors. Unless there were corrections, the bureau announced that Tuesday's report would be its last.
