Benson's Badgers Thrash Eastland Friday 13 to 0

The Merkel Badgers easily defeated the Eastland Mavericks 13-0 last Friday night on the local field. Only once during the entire game did Eastland plunge across its own side of the field, and then it charged to the Badger 3-yard line and fumbled, right after the first few minutes of the second half.

Eastland received Wesley Marton's kick and Billy Mac Gilbert nailed them on the Eastland 35. George English and Terry O'Brien held them and Billy Mac threw them for a loss.

Merkel had the ball for the first time and scored, starting from the Eastland 38 and continuing in a steady march to the 9-yard line with Kermit Rutledge, Freddie

Boone and Larry Joyce carrying the ball. Then Phillip Pursley scored on a keeper around right end. No conversion.

Eastland was unable to get farther than its own 41 with Marton, English, Erall O'Brien and Gene Hargrove stopping them.

Boone and Joyce carried the ball for Merkel. The Badgers lost ground on a penalty and an attempted pass and Eastland took over on its 42 with English making the tackle. Hargrove stopped them on the 45. A dangerous pass was beautifully knocked down by Terry O'Brien. Kermit made a nice return but a 15-yard penalty on the play placed the ball on the Merkel 28 as the quarter ended: M 6 E. 0. Eastland was able to get only as far as its own 45.

Pursley, Joyce and Boone carried the ball along for a first down Pass of 15 yards. Pursley to Gilbert, and one of 8, Pursley to Robert McLeod, were good. Joyce made a first down on the Maverick's 32.

Then Eastland intercepted a pass. In different plays Rutledge, Terry and Wesley Marton held them, stopping them on the Maverick's 41.

Pursley had the ball on the Merkel 26. Then Boone, Rutledge, Joyce and Pursley placed the ball finally on the Eastland 37. When Merkel was unable to make a first down Eastland took over on its own 32. Rutledge knocked down a pass. Gail O'Brien knocked the next one down. Kermit intercepted a pass and it was Merkel's ball on Eastland's 35. Passes were no good and the half ended there with the score still 6-0. Eastland penetrated only to its own 41.

An inspired Eastland team came on the field at the beginning of the second half. Terry stopped them cold twice on the Eastland 30. Two penalties pushed the ball back to the 20. Starting from there the Mavericks marched steadily to the Merkel 3-yard line with Pursley, Jackie Russell, Terry, Gilbert, Rutledge, Marton, English and Jerry Miller doing the tackling. Then the Mavericks fumbled.

Starting at this point Merkel was stung into action and marched steadily down the field for a touchdown. The ball was carried along by Rutledge, Joyce, Boone and Pursley to the 4-yard line, including a healthy pass from Pursley to Robert McLeod.

Boone carried the ball to the 1-yard and then dashed over for the TD. English's educated toe kicked the extra point. Score at the end of the quarter: 13-0.

In the last session Eastland had the ball on its own 40 when Gail O'Brien did the tackling. Billy Mac held them for no gain. Merkel had the ball on its own 45. The Badgers marched down the field with Boone and Rutledge doing the heavy work and placing the ball on the 3-yard line. And then the Badgers fumbled and Eastland recovered.

The Mavericks could get nowhere and kicked. Merkel had the ball on Eastland's 45. Rutledge carried the ball to the 40. Kermit recovered a Merkel fumble on the 50. Terry O'Brien hurled successfully to McLeod and the ball was on the 37 when Terry carried it to the 30. Merkel lost 10 yards. Then lost 3 more. Boone carried the ball to the 38.

Eastland took the kick on its own 10. Pursley stopped them on the 15. McLeod held them cold.

Rutledge had the ball on his own 25 when Eastland kicked and the game was over.

We Are Partners With God Says New Minister

In his first sermon here last Sunday morning, E. R. Watson, new minister for the local Church of Christ, emphasized the words of Paul, "We are laborers together with God."

Minister Watson used the challenging and encouraging statements of Paul as found in the first nine verses of the third chapter of First Corinthians as his text in his initial message here.

Speaking in a loud, resonant voice, with very appropriate arm and hand gestures, he stated, "We are partners with God. Our labor in the Lord is not wasted. We should appreciate the fact that we have God as our partner. The church is a place for every man, woman and child to work. There is something for everyone to do."

"We must work together in order to accomplish anything in the church," said Mr. Watson. "The five requirements for cooperation in the church are: We must believe the same things; we must have love for the same things; we must be associated together; we must all participate in the preaching of the gospel; and all of us must contribute of our means."

Minister Watson was educated at Gunter College at Gunter and at Austin College of Sherman. He has been preaching for 27 years in 12 states and Canada. He preached for the 12th and Chestnut congregation in Abilene for three years, before moving to Chelsea, Okla., where he has been located for the past few years.

Mr. and Mrs. Watson have four children, two boys and two girls, none of whom are at home now. The two daughters, one of whom is married, are now teaching school at Ft. Stockton. The older son, E. R. Jr., is in the armed services, and the younger, Timothy, who was just recently married, is living near Shawnee, Oklahoma.

Mr. Watson has a sister, Mrs. C. E. Bishop, living in Abilene.

PLAN POULTRY SHOW Merkel will have a poultry show again this winter. This was decided at a special meeting of the Board of directors called by President R. A. Ellis on Thursday night of last week. The time agreed upon was the second week of January.

GET COTTON TICKETS Farmers and landlords of districts 8 and 9 of Taylor County received their cotton tax exemption certificates Tuesday, the distribution being made here through representatives of the office of County Farm Agent C. Metz Heald. No sales will be approved on the basis of less than 4 cents per pound, Mr. Heald announced.

OVER 6,500 BALES Up to Wednesday night of this week 6,564 bales of cotton had been ginned this season at the five plants here and those at Noodle, Stith and Blair. This is an increase over the report published last week of 592 bales.

50TH ANNIVERSARY On Oct. 12, 1884, J. P. Sharp and Miss Edna Telford were married at the home of the bride's

Mr. Hodge had been active in church work in Abilene. He was a member of the Evangelical Methodist Church and an honorary steward of that church. He served several years as a steward in the First Methodist Church. He was a benefactor of McMurry College.

Survivors are his wife; three sons, S. J. Hodge of Stamford, Norman Hodge of Merkel and J. Howard Hodge of Midland; and three daughters, Mrs. W. D. Scales and Mrs. S. P. Nesmith, both of Abilene, and Mrs. O. B. Laird of Odessa.

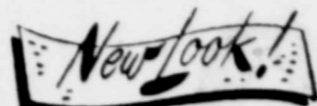

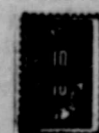

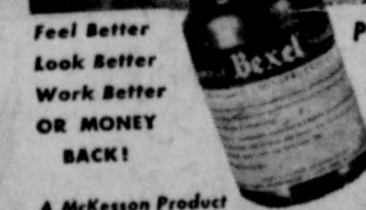

Man-made fabrics demand special precautions to machine stitch the best looking garments.

First you need to know your fabric — of what fibers it is made. You then choose the stitch length, kind of thread and size of needles based on these differences. The machine should be run at moderate speed.

The bobbin should be loosely wound when using nylon thread. Both top and bottom tensions should be as loose as possible to still do satisfactory stitching. Size "A" in nylon or silk thread is best. A little tighter tension is required for silk thread, and Number 100 cotton thread should have a slightly tighter tension than silk.

In general, small needles size 9 to 11 are best. Eighteen to 20 stitches per inch is best for sheer, closely woven fabrics. Fourteen to 16 stitches per inch is used on less sheer fabrics.

Use wide seams because of excessive raveling. Finish edges by edge-stitching, stitching with zig-zagger or turn under edges and stitch. Use sharp shears and fine pointed pins. Light weight seam-thin zippers are best for sheer fabrics.

For pressing, use wet press cloth and iron set for nylon or rayon. A steam iron can be used satisfactorily with a thin press cloth over seams to be pressed.

For further information on sewing man-made fibers, see your county home demonstration agent. Here is a recipe you might like to try.

Swiss Steak De Luxe

- 1 1/2 lbs. round steak,
- 1 1/2 inches thick
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup flour
- 2 tablespoon fat
- 1 clove garlic (minced)
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 large onions, sliced
- 1 stalk celery, diced
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 8 oz. cans tomato sauce

Trim excess fat from meat. Add salt and pepper to flour. Divide flour mixture. Pound half of it into each side of steak, using the side of a saucer. Brown meat in hot fat quickly on both sides.

Add remaining ingredients, cover, reduce heat to simmer and cook 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until meat is tender. Remove cover last 15 minutes to thicken sauce.

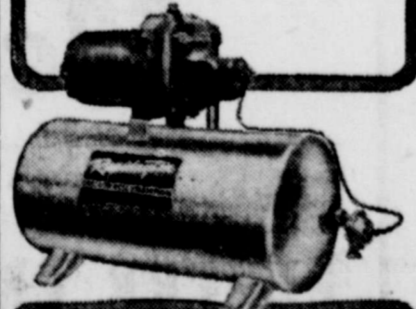

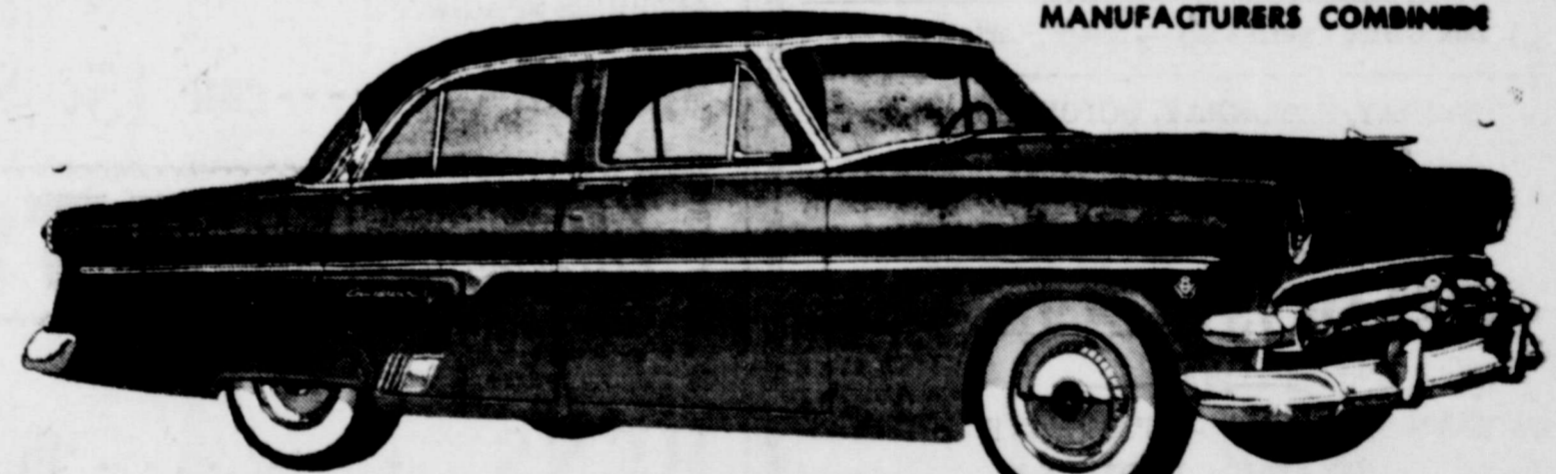
