### Is Money Borrowed De Lois Reese From Government And Not a Loan

A recent loan from the government for the use of line construction is not a gift but money borrowed through the REA and "to be paid back, plus interest," said Undergoes Surgery officials of the Taylor County Electric Co-op.

The operation, the executive explained, is the same as borrowing money from the bank. The bank takes a mortgage on land, stock, farm equpment, or other property as security.

The Taylor Electric Co-op's loan for line construction is secured by a mortgage on the line, its transportation equipment, office building and furnishings.

The money was borrowed under terms that the co-op would pay a certain amount of principal, plus interest on specified dates.

Lester Dorton, manager of the Taylor Electric, reported that during 1952, the co-operative made payments on the principal of previous REA loans totaling \$29,616 .-45 and interest amounting to \$39. 412.86, for a monthly average of \$2,468.04 on principal and \$3,284.-40 on interest.

"You can see from these figures this operation is not just a government subsidized agency, but a business enterprise locally owned and controlled," Mr. Dorton said.
