## Bareback Bronc Riding Thrills Large Crowd at Russell Arena

The rodeo staged by Ralph Russell is a colorful, thrilling entertainment. There is never a dull moment. In spite of the many unexpected things that come up Ralph keeps the rodeo going fast and furious with Cramer Reynolds using the loud speaker to good effect.

The minute hand is nearing 8 p. m. Friday, time to begin the rodeo. "Let's start," advises Ralph. And Cramer cries over the loudspeaker, "Will you people please clear the arena for the grand entry!" Nobody moves. Cramer is inspired and commands, "Every body on his horse. Get ready for the grand entry." Canned music is played. "Let's go!" shouts the announcer. Louder music is blasted. Ralph leads and the grand entry starts. All the riders follow along.

The bareback bronc riding is a new feature here and proves to be breath-taking in every way. The chute is opened and the horse and rider leap into the arena. The horse is wild, never having been ridden before. It pitches, jumps, surges, sways. The rider jerks up and down, swings from side to side. It takes nerve and skill and lots of practice to stay.

One stays on, two stay on, three stay on the horse. Then, smash! The rider bites the earth. The next comes on. The rider hits the ground with a hard thump. Then the horse hits the earth! Luckily, the man was off.

The mule exhibition was a sudden affair, quickly over. The chute is opened, the mule lurches forward, one second, two seconds, the rider is hurled into the air comes down to earth. It's all over, quickly.

## Power Purchased By REA Jumps In Last 10 Years

Operators of rural power systems financed by Rural Electrification Administration loans paid commercial utility company suppliers over \$43,000,000 for electric power in 1951, an increase of some \$5,500,000 from the previous year, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced. Commercial utilities continued to supply well over half of the power purchased by REA borrowers.

The total amount of power purchased climbed to a record of nearly 9 billion kilowatt-hours, which is 25 percent more than the previous year and 12 times as much as 10 years ago.

Purchased power does not account for all energy used by REA-financed systems. During the fiscal year 1951, REA borrowers used another 534 million kwh which they generated themselves.

Consumers connected to REA-financed lines at the close of the fiscal year numbered over 3,500,000.

The following shows the amount of power purchased and the price paid by Taylor Electric Coop. in the fiscal years 1941, 1950, and 1951: 1941, 682,700 kwh, \$7,222.45; 1950, 5,309,100 kwh, \$39,055.92; 1951, 7,137,200 kwh, \$40,910.33.

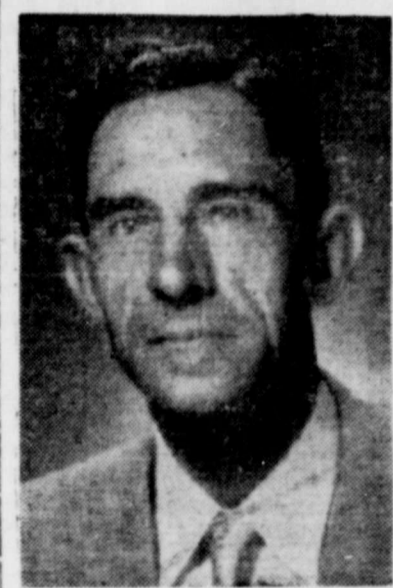

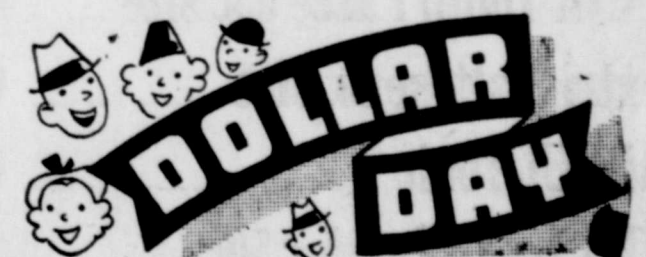

## Burleson Formally Announces For Re-election to Congress

Rep. Omar Burleson of Anson has authorized The Merkel Mail to issue his formal announcement as a candidate for re-election to a fourth term in Congress.

His statement follows: Camp Clark, one of America's great statesmen, and former Speaker of the House of Representatives of the United States, said, "The truth is being more and more realized that, other things being equal or anywhere near equal, the value of your representative increases in proportion to his length of service. The best plan for a constituency to pursue is to select a man of good sense, good habits, and personal integrity, young enough to learn, and re-elect him so long as he retains his faculties and is faithful to his trust."

On this principle I base my candidacy for re-election to Congress. At the age of forty-six, I have served the people of the 17th Congressional District for 5½ years. My record is that of a conservative. It will show that I have opposed all trends towards a welfare state, which is another term for socialism. My record will show my opposition to any schemes towards socialized medicine, socialized agriculture, socialized housing, or control of the Federal Government over local government, over business, over private lives.

Certainly I am opposed to the inefficiencies of Governmental operation, of waste and extravagance, graft and corruption. In an effort to bring about greater efficiency and reduce the tremendous cost of Government, I have supported the Hoover Commission recommendations, except that which would create a Department of Public Welfare.

As one of the leaders in an effort for greater economy, I have voted to cut more than 6½ billion dollars from the President's budget in this session of the Congress alone. All unnecessary spending should be eliminated by reducing the desirable as low as possible. Taxes have reached the limit of a healthy economy. The stability of our economy must be our first and foremost consideration to remain a strong nation and to be safe from forces both internal and external.

The national defense effort has received my vigorous support. At the same time, I have supported every effort to turn the spotlight of facts upon wasteful spending by the military, in an attempt to see that our money is spent wisely and that we receive value for our dollars.

I have believed that strength was the surest guarantee of peace. My efforts in matters relating to military preparedness and foreign policy have all been directed at one objective—a permanent and lasting peace.

In voting for the Taft-Hartley Law, I supported the inclusion of labor unions in the Anti-Racketeering Act, to curb the power of labor racketeers and protect honest union members against high-handed methods of a few labor bosses and against the Communist influence.

As your Congressman, I have been consistent in working for a sound farm program. The record shows my continuous interest in the betterment of rural living by working for fair prices for agricultural products, farm-to-market roads, REA services, and the protection of the farmer against bureaucratic controls, such as the Brannan Plan.

Most veterans are aware of my work in assisting deserving veterans in all their problems with the Veterans Administration. As a veteran of the last war, I have received great personal satisfaction in supporting, particularly, provisions for the disabled, their families, and the families of those who did not return from the war.

Everyone is, of course, familiar with the fight to retain our Tidelands. As one of the authors of the measure to keep the Federal Government from robbing the State of Texas of its Tidelands, I have remained in Washington to lend every effort against the President's veto.

Highly important legislation is now pending in the Congress. There are measures which are likely to be up for action and vote

in the next several days, such as the controls program, more Federal public housing, a bill which if passed would threaten to nullify the labor laws of Texas, and other matters which vitally affect us all, directly or indirectly. I am opposed to these particular measures, and will be at my post of duty against them. These and other highly important bills will keep me in Washington several more days, and I know that you want me to stay on the job.

It is my intention to return home just as soon as I feel it possible to do so without neglecting my responsibilities. You sent me to Washington to represent you in the Congress. I would be doing less than my duty if I returned to campaign at a time when measures so vital to us all are pending on the legislative calendar.

In the meantime, I trust that you, my friends, will consider that you have an investment in experi-

ence, which can only be attained by time. Evidently there are interests outside our own area which would like to see me removed from Congress, because they know that I am independent and stand by my convictions. They know I cannot be controlled and that I will not yield to the pressures which are constantly bearing down. They cannot, however, successfully question my record or integrity, my conduct of your affairs, nor the devotion and faithfulness to the trust you have placed in me.

I shall ever be grateful for a continuation of your support. You can be assured of my loyalty to your confidence.
