



Good range conditions are found moderately. They select the proper amount of stock and are very cautious not to harm the grass by over grazing. They try to graze so that one-half of the growth of the better grasses will be left at the end of the growing season.

These hot days make me like punch better than ever. Many people must be like me because someone is always wanting a fruit punch recipe. Here is one I like. Fruit Punch

(about 50 servings) 2 small cans canned lemon

1 No. 2 can grape fruit juice 1 No. 2 can orange juice 1 — 46 oz. can pineapple juice 21/2 lbs. sugar made into syrup

(use 2½ cups water) 1 - 15c bottle Almond extract Food coloring

Add 11/2 gallons water. Boil 21/2 cups water and 21/2 pounds sugar together to make a syrup. Chill. Combine fruit juices, extract, syrup, and iced water. Add coloring to give desired shade.

Always make a sugar syrup for sweetening either small or large grasses. This prevents these recipes of fruit punch. This eliminates the problem of undissolved sugar.

-Serve fruit punch to children for mid-afternoon snacks. They are nutritious and delicious.



SENATE JOINT RESOULTION No. 2

proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 4, by providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in certain counties if approved by the qualified property taxpaying voters at an election held for that purpose within such District; prescribing the powers of such District; providing for the submission of the proposition to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of 1954; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation by the Governor and publication of notice. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-

ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 4, which shall read as fol-"Section 4. The Legislature may

by law authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in counties having a population in excess of 190,000 and in Galveston County, with power to issue bonds for the purchase, acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of any county owned hospital, or where the hospital system is jointly operated by a county and city within the county, and to provide for the transfer to the county-wide Hospital District of the title to any land, building or equipment, jointly or separately owned, and for the assumption by the district of any outstanding bonded indebtedness theretofore issued by any county or city for the establishment of hospitals or hospital facilities; to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five (\$.75) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.-00) Dollars valuation of all taxable property within such district, provided, however, that such district shall be approved at an election held for that purpose, and that only qualified, property taxpaying voters in such county shall vote therein; provided further, that such Hospital District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care to needy inhabitants of the county, and thereafter such county and cities therein shall not levy any other tax for hospital purposes; and provided further that should such Hospital District construct, maintain and support a hospital or hospital system, that the same shall never become a charge against the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation ever be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of the said hospital or hospitals. 
