Total for Year Just Closing Was \$16,894.96; Bank Deposits Still Range Above the \$3,-000,000-Mark on Dec. 31.

Merkel postal receipts for the year of 1947 showed a gain of \$1,-284.33 over those for 1946, it was shown in the final figures for the year just closing in Postmaster Wrenn Durham's tabulation.

Receipts for 1947 were \$16,894.96, as compared with \$15,610.63. The 1945 total was \$20,303.77, while the all-time high-\$21,810.98-was reached in 1944.






