

"With six cases of polio in Taylor county in 1946, and 35 suspects, residents of this county will be asked to give generously in the drive to fight the dread disease," Chairman

The report of activities for 1946 show that the county chapter raised \$9,000 during the year and paid out over \$4,000 for braces, doctors, . hospitalization and medical fees.

Fifty per cent of every dollar contributed is left in Taylor county to fight polio, the other fifty per cent is sent to the National Headquarters for Research Work.






