

Better Lighting Needed Thirty Boys Present In Grammar School

Although there is no positive proof, there are good indications that severmeans a loss of \$55 to the school for al elementary school pupils are beties and Exchange commission, Washcensus enumerator for the Merkel year because of the poor artificial and natural lighting in the Merkel Grammar school, according to local

school administrators. Experiments with a light meter under various conditions show that boys. many Grammar School students do not have one-half as much natural light on their desks on a normal day as is recommended by lighting authorities. On cloudy days, some of the pupils do not have one-tenth the light needed, even with the lights on.

In a recent visit to the schools here, Clive Pierce, representative of the State Department of Education, declared that better artificial lighting is badly needed in the classrooms.

Eye tests given each year by the school nurse indicate that more and more children are suffering from deficient vision. This steady increase in eye trouble is thought to be partially at least due to the exposure to several years.


