MERKEL MEETS SEMINOLE IN BI-DISTRICT TILT

Untied and Unbeaten Badgers Go to Border City for Play-Off; Indians Have Lost Only One Game This Season.

Merkel's untied and unbeaten Badgers will clash with the once-beaten Seminole Indians for the bi-district championship at Seminole Friday af-

ternoon at 2:15. In winning their fourth district 8A pennant in the past five years. Coach Carroll Benson's powerful Purple and Gold aggregation has won ten consecutive contests, rolling

up 282 points to their opponents' 40. The local eleven has averaged 247 yards rushing per game while holding the opposition to 89 yards. Although the Badgers have depended chiefly on a powerful running game, their passing attack has been above the average, completing 47 passes cut of 105 attempts for a total of 829 yards. Ten of these completions have been for touchdowns. In the punting department, tailback Jimmy Walker and halfback James Land

have averaged 32 yards per boot. Seminole's complete season record is not available but it is known that Coach Gordon Woods has one of the finest Class A ball clubs in West Texas, having won 9 games and lost 1. The lone defeat was a 26-13 setback at the hands of the Littlefield Wildcats early in the season. The Indians reached their peak in defeating

Monahans 26-14. The only direct comparison that can be made between these two district winners is on the basis of the Andrews games, Merkel downed Andrews 6-0 on a muddy field, whereas Seminole whipped the Mustangs 28-18. On the basis of this score and by having the advantage of playing at home, the Indians have been in-
